Moran National Bank Opened Friday As The People's State Bank Of Moran

The Moran National Bank closed its doors last Thursday afternoon at 3:00 p.m. and re-opened as The People's State Bank of Moran on Friday morning at 9:00 a.m.

Moran, located about 16 miles northwest of Cisco heard about the transaction Thursday, but were assured

that no depositors will lose money. The accounts are insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. There are also several depositors from the Cisco area who deposit money in the Moran bank.

Doug Ford, president of the People's State Bank of Clyde, and the new owners of

the Moran bank, said the depositors in the Moran Bank should have no worries of any losses of funds.

Inadequate supervision by the bank's board of directors, poor lending practices

and adverse economic conditions were the reasons for the bank problems.

There will be no change in personnel at the bank according to reports.

City Manager Mike Moore Tells Council He Will Argue Surcharge

During the citizens council discussion at the regular city council meeting held in City Hall last Tuesday city manager Mike Moore told the council he would be travelling to Abilene on Friday to address the West Texas Council of Governments. Moore said the city of Cisco is being charged a surcharge from West Texas Utilities for intervening of the suit and proposed rate increase.

Moore said 27 cities in the WTU district were given the surcharge and he would like to make a stand against it.

The city council agreed with Moore on the issue at hand and asked him to speak for Cisco in the hearing.

It was also discussed during the citizens council discussion that the City of Cisco will crack down on violators of clean up ordinances.

Mayor Joe Wheatley said it is now at a point where warrants will be filed against property owners who are not complying with clean up ordinances. Wheatley said it is time to work to clean up the wonderful city of Cisco.

City Manager Mike Moore said he has copies of all the clean up ordinances to give to people who want to know what the ordinances state.

The clean up campaign will begin immediately, with one street at a time.

In other action city council members approved the quarterly report of the Cisco Municipal Court. City Secretary Ginger Johnson gave the report to the council.

Wranglers Open Conference Play With Win Over TSTI Wednesday

Mark Chambers, a 6-4 freshman forward from Fort Worth Dunbar, sank a free throw with four seconds remaining to give the Cisco Junior College Wranglers a 93-92 win over the TSTI Tornado at Wrangler Gym Wednesday night. It was the conference opener for both teams. With the win, the Wranglers' season record improves to 9-7. TSTI is 8-9 on the year.

The game was close all the way, except for a second half surge by Cisco that gave them an 84-70 lead with six minutes to play in the game. However, the Tornado came back, mostly on the strength of their three-point shooting. TSTI's Billy Spencer tied the game with two free throws at 92-92 with 11 seconds left. The Wranglers called a time out to set up a last second play, and Chambers was fouled on a drive to the basket, leading to the game-winning free throw. A desperation shot at the

buzzer by TSTI fell short. Tyrone Williams, a 6-5 freshman forward from Shreveport, came off the bench to lead CJC in scoring with 22 points. Chambers added 20 points, while Eddie Venzant, Thomas Miller, and Ronald Ateman added 16, 13, and 10 respectively. Venzant and Chambers pulled down seven rebounds each for the Wranglers. Reggie Degrate led the Tornado scoring with 26, including six three-pointers. TSTI hit 10 of 21 from the three-point range, while the Wranglers hit four of eight.

The Wranglers travel to Waco tonight (Saturday) to take on McLennan, and return to Wrangler Gym next Wednesday, Jan. 20, to play arch-rival Ranger. McLennan and Ranger are considered the top two teams in the conference. Game time is 8 p.m., preceded by the women's game at 6 o'clock.

The new speed limits will be passed setting the speed of 45 miles per hour, both directions on the North Frontage Road of Interstate 20, and a speed of 50 miles per hour, both directions on the South Frontage Road of the Interstate.

The Department of Highways said they will post the proper speed signs as soon as possible.

I don't know if I'll be here tomorrow or not.

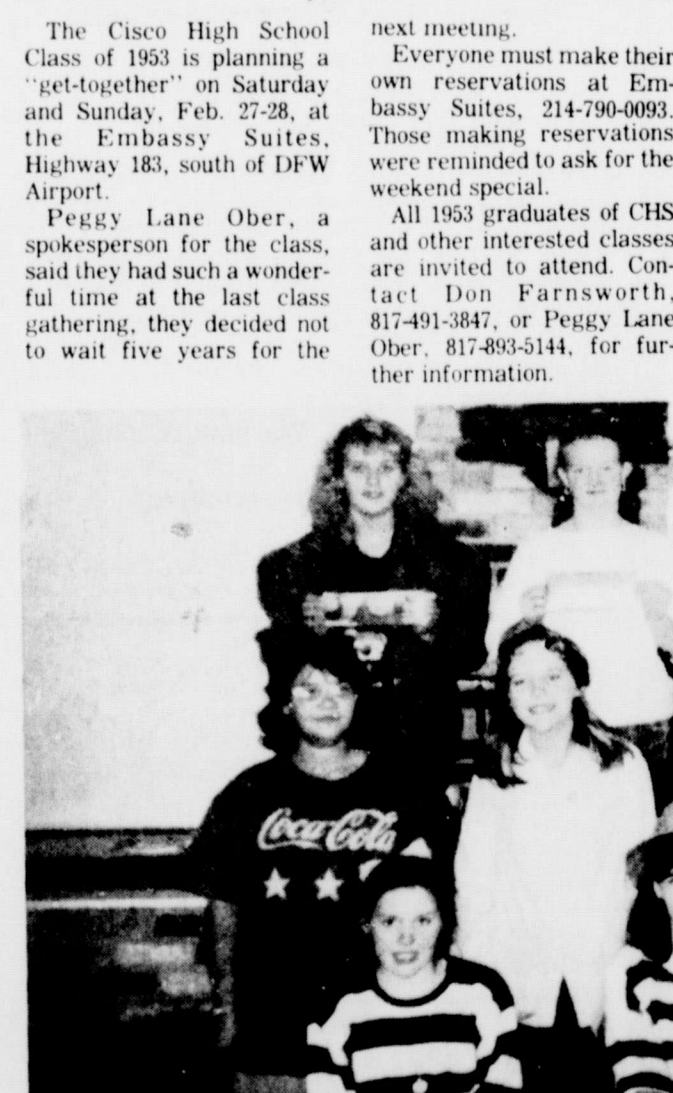
But I have today- grand and glorious, beautiful, wonderful today!

AARP To Sponsor Income Tax School

The AARP will sponsor, in cooperation with the IRS, an income tax training school for volunteer tax-aid counselors at the Best Western Motel in Cisco from January 18 through January 22.

Walter Knowlden, overall coordinator for the Cisco area, said, "Tax-aid counselors will receive 40 hours of instruction, by certified IRS instructors, to bring them up to date on all the new tax changes that have been made on this year's federal income tax returns." He also said, "Many of our counselors have been in the program for several years and they gladly volunteer all their spare time in assisting taxpayers who may need help."

There will be volunteers from Breckenridge, Cisco, Eastland, Gorman, Cross Plains, May, Brownwood, Comanche and Coleman attending the seminar this year.

The AARP tax-aid program is a volunteer program to provide income tax assistance for the elderly and for taxpayers who are unable to afford professional assistance. Nationally there are over 21,000 volunteer counselors in more than 9,000 sites who have been trained by the IRS and AARP instructors in tax law changes.

In 1987 tax-aid volunteers nationwide completed or assisted in completing over 1.25 million returns and assisted shut-ins by 29,000 visits to hospitals, nursing

homes and in their own homes.

In the Cisco area counselors will be staffing sites located in libraries, churches, community centers and senior centers from February 1 through April 15. Persons who may be shut-in or unable to go to a site may receive assistance by telephoning their nearest senior center and a counselor will make an appointment to visit them.

Counseling sites are also being established in Eastland County, Stephens County, Callahan County, Coleman County, Brown County and Comanche County.

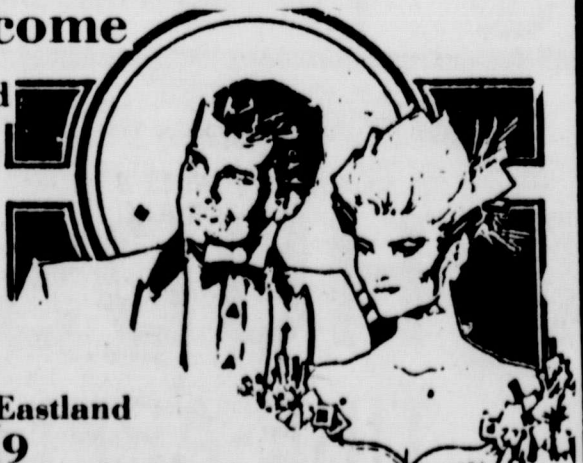

Eastland County Cooperative Board

Of Directors Hears Complaint

Complaints from a television cable company concerning the manner in which customer calls are handled were discussed Wednesday during the meeting of the Eastland County Cooperative board of directors.

In addition to serving as dispatcher for police and emergency calls for Eastland County, the cooperative also serves as an answering service for Southern Television Systems, Texas Utilities and Comanche County Electric Service.

Each of the companies pays the dispatch \$220 per month.

In a letter, Robert Moore, supervisor for Southern Television Systems, complained some dispatchers

are impolite to customers. Also, the company's telephones are turned off when dispatchers are busy.

Bob Mercer, chief dispatcher, told board members, "I can't dispute his claim. It's my personal opinion we should get out from under Southern Television."

Mercer said when electric service is interrupted, the electric companies make an employee available at their offices so dispatchers will not have to continue answering on-going calls about the services.

However, Southern Television does not do this, Mercer said.

Disgruntled TV customers even call the emergency police number to report television problems if the

cable company's telephone is busy, he said.

Michael Moore, board president, said, "If we are going to take \$220 a month, we have an obligation to the cable company to do the best we can," he said.

Moore asked Mercer to remind his dispatchers they are dealing with the public.

Mercer was asked to look into the possibility of using a transcribed message to answer complaints after determining the problem with disrupted TV service.

According to bankruptcy law, an entity filing under Chapter 9 cannot liquidate and must submit a plan of financial reorganization to the bankruptcy court.

The hospital has been up for sale since July 1986.

The hospital district pays creditors with its annual tax revenue of about \$120,000, he said.

The troubles extend to the hospital board itself. Cordell said he's still trying to fill a hospital board seat that was left empty after an election April. Two write-in candidates tied for the seat, but neither wanted it.

Eastland Hospital District Files For Bankruptcy

The South Eastland County Hospital District filed for bankruptcy Jan. 6 under a rarely used federal law to "hold off" its creditors.

The hospital district board closed Gorman's Blackwell Hospital - the district's only hospital - in October 1986 because it had piled up \$600,000 in debts and its two doctors had left town.

Since the closing, the board has continued collec-

ting taxes and has paid about \$100,000 to creditors. But the creditors are "getting impatient" and asking for higher payments, said Hershell Cordell, the hospital board president.

The hospital board hopes a bankruptcy judge will keep the payments from increasing, Cordell said, because higher payments would force a tax rate increase. Most of the debt was caus-

ACP Signup Opens January 19

The sign-up period for Eastland County's Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) will begin January 19, 1988 for conservation practices that can be completed in the spring of 1988. Farmers faced with severe soil erosion problems may want to apply for the program during this period. The sign-up period ends January 29, 1988.

The ACP provides both technical and financial assistance to help farmers solve severe soil, water and pollution problems on their land. "Cost-share" funds are used to correct conservation problems on a farm beyond that which could be accomplished with the farmer's own resources", County ASCS official David Martin said.

Cost-share requests are considered after each sign-up period. "We establish priorities and approve cost-share funds on practices that will obtain the most conservation for the dollars spent. Requests are evaluated as to the loss of soil and/or water, and the amount that can be saved by performing the practice that has been requested", the ASCS official said. Cost-sharing may range from 50 to 75 percent of the farmer's cost for the most critical problems.
