New Bulletin Explains Underground Water Conservation Law Of Texas

A bulletin recently issued by the Agricultural Extension Service of A & M College and the United States Department of Agriculture explains in detail the provisions of the Underground Water Conservation District Law, passed in 1949 by the 51st Texas Legislature. It is a timely bulletin, since farmers in many sections are being urged to organize districts as authorized by the law.

In the first place, the term "underground water" is explained as defined by law, as "any water suitable for agricultural, domestic or stock raising purposes, percolating—that is, permeating or filtering—below the surface of the earth. It specifically does not include underground streams or the underflow of rivers. Surface waters,

—rivers, creeks, run-off and the like—are not affected in any way. The law applies to all underground water, where the people have organized a district.

Ownership Affirmed

The law "specifically recognizes the ownership and rights of the owner of the land, his lessees and assigns, in underground water, and nothing in the law will affect that ownership."

If a district is organized by majority vote of the people concerned, then the district will have the right to set out regulations so as to get the greatest possible good out of the water. But the district will not have the right to take the water from under one man's land and give it to another. Nor will it have the right to limit the amount of water a man can draw from his well except under certain conditions, such as drawing salt water into the reservoirs.

Why Vote A District?

In some cases, to vote a district, may be the only chance a man will have of insuring his supply of water. In areas where the water level is dropping, the bulletin said, it may be necessary to use conservation measures, such as spacing wells, if the irrigation wells are to continue to produce. Otherwise, the entire area may find itself without water.

To organize a district, there first has to be a determination by the State Board of Water Engineers of the existence of an underground water reservoir. This must have determinate boundaries and must be capable of producing from a well at the rate of at least 150,000 gallons a day.

Once a reservoir is designated, an election must be held to find out whether a majority of the property owning, resident, tax-paying voters want to organize a district. If the reservoir is all in one county, then the County Commissioners' Court calls an election to decide whether a district shall be organized, if in more than one county the State Board of Water Engineers calls the election.

Separate Voting

In voting, the bulletin explains, each county votes separately from other counties, residents of cities vote separately from those living outside the cities, and voters in segregated irrigated areas by at least five miles vote separately from the others. The majority vote in each voting unit determines whether or not that particular unit is included in the district.

Voters in the district will elect a Board of Directors of five members. The district will be divided into five precincts and one director will be elected from each precinct by the voters in that precinct.

GO FISHING

The voters could vote a tax of not more than 50 cents on the \$100 valuation for support of the district.

The district is given the general power of doing what is necessary for conserving, preserving, protecting and recharging the underground water in the reservoir over which it has jurisdiction.

A district can use its power to prevent waste by requiring that artesian wells, for example, not be allowed to flow unrestricted when the water is not being put to a useful purpose.

The district can require that any person wishing to drill a well obtain a permit from the district before drilling. The permit can be conditioned on the compliance with certain specifications as to the drilling, equipping and completion of the well so as to prevent waste. The district can require that records be kept and reports be made of the drilling work and of water used.

The district has the power to recharge the reservoir, which simply means putting more water under the ground and into the reservoir.

On the South Plains, for example, there are thousands of wet weather lakes on the surface. Some of these lakes have tight bottoms so that the water running into them stays right there until it evaporates. By disturbing the bottom of such lakes, the bulletin says, it may be possible to drain their water into underground sands and put it to beneficial use.

The law does not, however, give to the district the right to pro-rate water or otherwise force well owners to cut down on production of water. The district can recommend in such cases but cannot force any limitations on withdrawal of water.

The law sets out the manner in which the land owner or water user may seek redress in the courts if he is dissatisfied with any action of the district.

Shivers Asks For 'Term Of My Own'

Gov. Allan Shivers, is formally announcing his candidacy for a first elective term as Governor, said he has done his best to carry out a program for Texas in a manner acceptable to the people of Texas, adding:

"If I have succeeded, I will appreciate their votes for a term of my own."

Shivers, who assumed the Governorship last July, had not held a full-time governmental job

before becoming Governor. He was elected to the State Senate in 1934 and twice re-elected. In 1946 he was elected Lieutenant Governor and re-elected to that office in 1948. Born in Lufkin, he spent his boyhood in Tyler County and later moved with his family to Port Arthur.

During his public career Shivers has given particular attention to public welfare, rural roads and improved educational facilities. He was co-author of Texas' original old-age assistance law and helped to write the tax bill which still meets the cost of old-age assistance. Under his leadership last February, the Legislature approved a far-reaching reform and improvement program for state hospitals.

The Governor said he considers economy to be the State's top problem. "And that means economy of money, of our soil and of our water resources," he added.

He expressed thanks to "the thousands of individual Texans who have already told me that they will support me in this election."

New Mexico To Pave Roads

New Mexico State Highway Engineer B. B. Dwyer has advised Gov. Thomas J. Mabry that the New Mexico Highway Department is making preparations to pave approximately six miles of road extending from Texico south along the Texas-New Mexico state line.

Engineer Dwyer also advises the Governor that his office expects to take bids for this work "about the 30th of June."

County officials of Parmer County contacted here Monday said that they had not received any requests or right-of-way easements along the route, but added that they would be provided if they are required.

W. J. Matthews, living six miles south on the line, said Monday he had contacted Gov. Mabry about the proposed road construction. It was agreed that the pavement will intersect the Bailey County farm-to-market road, a distance of seven miles south of here, instead of six. Matthews called attention to the fact that Engineer Dwyer set the distance at "approximately six miles."

The Bailey County pavement ends at the Texas-New Mexico line, seven miles south, and it has been the plan heretofore to join the roads at that point and bring the pavement into the Twin Cities.
