

Seed of a new variety named Hi-Hegari has been released to certified seed growers for increase, R. E. Karper, agronomist in charge of Texas Agricultural Experiment Station grain sorghum investigations, has announced.

It is a tall variety of Hegari, bred dwarf, drouth resistant, early

and developed primarily for forage and silage.

Karper says it has the high quality and paltable forage of Hegari and the same maturity and adaptation, but yields approximately 20 percent more forage.

The first grain sorghums were tall and late maturing. Hegari, one of the more popular, was imported from Africa in 1909 and was first grown at the Chillicothe station. In 1938 Texas sorghum breeders came up with Early Hegari, a

Allen points out that lightning rods, when properly installed and maintained, will give practically complete protection to buildings against damage from lightning. He recommends that the installation of rods be done in accord-ance with the National Code for the Protection Against Lightning. He says it is very important that all metal bodies inside buildings be grounded and bonded together to prevent electricity from jumping from one body to another. The metal tracks for feed carriers, feed or hay elevators and the heavy hardware on barn doors should always be grounded and tied into

This is the first of a series of four articles designed to make Mr. and Mrs. Average Driver more familiar with traffic control signs, which when properly understood and obeyed, make our highways a safer place to be. This is the story of a REGULATORY sign.

It is important enough to repeat that the regulatory sign is used to inform you of certain laws and regulations enacted to promote safey and convenience on streets and highways. A violation of these rules is a misdemeanor.

Generally, the REGULATORY sign is rectangular in shape, and it is mounted with the longer side up. The letters and border are black, and the background is white only with the following exceptions. (1) Night speed signs which have white letters on a black background; (2) Parking signs which have green or red letters on a white background; and (3) Stop signs which are so important as to merit a full description.

The stop sign is the outstanding exception to the usual shape and color combination of the REGULATORY sign group and it needs no explanation to most motorists. It is the only standard sign which has an octagonal (eightsided) shape, and it usually has black letters and border on a yellow background.

Unless they are illuminated by fixed source of light, the REG-ULATORY signs are always reflectorized to improve night visibility by using refelctor buttons covering the entire back ground with reflective materials. Remember the shape and color of REGULATORY signs. Remember, too, that they inform you of laws or regulations that have been enacted for your saftey and con-venience. If you disregard them, you are not only endangering the life and property of others who use the highways, but also threatening the lives and property of yourself and loved ones who may be with you.




