Cisco Post Office To **Close Wed. Mornings**

Effective Wednesday, Feb. 17, 1988, the Cisco Post Office will be closed every Wednesday morning. Window service will resume at 1 p.m Wednesdays

Customers will continue to have access to Post Office boxes, vending equipment, and "will call" service for packages. Stamps may be purchased through the stamp by mail program, or by calling Stamps by telephone at 214-263-9402 and charging them to Master-Card or Visa

The retail window ad-

justments are part of a nationwide effort to reduce operating cost, and are necessary to comply with the deficit reduction legislation passed in December. This legislation requires the postal service to trim its capital and operating budget by \$1.245 billion over the next 21 months.

Smaller offices where postmasters provide the window service will not be affected by the change.

Wranglers Lose To MCC: Play In Ranger Tonight


Henry Golightly scored his only two points on a driving layup with fourteen seconds remaining to give the McLennen Community College Highlanders a 75-74 win over the CJC Wranglers in Wrangler Gym Wednesday. The Wranglers had led most of the way, but Mark Benson's free throw miss with twenty seconds on the clock gave the Highlanders the opportunity they needed. Cisco called timeout after the basket, but a shot by Thomas Miller fell short with four seconds left. The Wranglers, who have now lost six conference games by a total of eighteen points, are now 3-6 in conference play, and must win all their five remaining games to qualify for the regional tournament. McLennan improved to 6-3 in the conference

In spite of thirteen first turnovers, the Wranglers took an early lead, and led at halftime 39-32. However, MCC scored seven unanswered points to start second half play, and the lead changed hands afterwards on several occasions. But the Highlanders prevailed on the boards and at the free throw line late in the game to insure the win.

Todd Mannon led the Wrangler scoring with seventeen points. He connected on five of seven attempts from three-point range. Eddie Venzant, Thomas Miller, Ronald Ateman, and Tyrone Williams were all in double figures with 14, 12, 11 and 10 points respectively. MCC's Shone Wyatt led all scorers

with 20. The Wranglers travel to Ranger tonight (Saturday) for an important conference game. The Rangers have a 5-4 conference record which puts them in fourth place in NTJCAC. Cisco will be out to avenge a 78-76 defeat earlier in the season. Game time is 8:00, preceded by the

Men Speak To CofC Directors **About Industrial Building Here**

Jerry M. DeHay told the Cisco Chamber of Commerce board of directors that the attitudes of small towns in the past have been town for "Every theirselves." Mr. DeHay added that times have changed and small towns need to work together to get industries in their area. Mr. DeHay spoke to the directors at their regular board meeting held last Wednesday morning at Traditions

dean of the school of Agriculture and Business and the head of the Department of General Business and Marketing at Tarleton State University in Stephenville. Also speaking at the meeting was Rusty Freed, assistant director of Small Business Development Center at Tarleton State University

Restaurant.

Both men are with the Small Business Development Center. The SBDC is a program designed to provide comprehensive manageand technical assistance to the small business community.

DeHay said major industries go to major cities because of the work force. He said this area will have to present the total labor force from the surrounding towns to new industries. He said if a new industry comes into this area, no matter what town it settles in, all the surrounding towns will benefit from it.

According to DeHay small businesses create the majority of new jobs. He said the 14 million small businesses in the U.S. comprise over 95 percent of the total of all businesses.

DeHay and Freed said they would be available to come back to Cisco and hold seminars for the business leaders here. He said they offer workshops and seminars on various topics of interest to small business owners, with minimal charge. DeHay said they are not here to make money, they are here to service small towns. Their charge is usually what their expenses are.

The board of directors agreed to discuss the possibility of a seminar to be held in the near future.

The board also voted to acnomination of Terri Madison as a Chamber of Commerce director. Madison will replace Harvey Hull, who resigned from his post recently.

Terri is the owner of Philpott The Florist and is a very active member of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce. Other board members were happy to hear that Miss Madison accepted the position.

To be qualified for consideration, applicants must be 60 years old or older or handicapped (if not elderly); must own the home (or in the process of buying it); and have a low income (financially unable to affort repairs, receiving Social Security or Veteran Benefits)

Each application will be reviewed and each home will be visited by the selection committee. A survey will be made to determine what repairs are needed. If selected, the home will then be included for repair by the volunteer labor force in

Anyone interested in donating time or money to the project may call the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco. Appeals are being mailed to the Chamber of Commerce members, churches, and civic clubs in the

area. It is hoped that at least \$3,500.00 can be raised by an April 1st deadline so plans

can proceed on the project. The "Christmas in May" has been recognized as an important program to improve the homes of those in the community who cannot do it themselves. If you can pledge time or money please call 442-2537 or come by the Chamber Office in Cisco.

Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson With spring whispering in our ears from day to day our thoughts turn more and more towards those lunkers. During a past warming trend I had the pleasure of fishing some water which was already full of spawning bass. The largest fish I was able to boat was in the 5 pound range. But what made me set up and take note was the number of pick-ups I had, only to be unable to get a hook-up. The bass were simply moving the bait out of the bed. Two other impoundments we visited produced much less success.

Classic, Lake Granbury. Learning from one's first catch of the day can pay big dividends. Remember, the goal is to catch that first bass. Then you can use the knowledge gained from that catch to lead you to more fish. Some anglers believe they can establish a pattern on just one bass; others say it takes three or four to be certain. Still, no other fish is as important in pattern

fishing as the first one. The first thing you'll learn is that you were using the right lure. But you must also note the speed and method of retrieve. Did you hesitate during the retrieve for just a moment, causing the line to "die" in the water? Did you retrieve it fast, or slow, or "stop-and-go"? You should also note immediately the depth of any nearby struc-

Also pay attention to the strike, noting whether it was solid or light, and whether the fish was hooked lightly or swallowed the bait. If the fish hit lightly and was barely hooked, you ought to fish a smaller lure, or fish slower.

Patterns can be hidden from the norm. Like the day at Proctor where only those willows with snakes in them held bass. The key is to stay alert to all elements.

Remember folks, its not just "Catch and Release" but "Live release". That fish you hold is the future of





First, recognize the conflict issue and don't avoid it with the silent treatment Also select an appropriate time and place to discuss the disagreement (in front of friends, parents, children, the boss, etc. are not good places). Then, listen carefully to what each other is saying. Feedback and summerizing of remarks is a good idea.

Next, specifically define the problem by each one stating the problem as he or she sees it. Now, it's very important that you attack the problem, not each other. Accusations are to be backed up with facts. Stay in the present, don't drag in garbage from three years ago. No cracks about each other's parents, relatives, or their appearance. Dramatics need to be reserved for the theater.

It's important that you identify your own contribution to the problem, be willing to accept responsibility for it, and move on to a mutually acceptable solu-

Finally, each takes whatever steps are necessary to put the conflict behind them by implementing the new behaviors.

These guidelines work when couples follow them. They remove stress from our relationships and promote growth in our family. After all, the family matters.
