## Lake Cisco Is Stocked With Brood Fish

Workers with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department stocked Lake Cisco with five different species of brooder fish on New Year's Eve in connection with a new program that will help to identify the fish. In years past, fish that completed their work as brooders on state hatcheries were quietly put out to pasture in public lakes.

While this probably suited the fish just fine, it did little for fishery management since the brooders could not be identified later. Now the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Hatcheries Branch has launched a new program that will encourage the 'catch and release' concept while giving anglers complete information about the fish's past.

Under the "Veteran Broodfish" program, brooders of five species will be tagged when released back into the wild. The internal tags will have an external streamer inscribed with "veteran brooder," a broodfish number and the department's toll-free number, 1-800-792-1112. Anglers catching the fish are encouraged to write

down the broodfish number and release the fish. Then by calling the toll-free number the angler will receive a history of the fish's production record and a copy of its "honorable discharge." Bill Rutledge, hatcheries chief, said the program will

## Burglary Operation Busted New Year's Eve

A sizeable collection of stolen property was recovered by law enforcement officers from a residence in Rising Star on New Year's Eve, according to Sheriff Don Underwood of Eastland. Officers of the Rising Star Police Department, the Eastland County Sheriff's Department and Constable Gene Hicks of

Rising Star worked together Thursday to acquire information and evidence, and to seize the property. "Eight to ten area burglaries should be solved as a result of Thursday's efforts," says Sheriff Underwood. "Some of the property matches the description of items taken in burglaries in the Eastland and Ranger areas."

Much of the seized property is believed to have been taken from rural houses and farms in the area. Officers continued to recover property and add it to an inventory that included refrigerators, wood burning stoves, a sewing machine, antique items such as lamps and harness, and trunks of items. One trunk contained hunting

clothing and another contained military equipment. If you have property that is missing or that has been stolen that you might be able to identify, call the Eastland County Sheriff's Dept. at 629-1774. One or more arrests are expected to be made and may be made by press time.

## Stolen Truck Recovered After Wild Chase

Tuesday morning must have seemed like a Hollywood movie to Callahan County officers and citizens of Baird.

At 7:00 a.m. the Sheriff's Dept. received a call from a man who said that someone was following him. Officers then learned that he had twice rammed a vehicle on I-20 west of Baird.

A call at 7:20 reported a man driving erratically back and forth on an overpass and acting strange.

Then a call came from Ruth's Restaurant in Baird. A large tractor-trailer U.P.S. truck had just been stolen from the parking lot as the driver was inside eating.

The U.P.S. driver ran from the building and jumped on the passenger side running board of the truck as it was leaving, but couldn't enter the cab, as it was locked.

Thinking quickly, the U.P.S. driver disconnected the air brake line, which limited the truck's speed to 35 m.p.h.

The thief hit a sign to knock the U.P.S. driver from the truck, then headed east on I-20.

Meanwhile, several witnesses at Ruth's Restaurant followed the truck in their vehicles, radio-

ing its location to Sheriff Bill Skinner and picking up the U.P.S. driver.

Sheriff Skinner overtook the eastbound truck on I-20 near the 2228 exit, but the thief refused to stop and forced the sheriff's vehicle off the road several times.

The thief drove the truck off onto the access road, then caused it to spin out as he attempted to cross back to the main eastbound lanes.

By then the truck had caught on fire from the locked down brakes, so the thief fled from the truck.

Richard Wagley of Putnam, one of the witnesses who was following the truck, then pursued and tackled the thief, holding him for the sheriff.

Eastland County officers were standing by as Sheriff Skinner took a 29 year old black male from Pineville, La., into custody.

The U.P.S. driver and the accused, Freddy B. Chew, were taken to Baird, then to Hendricks Hospital in Abilene to check for injuries.

The accused was thought to be under the influence of drugs.

Sheriff Skinner said that he was grateful to the men who kept the truck and suspect in sight and radioed their location to him.

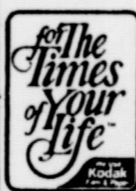

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## American Farm Bureau To Meet In New Orleans Jan. 10-14

WACO-The Texas Farm Bureau, the largest state Farm Bureau in the nation with 334,162 member families, will send 23 voting delegates to the 69th annual meeting of the American Farm Bureau Federation, Jan. 10-14 in New Orleans.

They, along with voting delegates from 48 other states and Puerto Rico, will adopt national policy for the 3.6 million member families within Farm Bureau for 1988.

Major issues that will be considered by delegates include farm program amendments, international trade, government monetary policies, environmental regulations, farm labor, and immigration reform regulations.

The 69th annual meeting will feature addresses by AFBF President DEAN Kleckner, Radio/TV Personality Art Linkletter, White House Chief of Staff Howard Baker and Ian McLachlan, president of the National Farmers Federation of Australia.

The Texas voting delegates are comprised of the TFB Board of Directors and nine leaders elected in district caucuses at the recent state convention in Lubbock.

The TFB contingent includes TFB President S.M. True, Plainview; TFB Vice President John Baker, Temple; and TFB Secretary-Treasurer Neal Burnett, Plainview.

Other voting delegates will include state directors Aubrey Rosor, Gruver; C.H. Dowdy, Wichita Falls; Royce Magness, Telephone; and Don Smith, Sulphur Springs.

Other directors among the voting delegates are Jesse Stephens, Lamesa; Robert R. "Bob" Turner, Voss; Russ Arnold, Trinity; John Earl Smith, Quemado; Bob Stallman, Columbus; Gerald Clark, Edna; and Steven Beard, Harlingen.

The other nine voting delegates from Texas were chosen by district caucuses at the TFB convention in Lubbock.

These voting delegates include Billie Ray Huddleston, Celina; Donald W. Lively, Ben Wheeler; Val Stephens, Lamesa; and Darrell Richards, Avoca.

Other voting delegates include Robert Cervenk, Riesel; Earl E. Chumley, San Augustine; David Whitworth, Fredericksburg; David Foehner, Boling; and Lewis Menn, Runge.

Also attending will be Robert Van Winkle, Sulphur Springs, chairman of the TFB Young Farmers and Ranchers Advisory Committee; and the recipients of the 1987 Outstanding Young Farmer/Rancher Award, Dan and Reeda Cay Smith of Lockney.

Search On For Hero

The search is under way for the rural hero for 1987, according to Ben Bullard of Waco, president of the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council which presents the annual rural heroism award.

All lambs & steers must have their milk teeth at this time. These rules are strictly enforced by the ECLRA & there will be NO exceptions. This rule does not apply to broilers, market rabbits or any breeding stock.

Any 4-H member who is a graduating high school senior is eligible to apply for the Texas 4-H Opportunity Scholarships. \$544,400 is given annually to qualified

## Texas Health Outlook

By Roy Cartee

Question: Mr. Cartee, my friend is in constant need of oxygen. Does Medicare help pay for this service?

Answer: You and your friend should have a talk with the provider. Carriers are no longer permitted to provide separate payments to the suppliers for both the rental of a tank of oxygen and the oxygen itself. Now claims must cover all expenses incurred in furnishing the oxygen (that is: oxygen, transportation, installation and administration of the tank). Carriers are also required to consider the least costly type of oxygen system, along with the physician's recommendations for the type of system, in determining how much they will pay.

Question: Mr. Cartee, are artificial hearts covered by Medicare?

Answer: No. Artificial hearts and related devices as well as ventricular assist devices used as temporary life support systems, are

considered by Medicare as investigational and are not covered under Medicare.

Question: Mr. Cartee, I am needing a good insurance plan. Could you recommend such a policy?

Answer: We do not recommend any insurance plan. There are hundreds of companies that provide policies that are adequate. You must remember there is a vast difference in the coverage of people who are under the age of 65 vs. those 65 and older. Those 65 and over usually carry a supplemental plan to Medicare. I am sure there are policies that cover those who are 65 years or older that pay for all that Medicare does not pay, but there is no doubt the cost would be very high. Usually the supplemental policy pays 20 percent of the approved doctor charges while the Medicare pays 80 percent of the approved doctor charges. Remember under the plan of Medicare, other than the deductible the hospital charges are normally picked up by Medicare.

# Guest Slot

THERE ARE statistics which tell us that we all work some many days (weeks? months?) a year just to pay our taxes. There is concrete data in expressing how much we work for our government(s) in order that it may provide services to the public (national defense, social helps, etc.)

Most know that there are other areas in which we in effect are working for the

government with little if any visible return on our investment.

Specifically we're referring to the various forms, questionnaires and other inquiries requiring time and patience. Many have just received a big, brown envelope from the U.S. Department of Commerce with volumes of forms to be filled out for the "nation's five-year economic census". What a pain.

And there's no choice: "penalty for non-compliance." These must be returned by Feb. 15 with as much information as is asked for. To quote: "Title 13 of the U.S. Code requires compliance AND guarantees that the information furnished will be kept confidential."

Commerce says the information is important because "many organizations rely on facts from the censuses in making policy decisions and in advising the business community."

We've never been overly fond of Commerce Dept. for a number of reasons: Number One being that every ten years, they drown us with free promotional material to run in connection with the national census which they expect us to run as a public service in order to collect all the important information. But then at tabulating time, they invariably release the figures to the TV new works and metropolitan newspapers early, and never bother to send us the time of day.

But this economic census is a bugger-bear in detail. Our form is ten by 16 inches to be filled in duplicate (presumably with the one sheet of carbon paper that is furnished).

There are about four pages for total recaps, and as many pages for each of our locations (five) - so we've got a lot of detail work ahead.

What do they want? Here's a rough summation: physical locations; organization status; employment (sub-divided by production workers others; payroll, plant hours, etc.); cost of materials and services used in 1987; inventories at end of year; capital expenditures; fringe benefits cost; cost of research and development; capital expenditures; depreciable assets; rental payments; cost of purchased electricity; fuel and communication; cost of repairs; etc., etc., for page after page.

When and where can I get the results of the censuses? The Census Bureau will begin publishing the results early in 1989. Over 600 reports covering the 1987 census will be sold through the Superintendent of Documents.

No where on the census is the question asked:

How can the national debts be reduced? That's one a lot of us would like to answer.

But for now-you wait for your year-end figures to get assembled before tackling the massive forms.

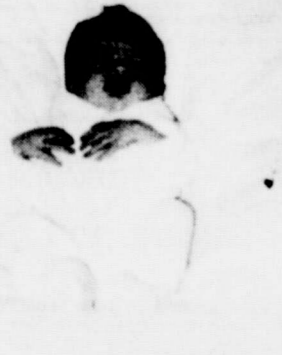

# Majestic Presents - The Untouchables

"The Untouchables" is a robust and meticulously crafted crime drama that excels on all levels. It reintroduces us to crime-stopper Eliot Ness of Prohibition era Chicago, although it is a different Eliot Ness than the one portrayed by Robert Stack in the legendary TV series. This Ness, as played by Kevin Costner, is a wet-behind-the-ears and almost stridently naive Treasury agent who is brought into town to enforce Prohibition laws and (more importantly) to bring down Al Capone (Robert DeNiro). Working within a corrupt police department to uphold a law which, in retrospect, was sadly futile, Ness accepts the job with full fury not necessarily because he agrees with the law, but because it is the law.

Unable to trust the cops on his own force, Ness sets out to assemble a team of outsiders who will form "The Untouchables", the group of lawmen who will remain untouched by corruption and criminal influence. His most important find is Jimmy Malone (Sean Connery), a wise beat cop who agrees to work alongside Ness to provide him with the street savvy that he so desperately needs. Rounding out the team is Oscar Wallace (Charles Martin Smith), the nerdy accountant who came up with the ingenious idea of pursuing Capone for tax evasion, and George Stone (Andy Garcia), a rookie sharp shooter.

Ness and his small band immediately go head-to-head with Capone, first by going to the Canadian border to bust up a major liquor transaction and then on Capone's own Chicago turf. But the toll is high. First Wallace is killed while trying to guard the bookkeeper who

is supposed to finger Capone, and then Malone is slaughtered by machine gun fire after he stands up to a hoodlum police chief. With each death, Ness becomes more obsessed with capturing Capone.

Although "The Untouchables" does cheat on the facts, you can be sure that the major story elements are left alone. Therefore, there is no final, theatrical shootout between Ness and Capone. When the gangster finally gets his due, it's in a court room, where a judge unexpectedly disallows a tainted jury and sends Capone up the river for tax evasion. Ness gets his revenge, but it's such a remarkably passive one in light of the violence that has gone before it. But it is no less satisfying.

After making 59 many vile and contemptuous films, and who would have thought that Brian DePalma had a movie this great in him? All of the things that he has been accused of before - the violence, the "aren't-I-clever" camera work, the outright thievery from other films - are all here, but they all mesh together with the story.

The film is rated R for violence. No one under 17 admitted without parent or guardian.

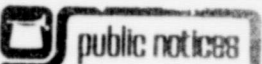

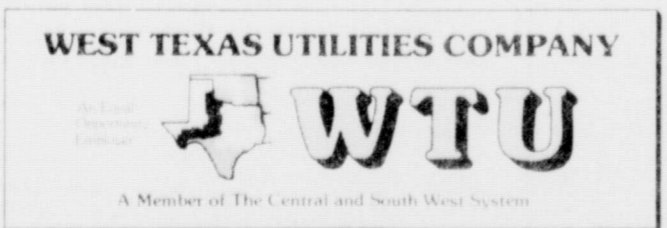

From page 1... focus attention on the catch and release concept, and also call attention to the contribution the hatcheries make to fishery management in the state. "The

department is implementing several programs that promote catch and release because we feel as fishing pressure increases it will be necessary to use larger fish more than one time."

Rutledge said. "Besides, the department has a considerable investment in these fish because genetic selection and hatchery maintenance are costly."

He added that the veteran brooders may be more susceptible to being caught after spending all their lives on a hatchery. "We would like to protect as many of them as possible to give them ample opportunities to spawn," said Rutledge.

Along with Lake Cisco the first 1,000 Veteran Broodfish (largemouth and smallmouth bass, channel and blue catfish and red drum) were released at the following locations: Lakes Coleman, Ray Roberts, Fork, Meredith, Medina (lake and river), Possum Kingdom, Greenbelt, Twin Buttes, Town (Austin), Ascarate, Casa Blanca, Livingston, Brownwood, Red Bluff, Spence, Waco, White Rock, H-4, H-5 and Dunlap.

Several red drum broodfish will be released in Galveston, Matagorda, Corpus Christi and Laguna Madre bays. Brooders also will be released into small lakes at the following state parks: Purvis Creek (not yet open for visitation), Choke Canyon, Lady Bird Johnson, Tyler, Rusk, Bastrop, Buescher, Huntsville, Blanco, Arrowhead, Mineral Wells, Balmorhea, Caddo, Palmetto and the J.D. Murphy Wildlife Management Area at Port Arthur.



## Dear Betty Crocker

Q. My rice pudding is always watery. What's the secret? A. B. Warren, Oh.

A. Rice pudding texture depends on cooking rice separately until water is completely absorbed. Only then, add rice to remaining ingredients. Or too high oven temperature during baking may affect the pudding.

Q. Will cakes or breads turn out the same if I use shortening, margarine or butter instead of vegetable oil? B. S., Peotone, Ill.

A. For best results, use the fat stated in recipe. Substitutions of liquid fat for solid fat, and vice versa, may change the balance of liquid to dry ratio. This is especially true for cakes.

Q. When a recipe says to "chill" food, does that mean to place in refrigerator or in freezer? C. S., Rocky Mountain, N.C.

A. "Chill" means to cool, but not to freeze. For best results, place food in the refrigerator.

**TIP OF THE WEEK:** Keep peeled potatoes from turning brown by covering them with water and storing in refrigerator.

Q. What's the best way to store turkey and stuffing?

A. First, be sure to store them separately. Divide turkey into serving-size packages and freeze what won't be used within three days. It will keep in the freezer up to a month. Stuffing can be stored in the refrigerator for one to two days and will keep in the freezer for three to four weeks.

Q. What's the measure of one small onion, chopped?

A. A small onion, chopped, will measure about one fourth cup, a medium onion will yield about half a cup of chopped onion and a large onion will measure about 1 cup when chopped.
