To Bingo Or Not To Bingo: That Will Be The Question May 7th

The City of Cisco Council approved the addition of a referendum election of voting for or against legalizing Bingo Games within the city of Cisco to the ballot of the May 7, 1988, City General Election during their regular meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall.

Helen and Cecil Brewer, were at the meeting, and said the City of Cisco will benefit from Bingo if the voters pass the resolution in May. Brewer said two percent of the gross revenue has to be paid to the State from the Bingo games and then 2 percent of the gross revenue has to be paid to the city.

Brewer said that according to the law of Texas, the money that is made at the Bingo games, less expenses, has to go to a non-profit organization. He suggested the Cisco Volunteer Fire

Department. He also said that one percent of taxes from any refreshments that are sold at the games, will go to the City of Cisco.

Brewer said, if the City of Cisco approves the Bingo games, by vote at the May 7th, election, the games will be held at the old skating rink. He said there will be skating on Friday and Saturday nights and Bingo on the other nights that they are open.

Brewer said 35 to 40 percent of the gross take will go to the non-profit organization, after the expenses of leasing the building, utilities, and all other expenses are paid. He said he thought first of the

fire department and then the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

Brewer had filed a petition for Bingo that had more than the 40 required names with the City. Moore said the petition is on file at the City Hall office at the present time.

In other matters, the council voted to designate the week of March 28th through April 2nd as the annual Clean-Up Week for the City of Cisco.

City Manager Mike Moore said this action will be for a good cause. He said the city will make extra pick ups for the garbage that citizens will have from cleaning up. This will also give everyone a

chance to clean Cisco up before the Folklife Festival Week.

City Manager Moore told the mayor and council members that Cisco Chief of Police Bob Baines and City Mechanic Reggie Pittman have looked at several cars that can be bought for the Cisco Police Department. Moore said the two men have found two cars for the police department that they consider the best of what was offered.

Moore asked the council if they would consider revising the Police Department Budget to allow the purchase of the two cars. Council members approved the re-

quest.

An ordinance was passed by the city council to vacate and abandon the street right of way for the 2200 and 2300 blocks of Avenue B, of the city. Moore said all of the land owners have signed the agreement. He said all existing easements for the utilities will still belong to the City of Cisco.

Mayor Joe Wheatley along with council members John Muller, Bural Chambers, Roy Dennis, Arlie Whitley and Allen Masters attended the meeting. City of Cisco Secretary Ginger Johnson and City Manager Mike Moore were in attendance. Allen Masters gave the invocation.

Recount Is Expected In Sheriff's Race

A re-count was expected to be asked for the ultra-tight county sheriff's race where the results were separated by some 27 votes.

County Democratic Chairman Mary Bailey indicated Friday morning that she had been advised that the request would be made at the 3 p.m. Friday canvass of the vote, which would validate the vote of last Tuesday.

She explained that rules provide that she would appoint a four-person panel (subject to the approval of both candidates) to re-count the votes in the sheriff's race, and that the re-count probably would be made at the courthouse next Wednesday.

She indicated that the party requesting the re-count is required to put up a deposit sufficient to pay for the re-count.

About a third of the qualified voters in Eastland County participated in the Super Tuesday Primaries, and unofficial returns show that the Democrats nominated a new sheriff candidate, retained the make-up of the County Commissioners Court and on the presidential level, generally

voted with the state.

The sheriff's race was close, with incumbent Don Underwood getting 2,039 votes and challenger Dee Hogan, polling 2,066. Votes by the parties were to be canvassed Friday.

The Democrats voted 3,335 citizens in nine precincts and the Republicans brought 828 voters to their five voting boxes.

County Democratic totals showed Gore with 1,270; Dukakis, 1,221; Gephardt, 787; Jackson, 222; and Hart, 217.

Bush carried the county on the GOP ticket with 434, followed by Roberts with 312.

Appeals Court Judge Bud Arnot easily carried the county, 2,410 to 1,129, over challenger George Hansard, and won two-to-one throughout the 23-county

district, 44,492 to 20,050, for his first full term to the court. He had been appointed last year.

The two county commissioners easily won re-nomination over challengers. Precinct One Commissioner Richard Robinson polled 828 votes to Glen Hubbard's 426.

Precinct Three Commissioner I.T. Owen polled 639 votes to Dicky Burgess's 349.

Bill Harris out-pollled Gene Millican, 825 to 465 to the post of Constable, Precinct One, the position for which Bill Hunter did not seek re-election.

Precinct Two Ranger Constable race showed Westley Sumpter with 360 and Cecil Cook, 456. Jesse Brown did not seek re-election.

Precinct Three Constable Gene Hicks polled 310 and Lynn Clark, 150, in Rising

Star.

In this county, the Democrats voted 3,125 for and 392 against in the non-binding proposition for the election of judges.

Republicans voted 665 for, 27 against, making English the official language of the state and nation.

County Democratic Chairman Mrs. Scott Bailey, un-contested, was re-elected with 3,369 votes.

Jim Keffer was re-elected county Republican Chairman.

Other uncontested candidates and their votes:

Rep. Charles Stenholm, 3,413; State Sen. Bob Glasgow, 3,248; State Rep. Jim Parker, 3,166; Chief Justice, 11th Court of Civil Appeals, 3,207; 91st District Court Judge, Jim Wright, 3,429; and County Tax Assessor-Collector Nancy Trout, 3,587.

Literary Festival To Be Held In Cisco

A number of leading southwestern writers and editors will be in Cisco Friday and Saturday, March 25-26 when the Texas Circuit group holds a Literary Festival in the Hilton Community Center.

This project of the Austin-based Texas Circuit will be funded by the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Texas Commission For the Arts. Dr. Monte Lewis of Cisco Junior College is host for this special event. Dr. Lewis is Editor of The Cross Timbers Review, a CJC publication.

Among those expected in Cisco are Ertha Colson, Austin poet and leader of the black community, and British Writer, Editor, and critic Peter Mortimer.

Elmer Kelton, noted southwestern Author, and Paul Ruffin, Poet and Editor, will be present. Editors from the Ft. Concho Press will also attend. C.A. Wiles, Austin Editor and Chair of the Texas Circuit Board, will coordinate events. Loris Essary, Austin publisher, will also be on hand. The CJC Cross Timbers will be represented by Dr. Cleatus Rattan,

poetry Editor, and Dr. Ken Hammes, Fiction Editor.

The purpose of the event is to bring together publishers, authors and those interested in writing to exchange information, study material, and learn of needs in various publishing fields.

The program in the Hilton will begin Friday at 1 p.m. with a two-hour session called "Writers Meet Editors." C.A. Wiles will welcome the audience, then the Editors and publishers will have a panel discussion.

This will give new writers some ideas on what Editors look for in material, and what outlets are available for submission.

From 4 p.m. to 5:30 two writers from the Abilene Writer's Guild and two from the Cisco Writer's Club will read original material. At 7 p.m. a dinner will be catered by Oscar's Barbecue of Cisco.

At 8 p.m. Elmer Kelton will read prose, and Paul Ruffin will read poetry. The

program will conclude around 10 p.m.

On Saturday morning the Texas Circuit group will return to the Hilton for a Book Fair from 8:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. Circuit members will display their books, selling and autographing them.

From 10 a.m. until 12 noon Ertha Colson and Peter Mortimer will read from their material. This will conclude the scheduled programs for the Festival.

There will be no charge for any of the readings or discussions or for any part of the Festival except the Barbecue Dinner Saturday night. Price for the meal is \$6, and reservations must be made by Wednesday, March 23. Call 442-2023 or 442-3186 (evenings) to secure reservations.

Lobos Lose First Baseball Game

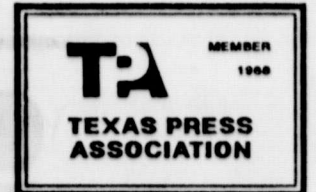

Breckenridge Man To Be Honored On TV Show

On March 16, at 7 p.m., KTAB-TV will present "The Gift of Time" as part of "For Kids' Sake," a nationwide public service campaign of this station and the "For Kids' Sake" sponsors, General Dynamics - Abilene Facility, First National Bank, Skinny's, Inc. and Southside Baptist Church. The campaign, aimed at adults, is devoted to improving the quality of life for young people. "The Gift of Time" hour long special, with guest appearances by actor Alan Thicke and his 13-year-old son, Brennan, focuses on people across the country who give their time generously to children.

The local segment will feature Frank Pellizari, a Breckenridge resident. Mr. Pellizari is KTAB-TV's "Gift of Time Local Hero." He has been an active leader in Boy Scouts of America for over 50 years. He attended the first Boy Scout Jamboree in 1937 and was named the 1978 "Scoutmaster of the Year" for the South Central Region. Topping the list of his many contributions to scouting is Pellizari's efforts in bringing 65 young men to Eagle Scout status since 1962.

Others profiled in the program are:

Jerry and Sandy Tucker, a husband and wife who have adopted or help raise more than 40 children in the hills of Kentucky. All of the children have physical and/or mental disabilities. The Tuckers believe that "everybody's time should be a gift to something or somebody."

Kent Amos, a man who is concerned about inner city children who are not doing well in school Every afternoon Amos, a successful

business man, opens up a "study hall" in his home in Washington, D.C., where he encourages youngsters to take education seriously. Amos says, "Everybody has 24 hours in a day. That was given to us, so that's the one thing we can give away ... you can do something with it."

Dr. Lois Lee, who set up "Children of the Night," a Los Angeles based organization that works with youngsters who survive on the streets by prostituting themselves.

Eugene Land, Bill and Elaine Farrell: Lang "adopted" a New York City elementary school class and promised to send each student through college upon high school graduation. The Farrells of Texas heard what Land was doing and set up a similar project in Dallas.

Mariam Wright Edelman, Robert Valverde: Edelman is the President and Founder of the Children's Defense Fund, a national organization that provides a voice for the children of America who cannot lobby, vote or speak on behalf of themselves. Valverde is a San Francisco teacher who gives his students a sack of flour that represents a "baby" requiring enormous care during a 3-week life training course he teaches.

Alan and Brennan Thicke share with viewers their reflections on giving time to others and on spending time together. In addition, they appear in four public service announcements about sharing the gift of time that will be broadcast from the end of February through mid-April.

A simple thank you is inadequate to express our appreciation to the neighbors and members of volunteer fire departments who came at mid-afternoon and stayed until midnight, Sat., March 5, then returned Sunday for several hours, to control a fire which began in the Clifford Smith place, moved southwest across the western side of Oral Davis's place, then across a county road and into the Charles Rutheford pasture.

EASTLAND
A two-county citizens committee on March 4 asked elected officials and the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation to make "urgent and needed improvements" on the FM Roads linking Stephenville, Lingleville, Desdemona and I-20 at Eastland. Some 1200 people signed petitions presented with the request. The great majority of the signers live in Eastland or Erath counties, according to Dorothy Greenhaw, committee secretary. "Hazardous conditions and heavy usage" of the roads brought the request, according to the petition. District Highway Engineer Wes Hill and local Highway Engineer Bryan Neabes plan to be at the next Eastland County Commissioners Court meeting on March 14, to discuss possibilities of the road.

Medical Perspectives

SKIN CANCERS
There is currently an epidemic of skin cancers in this country, largely related to the increase in sun exposure over the last few decades. Most cancers occur on sun-exposed areas of skin and are more common in those people who are fair-skinned. People with repeated, high-intensity sun exposure are at greatest risk, for example farmers, lifeguards and construction workers. There are three major types of skin cancer: basal cell carcinoma, by far the most common; squamous cell carcinoma and malignant

melanoma. Only the last two types ever spread to other parts of the body. Malignant melanomas are particularly dangerous, as they often spread to other parts of the body before they have received medical attention. Basal cell cancers, the most frequent type of skin cancer, can cause a lot of damage by continuous growth and destruction of surrounding skin. Those on the face can be especially destructive, if neglected.

Most skin cancers are curable if recognized at an

early stage. Any sore that does not heal, especially non sun-exposed areas of skin, should be examined by a physician. Likewise, any mole which begins to grow, to itch, bleed or change colors should be investigated immediately. Most early skin cancers can be easily excised with minimal discomfort. Dry rough patches of skin called keratoses often appear on the arms, hands and face as we age and may be precursors of skin cancer. These can be easily removed by freezing with liquid nitrogen.

The incidence of skin cancer can be effectively reduced by limitation of ultra-violet light exposure,

especially in childhood. Those at greatest risk should reduce exposure to sunlight, especially between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. and during the summer months. Wearing protective clothing, hats and visors is helpful. The liberal use of sunscreens with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 is very important as well.

As we approach the summer months, do all you can to protect your skin and that of your children, and consult your family physician about any suspicious places on your skin.

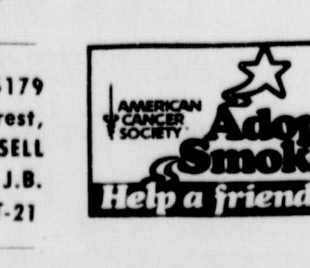

Third Grade Students Receive Book Sponsored By Local Merchants

Students in the third grade at Cisco Elementary School have received the gift-book entitled "Feeling Good About Me." It is a hand-somely bound book of stories about learning traditional values and self-esteem. "Feeling Good About Me" contains eight stories about realistic problems young people might encounter and how, using traditional values, they are resolved. Each story has a full-color illustration and teaches such

lessons as right and wrong, appreciation of family, what it means to be a good citizen, living up to one's full potential, and why (and how) to stay away from drugs. In the first story, "A Day With Granddaddy," young Wendy is mad. The most popular girl in school has invited her to a slumber party but SHE has to go to her grandparents house on the lake, a visit she usually enjoys. During a conversation that

takes place as Wendy fishes with Granddad, she learns the relative importance of the party and the visit (her values are put into perspective) and she feels good about herself and visiting her grandparents.

Other stories involve the meaning of friendship, family relationships, respect for others, loyalty and the importance of being your own unique self, lessons not always covered in school curriculums. They reflect positive influences that build a child's self-esteem.

Each story is accompanied by a teacher's guide, which covers lesson objectives, discussion starters and follow-up applications. The purpose of the lessons is to teach young people good values and encourage discussion of values between children, their parents and other family members in a home setting.

In "Real Heroes," a war game among a dozen boys and girls results in several broken windows at school. At the principal's office, the youngsters learn from an Army veteran that being an American hero isn't something that must happen on a battlefield, but also occurs by being a good citizen, doing whatever they can for their country.

In another story that takes place in a video arcade, Brian and Darrick must weigh the chance to get free games dishonestly against the effects of such action. With the help of a lesson learned from Darrick's dad, honesty wins out.

These beautiful books are made to last and are likely to become keepsake editions for the students. WIN OR LOSE, candidates, their workers and supporters must have a sinking feeling in the pit of their stomachs when they consider how few people make the effort to vote.

Only about 35 per cent of the registered voters in Eastland County marked a ballot in Tuesday's Primary Elections.

There are 13,252 registered voters in the county.

Only 3,835 voted in Democratic boxes and 828 in Republican boxes.

The Carbon Democratic box had the best turnout, percent-wise, with 36 per cent of their registered voters going to the polls.

Other Democratic box percentages:

Lake Leon had a 33 per cent turnout; Gorman, 31 per cent; Eastland, 30 per cent; Olden, 29 per cent; Rising Star, 27 per cent; Desdemona, 26 per cent; Cisco, 25 per cent; and Ranger, 21 per cent.

In the Republican boxes, turnout recorded:

Eastland, .07 per cent; Ranger, .04 percent; Gorman, .06 per cent; Rising

Tammy Green

Star, .14 per cent; Cisco, .01 per cent; Lake Leon, .36 per cent.

Overall, the Republicans turned out .06 per cent of the total registered voters in the county.

In addition to the absentee box, into which both parties voted, the Democrats had nine voting sites and the Republicans, five.

By precincts, those registered are:

Eastland, 3,264. Olden, 334. Ranger, 2,653. Desdemona, 278. Gorman, 1,126. Carbon, 384. Rising Star, 1,564. Cisco, 3,358. Lake Leon, 287. TOTAL, 13,252.

Democrats voted: 1,001 in Eastland; 98 in Olden; 583 in Ranger; 75 in Desdemona; 352 in Gorman; 141 in Carbon; 426 in Rising Star; 829 in Cisco; and 96 at Lake Leon.

Absentee total was 270.

Republicans by precinct voted: 244 in Eastland (which included Eastland, Olden, Carbon); 119 in Ranger; 78 in Gorman; 230 in Rising Star; 53 in Cisco; and 104 in Lake Leon.

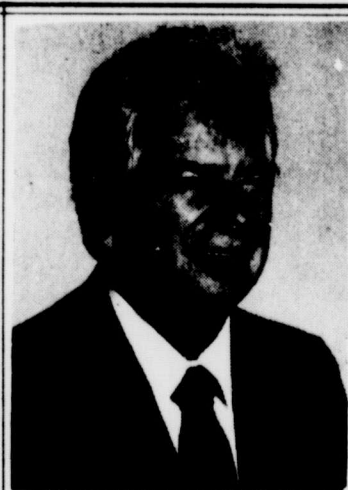

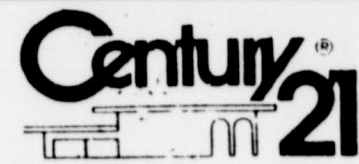

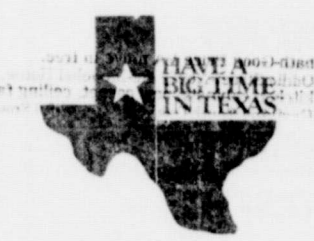

The list of area tournaments continues to stack up. March 27, Lake Brownwood, Brownwood Bass Club Open \$1,000.00 guaranteed 1st place; April 9th, Lake E.L. Spence, Tye Chamber of Commerce Open, First place \$1500.00 and trophy; April 9th Lake Possum Kingdom, Parker County Sportsman Club, Inc. Open, 1st place \$2,000.00; April 10th, Lake Hubbard Creek, Big Country Bass Club Open, 1st place \$1,000.00; April 16th and 17th, Lake Granbury Big Bass Tournament 1st place \$5,000.00; April 24th, Lake Brownwood, Buddy Bass Team Tournament, 1st place guaranteed \$5,995.00; May 21, Lake Possum Kingdom, Bass Printing Open, 1st place \$4,500.00; June 12th, Lake Whitney, Fin and Feather Open \$14,000.00 cash and prizes guaranteed, 1st place \$8,000.00.

If you or your organization have an outdoor event planned please contact me at 629-3255. Or if you know of some event you feel folks would be interested in I will be glad to carry it.

March 12th members of the E.C.B.C. will be meeting at scenic Lake Cisco for their intra-club tournament. Anglers are anticipating some excellent catches. Last weekend produced a nice 5 1/2 pound largemouth, as well as some 3 pound smallmouth. And don't forget, if you catch a tagged smallmouth (a yellow tag) write down the tag number and contact the Texas Parks and Wildlife. These fish are Texas Veteran Broodfish. The lucky anglers will receive a set of honorable discharge papers with a short history on the fish. Also tagged are, channel catfish and black bass.

Area lake reports as of March 4th were:

Brownwood: Water clear, 3 feet below spillway; black bass slow to 5 1/4 lbs. on a jig with a pork trailer; striper fair at night along with the white bass around the docks to 40 fish per string; crappie fairly good with limits of small fish; a few larger fish on minnows and jigs; catfish fairly good in number but small in size; largest fish weighed 6 pounds on trotline.

Fayette: Water clear, 65 degrees, normal level; black bass very good to 10 1/2 pounds on live bait as well as worms and Rat-L-Traps in 4-10 feet of water; crappie very good to 15 fish per party on minnows and some blue crappie jigs; blue catfish good with a 40, 50 and 58 pounder, a possible lake record.

Whitney: Water clear, 50 degrees, 8 1/2 feet low; black bass good in the upper lake around the brush on black and blue jigs as well as Stanley Jigs to 6.3 pounds with a few limits, great numbers of fishermen out over the weekend. One fisherman had to wait 90 minutes to launch a boat; striper good to 16 1/2 pounds mostly in the 12-14 pound range on deep diving Redfins and live bait around Katy Bridge, McKown Valley and Cedar Creek; crappie good to 1 1/2 pounds around Rocky Creek, Bluff Mill, and around Chisolm Trail on minnows, Flea Flies to 1 1/2 pounds, white bass good in the Nolan and upper Brazos to 30 fish per string trailing hot spots; yellow catfish good around Katy Bridge and in the river below the dam to 8 pounds on cut shad; a single blue catfish weighed 24 pounds.

Bridgeport: Water clear, 52 degrees, 6 feet low; black bass slow; striper fair to 6 1/2 pounds on silver slabs; crappie fair to good with many limits on minnows; white bass slow; catfish picking up some to in the 1 1/2-3 pound range on stinkbait.

Fork: Water clear, 58 degrees, normal level; black bass good to 14 pounds, 15 ounces on Stanley Jigs with black and blue pork trailers as well as black and white skirted willow leaf spinners, moccasin lizards,

black blue tailed lizards, Rogues, Devil's Horses and Bany-O-Lures; crappie fair to good on minnows in 60 feet of water with limits of 25 fish; catfish.

Houston County: Water clear, 61 degrees, normal level; black bass good to 11 1/4 pounds on black lizards with several 9's, 8's and 7's, and 6's; crappie fairly good in the dam area on spinners to 20 fish per string; white bass slow; catfish slow.

Rayburn: Water clear, some murkiness in river, 51 degrees, 1 foot above pool level; black bass good to 12 pounds 10 ounces, a new lake record, on jigs, Rat-L-Traps and Crawworms and some topwaters; striper slow to 6 pounds; crappie slow; white bass slow; catfish fair. Fog heavy over last weekend.

Toledo Bend: Water clear, 59 degrees, normal level; black bass fairly good to 6 1/2 pounds on reel Rat-L-Traps; striper fair to 7 pounds; crappie fair at the edge of the grass beds on jigs, white bass slow; catfish slow.

Falcon: Water clear, 2 feet above normal; black bass good to 10 pounds, 1 ounce with several 6's and 7's on white and chartreuse spinners in 3 to 4 feet of water; striper slow to 6 pounds on spinners while fishing for black bass; crappie slow; white bass good up the river on topwaters such as a Pico Pop to 100 fish per string. Catfish good on frozen shrimp and sponge bait.

Fort Phantom Hill: Water turbid, 50 degrees, 3 feet low, black bass good to 4 1/2 pounds on jigs, lizards and worms in 8-12 feet of water; hybrid striper fairly slow but beginning to hit in the hot water discharge area on slabs and Rat-L-Traps; crappie excellent in the hot water discharge area on white jigs and minnows; white bass fair trolling near the dam on Rat-L-Traps and slabs as well as slabbing off rocky points near the dam; catfish fairly slow, walleye fishing good to 5 pounds on live bait and white jigs in the discharge

Granbury: Water clear, 56 degrees, normal level; black bass good to 6 pounds, 13 ounces on spinners; striper slow; crappie good to 25 fish per string on minnows; white bass to 15 fish per string on slabs and minnows; catfish good to 13 pounds on trotline baited with live perch.

Hubbard Creek: Water clear, 48 degrees, normal level; black bass good to 7 pounds in the shallow flats in late afternoons on worms and cranks; striper good around Goat Island and down near the dam on slabs and trolling Roadrunners and Flippitail flirts on down riggers; crappie excellent in both creek arms especially Hubbard Creek near the bridge with a good number of limits of fish to 1 1/2 pounds on minnows or yellow jigs; catfish slow.

Oak Creek: Water clear, 60 degrees, 2 feet low; black bass fair but small, not many keepers on purple worms with white tails;

crappie slow but good sized on minnows; white bass fair; catfish beginning to hit; fish generally small.

Possum Kingdom: Water clear, 45-48 degrees, 13 1/2 feet low; black bass very good in the 3-9 pounds range on crawdad colored shrimp and topwaters; striper slow; crappie good to 25 fish per string to 1 1/2 pounds on minnows and slabs; white bass slow; catfish slow.

Spence: Water clear, 53 degrees, 19 feet low; black bass good to 7 pounds, 183 black bass caught in tournaments over last weekend which totaled 514 pounds, mostly on spinners; striper slow; crappie slow; white bass good to 30 fish per string on slabs; catfish fair to 40 pounds on trotline with live bait.



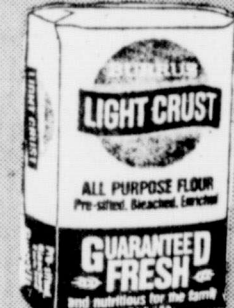

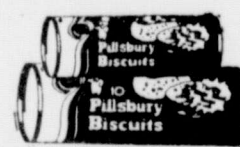

Prior to receipt of bids, Addenda will be mailed or delivered to each person or firm recorded by the Architect as having received bidding documents and will be available for inspection wherever the bidding documents are kept available for that purpose. Addenda issued after the receipt of bids mailed or delivered only to the selected bidder.

17. Each bidder shall examine the bidding documents carefully, and not later than seven days prior to the date for receipt of bids, shall make written request to the Architect for inspection or correction of any ambiguity, inconsistency or error therein which he may discover. Any interpretation or correction will be issued as an addendum by the Architects. Only a written interpretation or correction by an addendum shall be binding. No bidder shall rely upon any interpretation or correction given by any other method.

18. Each bidder represents that his bid is based upon the material and equipment described in the bidding documents.

19. No substitution will be considered unless written request has been submitted to the Architect for approval at least ten days prior to the date for receipt of bids. Each such request shall include a complete description of the proposed substitute, the name of the material or equipment for which it is to be substituted, drawings, cuts, performance and test data and any other data or information necessary for a complete evaluation.

20. If the Architect approves any proposed substitution, such approval will be set forth in an Addendum.

21. Each bidder submitting a bid shall submit with the Proposal a properly executed Contractor's Qualification Statement, AIA Document A305, as bound in these specifications. This document shall be inserted separately in a sealed envelope and enclosed with the Proposal and Bid Bond, all submitted as a bid package. When considering the bids submitted from the various contractors, the completion time proposed by

the bidders as stipulated in the Proposal and the contractor's demonstrated ability to successfully execute the work required by the Contract Documents will be prime and decisive factors in awarding the contract, as well as apparent low bid.

22. The bidder acknowledges the right of the Owner to reject any or all bids and to waive any informality or irregularity in any bid received. In addition, the bidder recognizes the right of the Owner to reject a bid if the bidder failed to furnish any required bid security or to submit the data required by the bidding documents, or if bid is in any way incomplete or irregular.

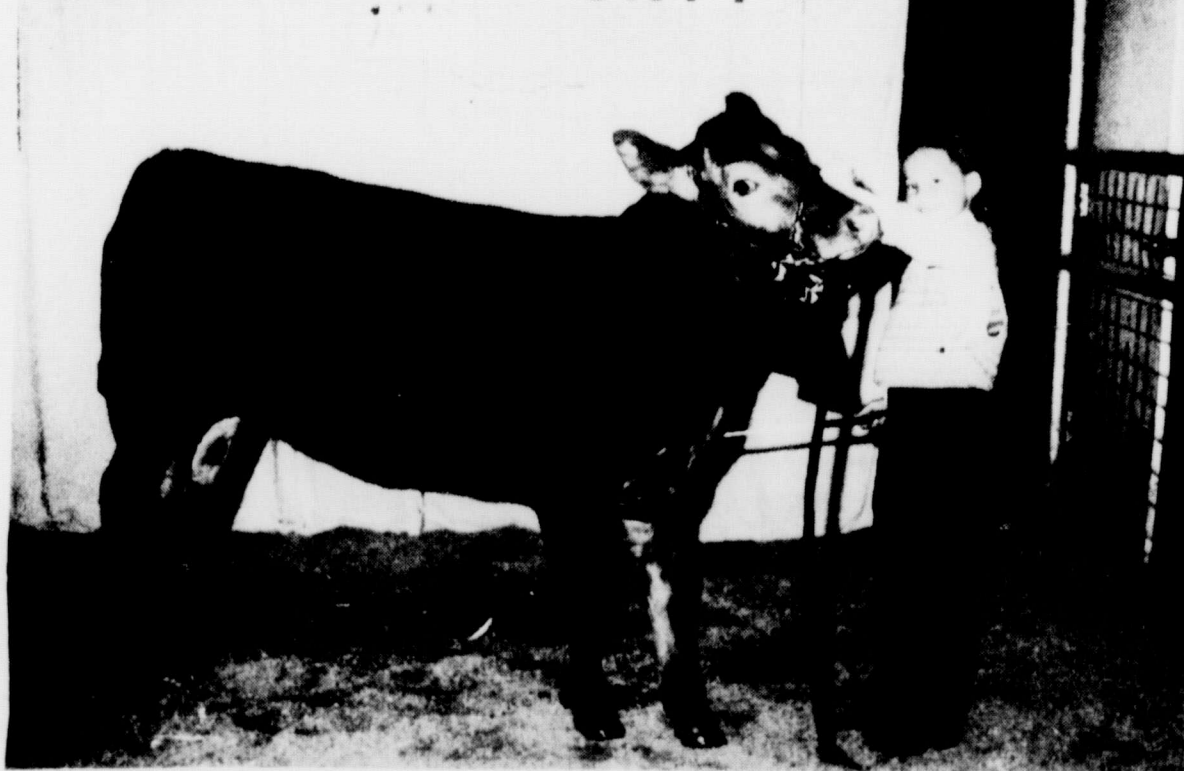

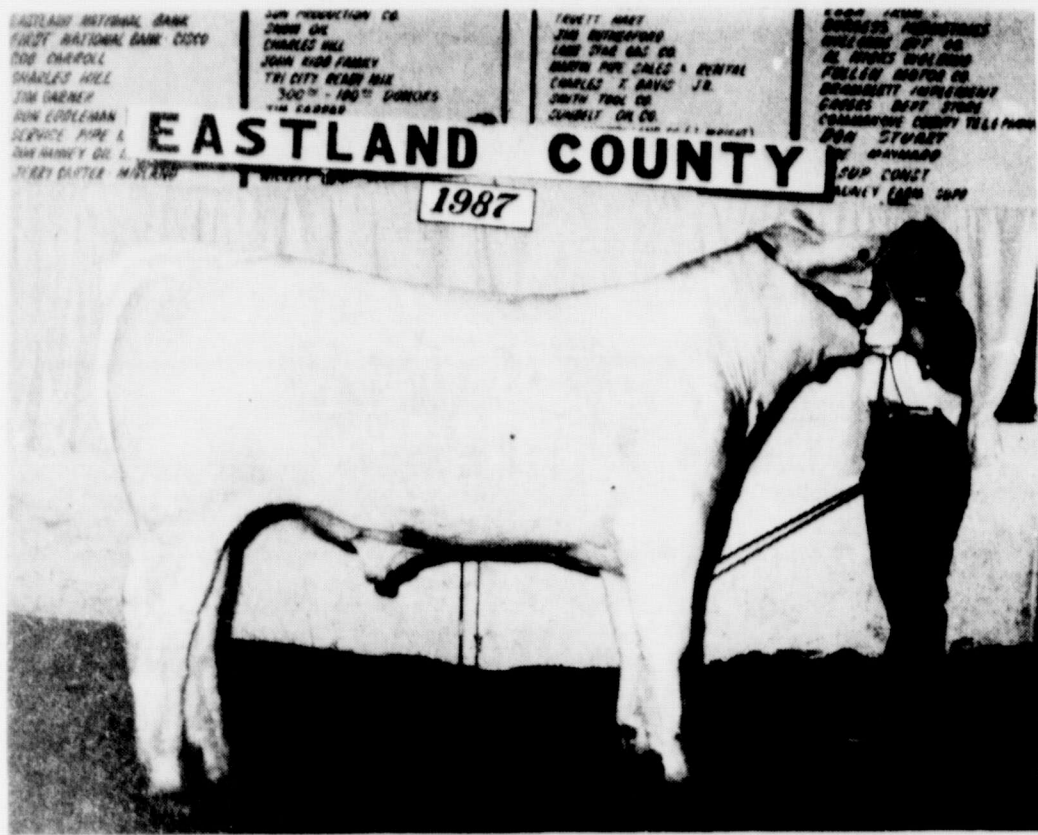

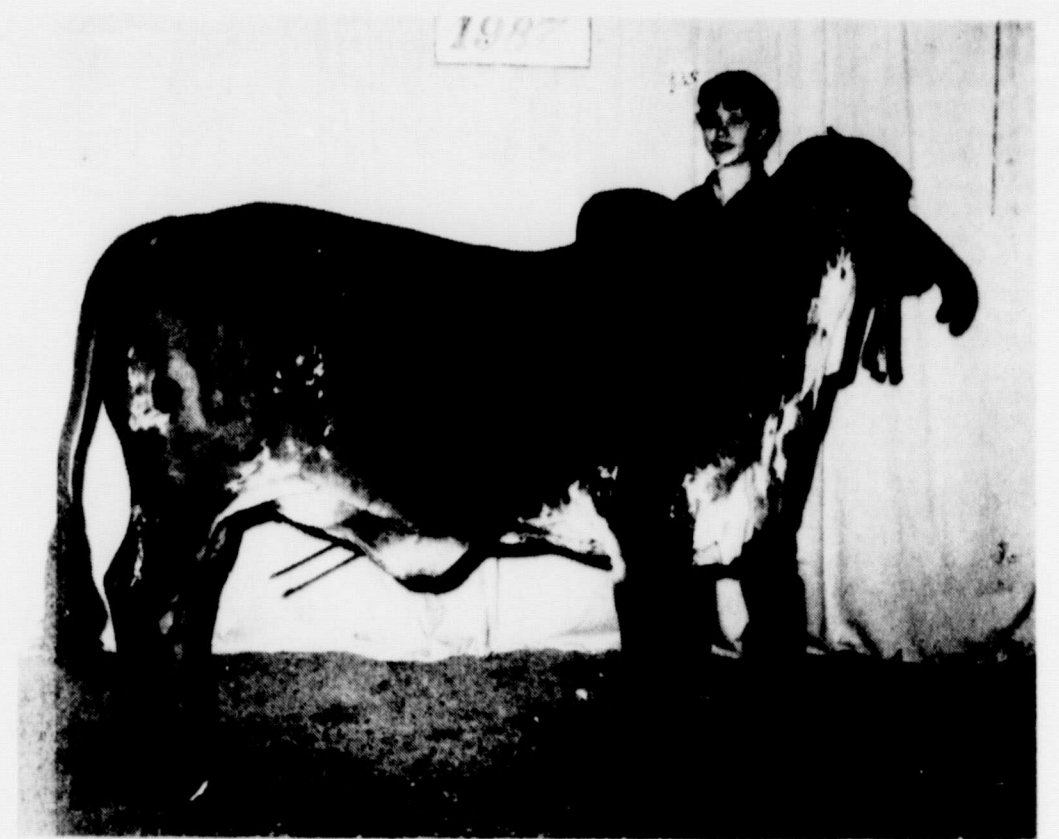

"The 4-H program provides many opportunities for growth and stimulation for adults and helps them attain enjoyment and self-fulfillment," Wilbanks said. In Eastland county volunteers are needed to serve as leaders for 4-H projects such as photography, electricity, sheep, swine, rabbits, clothing, foods & nutrition, just to name a few.

STOCK SHOW SEASON

It's that wonderful time of year once again, Stock Show Season! Yes, it's finally here, after all the months of waiting and feeding animals.

Over 200 young people in Eastland County have been busily preparing their animals for the "Big Event." Untold hours of time have been spent grooming, exercising and working with these livestock projects. It takes a lot of dedication from the student, as well as, the parents to have a successful project. Success doesn't necessarily mean winning Grand Champion, contrary to popular belief. Success can come in the form of learning. Projects are taken on for the purpose of learning. Students learn how to properly feed out a particular project. This knowledge doesn't come from a one-time feeding. It takes months and even years to learn what type of feed does the best job for any particular breed. You must also learn how much to feed and the basics of exercising your animals to firm them up.

Another important lesson is selecting the "ideal" animal. Selection is one of the hardest and most difficult aspects of starting a project. Everyone wants the best animal for the least amount of money. Sometimes this can be a very hard decision to make; however, it's all part of the process.

Another important aspect of raising and showing animals is learning how to treat them for sickness and or parasite problems. Students must keep a close record of worming schedules and also have an idea of when their animal is not feeling well. Any change in eating patterns may cause a drop in weight gain, which must be monitored.

All market animals have weight limits; therefore, each animal must be weighed and records of this weight kept up to date. Rate of gains should also be determined and this information be used in determining how much feed your animal should receive.

As you see, an animal project demands a lot of time and dedication. It teaches our young people responsibility and development of life skills. The main thing I see as a result of 4-H and FFA projects, is the strong family relationships that come about as a result of commitment to a central project. The family structure is vitally important to a young person's sense of self-image and direction in life.

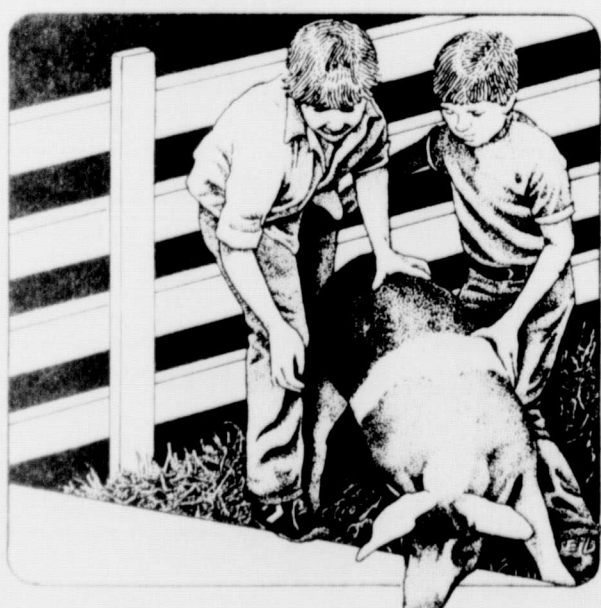
Membership Over 400 In Eastland County

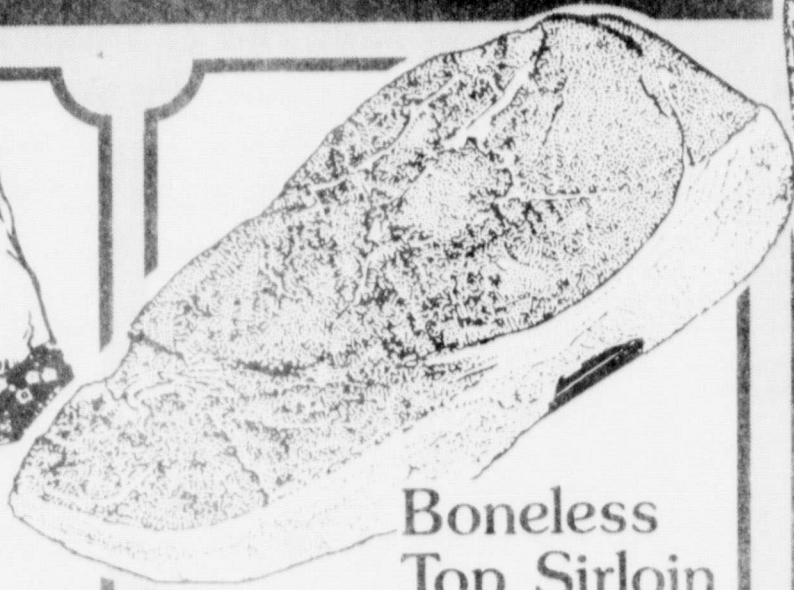
