## Cisco Volunteer Firemen Help Fight Range Fire

Members of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department worked with hundreds of other volunteers to put out the brush fire that destroyed more than 300,000 acres of pasture in three counties last week. Cisco residents suffered from smoke and the smell of the grass fire, even though the fire did not even come into Eastland County. The fire came as close as Moran, about 20 miles away on Friday.

The fire originated Thursday around 12:30 p.m., north of Clyde in Callahan County. From there the fire burned north toward Albany where some families were evacuated from their homes in rural Shackelford County. The fire then moved into Throckmorton County which was being fueled by low humidity and high winds that gusted up to 30 miles per hour.

When a cold front passed

through the area Friday afternoon, the winds changed direction and started blowing out of the north. The fire turned around and moved back into Callahan County. Rural residents around Baird, Moran, and Putnam were evacuated Friday when the fire moved in too close.

Several people from Cisco carried food and canned drinks to the volunteer fire fighters. Commercial water haulers from Cisco that carried water to the fire fighters were Dean's Water Hauling, Stovall & Winnett Water Haulers, United Energex hauled water and dozer to the fire site and Don Wallace of Cisco carried his dozer there. Several other water haulers from other towns in this part of the area helped the fire fighters to put out the blaze.

Cisco Fire Chief Richard Connell said luckily there

were no other grass fires or threats of grass fires around the Cisco area and the firemen were able to help fight the monstrous brush fire on Friday.

Cisco firemen who travelled to Callahan County to fight the fire were Richard Connell, Joe Jarvis, Gerald Jackson, C.W. Guthrie, Larry Weikel, Phillip Cockrell, Dennis Stovall, David Gill and Billy Bacon. The firemen took the rural fire truck.

Connell said this is why Cisco needs more than one rural fire truck. He said the Cisco firemen were able to respond to the fire, but they would have been away from the station if another fire had broken out. The Rising Star fire truck was destroyed in a fire last month, and they are dependent on other fire stations, including Cisco, to protect them.

Connell said he is happy and very thankful to announce that enough money has been donated to buy two engines. He said one engine is being rebuilt by Kay and Bryan Jackson, both Cisco Volunteer Firemen, at the Cisco Junior College garage. Jackson told Connell said the inside of the engine looks outstanding and will be a good engine. It will be put into the present rural fire truck.

Connell said he is asking the citizens of this area to help raise the funds to build another rural fire truck with the other engine. He said they need a four wheel drive chassis and a tank and pump. He said the total price will be around \$16,000.

## Farm Road Work Is Approved

Eastland County Commissioners, in a 3-1 vote, went on record Monday with a Resolution that Eastland County will commit itself to acquiring the right-of-way for improvement on FM Roads from Eastland to the Erath County line near Desdemona. Work will begin at the first four miles near Eastland.

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, made the motion for the Resolution, and Norman Christian, Pct. 2, seconded the motion. L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, voted for the motion, and Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, cast the dissenting vote.

Bacon said he thought the Commissioners should contact people along the road-way and see what obtaining the right-of-ways would entail before going on record as approving this Eastland to Stephenville project.

The roads from Eastland to Stephenville are FM 570, 2214 and 8. The roads in Eastland County are 2214 and 570.

Present in the Courtroom for the vote were a group of citizens from the area along the roadways. Dorothy Greenhaw was spokesman for the group, and they carried a petition with about 1200 signatures.

Also present in the Courtroom were Texas Highway Engineer Bryan Neaves (Eastland), and District 23 Engineer Wes Heald of Brownwood.

Heald said he agreed with the petitioners on the "Hazardous conditions and heavy usage" of the roadways.

"Of the nine counties in the District, this is probably the worst road," he said. "A lot of the road is posted at 30 mph, with more than 2,000 vehicles per day traveling the narrow route."

"I'm ready to commit some money to this," the

District Engineer said. "The next 'Program Call' (funding) will probably come in September of this year. I think the work should be section-by-section, starting at Eastland."

He added that no construction should be expected for 18 to 24 months, and it could be 10 years before the project was completed all the way to Stephenville.

Heald was asked by the Commissioners if there was any chance that the route could be designated as a State Highway. Under the present FM designations the Counties (Erath and Eastland) will have to pay for all the right-of-ways.

Heald said he had inquired in Austin as to redesignation. "The answer is 'NO,'" he reported. He indicated that State Official seemed concerned about "starting something" by designating FM Roads as State Highways.

"So I throw it back in your Court," Heald told the Commissioners. He said a vote by the Commissioners to begin work on the right-of-way would give the Highway Department authority to begin designing the road-way. He said 140 ft. of minimum right-of-way would be needed on this road, and there would be

some curves to straighten out.

The Citizens Group seemed pleased to get any part of the project underway, and thanked the Commissioners for their favorable decision.

On other road matters, the Commissioners asked Engineer Heald why the Highway Dept. had condemned several bridges in the county, yet Eastland County had received no funds to replace the bridges.

"They inspected a bunch of the bridges and just dropped it," L.T. Owen said. The Highway Engineers agreed to look into the matter.

On jail matters, Commissioner Billy Bacon reported that 17 inmates were presently in the County Jail, considerably under the requirements of the State Jail Standards Commission. An inspection by this Commission is scheduled for March 30, Bacon said. In other business, the Commissioners decided to open bids on proposals for purchasing a computer system for the County. Equipment is presently being leased from Apollo Data and Executive Leasing, but at the last meeting Commissioners voted to change from this system. They will either buy the equipment presently in the Courthouse or set up a new system.

## There's Irish Among Us

The evening sun was beginning to dim as I fought through the Dallas-Ft. Worth turnpike, trying to locate Fair Park. By chance a week earlier I had learned that the Sixth Annual North Texas Irish Festival was being held there in Dallas on March 5-6.

It turned out that some of Ireland's best musicians were going to be playing there. Feeling a strong desire to hear them, I had decided to attend at all costs. So I packed the camera, a note pad, and headed east.

Traveling down I-20 it was easy to detach myself from 1988, projected by the sound of bodhrans (Irish drums) and ancient melodies from the time when some of my ancestors were sitting on castle-steps playing for their room and

board.

I was forced to deal with modern society somewhere about Fair Park exit by narrowly missing a Dallas motorist with my jeep.

I thought all I had to do was get to Fair Park and I would find it filled with Irish people. But the Hunter's Exposition and Low Rider's Car Show were also occupying Fair Park. The Irish Festival was relegated to the Stock Show area, held mostly in the Show Barns and arenas.

On my way to a parking lot I noticed some people with green clothes on. I decided they must be headed for the Irish Festival instead of the Low Riders Show, so I followed them.

As I approached the Stock Show area I heard something which seemed completely out of place - The Dallas Caledonian

Pipes and Drums Corp. This group was dressed in kilts and doing some fast stepping.

Admission to the Fair was \$7, which I gladly paid. For that I received full admission to the Festival area, and a Festival Guide. This was quite necessary, since there were six different stages with performers.

There were also an inordinate number of vendors present, selling everything from Irish derbies to "Emerald" beer - green, of course. The vendors were there for a reason - to capitalize on the recent resurgence of interest in Ireland.

I noticed that many Dallasites dressed in acid-washed jeans were freely spending money on Irish memorabilia. I guess people who will buy acid-washed jeans will buy

anything.

But I had some to hear music, so I found a stage where "The Lost Tribe" - a Dallas-based group - were playing.

These Americans played a variety of traditional music, all very well done. "The Lost Tribe" will perform soon for the Cross Timbers Fine Arts Council in Stephenville.

Then I was privileged to hear some of the best music I'll ever get to listen to. The group was "Patrick Street", made up of Kevin Burke, fiddle, Jackie Daley, accordion, Andy Ervine, vocal, and Arty McGlynn, guitar. All are from Ireland, and masters of traditional Irish music.

Many euphonisms have been used to describe this group's playing - most of which sound ridiculous to someone who hasn't heard them. So I'll just say that you should buy one of their albums and then you can make up your own euphonisms. For more information on their records you can contact Green Linnet Records, c/o Turner

During the evening Kevin Burke gave a workshop on advanced fiddle playing. While at this workshop I was able to talk to Arty Glynn and learn more of his style of flatpicking on the guitar.

I learned that "Patrick Street" has been on tour in America since February, playing in a number of major cities. The group doesn't really get to see much of America beyond airports, hotels and the concert stage.

"Patrick Street" gave two performances that night at the Festival, with the last one ending about midnight. I reluctantly left the Festival area, carrying a couple of books, an Irish flag, and no money. Yes, the vendors got to me also!

Back on the Turnpike I turned on the radio - I don't know why. For it had typical commercial music, something I was not wanting to hear. So I turned it off about about two minutes.

# Teamwork Limits Disaster

Eastland and Eastland County fire depts. were among those from all over the state which responded to the Texas sized range fire which burned nearly three hundred thousand acres in Callahan, Shackelford and Throckmorton Counties, and threatened adjoining counties including Eastland County.

After fires were reportedly started north of Clyde by rubbish burning and possibly arson or carelessness, they burned northward destroying a home and threatening Albany as the flames advanced toward Throckmorton, then they turned westward and threatened Lueders.

High winds moved the fire so quickly across the Big Country that firefighters could only try to protect houses and cities until massive amounts of equipment arrived.

A norther on Friday turned the wall of flame back to the south and the east where it threatened Baird,

Putnam and Moran. People were starting to evacuate as more equipment, including a convoy of eight fire trucks from the Fort Worth area arrived.

Cities in the pathway of the windblown inferno, such as Cisco, asked residents to limit water usage in order to fill standpipes and build up water pressure in the cities.

Four Ranger firemen fought the blaze on Thursday and returned on Saturday after a day of rest, but Ranger couldn't spare a truck as they were answering local calls and fighting a fire in Stephens County.

Cisco, which was also responding to calls in the Rising Star area, sent eight men and their rural truck on Friday.

Eastland also responded on Friday, sending the rescue truck, which was used as a mobile command post, and ten men. The truck left Friday evening and returned Saturday morning with the men fighting fire through the night.

As a line of earthmoving

equipment formed across miles of the Big Country building fire guards and fire trucks moved into position behind the guards, firefighters finally had a chance against Texas' biggest range fire of the century if not the biggest ever.

Pioneers in the 1800s reported in letters and etc. which are still in existence, a large range fire started by lightning which burned much of north Texas.

Aircraft were brought in to bomb the most intense areas of the fire with foam and water to cool them down enough that fire trucks on the ground could approach the intense heat and smoke to bring the flames under control.

The wall of flame which threatened Callahan, Eastland and Stephens County homes all at the same time was brought under control Saturday. But the battle wasn't over yet. With high winds continuing to blow, and blowing any available sparks toward the parched dead grass and broom weeds just

waiting to explode into flames, firefighters had to carefully watch the smoldering ashes and the tree trunks which might burn for days before being consumed.

Surely this experience should teach us all to be more careful with fire and to never, never start a controlled burn when it is dry and the wind is blowing.

And we might want to contribute more toward the purchase of some additional fire fighting equipment, and especially to thank the men who fought the blaze all night or longer.

Eastland firefighters included Assistant Chief Phillip Arther, Terry Edwards, H.T. Fillingham, Steve Jameson, Ardie Merritt, Mark Pipkin, Steve Simmel, Terry Simmons, Rick Wende and Gordon Woolam.

Texas can do so much more when the people of our state work together as friends and neighbors, things that seem impossible for individual cities. And Texans can be proud of their neighborly spirit.

# Democratic Party Officials Recounted Votes

Officials of the Democratic Party officially counted the Primary voting results Friday and the results were the same as the unofficial returns. Dee Hogan had twenty-seven more votes than Don Underwood in the sheriff's race.

County Democratic Chairwoman Mary Bailey stated that when a race is as close as the sheriff's race, a candidate has the right to ask for a recount, especially when thousands

of dollars have been invested in the campaign.

In a closed meeting between Mrs. Bailey, Mr. Underwood and Mr. Hogan, Mr. Underwood asked for a recount and paid the required fifty dollar deposit. The candidates then agreed for Mrs. Bailey to select four people to recount the ballots under her supervision.

The vote counters must be uninvolved people who are not related to either candidate and who did not campaign for either candidate. Don Underwood will pay for the recount with the cost expected to be slightly more than the \$50 deposit.

Recount procedure called for the ballot boxes to be

opened at 9 a.m. Wednesday with just Mrs. Bailey and the four counters present. The counters were to go through each ballot box placing the ballots marked for Dee Hogan in one stack and the ballots marked for Don Underwood in another stack. Two counters would then count one stack while

the other two counted the other stack. When finishing, the groups of two counters would swap places and the ballots would be counted again.

When the count, expected to take 2 1/2 or 3 hours, ends, the results are then made public.

And since the Democratic candidate faces no opposition in the General Election, the winner will become the Sheriff of Eastland County when Don Underwood's term expires.

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## Three Men And A Baby

When is a baby not a baby? When the baby in question is a squalling, hideous, time-activated diarrhea grenade, that's when. Tom Selleck, Steve Guttenberg and Ted Danson play three extremely sexually-active heterosexual bachelors, all of whom live and party together in a huge, amazing, extremely sexually-active bachelor penthouse. Then, one day, the fruit of Danson's loins finds its way to their sexually-active heterosexual doorstep, and their beautiful luxury apartment is soon besmirched with every foul, evil bodily fluid that one could possibly squeeze free of a newborn.

The titular baby, Mary (essayed here by twins Lisa and Michelle Blair), with her incessant dietary expulsions, is the most alarmingly funny prop to find its way into a major studio feature since the only marginally more horrible title characters in "Gremlins." The three male leads, with their immaculate yuppie lifestyles, provide a perfect foil for the monstrously uncouth infant, and the funniest parts of the movie deal with their improvised efforts to cope with a situation far beyond their realm of experience. Especially endearing is their use of various household instruments to bathe the child.

Guttenberg and Danson are excellent as two of the squeamish daddies, but it is Selleck who brings off the biggest laughs. Fulfilling a long-held promise, TV's favorite chunk of human silt finally proves himself an amazingly deft and versatile world-class comic actor. Crawling free from years of cinematic dreck, Selleck finds the best role of his career in "Three Men and a Baby," and demonstrates once and for all that he can turn in a very funny performance full of extraordinary timing, perception, subtlety and warmth.

Leonard Nimoy, fresh from his triumph with "Star Trek IV," joins Rob Reiner and Ron Howard as yet another popular TV actor turned first-rate feature director. His powers as a purveyor of comic nuance continue to grow exponentially, and the film itself has a rich, glossy narrative texture that meshes perfectly with the subject matter.

A subplot involving heroin traffickers mars the film somewhat with some unnecessary dramatic relief (a holdover from "Three Men and a Cradle," the inferior French film on which this is based), but it is mercifully brief and unobtrusive. Nimoy understands where the narrative's true appeal lies, and "Three Men and a Baby" emerges as one of the most likable comedies of the season.

The film is rated PG for language. —Jim Kozak

Maybe I fix my thoughts too much on single pieces of the mosaic that life is made up of but memory is somewhat selective. Then again, some people insist that the mind records everything you hear or say and that under hypnosis any item can be retrieved. That would seem a dangerous area indeed. Under hypnosis the mind might be far more susceptible to implanting false impressions put there by an operator or again the human mind is inventive and might even construct a false image from the vast number of impressions much as it produces dreams or nightmares. Doubtless some people have believed they experienced a heaven-sent vision when in fact it was one of those dreams that seemed too real.

Rarely have average citizens had to consider "evidence" based on hypnosis when serving on a jury. Since I have encountered a number of pathological liars whom polygraph operators say check out "too true" because they don't even make the machine react to an obvious whopper, I would hardly want to consider evidence one unable to separate truth from fiction might give under hypnosis. I fear that too often we accept almost anything that seems "official" without any knowledge of background. We are prime suckers for "Experts". There is too much truth in the statement that an expert is anyone more than fifty miles from home. Of course that may be seen as only a modernized version of scriptures, "A prophet is not without honor save in his home village."

Time was when stories invented to entertain or to explain the unexplainable became myth and those able to survive a long while became the basis of religions. Today we are more sophisticated. All the myth needs now is a stamp making it OFFICIAL. Government then has replaced all the gods of Mt. Olympus and their oracles beyond question.

Parentetically, I used to read a cartoon strip "Smokey Stover, the Fireman of Foo". The cartoonist once introduced readers to the Ficial Brothers, Off and Arti. These were the Puritanical days when a few people considered Sunday funny papers a bit immoral, many more rejected Sunday movies and a few still living can recall when a grocer could open only for emergencies on Sunday and be fined if he sold a Coke during that "emergency".

Naturally we children believed the folks just didn't want to spend the money for shows and such. Today we hear cries about Puritanism by those pushing pornography and wanting to obliterate the last vestiges of morality. With AIDS decimating their forces and Christian resistance still alive they fight a two front war. Without help from people who should know better they wouldn't have a chance

of winning. Back to Official Mythology, it can be hazardous to express doubts about such. The best or worst example of that is HOLOCAUST which has assumed almost religious status and in courts of law has even been exempted from examination or open debate by judges "taking judicial notice" of it thus denying any doubter the right of defense.

One might hope that like the Inquisition and the Salem Witch Hunts the pseudo-religion of Holocaust will lose its grip. Meanwhile I will drink the modern equivalent of Socrates' cup of hemlock rather than accept that official religion.

In as far as I am given the degree of understanding upon which to base my belief I shall prefer fact to official pronouncements.

I once encountered a man who did not consider it wrong to take another man's wife if the couple had not been married in his church. He simply did not consider any other marriage as valid. Could it be then that before the establishment of his church there was no such thing as legitimacy? Rediculous. Whether a church or civil ceremony, whether joined by heathen priest or just personal selection like in primitive society or common law, to me they would still be man and wife. No breach of contract would seem any different from breach of fact.

What defies officialdom anyhow? The greatest difference in official execution and a lynching is only the degree of organization and to the "guest of honor" probably

means nothing at all.

I have been subjected to so many lies both official and unofficial and witnessed so many injustices that I am willing to risk any part of my remaining years to challenge anything I have reason to doubt whether it be political, religious or scientific. Where I was once willing to compromise to avoid discord or unpopularity I now welcome debate and care not a whit what names they might call me so long as I feel I have the truth. My faith is as valid as any others.

## Jerry King Lands Lunker at Lake Cisco

Eleven members of the Eastland County Bass Club met at Lake Cisco March 12th for their monthly in-club tournament. Changing weather conditions were expected to hamper catches by most anglers. And the number of 14 1/2 inch or longer bass weighed in showed just how a frontal passage slows down the catching.

The final weigh-in went as follows: First place with 4 fish, Tommy Maynard 9.45 pounds. Second place with 3 fish Eddie Green 6.54 pounds. Third place with 2 fish Terry Wilson 5.27 pounds. Big bass of the day went to Jerry King with a real lunker weighing 5.20 pounds.

First place Tommy Maynard reported catching his fish on a Stanley. These were all largemouth bass, coming from 1 to 2 feet of water. Eddie Green reported his fish being taken on a crankbait in 5-15 feet of water. Eddie's stringer contained two very nice smallmouth in the two pound range. My fish were taken on a Storm Manufacturing's Magnum Wiggle Wort in 6 to 22 feet of water.

Happily, the new screen also has a high pixel density. It's four inches tall and combines a vertical resolution of 192 pixels with an outstanding zoom feature to provide excellent picture detail. Fish and other objects more than three inches apart or displayed separately. So, in addition to being easy to see, CLEARVISION provides enough detail to be of use to serious fishermen.

Other companies are sure to follow Lowrance's response to this pair of major complaints. Computerized liquid crystal graphs are constantly changing, improving as rapidly as personal computers. This causes some fishermen to be hesitant about buying one.

"Fishermen have faced a dilemma... buy now and immediately enjoy the benefits of an LCG, or wait a year and buy the same unit for less, or an improved unit for a similar price," said Mike Render, manager of marketing services for Lowrance.

Things have changed, according to Render, and there is less of a dilemma today. "LCD technology has now advanced to the point where these units offer significant advantages,
