The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department extinguished two grass fires on Sunday. At 9:55 a.m., firemen put out a fire in the 100 block of Ave. G. At 2:40 p.m., Cisco firemen were called to a grass fire in the 800 block of West 12th. Damage was minor in both fires.

Cisco received about a half inch of rain last week, when a cold front pushed through this area. But that wasn't enough rain to help the fire hazard in this area. Everyone is urged not to burn anything until the

#### Winds have been blowing heavily everyday and the humidity has also been at a low, usually staying around 10 to 20 percent. These conditions are just too dangerous for anyone to try to burn anything, according to David Gill, Cisco fireman. Gill brought in a copy of

the regulations for burning trash and other refuse in this area. He said the federal laws are administered by the Texas Air Quality Control Board

The only time outdoor burning is allowed is when: permission has been granted by the Texas Air Control Board; when out door burning is used for the purpose of training fire-fighting personnel and permission has been granted by the Texas Air Control Board; when collection of domestic waste is not provided by the local government entity; and when campfires are used solely for recreational or ceremonial

purposes. Outdoor burning in rural areas of trees, brush, grass and other dry vegetable matter is acceptable to the Texas Air Quality Control Board when no practical alternative to burning exists right-of-way for maintenance, land clearing operations. The burning must be outside the corporate limits of a city or

town. Most important, burn-

ing shall be commenced only when the wind direction will carry smoke and other pollutants away from any city, town, residential, recreational, commercial or industrial area. The burning must be at least 300 feet from any residential, recreational or commercial area.

Hours allowed by the Texas Air Quaility Control Board is from 9:00 a.m. till 5:00 p.m. The rules state that the fire must be out by 5:00 p.m.

Air speed also plays a factor in burning acreage or trash. Surface wind speed needs to be above 6 miles per hour so the smoke will dissipate. Wind speed should not be greater than 23 miles per hour, to prevent the spreading of hot ashes to areas other than on the controlled burn.


A fund to assist with the medical expenses of little Yolanda Newton of Cisco has been established by friends of the family.





State Fish Record Application Rules Modified

The state fish records committee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced several rule changes for anglers seeking certification of state record fish.

The new procedures, which will become effective April 1, are designed to enhance consistancy with rules used by the two major world record certifying organizations, the International Game Fish Association and the Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame. Dr. Gary Matlock,

fisheries director, said an important change requires that potential state record fish must be caught from public waters. This excludes fish from private, club or fish hatchery waters or private ponds not accessible for angling by the general

public, Matlock said. Another change worth noting is that ties for rod and reel records are accepted. Fish taken under the unrestricted category (by legal methods other than rod and reel), must exceed the weight of the existing rod and reel records. Also, fish affixed with an

electronic transmitter or other tagging device to assist in locating fish are not eligible. A fish may not have been knowingly caught more than once by the same person for a state record. Might mention also that this addition was brought about

Fish may be taken on line with no more than two hooks attached to the line, leader or trace. Gang hooks are permitted when attached to artificial lines that are specifically designed for this use (applies to rod and reel

The new form incorporates the application processes for state fish records, big fish awards, lake or bay records and the lunker catch and release program.

Big Fish Awards are issued to anglers catching fish heavier than minimum weights for that particular species. With proper documentation, the angler will receive a certificate

1. The responsibility of discipline must be shared by both parents.

2. Remember, you are a parent, not a pal. You can certainly have fun together, but parents must maintain a balance of authority. 3. Make the discipline for

4. Be consistent with all your children.

5. Be consistent with how you handle an issue or situation. Discipline one time and not the next confuses the child.

6. When you use spanking, be careful not to hurt the child, or spank for every little thing. As the child grows older, spanking should be used less and persuasion and reasoning used more.

7. Never spank when you are angry, frustrated or embarrassed.
