The Cisco Junior College spring schedule of Community Service courses includes a wide variety of classes.

MONDAYS -- Communication & Speech is designed to help the student develop the art of speaking in a manner that interests, motivates, entertains and impresses.

Jazz Dance for grades 3-6; 7-8; 9-12 will include technique and routines for the beginner, intermediate and advanced student.

TUESDAYS -- Country & Western Dancing will introduce the students to a number of country western dances including the two step, waltz, cotton eye joe and others.

Weightlifting is designed to set students up on individualized programs to improve their general physical appearance and fitness levels.

This class will meet on Tuesday and Thursday nights.

WEDNESDAYS -- Creative Writing will explore elements of story writing including plot, narration, characterization and techniques on creating reader interest.

Typing is a self-paced class for the beginning, intermediate and advanced student.

Bridge is designed for the beginner, intermediate and advanced player. Basic instruction is given and students play to gain expertise.

THURSDAYS -- Bowling includes instructions, score keeping and skill development.

Drug Hot Line Is Helpful In Man's Arrest

Cisco Policemen Larry Weikel and Donald Wiley stopped a 33-year old white male last Sunday morning in Cisco and arrested him. The man had warrants against him from the State of Texas. The man was charged with a Class B misdemeanor when less than 2 ounces of marijuana were found.

Cisco Chief of Police said the arrest was the result of information obtained from the Drug Hot Line.

Richard Ballinger of Eastland called the Cisco Police on February 3, to report that his 1977 Monte Carlo had been taken from Thrift Mart parking lot in Cisco. It was later recovered by the Abilene Police Department in Abilene.

Chief of Police Rains said the vehicle was believed to have been taken by juveniles.

Rains and Smith are investigating the reported case of cruelty to an animal. Rains said they received a call on February 11, about a dog that was believed to have been left in a pen for three weeks without food or shelter.

Cisco Police received a reported burglary of a motor vehicle on February 13. A woman's purse containing \$20 cash and some personal items was taken from the car while it was parked at the Community gym.

Juveniles are believed to have been involved. The purse was later recovered and the woman declined to file charges.

from University of Texas School of Law and is well known throughout West Central Texas as a trial lawyer. He is married to the former Anne Keith of DeLeon. They have one child at home and five grown children. Sudderth has served as president of the Chamber of Commerce, president of the Comanche Jaycees, as a legislative consultant for trade and professional organizations and has held many other offices in local and business organizations.

Rains Help Fire Situation For Now

Light to moderate rains that fell across Eastland County Wednesday and Thursday are expected to stop grass fires for a few days.

Totals varied from .25 around Carbon to .4 to .9 in some parts of the county. Ranger, Eastland and Gorman reported .6, with slightly more around Cisco.

The rains came from a slow-moving cold front which entered the county late Wednesday. The skies began clearing Thursday afternoon, with sunlight and a heavy frost Friday morning.

Eastland County has had ice and snow this winter, but not enough rainfall to keep dead vegetation from creating a hazardous fire situation. Fire departments

from all the towns have been fighting fires, some of them large and dangerous blazes.

Two people have died recently while fighting grass fires in the area. Jackie Cooper, a Breckenridge High School Senior, died last Saturday while fighting a fire in southern Stephens County. J.W. Little died Tuesday while fighting a grass fire on his land east of Ballinger.

A number of fires in the area have been from "controlled" burns which got out of hand. All the firemen stress that local fire departments must be contacted before "controlled burns" are started. It is illegal to set a controlled burn when the wind is above a certain velocity, and the fire departments can advise on

that.

All citizens are urged to be especially careful when dry and windy conditions return. Grass and weeds are easily ignited by sparks from trash fires, welding machines, cigarettes and even exhaust systems on vehicles.

Let's do what we can to prevent fires in Eastland County! Give those Volunteer Firemen a rest!

County Resource Association Sets Goals

The Eastland County Resource Association set membership goals, reviewed help being given, and learned more of current needs of people during a meeting Wednesday at Centennial Memorial Library.

David Bondurant, Head of the Resource Association's Board of Directors, led out with the meeting. Bondurant is Minister of the First Christian Church in Eastland.

Also present at the meeting were Guy Owens,

Margaret Corbell, Peggy Roberts, Mary Dunn, Dennis Noska, Corrie Cowley, Maria Duncan, Helen Osburn, and Viola Payne.

It was decided to hold a membership drive this spring, with the initial goal of 50 supporting members. The membership fee will be \$10 monthly for each individual or organization. Arrangements are expected to be made where volunteer time may be substituted for membership fees.

The membership funds raised will be used for the Multipurpose Center, the Ministerial Alliance Travel Funds, and other critical County-wide needs.

Persons at Wednesday's meeting said they expected self-help for the County to become more and more necessary, due to cut-backs in Federal and State funds for human services. The Multipurpose Center furnished emergency food for a number of applicants last month.

Organizations reported to be contributing to the Multipurpose Center Food Pantry on a regular basis are the First Christian and First United Methodist Churches of Eastland, the Mangum Baptist Church and Lake Leon Mission, and the Ministerial Alliance.

The Ministerial Alliance has designated the first Sunday of each month as a time to collect food in all participating churches.

Mary Dunn, who is in charge of the Food Pantry, told County Resource Association members that supplies are getting low again. Canned goods and other staples are always appreciated. The Pantry has no shortening in stock, and could especially use that item.

Peggy Roberts Director of the Multipurpose Center, stated that she could really use two volunteers to sort and mend clothing. If interested, report to the Center at 204 N. Lamar in Eastland.

The Eastland County Resources Association will meet again on Wednesday, March 16 in Centennial Memorial Library in Eastland.

Candidates Of 1988 And Issues

The 12 men who seek the presidency in 1988 are a varied lot. They come from all walks of life. Their occupations differ as well. They are from every geographic corner of the country. Politically they would chart widely different courses on issues from arms control to AIDS.

The Wall Street Journal sent a questionnaire seeking their beliefs. Here is their answers drawn from their campaigns and public statements and by the Journal's questionnaire.

According to reports, Governor Dukakis is at this particular time considered as the Democratic front runner. He is the Massachusetts governor and regards this period as the "best opportunity in our lifetime" for an agreement on arms control. He believes that Soviet/America relations may improve under the new leadership in Russia. On the issue of NATIONAL SECURITY he strongly opposes a build-up of our defense and opposes Star Wars. He favors research but at a lower level than the current funding.

His thinking on CENTRAL AMERICA is to aid the Contras economically and strongly opposes military aid for the freedom fighters, the Contras.

His BUDGET POLICY calls for freezing defense spending at current levels. He would cancel Midgetman missiles. He favors increase spending on schools, infrastructure and technology to strengthen the economy.

On TAXES he is in favor of tax increases if necessary to balance the budget. He proposes a five-year enforcement plan to collect what he says are \$110 billion in overdue federal taxes.

As for the TRADE issue he advocates limited and temporary import restrictions to protect industries while they modernize. He is against the Gephardt amendment which would require the U.S. to renegotiate current international trade agreements and keep their aggregate trade accounts with all nations in balance or face across the board tariffs.

On the AIDS issue he opposes mandatory testing of AIDS except in the military and of prisoners and some immigrants. He favors health education as a means to prevent drug abuse, teen-pregnancy and AIDS starting in grade school and he is a pro-abortionist.

Richard Gephardt, a Democrat, has been chairman of the House Democratic Caucus from

1965 to the present. On the issue of NATIONAL SECURITY he supports pending agreement on intermediate range missiles, the agreement reached recently during the Soviet/American peace talks. He strongly opposes Star Wars deployment and favors low-level research. He supported nerve gas research and production to bring existing stockpiles up to date, but opposes additional development.

He opposes AID TO CONTRAS and says he would support a special group to encourage direct negotiations among all parties in Central America.

On the BUDGET QUESTION, he opposes a balanced budget amendment and does not want the line-item veto but prefers to lump all bills into one bill and present it to the President to sign all or none. He supported the House-passed version of Gramm-Rudman, but was against the Senate version because he considered it was too hard on domestic spending. He wants to sharply limit inflation defense spending levels, but supports increases in education and health.



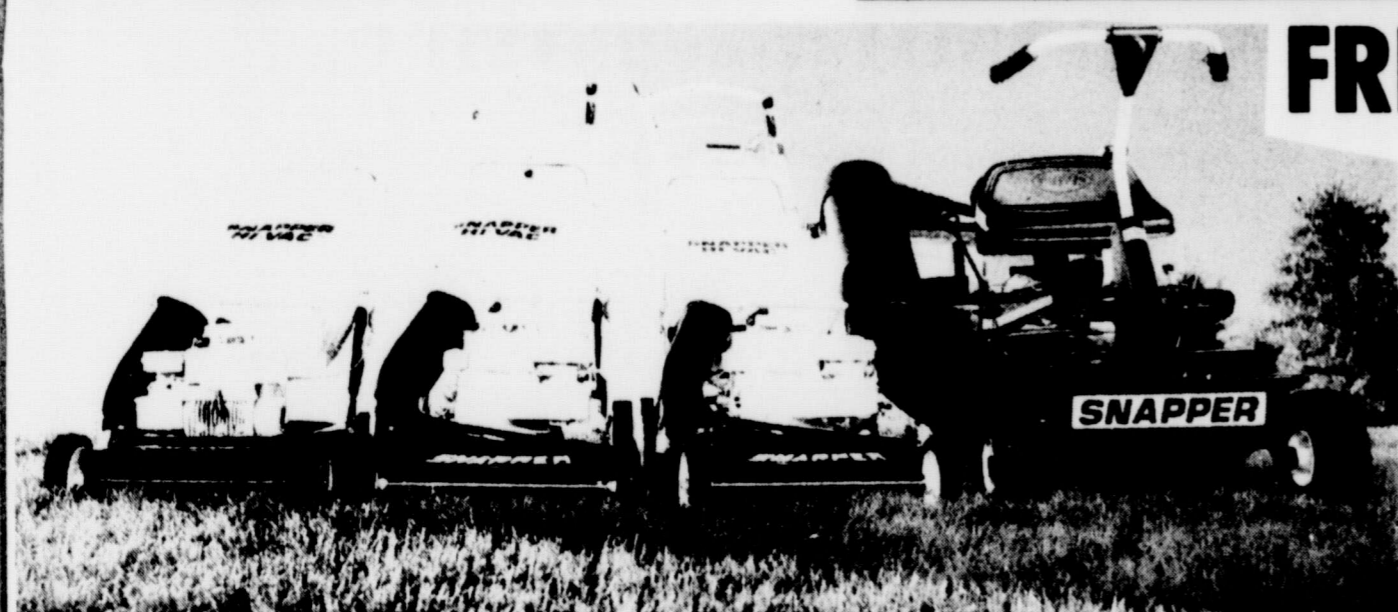

EASTLAND

variables to this fish catching lure have existed over the years. Single blades, double's, Colorado, Willow Leafs and countless combination.

One of the newest of these is the double Willow Leaf. Our first experience with this bait came during a Lone Star Bass Classic on Twin Buttes Reservoir near San Angelo. B.A.S.S. professional Elroy Kruger of Universal City fished a proto type he had developed in 1986. A double copper Willow leaf 3/8 ounce spinner which produced 7 nice bass towards winning this event.

Mr. Kruger stated that this bait outperformed his partner's combination Willow leaf and Colorado blade bait 5 to 2. Mr. Kruger said he believed the added flash from two willow leaves combined with the different vibration more closely imitated fleeing baitfish.

We should all realize a little something from this instance. That being by make small changes in some old baits can pay big dividends. Experiment during those next trips, who knows you could stumble on to a real winner.

Last cast we informed you of a 17 pound 4 ounce lunker from Lake Fork. Larry Barnes a 41-year-old sales manager with Southwest Bell in Fort Worth, rocked the fishing world Sunday, February 14 with the states second largest bass.

This lunker was taken around 11:45 a.m. while flipping standing timber in 12 to 15 feet of water. This monster fell prey to a black 7/16 ounce jig with a No. 11 Uncle Josh pork frog trailer in a black and blue color. The battle lasted only 15 to 30 seconds, but the memories, I sure will live forever.

Area lake reports are looking excellent with most impoundments hinging around two or more days of sunshine.

Leon: Black bass good to 5 pounds on north banks using jig and pork, some good numbers coming from the river area up to 4 pounds most around 13 inches; crappie fair in size good in numbers no 2 pound spawners reported yet, minnows and jigs both producing.

Brownwood: Black Bass improving to 4 pounds on worms and jigs, some smaller bass being taken on spinners in the main lake; crappie excellent up the Bayou River; catfish

fair to excellent up the Bayou River; catfish fair to 10 pounds on cut shad.

Hubbard Creek: Black Bass excellent to 6 pounds good numbers of 4 to 5 pound fish being taken on a wide variety of baits; crappie good in numbers small in size.

Proctor: Black bass fair to 7 pounds on black jig and pork. Some spawners being caught on north banks and up the rivers; crappie excellent in sunken brushpiles up to 2 pounds.

ORDINANCE NO. 0-88-3
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AND CHANGING A FRANCHISE ORDINANCE ENACTED BY THE CITY OF CISCO, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS, ON DECEMBER 8, 1987 AND BEING PARTLY STYLED, "AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LONE STAR GAS COMPANY, A CORPORATION, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO FURNISH AND SUPPLY GAS TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC IN THE CITY OF CISCO, EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS"; PROVIDING FOR A MODIFICATION OF THE PAYMENT PROVISIONS IN SECTION 9 THEREOF; ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF CISCO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. As of the effective date of this amendatory ordinance, and upon acceptance by Lone Star Gas Company of the provisions hereof, Section 9 of the aforesaid captioned franchise ordinance enacted on December 8, 1987, shall be stricken, cancelled and nullified and there shall be substituted in lieu thereof a new provision reading as follows:

"SECTION 9. Company, its successors and assigns, agrees to pay and City agrees to accept, on or before the 31st day of January, 1988, and on or before the same day of each succeeding year during the life of this franchise, the last payment being made on the 31st day of January, 2008, a sum of money which shall be equivalent to two percent (2%) of the gross receipts received by Company up to December 8, 1987 from the sale of gas to its domestic, commercial and industrial consumers within the corporate limits of said City (expressly excluding, however, receipts derived from sales to governmental users and consumers in said City) and four percent (4%) for the balance of the 1987 calendar year from the sale of gas to its domestic, commercial, and industrial customers, and a sum of money which shall be equivalent to four percent (4%) of said gross receipts for each preceding calendar year thereafter from the sale of gas to its domestic, commercial and industrial customers, which annual payment shall be for the rights and privileges therein granted to Company, including expressly, without limitation, the right to use the streets, alleys, and public ways of said City. And it is also expressly agreed that the aforesaid annual payment shall be in lieu of any and all other and additional occupation taxes, easement, and franchise taxes or charges (whether levied as an ad valorem,

special, or other character of tax or charge), in lieu of municipal license and inspection fees, street taxes, and street or alley rentals or charges, and all other and additional municipal taxes, charges, levies, fees, and taxes of whatsoever kind and character which City may now impose or hereafter levy and collect, excepting only the usual general or special ad valorem taxes which the City is authorized to levy and impose upon real and personal property. Should City not have the legal power to agree that the payment of the foregoing sums of money shall be in lieu of taxes, licenses, fees, street or alley rentals or charges, easement or franchise taxes or charges aforesaid, then City agrees that it will apply so much of said sums of money paid as necessary to satisfy Company's obligations, if any, to pay any such taxes, licenses, charges, fees, rentals, easement or franchise taxes or charges.

In order to determine the gross receipts received by Company from the sale of gas (expressly excluding sale of gas to governmental consumers) within the corporate limits of City, Company agrees that on the same date that payments are made, as provided in the preceding paragraph of this Section 9, it will file with the City Clerk a sworn report showing the gross receipts received from the sale of gas to its domestic and commercial consumers within said corporate limits for the calendar year preceding the date of payment. City may, if it sees fit, have the books and records of Company examined by a representative of said City to ascertain the correctness of the sworn reports agreed to be filled herein.

Receipts from sales to governmental users or consumers shall include all those receipts derived from the sale of gas to federal, state, county or city governments or branches and subdivisions thereof, school districts, or other similar districts, if being the intention to include within the term "governmental users and consumers" all tax-supported institutions owned or operated directly or indirectly by said governments and branches or subdivisions thereof, such as schools, colleges, hospitals, eleemosynary institutions, army or training camps airports, courthouse, city hall, and other institutions of like of similar kind and character.

The payment herein provided shall be for the period January 1 to December 31 of the respective year that the payment is made.

SECTION 2. The terms and provisions of this amendatory ordinance shall be deemed to be severable, and if the validity of any section, sentence, clause or phrase of the amendatory ordinance should be declared to be invalid, the same shall not af-

fect the validity of any other section, sentence, clause or phrase of this amendatory ordinance.

SECTION 3. Except as heretofore and hereinabove changed and amended, the terms, provisions, conditions and requirements of the aforesaid franchise ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 4. This amendatory ordinance shall become effective as of February 9, 1988 if the Company files its written acceptance of the provisions of this ordinance within sixty (60) days after its final passage and approval by this City and upon acceptance, the provisions hereof shall be binding upon City and Company, their successors and assigns.

SECTION 5. In order to have this ordinance passed and in effect as soon after the first of 1988 as possible to expedite the provisions of the franchise ordinance, the City Council declares an emergency and that the provisions of the Charter of the City of Cisco calling for two readings of an ordinance be dispensed with, and that this ordinance take effect as an emergency measure immediately upon its passage and approval.

Tax Counseling

They should also bring all records of expenses, such as doctor and hospital bills, interest on home mortgage, interest on personal loans or credit cards and all real estate taxes paid.
