Rains Help Fire Situation For Now

Light to moderate rains that fell across Eastland County Wednesday and Thursday are expected to stop grass fires for a few

Totals varied from .25 around Carbon to .4 to .9 in some parts of the county. Ranger, Eastland and Gorman reported .6, with slightly more around Cisco.

The rains came from a slow-moving cold front which entered the county late Wednesday. The skies began clearing Thursday afternoon, with sunlight and a heavy frost Friday morn-

Eastland County has had ice and snow this winter, but not enough rainfall to keep dead vegetation from creating a hazardous fire situation. Fire departments

from all the towns have been fighting fires, some of them large and dangerous blazes.

Two people have died recently while fighting grass fires in the area. Jackie Cooper, a Breckenridge High School Senior, died last Saturday while fighting a fire in southern Stephens County. J.W. Little died tuesday while fighting a grass fire on his land east of Ball-

A number of fires in the area have been from "controlled" burns which got out of hand. All the firemen stress that local fire departments must be contacted before "controlled burns" are started. It is illegal to set a controlled burn when the wind is above a certain velocity, and the fire departments can advise on





Highway Department Cautions Political Candidates

The highway department is cautioning political campaign workers not to "mess with Texas" in their zeal for

victory. As the presidential campaign's March 8 Super Tuesday approaches, more and more political signs are appearing along highways throughout the state. The department wants to be sure workers don't disobey the law when they plant a candidate's signs.

Political signs may be found wanting in two ways. If the signs do not comply with outdoor advertising sign regulations, they violate state or local laws. In addition, the placards can be considered litter under the **Texas Litter Abatement Act** (Article IV of Article 4477-9a,

We want to let political candidates know that placing signs within the highway right-of-way is prohibited,' said Charles Clinger of the Right of Way Division of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"Signs placed within the highway right-of-way will be removed maintenance crews and disposed of," he cautioned.

According to Clinger, the department has two reasons for making sure the Texas Litter Abatement Act is not violated. One, of course, is a desire to keep Texas highways beautiful. The other has a more tangible motivation.

"If there's an indication that the act is not being enforced, the Federal Highway Administration can extract a 10 percent penalty from our federal highway funds. That means less money for highway construction," he

But littering isn't the only trouble a campaign's signs can get into. "Signs placed outside and along highway right-of-way must meet certain spacing, size, construction, license and permit requirements," add Clinger.

Two years ago, the state Legislature made the department responsible for controlling outdoor advertising in unincorporated areas. Under House Bill 1330 (Article 6674v-3, VTCS), individuals or groups wanting



ORDINANCE NO. 0-88-3 AN ORDINANCE AMEN-DING AND CHANGING A FRANCHISE ORDINANCE ENACTED BY THE CITY OF CISCO, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, ON DECEMBER 8, 1987 AND BEING PARTLY STYLED, AN ORDINANCE GRAN-TING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORA-TION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRAN-CHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF CISCO, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS": PROVIDING FOR A MODIFICATION OF THE PAYMENT PROVI-SIONS IN SECTION 9

THEREOF ESTABLISHING AN EF-FECTIVE DATE: AND DECLARING EMERGENCY

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CI-TY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 9 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on December 8, 1987, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

"SECTION 9. Company, its successors and assigns, agrees to pay and City agrees to accept, on or before the 31st day of January, 1988, and on or before the same day of each succeeding year during the life of this franchise, the last payment being made on the 31st day of January, 2008, a sum of money which shall be equivalent to two percent (2%) of the gross receipts received by Company up to December 8, 1987 from the sale of gas to its domestic, commercial and industrial consumers within the corporate limits of said City expressly excluding, however, receipts derived from sales to governmental users and consumers in said City) and four percent (4%) for the balance of the 1987 calendar year from the sale of gas to its domestic, commercial, and industrial customers, and a sum of money which shall be equivalent to four percent (4%) of said gross receipts for each preceding calendar year thereafter from the sale of gas to its domestic, commercial and industrial customers, which annual payment shall be for the rights and privileges therein granted to Company, including expressly, without limitation, the right to use the streets, alleys, and public ways of said City. And it is also expressly agreed that the aforesaid annual payment shall be in lieu of any and all other and additional occupation taxes, easement, and franchise taxes or charges (whether levied as an ad valorem,

special, or other character of tax or charge), in lieu of municipal license and inspection fees, street taxes, and street or alley rentals or charges, and all other and additional municipal taxes, charges, levies, fees, and rentals of whatsoever kind and character which City may now impose or hereafter levy and collect, excepting only the usual general or special ad valorem taxes which the City is authorized to levy and impose upon real and personal property. Should City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing sums of money shall be in lieu of taxes, licenses, fees, street or alley rentals or charges, easement or franchise taxes or charges aforesaid, then City agrees that it will apply so much of said sums of money paid as necessary to satisfy Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, ren-

In order to determine the gross receipts received by Company from the sale of gas (expressly excluding sale of gas to governmental consumers) within the corporate limits of City, Company agrees that on the same date that payments are made, as provided in the preceding paragraph of this Section 9, it will file with the City Clerk a sworn report showing the gross receipts received from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within said corporate limits for the calendar year preceding the date of payment. City may, if it sees fit, have the books and records of Company examined by a representative of said City to ascertain the correctness of the sworn reports agreed to be filled

Receipts from sales to governmental users or consumers shall include all those receipts derived from the sale of gas to federal, state, county or city governments or branches and subdivisions thereof, school districts, or other similar districts, it being the intention to include within the term "governmental users and consumers" all taxsupported institutions owned or operated directly or indirectly by said governments and branches or subdivisions thereof, such as schools, colleges, hospitals, eleemonsynary institutions, army or training camps airports, courthouse, city hall, and other institutions of like of similar kind and character.

The payment herein provided shall be for the period January 1 to December 31 of the respective year that the payment is made.

SECTION 2. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, senctence, clause or phrase of the amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not af-

fect the validity of any other section, senctence, clause or phrase of this amendatory

ordinance. SECTION 3. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of February 9, 1988 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns

SECTION 5. In order to have this ordinance passed and in effect as soon after the first of 1988 as possible to expedite the provisions of the franchise ordinance, the City Council declares an emergency and that the provisions of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effet as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval.



They should also bring all records of expenses, such as doctor and hospital bills, interest on home mortage, interest on personal loans or credit cards and all real estate taxes paid.
