Hilton Born 100 Years Ago



Conrad N. Hilton, the famous "Innkeeper of the

World," whose hotel empire had its beginnings in Cisco, was himself born on Christmas day 100 years ago.

Named Conrad Nicholas Hilton, his middle name carried the connotation of the special day he came into the world. The place of his birth was San Antonio, New Mexico. He died on January 3, 1979, at the age of 91.

Barron Hilton, Conrad's oldest son and current President and Chairman of Hilton Hotels, in a telephone conversation Tuesday, told Eris Ritchie, President of Cisco's Hilton Community Center, that the one hundredth anniversary of his father's birth was being observed with the issuance of special Christmas cards to Hilton Hotel guests throughout the world, and by providing in-room television clips about Conrad Hilton's life story for the guests. The short clips tell about his start in Cisco,

and they include a picture of the Mobley Hotel, Mr. Hilton said. He is sending a copy of the videotape to Mr. Ritchie for the people of Cisco, along with some of the commemorative cards.

"Ciscoans should be proud of the Hilton legacy," Mr. Ritchie stated, "as we can truly claim to be the birthplace of Hilton Hotels." He continued, "We are of course also forever indebted to the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation for providing the funding which made possible the rehabilitation of the old Mobley Hotel into its current format as the Hilton Community Center. Conrad Hilton was truly one of the world's great entrepreneurs as well as a dedicated American patriot and notable humanitarian, and we can all be inspired by his story as we celebrate the one hundredth anniversary of his birth."

Commodity Recertification

It is that time of year when Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., which sponsors the Temporary Emergency Food Assistance Program, must recertify the clients who participate in this much-needed program.

The Texas Department of Human Services' guidelines state that to receive USDA commodities, households must apply once a year in the contracted service area where they live.

Volunteers Can Deduct Expenses

Volunteer workers should be aware that certain out-of-pocket expenses are tax deductible, says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, an economist with the Texas Agricultural Ex-

ension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Expenses that qualify as deductions include these:

- Unreimbursed travel expenses, including travel expenses to and from the place of operation, and meals and lodging on the trip away from home for the organization, provided the expenses are incurred for an organization which authorizes your travel.

- Actual operating costs of your car in volunteer work, or a flat mileage rate of 12 cents per mile, whichever is greater. If expenses for gasoline, oil, tolls and parking fees are greater than the standard rate, you may deduct actual expenses. You may not deduct any part of general repair and maintenance expenses, insurance or depreciation.

- Cost of telephone calls incurred in conducting the volunteer work.

- Cost of materials and supplies furnished by the volunteer in conducting the volunteer work, such as stationery and postage.

- Convention expenses of official delegates to conventions.

- Non-deductible items include the value of volunteer time or service and child care expenses incurred by volunteer work.

Medical Perspectives

Many people long for the ways of times gone by - warm, home-made bread in the oven, milk delivered to the doorstep, gasoline for pennies a gallon and cartoons shown before each feature movie. Some also miss the old country doctor who made housecalls in his horse-drawn buggy on cold and snowy nights. None of these things are likely to make much of a resurgence in the future, but the good news is that there is a growing effort to produce more family physicians. Unlike other kinds of medical doctors, family physicians are specifically trained to care for all family members, from newborns to the aged, and to treat the whole person, not just one organ system.

Medicine has made awesome advances in the diagnosis and treatment of disease, and yet patients often feel like so much cattle, being shuffled from specialist to specialist with no one really seeing the whole picture. Family physicians have been trained to take care of 85 to 90 percent of your illnesses in a competent and compassionate fashion. They are often more accessible, available in emergencies, and cost less

money to see. When it becomes necessary, the family physician will refer you to a competent consultant, usually one with whom he or she is familiar.

Family physicians are interested in preventive health care as well as the treatment of acute illnesses. They can advise in proper nutrition, good exercise habits and how to deal with stress. The family physician will ordinarily have time to listen, to ask and answer questions and will often be your best advocate when dealing with the health-care bureaucracy. They are also trained to be cost-conscious, to avoid expensive tests when possible and to use their clinical skills to the maximum.

Family physicians complete a 3 year residency program in a larger urban hospital after graduating from medical school and are then certified by the American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP). They are trained by internists, surgeons, pediatricians, obstetricians and numerous other subspecialists as well as by family practitioners. Family physicians become "board-certified" by taking and passing a board ex-

amination, an extensive test measuring their expertise in all areas. After certification, they are required to earn a minimum of 150 hours of continuing medical education every three years and must re-take the board examination every 7 years.

I encourage each of you to establish a "partnership for health" with a family physician in your area, as he or she can provide total health care on a continuing basis. Please consult your family physician prior to journeying a distance to see a specialist. He or she may save you a trip or may direct you to the most appropriate specialist. A woman does not usually receive comprehensive health care from a gynecologist nor does a man from a urologist. Find a family physician you can trust, whether you live in an urban or rural area, then use him or her to the fullest. This will lead to a greater sense of trust between you, and each will be more devoted to the other. Agricultural Outlook Bright

The agricultural outlook for 1987 remains fairly bright, according to an economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Texas farm and ranch income will continue to be supported by strong cotton and cattle prices and sizable government payments," says Dr. Carl Anderson. He emphasizes that moderate inflation and a relatively low level of planted acreage will dampen the increase in production expenses.

"As a result, agricultural incomes in 1987 are expected to be up substantially from the depressed levels of recent years," Anderson predicts.

For 1988, the general outlook is highlighted by smaller world crop supplies, stronger demand, and higher prices. Larger meat supplies will dampen livestock and poultry prices for the year ahead, however, he notes.

"Most Texas farmers and ranchers likely will experience stable income in the New Year. Lower prices for beef cattle, pork, poultry and cotton may offset slightly higher prices for wheat, soybeans, corn and rice," Anderson says.

In the coming year, U.S. farm exports are expected to increase moderately because of low competitive prices. The weaker dollar also will boost sales, the economist predicts.

He notes that farm financial stress is easing somewhat with improved incomes, lower land and capital costs. In addition, the downturn in farm land prices is beginning to show signs of stabilizing.

"The structure of agriculture continues to change in the direction of fewer and larger commercial farms that are integrating with supply and processing firms to increase efficiency. The result is higher and more stable income per family," Anderson says.

Many part-time farmers remain who derive most of their income off the farm. These families are seeking a rural lifestyle rather than farm income, in most instances. The result is fewer middle-sized farm operations, the economist adds.

Anderson adds that a modest increase in food prices of 2 to 4 percent is in prospect for 1988. Large meat supplies will probably dampen food price gains, he notes.

U.S. farmers are idling 70 million acres, and as a result, input sales have fallen sharply. Farmers are using cash flow to pay on debt, rather than purchasing inputs. Sales of manufactured inputs are down about 30 percent from the peak, due to the idled acreage, Anderson says.

Layoffs and plant closings in recent months have led to a rapid consolidation of input and processing industries. Exports of broilers, flours, soybean products, meat and other value added products have dropped sharply because of highly subsidized sales of these products by many foreign competitors. The European Economic Community paid out about \$8.5 billion in direct export subsidies last year, Anderson reports.

"In summary, net farm income in 1988 may decline slightly from the improved

level in 1987," Anderson says. The outlook is for continued gradual improvement in the global crop supply-demand situation. U.S. exports are expected to benefit from the growth in global demand and competitive U.S. prices, he adds.

"World animal-product output is expected to increase modestly in 1988, with expanded output of poultry and pork offsetting less beef and veal," Anderson says.

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Fishing Outdoors

With the holiday season upon us, we're going to fudge a little. The following article by Larry Colombo is a very informative piece on jigging spoons. When properly executed, here's a sure-fire method for putting fish on the stringer.
Discover a better method for catching fish, and anglers will beat a path to your door. Fishermen for years have devised more improved methods for catching fish. There have been scores of successful techniques, developed over the years, which are enjoyed by anglers everywhere. Some are not necessarily new, but often unheralded.

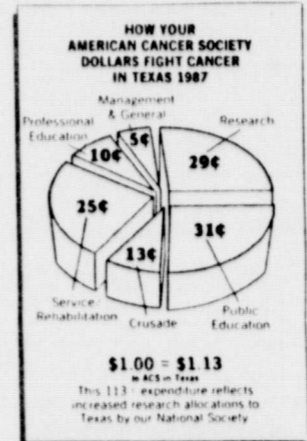
One particular method for taking any number of game fish - extremely effective and most often underrated - is vertical spoon jigging.
Next to cane poles and bobbers, spoon jigging is probably the easiest method of all angling to learn. Nearly anyone - young or old, male or female - can learn the art of basic jigging. The secret to successful angling with a spoon is not so much in the fishing, but in locating and staying in contact with the fish. Here is where the two most important tools of the trade are employed.
Number one is a good, reliable depth sounder. Number two is a set of highly visible plastic marker buoys.
Most game fish, during certain times of the year, have a tendency to bunch up or school. This usually occurs shortly after the spawn-

ing season ends. From late spring until the cool days of autumn, you will find bass, white bass, hybrids, stripers, walleye and crappie gathered in schools around open-water structure from fifteen to thirty feet deep.
Factors governing these depths will be water clarity, surface temperature, bait fish and the availability of a dozen or more types of submerged structure. Catching these fish can be easier than you think once they are located and their habits understood.
It doesn't take a lot of training to learn how to identify fish on a depth sounder. This is especially true of some of the newer LCR type units, especially the ones which readily identify fish in color. Units equipped with audible fish-alarms make it even easier.
Perhaps the most effective installation of the equipment for successful vertical jigging is a bow mounted depth sounder, with the transducer attached to the foot of the trolling motor. This set-up allows the angler to effectively monitor the depth of his quarry and their constant relationship to underwater structure.
Once a school of fish has been located, it is important they be marked. A brightly colored, plastic marker buoy is used to pinpoint the location of the fish, or the structure near which they are holding. A good idea is to drop the weighted buoy close to, but not directly on top of the school. Often during the excitement of catching fish, the nylon cord can become entangled with the fishing line. Thus, a few feet off the

target is the suggested spot.
Vertical jigging with a weighted spoon is an easy method to learn and master. Drop the spoon overboard and allow it to fall to the bottom. Reel up the slack line and, with a yo-yo type motion, raise and lower the lure, always allowing it to return to the bottom.
Most strikes will occur on the downward fall of the lure, so it is important to "feel" the lure back to the bottom. Do not simply allow the spoon to "free fall" on its downward plunge.
Once the rhythmic feel of the lure is developed, the angler should focus his attention on the underwater display. The sounder should be activated by the other anglers in the boat know there are fish present. The falling spoon resembles the dying flutter of a small bait fish. Most game fish find it hard to resist the easy, tempting meal the lure imitates.
Experiment with various sizes and colors of spoons and learn to vary the technique of jigging and the above method will soon become favorite simply because of the success it affords.
The more you keep your eye on the depth sounder, the more this method will pay off.

ADDITIONAL TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL SPOON JIGGING:
1) A good, stiff 5 1/2-foot

graphite or boron rod works best for vertical jigging.
2) Use 14 to 17 pound test line. It saves a lot of spoons.
3) Thin wire hooks will straighten easier when snagged - but will adequately hold most game fish.
4) Position the depth sounder where it can easily be seen while operating the trolling motor as the spoon is jigged.
5) Select spoons in the 1/2, 3/4 and 1 oz. sizes, in a variety of chrome, shad or chartreuse colors for best results.
6) When snagged, a spoon can often be dislodged by moving directly over it and rapidly flipping the rod tip up and down.
7) Carry at least a set of four highly colored Bass'n' Buoy's to mark the fish and structure.
8) If fish are marked suspended off the bottom, adjust the depth of the spoon to coincide.
9) Fish close to the bottom are often enticed with a short, rapid action of the spoon.
10) Several missed strikes will indicate the fish are hitting short. Go to a size smaller spoon with slightly smaller hooks.

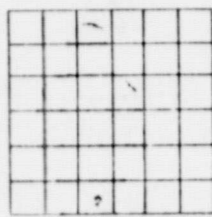

Burglary Suspect Arrested In Ranger

According to Police Chief Charles Edwards, police department spokesman, on December 24 at 1:25 a.m., Senior Patrolmen Ben Sancillo was advised by a citizen of a suspicious person at Weldon's Place on Hwy. 80. Upon arrival at Weldon's, Sancillo noticed three cases of beer outside the building. He also noticed the drive thru window was broken out. As Sancillo approached the building, a man inside the building raised up. Sancillo arrested a 40 year old white male of Ranger. Also found

was tools, including pliers and tire tools which was apparently used to gain entrance into the building by using it to break the window. Upon checking Sancillo found the suspect fit the description of a suspected burglary possibly involving a burglary at Ranger Airport where tools and parts were reportedly stolen. The suspect may also be involved in other reported burglaries. Investigation into this matter continues at this time. Officer Sancillo was backed-up by David Rodriguez and Eastland Unit and State unit.

Immigration And Naturalization Service Makes Clarification

The Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) has made a further clarification regarding I-9 form recordkeeping (employee documentation) for producers of perishable commodities.

An earlier interpretation was that I-9 forms need not be filled out for persons hired in the production and harvesting of perishable crops until December 1, 1988. This interpretation has now been somewhat modified, points out Dr. Richard Edwards, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

"Producers of perishable crops will not be penalized for hiring production and harvesting persons who cannot present proof that they have the legal right to work in this country," notes Ed-

wards. "This is not a change from the earlier interpretation; the change relates to filling out and filing an I-9 form."

According to the INS,

perishable crop producers must fill out an I-9 form within three working days and ask for qualifying documents. If documents are presented, the I-9 should be completed. If acceptable documents cannot be produced, the employer simply writes SAW (Season Agricultural Worker) on the I-9 form.

When the employer obtains an employment authorization card, it must be shown to the producer, who then should complete the previously incomplete I-9 form.

"This process is to continue until November 30, 1988," says Edwards. "At that time, no persons should be hired unless they can present proper employment documents."

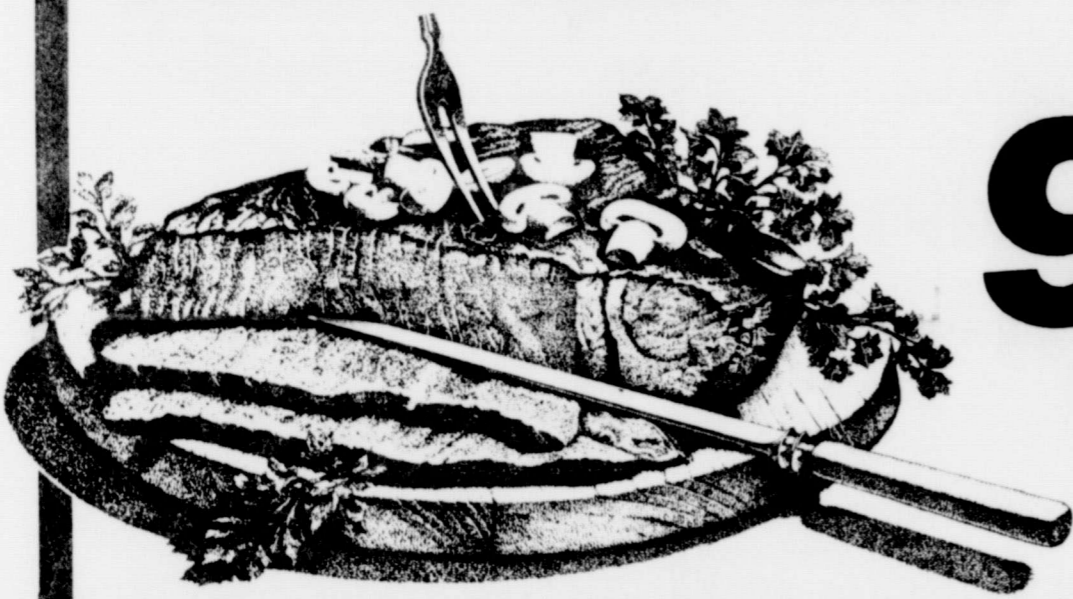

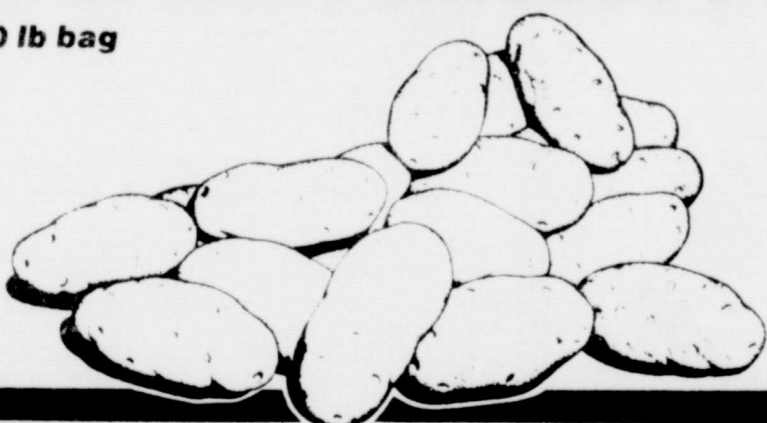

Tax Dependents For 1987 Must Have Social Security Number

"People who intend to list dependents age 5 and older on their 1987 Federal tax returns must show Social Security numbers for those dependents," Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said. This is required by the Tax Reform Act of 1986.

"We urge people to apply now for these numbers while there is more than ample time," Hammons said. "If they were to wait until 1988, they may find that the process takes longer due to heavier workloads, and they would be unable to file their tax returns early."

A person can apply for a Social Security number at any Social Security office. If

a person is 18 or older, he or she must apply for a Social Security number in person.

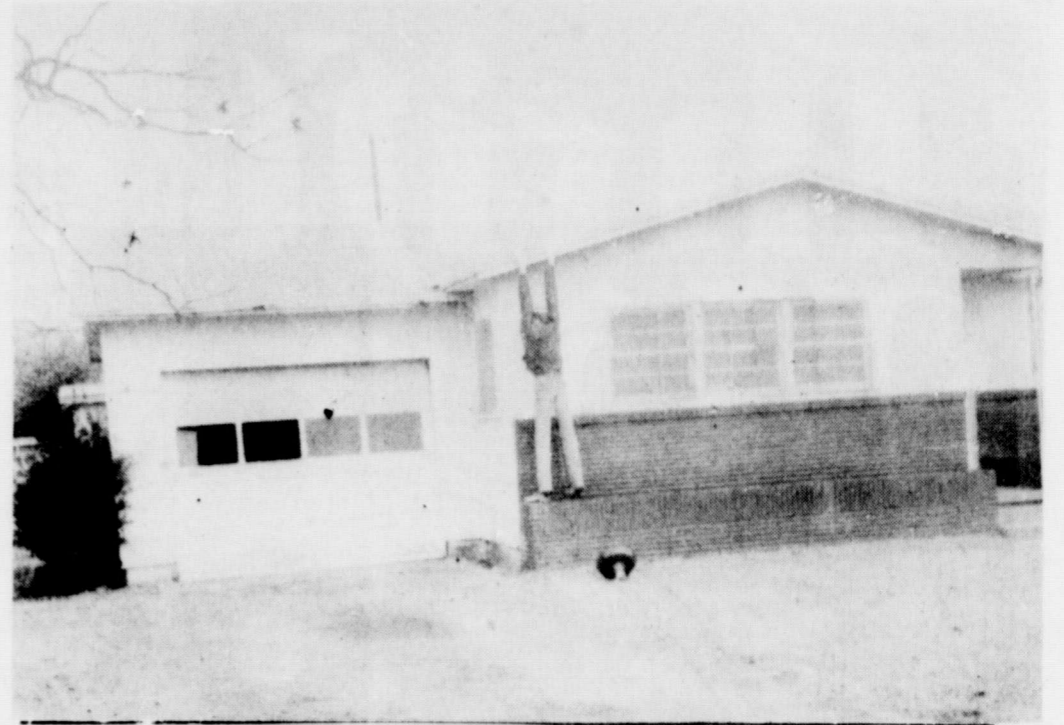
"But, parents applying for children can do so by mail," Hammons said. "In fact, they can start the application process by phone."

"When a person applies, he or she will need evidence of age, U. S. citizenship or lawful alien status, and identity," Hammons stated. If a person was born in the U. S., usually an original or certified copy of a public record of birth established before

age 5 can be used as evidence of both age and citizenship. For children, school, medical, or day care records can be used for identity.

"Approximately two-thirds of all young people already have Social Security number," Hammons said, "and they will not have to get other ones."

8-Foot Passageway At Possum Kingdom Dam Now Complete

Repairs to the dam at Possum Kingdom Lake are continuing on schedule, according to the Brazos River Authority, owner and operator of the dam and reservoir project. To date, more than \$8 million in Authority funds have been authorized for the repair work. The Authority's Board of Directors will review a proposed final budget and schedule for completion of repairs at its January 1988 meeting.

The lake level was drawn down 13 feet from the normal maximum operating level of 1,000 feet as a safety precaution while investigations of indicated foundation problems and corrective modifications are being made at the dam. The temporary maximum operating level of 987 feet was ordered by the Federal Energy

Regulatory Commission, which licenses the hydroelectric generating facilities at the project.

The process of drilling an 8-foot diameter access passageway through the 9-foot thick concrete buttresses in the spillway section of the dam has been completed.

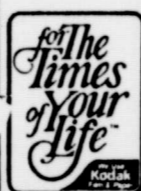
