Grass Fires In Big Country Keep Cisco Firemen Busy Over Valentine Weekend

Marie Rabel said, "God was looking over us Sunday," when a grass fire that was burning out of control came right up to their house, but didn't burn it.

Mrs. Rabel said Don Shepard and Joe Keating had come by her house Sunday and told her they were going to build a fire break to help control a grass fire in that area. She said by the time she went back in her home and looked out the window she could see the flames. She took her son, 16-month old George, and got into their truck and left.

The fire spread over to Mr. Keating's place and burned about 80 percent of their property, according to his son, Scott. Scott reported that the fire started about one fourth to one half mile away from their home, but when it came to an open field, it really spread.

A storage building that had close to \$6,000 worth of valuables such as lawn equipment, a freezer and other furniture was destroyed in the fire on the Keating's property. There was also extensive damage done to their yard. Their home was not burned.

Several fences were also burned.

Mrs. Keating said if it wasn't for the fire departments in Baird, Rising Star, Cross Plains, Eastland and Cisco, they would have lost their home. They did an excellent job, she said.

This is just one of the fires that have plagued the Big Country area recently. Firemen from all the surrounding counties have had to work several hours fighting the fires and one death has occurred from these grass fires.

Jackie Cooper, a senior at Breckenridge High School was killed during a fire last Saturday in Stephens County.

Cooper and another man, John Williams, a retired Soil Conservation employee, were helping with a controlled burn on a ranch near the Harpersville Community when they lost control of the fire at about 2 p.m.

Williams received 2nd and 3rd degree burns over 65 percent of his body in the fire. He is in Parkland Burn Center in Dallas.

Cisco Volunteer Firemen have worked hard all weekend fighting these

"controlled burns" that get out of hand and destroy several acres of property.

Beginning Friday, February 12, at 5:40 p.m., Cisco Firemen were called out to help put out a small grass fire 5 miles east of Cisco on the Putnam Highway. Later that day at 6:45 p.m., firemen were sent out to help extinguish a fire from a controlled burn 10 miles south of Cisco on Hwy. 206.

At 2:42 p.m. Saturday,

Cisco firemen were called to assist the Stephens County fire department with the same fire that killed the teenager. Cisco firemen were ready to respond, but had to cancel when three minutes later firemen received a call to extinguish a grass fire near Nimrod. The fire was caused from burning trash.

CJC Board Of Regents Vote To Have Election On May 7 For 4 Places

The Board of Regents at Cisco Junior College adopted a trustee election order providing for an election to be held Saturday, May 7. The election will be held to elect trustees for four places, place 1, 2, 3, and 4. They met Tuesday, February 8, at the college for their regular monthly meeting.

Place 1 is presently held by Lloyd McGrew. Place 2 is held by Joe Cooper and Place 3 is held by Bill Reynolds. All three will be for six year terms. Place 4 is presently held by Dean Madison. Mr. Madison was appointed by the Board of Regents to replace J.D.

Yardley, who died last year. Place 4 will only be for a two year term.

The board appointed Vonda Anderson as election judge and Helen Gaeta as absentee clerk.

In other matters the board was given the Spring Enrollment report. A total of 1,686 students enrolled at Cisco Junior College for the Spring semester. This is a 5.11% increase over the Spring semester of 1986.

Board members adopted a student record retention policy that states how long student records will be kept. Board members were given a financial report by Ralph

Glenn and John Muller gave a report on institutional scholarships.

Board members discussed the lease purchase plan on the Cisco Junior College buildings in Abilene and Clyde. They voted to pursue research of the buildings in the two cities.

In other action the board adopted an intellectual property policy. This policy basically covers the rules for people that publish, copyright or invent things on college time.

The March Board of Regents meeting was changed from March 14 to March 7, due to the Spring Break.

peals and states that he feels this experience makes him the most qualified candidate for this position. The voters are asked to compare the experience and qualifications of the candidates in this race.

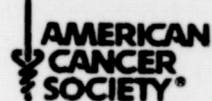

Cisco Firemen Fight Several Fires

11:55, Cisco firemen were called out to help extinguish a grass fire on the Reay property where 20 large round bales of hay were on fire. The firemen stayed until 6:00 a.m. Sunday, fighting that fire.

Later Sunday, Cisco Firemen were called to help assist the Stephens County fire department again when a grass fire flared up. But five minutes later Cisco firemen had to decline the request for help when they received a call to help extinguish a fire south of Cisco, northwest of Billy Bacon's land. It was a controlled burn that got out of hand.

At 12:45 p.m., Sunday, Cisco fire department received a request for help from Moran Fire Department. A grass fire was out of control 1 1/2 miles from the town, and their fire trucks were helping the Stephens County Fire Department. When Cisco Fire Depart-

ment arrived Baird had sent three fire trucks and a dozer, so Cisco came back. While they were coming back through Moran, Cisco VFD received a call on the fire at the Rabel's and Keating's land. One fire truck from Baird and three from Cross Plains and some fire trucks from Rising Star were already at the scene of the fire when Cisco arrived.

Monday, Cisco firemen put out a grass fire that was the result of a controlled burn. And at 1:16 a.m., Tuesday morning firemen had to extinguish a grass fire south of town that was caused from a controlled burn.

Cisco Fireman David Gill said one reason for the onslaught of grass fires recently is so many people are trying to burn things off. Gill said everyone was cooped up for awhile and now its pretty and everyone wants to get out and clean things up. But the weather has not been ideal for this type of work.

Gill said there has not been any rain in this area, and it is dangerously dry. He said the humidity has been low and the winds have been blowing very hard. These are not the right conditions to have controlled burns, he said.

Everyone needs to take precautions to help stop these rash of fires and check out the weather conditions and the weather forecast before they decide to clear off their land by fire, Gill said.

District Attorney Cautions On Out Of County Repairmen

District Attorney Emory Walton cautions citizens of this area to be careful of out-of-state and out-of-county painters, roofing repairmen, siding salesmen, and foundation repairmen who come through here from time-to-time.

"Nearly every year, or every two years, we get complaints about poor jobs and shoddy

material," the District Attorney says. "On paint - the first time it rains - it's usually gone."

Walton states that these people have ripped off the elderly an untold amount. "I would urge anyone who is contacted by an out-of-county person for this type of work to check with the Police before they make any kind of commitment," he says.

Cisco Police Department 1987 Report

Cisco Police Department received a total of 377 of offense reports in 1987. Of that total, 120 calls were for thefts, 19 were for driving while intoxicated, 9 were for possession of controlled substance, 22 were for burglary of a habitation, 32 for criminal mischief, 7 for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, 5 for forgery, 16 for burglary of motor vehicle, 23

for assault, 1 for passing forged instrument, 1 for escape, 4 for disorderly conduct, 4 missing persons, 19 burglary, 4 public intoxication, 3 runaways, 2 harassment, 19 burglary of a building, 2 sexual assaults, 2 for unlawful carrying of a weapon, 2 possession of drug paraphernalia, 2 for possession of marijuana, 16 for theft of livestock, 3 for burglary

of coin machine, 4 for aggravated assault, 6 for criminal trespass, 2 for aggravated assault of police officer, 3 simple assault and 1 call for each of the following, deceased person, prohibited weapon, arson, attempted burglary, insufficient funds, juvenile runaway, dog running at large, discharging firearm, insurance forgery, attempted aggravated assault, terrorist threat, driving while license suspended, cruelty to animal, carrying prohibitive weapon, robbery, securing execution of documents by deception, credit card abuse, incest, fraud and evading arrest.

During the year of 1987, there was \$202,795.00 worth of property loss and damage reported to the Cisco Public Department. The Department recovered \$11,355.05 worth of that property.

During the year of 1987 the Cisco Police Department cleared 66 cases by arrest, 29 cases by recovery, and 27 cases by exceptional means. 115 cases were inactive and 34 unfounded, due to lack of evidence or information to prosecute the case. There are 88 cases from 1987 still being actively investigated by the Cisco Police Department. There were 44 cases filed with the District Attorney, there were 25 cases presented to the Grand Jury, 16 People indicted, 1 cases

filed with Justice of peace, and 16 filed with Cisco City Court.

The following is a breakdown of the Animal Control Daily Activity Report for the year 1987.

164 complainant calls were made, 20 warnings were issued, 98 animals were picked up, 10 animals were released, 2 animals were adopted, 48 dead animals were picked up, 89 animals were euthanasia, and 4 animal bites were reported.

6 Flags To Unveil Magnificent Machine

What will soon be Six Flags Over Texas' newest ride will also be one of its oldest.

After more than three years of painstaking restoration, the theme park's hand-carved carousel will be ready to entertain new generations of Six Flags visitors in early March.

The magnificent antique, to be known as The Silver Star Carousel, will be the focal point of Six Flags' entry mall, protected from the elements by a specially designed, two-story building which will stand just behind the park's landmark flags and fountains.

The carousel's 66 prancing wooden horses were carved in the mid 1920's by immigrant European craftsmen under the direction of the late William H. Dentzel. The master carousel builder's shop was located in the Germantown area of Philadelphia.

Dentzel, himself, operated the spectacular ride during the 1926 and 1927 seasons at a park on New York's Long Island.

Six Flags Over Texas purchased the carousel in 1963 as a featured ride in its then-new Boomtown section.

Six Flags paid \$25,000 for the ride. A single horse carved by a Dentzel craftsman recently sold at auction for \$57,000.

Six Flags president Bob Bennett says no estimate has been made of the value of the restored carousel. "It's safe to say that the Silver Star's worth runs well into seven figures. If we knew its true value we might not want to let people touch it, much less get on and ride it."

"The millions of park guests who rode the carousel before we removed it for restoration at the end of the 1984 season will not recognize it," he said. "It is a work of art."

When the restoration process began, the first major task was removal of layer upon layer of paint which had been applied to the horses to prepare them for the start of many seasons. Each horse was stripped to bare wood.

The stripping operation uncovered fine details of the carving which had been hid-

den for years. Those details are dramatically apparent in the restored horses.

In addition to heavy use by laughing riders, the old carousel had been exposed to the whims of Texas weather, including several floods.

Six Flags' artists were called on to carve, by hand, needed replacements for ears, hoofs and even entire legs of some horses.

The carousel's "rounding board" - the decorative mirrored edging of the roof - was originally trimmed with elaborate plaster ornamentation, most of which was destroyed during the 1963 trip from New York to Texas.

Using historical photographs of the carousel as it appeared in the 1920's, Six Flags researchers were able to locate an identical section of rounding board in the collection of a Missouri carousel buff. The section

was purchased and brought to Arlington where exact castings of the original Dentzel decor were made.

"If anything," Bennett commented, "The Silver Star Carousel is more beautiful than it was the day it was completed in Philadelphia.

"Today's paints and wood treatments have given our artists an edge over the

Six Flags will start its 1988 season March 5. It is hoped that the carousel will debut the same day.

"One very important thing we have learned," Bennett concluded, "is that you don't put a stopwatch on the restoration of an antique of this quality and size. The particular work of art has a way of setting its own timetable."

Extension Program Council Dinner Well Attended

Eighty persons from around the area attended the annual meeting and appreciation dinner for Extension Program Council members on Thursday, February 11 at Lone Cedar Country Club.

The mood of the gathering was up-beat, reflecting improved conditions in the Eastland County agricultural economy. The annual event was hosted by County Agents De Marquis Gordon, Janet Thomas and Crystal Wilbanks. Extension Program Council President Charles Walker welcomed the crowd.

Charlie Jordan, Abilene KTAB weatherman and Director of the Ben Richey Boys' Ranch, was guest speaker. There were also summary reports of Committee accomplishments during 1987, and recognition of agricultural

demonstrators. The Program Council officers for 1988 were all re-elected for 1988: Charles Walker as President, Joe Taylor Vice President, and Dorothy Underwood, Secretary-Treasurer.

Special guests at the meeting were County Judge and Mrs. Scott Bailey, Pct. 1 County Commissioner and Mrs. Richard Robinson, Pct. 2 Commissioner and Mrs. Norman Christian, District Extension Director Glenda Trimble of Stephenville, District Extension Director Ronald Wooley, also of Stephenville, and personnel from the Eastland County Newspapers.

Donors for this annual dinner meeting were Mr. and Mrs. Don Mauney, Production Credit Association, Eastland office, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Taylor, Eastland National Bank and Bird-

song Peanut Co. of Gorman.

In his talk Charlie Jordan displayed the same high spirits, warmth and humor that have made him a favorite throughout the area. He gave a summary of his early life "on a dryland wheat farm near the Canadian River," and his 25 years as a Meteorologist with the U.S. Navy.

He told of his experiences since becoming Director of Ben Richey Boys' Ranch, which is dedicated to salvaging boys who are in "real trouble."

One Eastland County boy is living on the ranch now, Jordan said.

On the subject of weather, Jordan had some practical advice on self-protection during tornadoes and lightning storms. He said that the latest scientific finds on these types of weather have changed ideas a lot.

"Don't try to outrun a

tornado in a car," he said. "And don't leave windows open in your house when a tornado is coming."

"Don't lie down in a low place with your body flat against the ground when there's lightning in the area, he said. He suggested that you "hunker down" to protect your heart.

In another part of the program, County Agent DeMarquis Gordon told of the hard work of the Program Building Committees in 1986, and how their suggestions took the form of educational programs in 1987.

Ruth Cartee, a member of the Home Economics Committee, reported on events sponsored in 1987 on the themes "Strengthening Families," and "Parenting."

This included nutrition programs, a large Health Fair, and a self-care program for children when they are unsupervised. This "On Your Own" program was presented to 396 Elementary-age children by Janet Thomas.

Natalie Stevens, a 4-H Youth Committee member, told of the work of this group last year. They ad-

dressed Drug and Alcohol Abuse, and Economic Concerns. They brought career information to the local High Schools, stressing opportunities in the field of agriculture.

A large meeting called BIONIC (Believe-it-or-not-I-care) dealt with a lot of the concern of young people. This was held at Camp Inspiration in Eastland.

Jay Laffertry, Chairman of the Livestock and Forage Committee of Agriculture, reported a very busy 1987. Issues addressed were Agricultural Profitability, water, soil conservation, and marketing. He told of Beef Cattle Clinics, Workshops, and a Hay Show. Members of the group attended a large Ag Lender's Conference last Sept. 26 at the Par Country Club on Lake Proctor.

DeMarquis Gordon also introduced the Demonstrators for 1987, people who let their land be used to decide on better ways of doing things.

Gene Snyder demonstrated minimum-till on peanuts, James Alexander, chemicals on insect control on pecans,

Danny Hutton, insect control on peanuts, Tony Long (represented at the dinner by his son, Toby) a demonstration with cattle, and Leo Williams, a demonstration involving ear tags on dairy heifers. County Agent Gordon said that these result

demonstrations had been very effective. Plaques were presented in appreciation of the work of these citizens.

A remark from Jay Laffertry summed up the thrust of Extension work. "The Extension Service puts out a lot of informa-

tion," he said. "We need to get people more interested in sharing this information."

Members of the Extension Program Council said that they looked for a good year in 1988, and were ready to continue with their work.

During the spring fling of bassin many of us overlook one of the most helpful tools for locating those lunkers, our temperature gauges.

Spring is when fish are just moving up into shallower water, looking for the warmest water they can find. If you can find surface temperatures of at least 51 to 53 degrees, you can catch bass shallow.

Skilled anglers use temp gauges in spring and late fall to find the warmest coves and bays, where they know bass will be active in shallow water. You can usually guess which waters will be the most productive in cool weather, because sunlit, wind sheltered coves will be warmer than open water or creeks with considerable current.

More than that, however, knowing the temperature can give clues to which lure to tie on, and how to fish it. Warm water calls for a faster moving bait, or a top-water lure, while cold water slows bass activity and demands smaller slower-working lures.

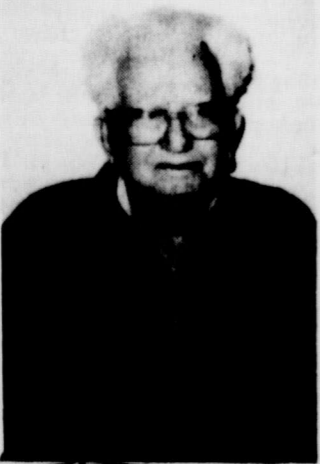
Luke Phippen Honored By Cisco Masonic Lodge

PRESIDENTIAL ELECTION PROCESS

Is Too Long, Says TCU Professor

The presidential election process is becoming so long that a candidate must be virtually unemployed in order to get elected.

That is the opinion of Dr. James Riddlesperger, assistant professor of political science at Texas Christian University.

"Candidates must have organizations in each of the 50 states, and in order to have control of those organizations you must have your people in place quite a while before the primary

process begins," explained Riddlesperger.

The problems which may evolve when a candidate does not have a strong organization in a state were brought to light when fraudulent signatures were found on the primary petitions of several GOP candidates. Lacking political organizations in Texas, these candidates hired political consultants to collect the 5,000 needed signatures, the TCU professor noted.

"George Bush has essentially been running for president since 1980, so it was easy for him to collect the signatures," he said. "Dole, on the other hand, has a full-time job in the Senate and hasn't been willing to give up his job to run full time."

Looking at the presidential candidates in the recent past, Riddlesperger pointed out that Jimmy Carter admitted that he spent four years running for president from 1972 to 1976. Walter Mondale had been running

for president for four years before he got his party's nomination in 1984 and Ronald Reagan began running for president in 1968 and continued until he got his party's 1980 nomination.

"It seems you have to be an incumbent or unemployed to get a party's nomination for president," concluded Riddlesperger. "That's the only strand of commonality I can find when examining the last several presidential contests."

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by adverse weather conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Eastland, FmHA County Supervisor Jack Phillips said today.

Eastland County is one of sixty nine in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the adverse weather conditions.

Phillips said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a

farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Phillips said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until October 3, 1988 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Phillips said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substan-

tial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Eastland is open from 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 5:00 Monday through Friday.

The Emergency Loan Program Question and Answer Fact Sheet

1. After a county is eligible, who can get a loan?

An established farm operator who is a citizen of the United States, is of good character; can show evidence of having suffered a qualifying physical or production loss; has adequate security and repayment ability.

2. What is a qualifying production loss?

Loss of at least 30 percent

below a normal year's production.

3. How much can an eligible farmer borrow?

Up to 80 percent of actual production loss or \$500,000 or enough for next year's operation which is less but not more than is actually needed.

4. What is the interest rate?

For borrowers unable to obtain credit from a private lending institution, the rate is 4.5 percent.

5. What can the money be used for?

To restore property, pay production costs, pay delinquent debts, pay living expenses, repair buildings, buy equipment and refinance debts.

6. How long can the loan run?

The term is based on the type of loss, use of loan funds, type of collateral and borrower's repayment ability. Production losses are normally up to 7 years; real estate normally is required as security for longer terms.

7. How is PIK counted?

Any acreage unplanted because of PIK (Payment-In-Kind) or conservation reserve is counted as having produced a year's normal production in determining actual loss.

8. How are prices determined for production losses?

"The average monthly price in effect for the previous year" is the guideline - as required by the congressionally-mandated Omnibus Reconciliation Act of 1981. Prices are obtained from the Statistical Reporting Service, USDA.

Weems Dykes And His Special Book

Some things in this world can be bought and sold, and others can only be labeled as "priceless."

This is the description of a booklet owned by Weems Dykes of Eastland, a retired minister of the First Christian Church. No, the word "retired" doesn't fit Dykes too well, for he still "fills in" at various churches, and also does some substitute-teaching.

Dykes red, white and blue book in the shape of Texas was the creation of High School student Brad Cox of Longview, Texas, and was presented to the Rev. Dykes during the Texas Sesquicentennial.

The painted cover of the book says: "Texas Presents Weems S. Dykes." The 38 pages which follow have information, comments and decorations pertaining to Dykes, or Texas. The theme centers on Dykes as a Texas Poet-Laureate in 1980-81.

The material is all handwritten, with the exception of copies of some of Dykes poems. There is a complete Bibliography, with sources listed.

Brad Cox was inspired to do this project by his Longview English teacher Larry Osburne, who as a young man was a neighbor of Weems Dykes' sister in Gilmer, Texas.

When Osburne grew up he attended College and then taught High School English. While teaching in

Gladwater several years ago he started a project where students would select an individual to do a study on.

When he moved to Longview to teach, Osburne began to incorporate this idea into the Texas Sesquicentennial celebration. In 1986 he encouraged his English students to have special Sesquicentennial projects. Brad Cox was one of the students.

"I soon learned that this young man was working on ME," says Dykes with a smile.

He corresponded with the student, supplying information requested. But he did not realize what a beautiful format the book was going to have.

In the "Texas" booklet, Brad Cox describes his subject on Page 3. "Weems S. Dykes, 1980-81 Poet Laureate of Texas, does not behold himself as a Henry Wadsworth Longfellow, or Edgar Allan Poe, or a Carl Sandburg, just because he has been acclaimed the Lone Star's Poet Laureate!

Yet, this silver-haired preacher-poet is an interesting, thought provoking, down-to-earth individual. He has authored three books, A Cup of Thoughtfulness, My Cup of Tea, and The Listening Cup, thousands of sermons, and numerous articles.

His works range from the philosophical to the hilarious. His pictures life yesterday, today, and tomorrow. He likes to write about churning, biscuit making, and dipping snuff. He likes to look back on things that have slipped the mind and are now only cherished memories.

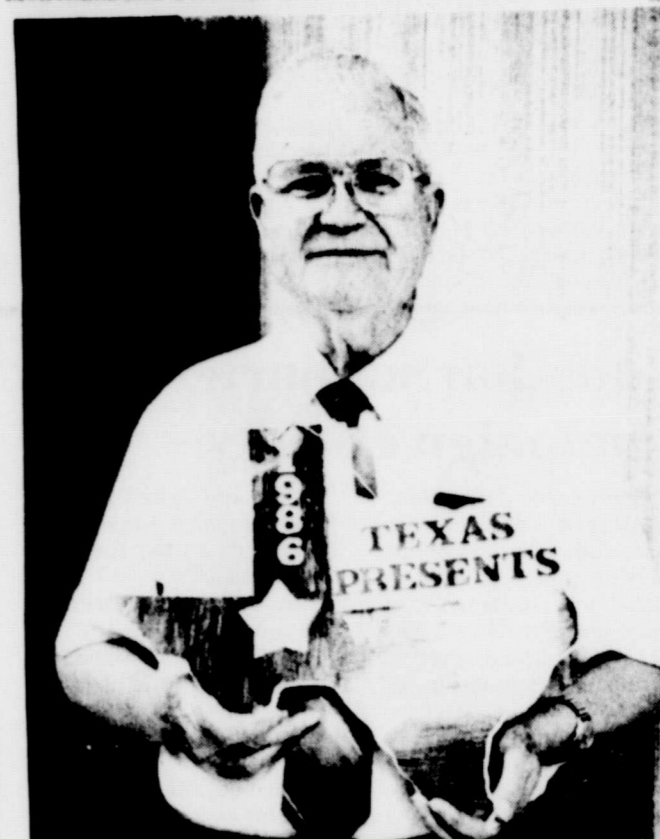
Thus, a detailed study of the position, life, works and contribution of Weems S. Dykes reveals him to be an outstanding Texas author."

Hudson Campaigns In The County

William L. (Bill) Hudson of Electra visited in Eastland County the past week as a first time candidate to represent the 49 counties of District 14 on the State Board of Education.

Since the job is unsalaried, Mr. Hudson said that the satisfaction of helping somebody was his reason for running.

Mr. Hudson was a school superintendent for 20 years after first teaching, coaching both boys' and girls' sports, and being a principal on both elementary and secondary levels.

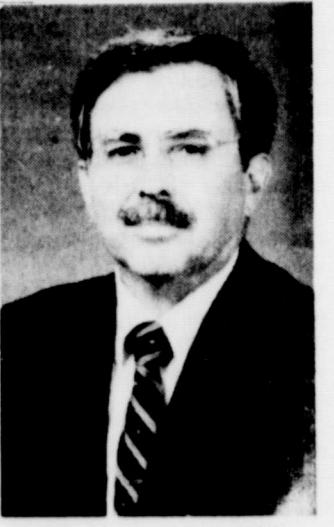
Active in school related organizations, Mr. Hudson served as Lion's Club and Chamber of Commerce president in Electra and Frisco. He is heavily certified and holds degrees in administration and finance.

An army counter intelligence Special Agent during World War II, Mr. Hudson has been a Director and Senior Vice President of Southwest Industries of Little Rock, Arkansas.

After visiting 400 schools, Mr. Hudson said that the Texas School System is big business and its greatest problem is a need to reduce paper work. We have to abide by laws the Legislature passes, he says, but administrative laws can be changed.

The drop-out problem caused by H.B. 72 needs to be corrected. Six weeks is too long to keep students out of many educational and sports activities that are denied to them if they make a failing grade. Three weeks or even one week would be better. Criminals are better treated than our students under this requirement.

Changes are needed in the teacher career ladder, teachers are penalized for moving for example, and the Permanent School



Fund of over six million dollars needs to be protected.

A teacher's job should not be tied to tests taken by students and vocational education should be continued in Texas, he says.

Texas cities can't afford the bond issues that would be required to provide classrooms to further reduce the student to teacher ratio, he says, and monitors, "state dictators," shouldn't be sent to over rule school boards and call for bond issues.

Due to losing finances and 25 to 40 per cent of valuations, we need to take a second look at our goals, says Mr. Hudson.

Mr. Hudson, who had some new innovations in Electra, was invited here by a teacher who formerly taught under his supervision.

Also complaining about the importation of natural gas from Canada, Langdon says that we need to market Texas natural gas first. And some incentive for the natural gas industry can bring back more drilling in Texas and help the states economy even if the price of oil goes down.

Notes On Northveiw

Have you ever wondered how a mentally retarded individual is identified and introduced into the system enabling them to receive services available? These services may be provided by the local Mental Health/Mental Retardation office or from placement in an ICF-MR facility such as Northveiw or Rock House Springs. Whether the individual in question is a child or adult, independent or with guardian, the overall process is basically the same.

Step 1 involves contacting the local Mental Retardation Authority (MRA). The one for Eastland is The Central Texas MHRM Center in Brownwood; however there are a number of MRA's serving Texas and the name of the one providing services to your particular location can be obtained from your local MHRM center or contacting the social worker at a facility like Northveiw.

Once contact is made and a potential client identified in need of services, the MRA will send a social worker to obtain information to develop a social history. Based upon the findings of the social history, appropriate clients are scheduled for a Comprehensive Diagnostic & Evaluation (C D & E). The purpose of the C D & E is to determine if the prospective client meets the legal requirements for being diagnosed as mentally

retarded. A C D & E consists of:
• A complete psychological evaluation
• An educational assessment

• A physical examination
• A social assessment
Out of these evaluations, an IQ and Adaptive Behavior Level (ABL) will be assigned. The C D & E Team consists of a psychologist, educational specialist, social worker, and physician/registered nurse. This team makes recommendations concerning services that would best meet the client's needs. These services might include but are not limited to residential placement services, social services (counseling, assistance with finances, etc.), educational services, therapeutic and medical services. The Social Worker who did the initial social history and intake process will assist in helping the client obtain the recommended services.

In the event that a residential placement is recommended, packets containing the above mentioned assessments and evaluations will be mailed to appropriate facilities, like Northveiw, for review. The MRA initiates the necessary paperwork to gain a Level of Care (LOC) from the region's health department. A pre-admission Level of Care is valid for 30 days. If the client

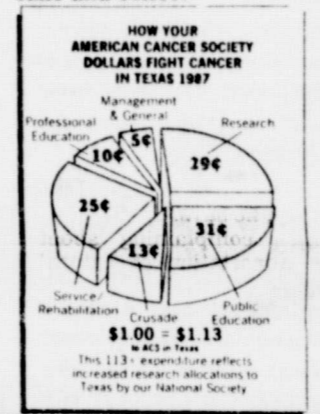

Under a law passed by the 70th Texas Legislature, hospitals are required to identify potential organ/tissue donors at or near death, inform the family of the option to donate, and document the approach and its disposition. The state law became effective Jan. 1, while a similar federal law took effect Nov. 20, 1987.
A written protocol for conforming with the state law is required of each hospital in the state, and hospitals in the Medicare and Medicaid program must comply with the federal law, according to Matthew T. Wall, staff attorney with the Texas Hospital Association.

needs for organs/tissues and the organization's availability for retrieval.
"In considering organ or tissue donation, families should keep in mind that no costs are incurred by the donor family, and that the identity of both the donor and recipient are kept confidential. No visible alteration to the body and no interference with funeral arrangements is anticipated," Wall noted.
"The best time to think about organ or tissue donation is while you are well, and decisions to donate should be shared with family members," noted THA President Terry Townsend. "These laws were drafted in response to a critical shortage of organs and tissues. In complying with these laws which the health care industry supported, hospitals will be sensitive to dying patients and families. Organ and tissue donations from dying patients literally will provide life for others. For donors and their families, it can be a final act of love, a way to make death meaningful. For recipients, it's a chance to live a productive life once again."

The protocol must provide for trained individuals to perform the approach to the family of a dying patient and inform them of the option to donate. Wall said.
"Neither the federal or state laws require asking the family for the organs or tissues of their loved one. This is not the intent of these new laws. Rather, they envision the approaching of the family to determine/identify whether the deceased or dying patient was an organ or tissue donor, as evidenced for example by a signed donor card. If not, then the hospital must simply inform the family of their option to donate or decline donation, and document the approach and its disposition," the attorney explained.
E.L. Graham Hospital in Cisco has an agreement with Southwest Organ Bank Inc., of Dallas.
Under the new state law, no inquiry is required; if the decedent is medically unsuitable for donation, there is actual notice of objections to donation by the decedent or persons authorized to make a donation, or if the hospital has not been notified by a procurement organization as to current medical

Mission To Break Ground

A new building will soon be arising south of Lake Leon near the intersection of Highways 2214, which connects Eastland and Desdemona, and 2461, which circles the lake. The location is across the highway from the country stores.
The building will house the Lake Leon Baptist Mission and will be built as a pilot project with assistance from the Baptist General Convention of Texas.
A 36 ft. by 68 ft. metal building on a slab with a brick ledge is planned. It is to house a one hundred seat sanctuary, 4 class rooms, a kitchen, and restrooms.
And a master plan has been prepared that will allow for orderly expansion of the facility on the Mission's over two acres of land.
More than twenty people are currently holding services in a mobile home on the location.
The Lake Leon Baptist Mission is sponsored by the Mangum Southern Baptist Church located southwest of Eastland.
The Mangum Baptist Church, which runs about ninety in attendance on Sunday mornings, also sponsors the Gunsight Highway and sponsored Nimrod before it became a self-supporting, constituted church.

And Mangum Baptist is also working to establish a mission at Union, which is between Cisco and Rising Star.
Dwaine Clower, the Mangum Baptist pastor, also preaches for Sunday services at the Lake Leon Mission. So that he can preach at both locations on Sunday, preaching is at 9:30 followed by Sunday School at 10:30 in the morning at Lake Leon, and the evening services are at 5. Wednesday night Bible study is at 7.
The Baptist General Convention of Texas planned the new building and granted \$7,500, which came from state mission offerings, to help finance it in what is a new approach. The building is to be a role model for other new rural churches over the state.
With the help of First Baptist of Ranger and New Hope Baptist of Gorman, around \$10,000 has been raised locally for the project.
People are being saved at the Mission which expects to move into the new building even before it is completely finished.
Bethany Baptist of Breckenridge has already given the Mission some pews for the new building.
Paul Taylor, Chairman of the building committee, is directing the construction of the new building.
A ground breaking service will be held this Sunday evening at 5 at the Mission, and concrete will probably be poured later in the week.
The Mission needs a water meter and access to the nearby community water line, which it has not been able to obtain.
Volunteer labor will be used to construct the building and any help would surely be appreciated.

On Eastland Visit:

Senator Graham Thanks EBAA Iron

"What you see here is free enterprise at work."

These were part of the opening remarks of Texas Senator Phil Gramm during his visit to EBAA (Earl Bradley and Associates) Iron Corp. Wednesday.

"I've been trying for two years to bring new industry to Texas," Gramm also said. "Then I decided I'd better come around and thank people who have already brought it here - and made it work."

This visit to the large iron foundry near Eastland was part of the Senator's swing through West Texas this week, during which he stopped at various private companies.

The plane carrying Gramm landed at the Eastland Airport about 5:30 p.m. Wednesday, and he was escorted to the EBAA Iron complex by Joe Williamson. There the Senator was met by Mr. and Mrs. Earl Bradley, other EBAA Iron officials, and more than 70

other enthusiastic citizens from Eastland and the area.

The reception was held in the Flex-Tend Building, one of four in a group near the foundry. A podium was set up for Gramm to speak from, and photographs and displays of EBAA Iron pipe fittings and other products were arranged nearby. These included the Japanese-invented Super-Flex fittings, which were first marketed in 1987.

Earl Bradley, founder of EBAA Iron, introduced

Senator Gramm, saying that the Company was highly honored by his visit.

Then Bradley spoke of EBAA Iron. "In January of 1964 I was in Dallas with a wife, four kids, and no job. Yet I knew this kind of stuff (foundry work) and how to sell it."

He started out with a Sears and Roebuck Drill Press and no employees, Bradley remarked.

He went on to tell that Earl Bullock began working for the Company early in its history, and that Bullock helped set up the Eastland plant in 1972. This foundry now has 95 employees, with 55 more at a subsidiary plant in Georgia. EBAA Iron has four patents with two more applied for. It sells these pipetting products all over the world.

Bradley's recipe for success was this: "We just work, we get a good idea, we do a lot of praying." Gramm enlarged on the free enterprise theme during his speech to the crowd.

"What you see here is ideas, hard work - and a new industry where none existed. This is a great economic force for the whole area."

"Some say Americans can't compete on the world market - that we should build walls around our products. But here in Eastland is a company which does compete successfully, and with a quality product."

Gramm, who is a former professor of Economics at Texas A&M University, said that the Texas economy is getting back on its feet. "The year 1988 is going to be better," he said. "It will be especially better if we can get more people like Earl to come up with ideas."

Gramm listed several national issues he is working on now.

"Thanks, EBAA Iron, for making the free enterprise system work in Eastland."

After his talk the Senator, an aide, Earl Bradley and the news media toured the foundry, where casting was underway.

They viewed the blast furnaces, and saw molten metal being poured into molds. A magnesium treatment on some of the material sent starry fragments above a furnace.

After this impressive tour Gramm and his aide left for the Airport. On the drive the Senator discussed questions of national and local interest.

There have been rumors about his being nominated for Vice President, the Senator said, but he has no interest in the job now. He has a commitment to the people of Texas to serve out his term as Senator - four more years - and do what he can to help turn the economy around in the state.

Gramm said he was not taking sides in the Presidential primaries.

"Three of my close friends are running for President," he explained. I consider George Bush the best Vice President this country has ever had - but I work with Bob Dole in the Senate all the time. Jack Kemp and I are long-time friends - I admire him a lot. One of these three men will probably be our next President. And I'll take any one of them over Gary Hart or Jesse Jackson," he remarked.

Gramm said he "was surprised at the showing of Pat Robertson in Iowa," but still feels that George Bush is the front runner in the Republican primaries.

"But you don't take any election for granted," he said.

Gramm listed several national issues he is working on now.

I've been trying to put the

Federal Government on a balanced budget," he remarked, apparently referring to the Gramm-Rudman Act. "I also want to bring down interest rates. And my Amendment repealing the Windfall Profit Tax on oil passed the Senate, so now we're trying to help get it passed through the House."

Gramm did not appear too hopeful on an Oil Import Fee. Congress and a large number of the public are too set against anything they think will cause higher prices in oil, he said.

"I'm working on another approach - tax incentives to encourage more oil and gas production. I would like to see the depletion raised back to 27 percent, and an investment tax credit for drilling."

As the car rolled through Eastland to the Airport Gramm remarked about how much it had meant to him to visit EBAA Iron and this community.

"I am impressed with Eastland and the area," he said. "I've been trying to get industry to locate in smaller towns like this - and in smaller counties."

"The big towns have people hired to target industries as they locate - making it harder for the small places to compete. But I'm here to help the small towns get plugged in."

Then the Senator turned and looked directly at the Eastland Telegram reporter. "If people here learn that some company is considering moving to Eastland - along with other locations - and someone will tell me about it, I'll be glad to pick up the phone and call them to personally recommend this area as a fine place for a Company to be."

It was soon afterward this encouraging remark when the Senator's plane rose into the cold, windy night.

But thoughts of his visit lingered on.

State, County Economics Improving

State Comptroller Bob Bullock's office sent the state collected one percent city sales tax receipts to the cities this week and Bullock announced that the amount was 3.4 percent larger than last year.

The February receipts were collected by stores in December and their increase indicates that consumer spending is increasing and that the state's recession has finally ended, says Bullock. A widened tax base also contributes to the increase.

February payments for Eastland County totalled \$85,652.86, with \$41,608.00 going to Eastland, \$21,368.00 going to Cisco, \$14,346.00 going to Ranger, \$4,624.00 going to Gorman, and \$3,703.00 going to Rising Star.

For Eastland County that was less than last year's total of \$88,785.11 for the same period. However, the reduction was all in Eastland where December sales had dropped from \$47,384.00 in tax receipts for the previous year. All

other county cities had a sales increase, or at least an increase in collected sales tax.

When both November and December tax collections are compared, Eastland county had an increase to \$122,528.68 from last year's \$117,707.25. For the two month period only Ranger had a reduction in sales, or tax receipts.

Ranger dropped to \$20,646.00 from last year's \$22,196.00. Eastland was up to \$62,310.00 from last year's \$58,172.00 and Cisco was up to \$29,468.00 from \$28,222.00. Gorman was up to \$5,832.00 from \$5,019.00 and Rising Star was up to \$4,271.00 from \$4,096.00.

Eastland had good November sales to make up for poor December sales while sales in Ranger were poor in November but improved in December. Other county cities showed steady improvement during both months with Gorman having a 16.20 percent improvement for the two months.

Everyone is welcome to attend and receive ashes and hear the invitation to "Turn away from sin and be faithful to the gospel."

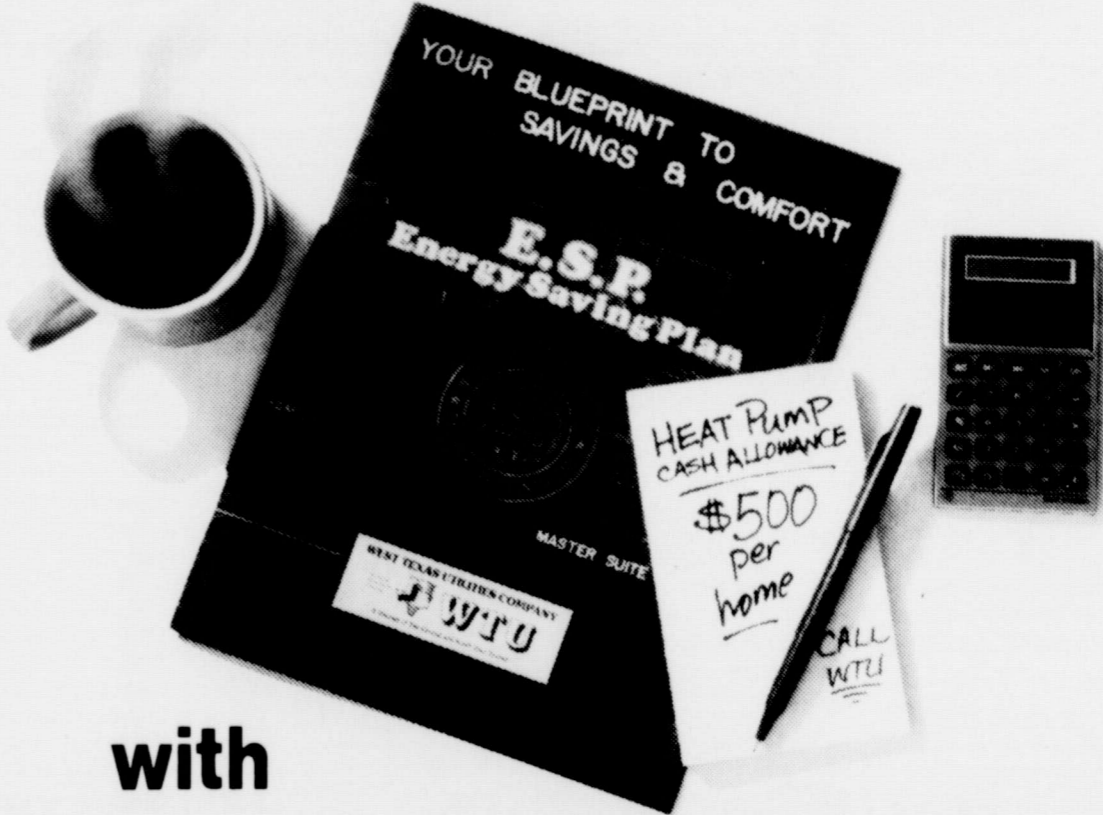
