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Vernetta Pierce Files For Council Place IV

Vernetta Pierce, filed for place IV on the City of Cisco Council seat last week according to Mike Moore, city manager.

Pierce who occupies a seat on the council at the present time, took it over when it was vacated by Bill Roberts last year. "She has worked hard as a council member and I glad she has decided to file," said Moore.

One other place is empty and no one has filed for Place III on the city council. If anyone would like to file for the election of the two seats they may do so at the City Hall office during regular business hours.

There have been no filings for open seats for the Cisco Junior College Board of Regents or the Cisco Independent School District Board of Directors according to last reports.

If anyone is interested in running for a position, on the CJC Board of Regents they may contact Emma Watts at the College.

To file on the CISD board of directors anyone can contact Ray Saunders at his office behind the Cisco Elementary School.

Council Approves Purchase Of Police Car

City of Cisco Manager Mike Moore told council members at the regular council meeting held at City Hall last Tuesday, that at the present time, two out of the six police cars are out of commission. Moore said the eight Cisco police officers are having to double up now.

Moore told the council the City of Cisco has the money in the 1987-88 budget to purchase one automobile. Moore told the council he was notified by the Department of Public Safety about some 1984 Ford LTD cars that are for sale. He said the company would paint the cars to match the ones Cisco has and put on new tires.

Moore told the council that Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains and City Mechanic Reggie Pittman will drive to Austin to look at the cars. Moore said if the two men should find another car that would be an exceptional buy, then Rains and Pittman can put it on hold. Moore said if they place a car on hold he will bring the matter before the council to see about revising the budget to buy the second car.

In other matters, Moore

told the council during the city manager's report, that one of the major projects in the City of Cisco is the continuing development of the new landfill. Moore said they need to put in the fences now.

Another project is the development of 14th Street. Moore said that hopefully the finances of the city will allow the street to have a seal coating put on it. He said at one point on the street, sixteen inches of filler had to be placed in the middle of the street.

During the financial report, manager Mike Moore told council members that the tax collection for overdue taxes is extremely disappointing. He said thirty five percent of the past due taxes for the City of Cisco are from people who have never been delinquent before. Moore added that this must signify something. Only 76 percent of the total taxes that are due have been paid. Moore added that tax collection is the biggest source of income for the City of Cisco.

Moore said he will meet with tax lawyers next week. A decision will be made on

how to handle this problem.

Moore said 33 percent of the fiscal year is completed and the city is holding its own in the other avenues of revenue and expenditures.

In other matters, council members voted to table an ordinance for the 2200 and 2300 blocks of Avenue B, of the city to be vacated and abandoned except for the existing easements, until Moore has heard from one of the land owners.

During the citizen council discussion, council members were told that the clean up campaign on Conrad Hilton Avenue is coming along pretty well. Council members asked who is responsible for cleaning up the debris of the burned out building at the Red Front Mini Mall. Moore said he has sent letters to the bank that holds the title of the building, but he had not heard any reply by Tuesday night. Moore said he had

heard reports of law suits by or against the insurance companies and this may hold the cleaning up of the building back for awhile.

Mayor Joe Wheatley and council members Allen Masters, Arlie Whitley, Roy Dennis, Vernetta Pierce, and John Muller attended the meeting were City Manager Mike Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.

Cisco Crimestoppers Offer Reward In Last Week's Theft

The boat was taken from an open carport located behind the residence between the hours of Thursday, February 18, 6:30 p.m., to Friday morning, February 19, at 7:30 a.m.

A \$500 reward is being offered by the Cisco Crimestoppers for information leading to the arrest and indictment of the person or persons responsible for the theft.

The Crime Stoppers telephone numbers to call are 629-3161 or 629-3182. Or contact Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains at 442-1770. If you have any information, you do not have to identify yourself when you call in.

You will be given a reference number, and when you see it published that the persons reported committing the crime has been indicted, then contact Crime Stoppers again, identifying yourself by the reference number you were given. You can then make arrangements for the payment of the reward.

Citizens are asked to keep an eye open in their

neighborhood. Everyone is urged to pay attention to what is going on around them. There has been an increase in thefts of property and personal belongings in this area. Anyone who sees a suspicious character or vehicle in their neighborhood is urged to call the police through the Eastland County Dispatch at 629-1728. Help prevent crime!

Thomas Miller, a 6-6 sophomore forward from Killeen, scored 22 points and pulled down 10 rebounds to lead the CJC Wrangler Men to an 83-65 win over the Hill College Rebels at Wrangler Gym Wednesday night. It was the third straight conference win for the Wranglers and improved their conference record to

6-7 and 14-14 overall.

Cisco jumped out to an early lead which they kept throughout the first half. The score at halftime was 37-31. The Wranglers came out hot at the start of the second period, and gradually built the lead to a comfortable margin. They shot sixty percent from the field, and had a 39-29 rebound advantage over the shorter Rebels.

Miller's 22 points led both teams in scoring. Ronald Ataman added 19 for Cisco, while Tyrone Williams had 12. Tracy Guy had four three-pointers for Hill, and led them in scoring with 17.

The Wranglers end the 1987-88 season tonight (Saturday) in Denison against the Grayson College Vikings.

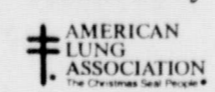
Jason currently lives in Brownwood. He graduated from Howard Payne University in December with a BBA in Accounting. He attends the First Baptist Church in Brownwood.

On Election Day, there'll be 14 voting sites—nine Democratic and five Republican locations; so there's no excuse for us not to vote.

We can even vote absentee right now at the County Clerk's Office through March 4—if for some reason we can't be at our voting box on Election Day.

The Democratic voting locations are:

- Eastland - Courthouse.
- Gorman - Fire Hall.
- Desdemona - Community Center.
- Lake Leon - Morris Newnham Home.
- Carbon - School.
- Cisco - College Annex.
- Olden - Community Center.
- Rising Star - City Hall.
- Ranger - Community Clubhouse.

Republicans can vote at these sites:

- Ranger - Old School Gym.
- Eastland - City Hall.
- Cisco - 1010 W. 7th St.
- Rising Star - School Tax Office.
- Gorman - Old Fire Station.

Those who attend their precinct convention will elect delegates to the county convention; those who attend their county/senatorial convention will elect delegates to the state convention. Those who attend the state convention will elect delegates to the National Convention.

PRECINCT CONVENTIONS

A convention will be held in your precinct at 7:15 p.m. on March 8, 1988, the same day as the presidential primary.

COUNTY CONVENTIONS

If you are elected a delegate or alternate at your precinct convention, you may attend your county convention on Saturday, March 19.

A poll is taken of all the delegates to figure how

many delegates of the convention support each candidate. The chair will announce the results.

PRESIDENTIAL PRIMARY

Unlike earlier years, Texas will hold a presidential primary in 1988. This primary will be held Tuesday, March 8, 1988, and will be open to any registered voter who does not vote in another party's primary and who does not attend another party's political convention.

Three-fourths of the delegates will be distributed to presidential candidates based on the results of the primary. One-fourth of the delegates will be distributed based on the number of people attending the party's conventions. The delegates themselves will be elected at state convention.

CONVENTION SYSTEM

The Texas Democratic Party has a three-level convention system:

- Level 1. Precinct conventions;
- Level 2. County conventions (or senatorial district conventions in urban areas); and
- Level 3. State convention.

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A poll is taken of all the delegates to figure how

many delegates of the convention support each candidate. The chair will announce the results.

Fourth, delegates in each precinct, or sometimes a group of precincts, gather together to elect delegates and alternates to the state convention. Within the group, the delegates and alternates are elected at one time, but you cast only one vote. The highest vote getters are the delegates and the next highest are the alternates.

STATE CONVENTION

If you were elected a delegate at your county/senatorial convention,

you may participate in the state convention.

The state convention elects four types of delegates to the National Convention:

1. Pledged senatorial district delegates and alternates;
2. Unpledged party and elected official delegates;
3. Pledged party and elected official delegates; and
4. At-large delegates and alternates.

NATIONAL CONVENTION

If you are elected a delegate or alternate by the state convention, you may participate in the National Convention.

County Treasurers Meet In Eastland

"Heart of Texas"-Region 6-County Treasurers' Meeting in Eastland, counted treasurers from 17 counties along with 2 deputies at their meeting February 18, 1988 at the courthouse. In the morning session, Rene Henry of the State Comptroller's Office presented up-to-date information and instruction concerning duties of county treasurers in 1988.

After lunching at K-Bob's, the group conducted regional business, and elected officers for the next two years. The treasurers led by their director, Ms. Odessa Wells of Waco, reviewed Item 7 on the Study Charge given by Gib Lewis to State Representative Mark Stiles, chairman of House Committee on County Affairs. Item 7 states: "To study the abolishment of the office of county treasurer and the

transfer of the treasurer's duties to auditor's office".

In summation of the review: The treasurers as a group feel strongly that elected county officials like themselves will always feel great responsibility to their voters. This keeps them seeking to improve ways of investing the county's money, being careful to safeguard any and all funds, and to keep accurate and open records.

When the county treasurer keeps a set of books and the county auditor's office keeps a set of books - the "checks and balance system", so valued by our form of government, is in full force.

County treasurers greatly respect the county auditor's role in county government. They also feel that the county treasurer's office as set forth in the Texas State Constitution is not only relevant

but valuable in the day-to-day business of county government.

Each county treasurer will be working with the people of her county to inform them, ask for their help and seek their advice as hearings concerning Item 7 are conducted throughout the state in the coming months.

Guests during the day-long meeting were: Scott Bailey, county judge; Ray Pruitt, county auditor; Agnes Johnson and Rena Midkiff of the auditor's office; Emory Walton, district attorney; and Edith McCullough, Retired Eastland County Treasurer.

All of the visiting

treasurers expressed their thanks to Eastland and the Eastland Chamber of Commerce for an enjoyable and informative day.

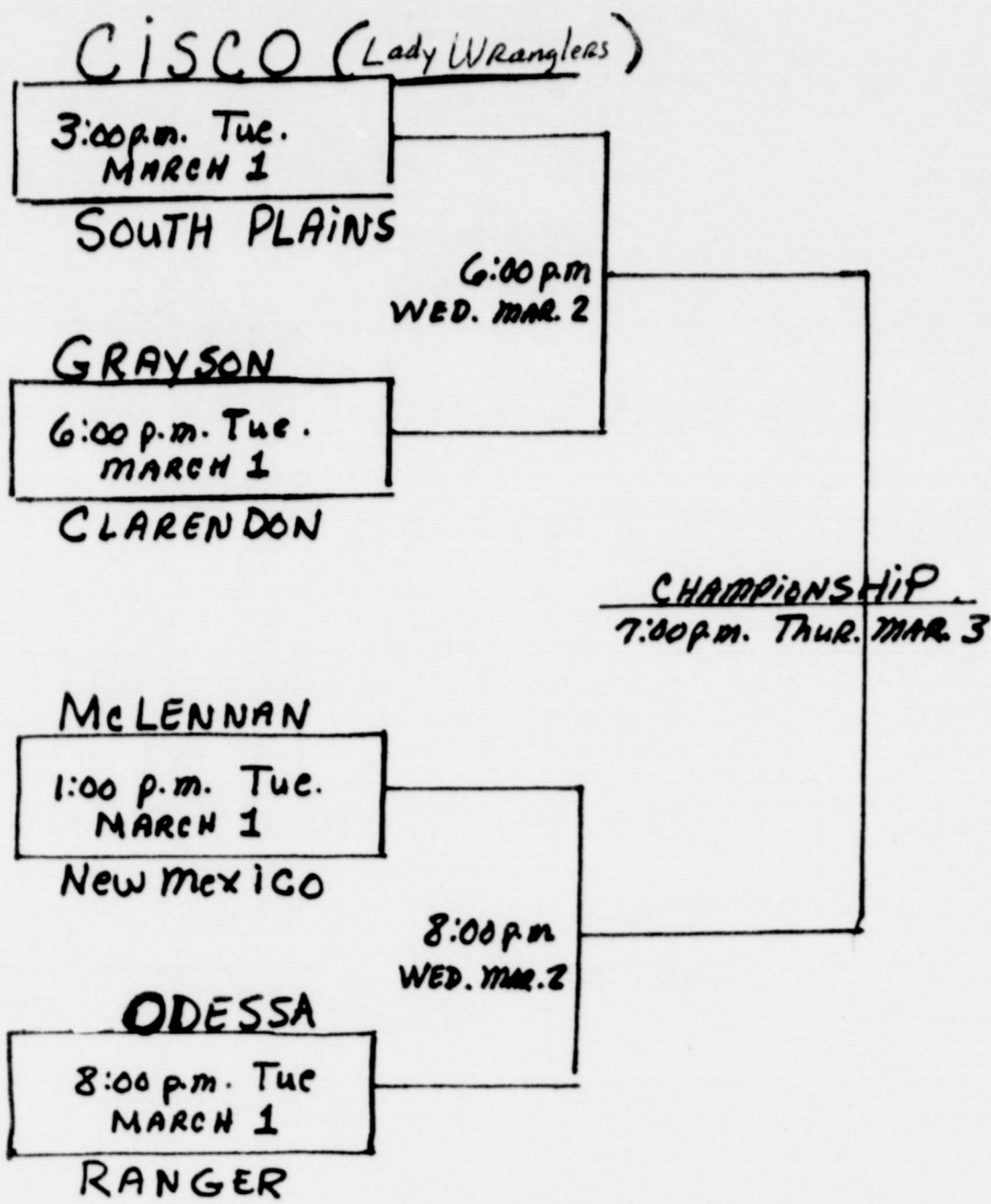

Project TEACH Is Formed In Texas

One out of five Texans cannot read.

To combat this growing problem which keeps our state from realizing its full economic and human potential, the Texas Classroom Teachers Association in cooperation with the state's First Lady, Rita Clements, has announced the formation of Project TEACH (Texas Educators Are Committed to Help).

Project TEACH is designed to plug in teacher volunteers to existing adult literacy programs and encourage the development of programs where none exist.

Mrs. Clements has challenged every Texan to join this educational crusade. "Volunteers with or without prior teaching experience are needed," she said. "The statewide adult literacy project undertaken by TCTA is a well-directed step toward abolition of this

skills handicap. Teachers are experts in the instruction of reading and writing and, therefore, their input is of utmost importance in the endeavor."

Texas, like virtually every other state in the nation, has an unacceptably high illiteracy rate. According to the 1986 Governor's Task Force on Literacy, one out of five adult Texans cannot read, write or compute well enough to be successful in society.

The Governor's report also said that 36 percent of Texas's adults did not complete high school and 18 percent did not complete the eighth grade. Eighty-five percent of the Texas Department of Corrections inmates, 63 percent of heads of households who receive Aid to Families with Dependent Children, and 60 percent of adults with incomes below poverty level

are high school dropouts.

The high illiteracy and dropout rates are shortcomings that threaten the state's economic revitalization, Gov. Clements has said. "A skilled and educated work force is essential if Texas is to achieve its goal of economic diversification."

Mrs. Clements said if the state is to be able to recruit new business, it is necessary to equip citizens with skill that will be in demand. "Our efforts to increase state employment will be self-defeating if we do not meet the needs and expectations of businesses. We want new business in Texas because we want new jobs for Texans."

She feels the 70th Legislature took some steps in the right direction when it established the Texas Literacy Council to study literacy training programs available to adults and out-of-school youth in our state.

"Project TEACH" is keeping with our association's overall goal to provide educational opportunities for everyone, regardless of age, to fully develop this state's human and economic potential," TCTA President Wendell Whittenburg said.

Whittenburg added, "Developing this state's full potential should be the priority of every individual involved in education. We encourage and urge others to assist us in this extremely important effort."

Whittenburg said, "TCTA decided to develop Project TEACH in response to the need and desire to give something back to the com-

munities where we live and work. Too many times our efforts are seen as self-serving by the public. This is a way we can get involved and let people understand what teachers and their skills really mean to a community."

"Since many TCTA members come from rural areas where the need to serve the functionally illiterate is especially great, the association feels it can provide valuable resources in terms of staffing adult literacy programs in those regions," Whittenburg said.

"We are ready to form a corps of volunteers from our membership ranks to assist in teaching and providing resources for implementing such programs."

Through all phases of the project, TCTA will work with the Adult Literacy Council to cooperate in the development and maintenance of a delivery system for the literacy course work and to insure the state's literacy goals are attained.

In addition to helping establish programs in communities where none exist, TCTA members will also help by volunteering to be tutors or trainers of tutors. Teachers who cannot give the 1.5 hours a day twice a week for one-on-one tutoring because of family or job restraints can become tutor trainers, training other teachers in the "how-to" of teaching adults.

Cisco Junior College has graciously offered the facilities of the Student Union Building for the affair. Food, games, music, bowling, video games, pool, ping pong and movies will be offered for the night. Plans are in the making to gather door prizes galore for Project Graduation.

"Project Graduation" is a chemical-free celebration concept developed by and for high school students in the state of Maine. The project began at one high school in 1980 after having lost seven seniors in alcohol-related fatal crashes the preceding year. As of the end of 1984 school year, 103 of 130 high schools in Maine held Project Graduation activities. The fact that there were no alcohol related fatal crashes involving students at these schools during the months of May and June for the past three years is testimony enough of the worth of such a project.

The concept has subsequently spread to other states during the past several years, and as a result of a national conference in Springfield, Ill., in March, 1984, introduced a few representatives from the State of Texas. Even though the time remaining to graduation was short, two high schools initiated projects at the end of the school year. Both were highly suc-

cessful and received statewide attention.

The projects are organized by students, and parents with the support of churches, and the local community. Although the project graduation taking place are designed primarily for the graduating class, the development, organization and participation is not necessarily exclusive of other school students or parents. It would be to the advantage of any underclassman and his parent to help with establishing Project Graduation. After all, the underclassman will eventually become a graduating senior.

Although graduation is yet months away, the parents involved in the organization of Project Graduation feel that a well organized activity takes much planning. Smart parents, they feel, do indeed think ahead.

Because of the great undertaking of Project Graduation and its expense, the project must indeed have the support of the community. When you are called upon as a church, community leader, business, or an individual, please say yes to lend a helping hand, a senior parent said. After all, she added, your people are our tomorrow.

For any parent, it is a terrible thing to contemplate and an awful, impossible thing to live with - the tragedies that seem, inevitably, to accompany the excitement and pride of high school graduation week.

Parents try their best to explain the facts of life and booze to kids. Forbidding alcoholic beverages, preaching temperance, warning of the consequences of drinking and driving - all of it works, a little, but not if it can't completely overcome the irresistible social pressures, the coercive peers, the temptation unleashed on any high school student, especially this time of year.

Some kids listen, some of them don't; but every parent

knows that it only takes one time, one party, one concession to the crowd and a drunken trip behind the wheel to snuff out a life that was given so much love and held so much promise.

The months of May and June are a period of high anxiety for thousands of parents who have invested time and money and personal sacrifice in the life of a child who is becoming an adult. They know about the beer parties, the camps, the rented motel rooms and apartments that will be crammed with drunken kids, their kids, with car keys in their pockets.

This year, parents in a number of Texas communities who are tired of feeling powerless and able to do nothing more than pray and watch the clock on graduation night are determined to do something different. They decided to offer their child, and every child, an alternative to alcohol at graduation time. They are committing themselves to a program that will show kids they don't need booze to have a good time. Maybe they'll save a life in the bargain.

In Cisco, parents are planning to provide an alternative to graduating seniors of the area on graduation night. Already, great plans are being made for Project Graduation for a memorable night. With the consent of Cisco Junior College, area seniors have been offered the use of the College Student Center. How lucky we are to have this facility, with a generous administration, in our town.

The program deserves the support and participation of young men and women who will be graduating - especially the student leaders in the school. If there is ever a time that visibility, popularity and leadership mean anything, it is at graduation time.

But if our program is going to have the appeal it

must have to attract these students, its organizers need the support of the community. They need funds from donations, they need chaperones, fund solicitors, people who will donate food, baked goods, and drinks for the receptions and parties - the whole gamut, from the open wallet to the helping hand.

Sure there will be other parties. Certainly, this is a small step. But someone has

to take it if there is ever to be a reduction in the awful human cost of high school graduation festivities.

Know When To Contact Social Security

It is important the the people in the Big Country area know when they should get in touch with Social Security, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently. Now knowing when to contact Social Security could mean lost benefits which could never be recovered, Hammons said.

A person should contact Social Security: •Before getting his or her first job to get a Social Security number, which is required to get proper Social Security credit for earnings. People who change their names should also contact Social Security to get a new

card. A person should allow at least 2 weeks.

•After a death in the family to see if survivor benefits can be paid.

•When someone in the family is disabled to find out if disability benefits can be paid.

•At retirement—at 64 for full-rate benefits, or as early as 62 for reduced benefits. A person should sign up for Medicare 2 or 3 months before 65, even if there are no retirement plans.

•Any time there is a question about Social Security.

When a person calls Social Security, the people there can tell:

•How much work credit is

needed to be insured for benefits.

•Who can receive benefits. •How to replace a lost Social Security or Medicare card.

•How to get a free statement of the earnings reported to the person's Social Security record.

•What documents a person needs who applying for benefits.

Most all Social Security business can be conducted by telephone. The number for the Abilene Social Security office is 915-698-1360. The office is located at 142 S. Pioneer.
