Corn Earworm Control Tested

That pest of the roasting ear patch the corn earworm can be success fully controlled. The use of a new method of control may make it possible for farmers to grow crops of high-value sweet corn in many areas of the country where the earworms have in the past made the crops unprofitable. This has been especially true in the South

According to J. A. Deer, assistant extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College, the method has been field tested for three years in four states, including Texas, and earworms were controlled in every instance when the sprays were applied properly.

Spray applications of an emulsion containing DDT, mineral oil and water to the silks and husks of the developing ears, when applied at the right time, kills the worm before they have a chance to ruin the corn. The commercial grower who uses a power sprayer with fixed nozzles shoulld use three quarts of 25 percent DDT emulsifiable concentrate and two and one-half gallons of white
