## Cisco Helps With Olden Grass Fire Mon.

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department assisted the Eastland, Ranger and other local Fire Departments in putting out a grass fire near Olden Monday afternoon. The fire was started by sparks from a train passing through the area. The train was believed to have started other grass fires in Callahan County.

Mutual aide was dispatched from: Stawn-2 trucks, Eastland-1 truck, Cisco-1 truck, Gorman-1 truck, and Ranger-3 trucks.

Low humidity and high winds are the major factors determining the containment of the fire at this time.

No livestock or building losses were reported.

At one time during the night, the fire was moving across the Morton Valley Highway towards the town of Ranger.

The Ladies Auxiliary of Ranger came with cold drinks and food for the exhausted firemen throughout the night.

As of press time, the fire was being closely monitored for hot spots. The danger is not over yet.

Cisco firefighters were called on to extinguish a school bus fire at 4:20 p.m., Monday in front of Quickway Grocery. There were no

children on the bus at the time of the fire.

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department extinguished two grass fires on Sunday. At 9:55 a.m., firemen put out a fire in the 100 block of Ave. G. At 2:40 p.m., Cisco firemen were called to a grass fire in the 800 block of West 12th. Damage was minor in both fires.

Cisco received about a half inch of rain last week, when a cold front pushed through this area. But that wasn't enough rain to help the fire hazard in this area. Everyone is urged not to burn anything until the weather situation changes.

Winds have been blowing heavily everyday and the humidity has also been at a low, usually staying around 10 to 20 percent. These conditions are just too dangerous for anyone to try to burn anything, according to David Gill, Cisco fireman.

Gill brought in a copy of the regulations for burning trash and other refuse in this area. He said the federal laws are administered by the Texas Air Quality Control Board.

The only time outdoor burning is allowed is when: permission has been granted by the Texas Air Quality Control Board; when outdoor burning is used for the purpose of training fire-fighting personnel and permission has been granted by the Texas Air Quality Control Board; when collection of domestic waste is not provided by the local government entity; and when campfires are used solely for recreational or ceremonial purposes.

Outdoor burning in rural areas of trees, brush, grass and other dry vegetable matter is acceptable to the Texas Air Quality Control Board when no practical alternative to burning exists for right-of-way maintenance, land clearing operations. The burning must be outside the corporate limits of a city or town. Most important, burn-

ing shall be commenced only when the wind direction will carry smoke and other pollutants away from any city, town, residential, recreational, commercial or industrial area. The burning must be at least 300 feet from any residential, recreational or commercial area.

Hours allowed by the Texas Air Quality Control Board is from 9:00 a.m. till 5:00 p.m. The rules state that the fire must be out by 5:00 p.m.

Air speed also plays a factor in burning acreage or trash. Surface wind speed needs to be above 6 miles per hour so the smoke will dissipate. Wind speed should not be greater than 23 miles per hour, to prevent the spreading of hot ashes to areas other than on the controlled burn.

## Registration For Kindergarten Will Be Held At Elementary School

Kindergarten registration for the 1988-89 school year will be held Tuesday and Wednesday, March 29-30, from 9 to 11 a.m. and from 1 to 2 p.m. in the library of Cisco Elementary School.

In order to enter kindergarten a child must be five years old by September 1, 1988. Please bring birth certificate and immunization records.

Immunizations required for entry into public schools are: DTP/TD regular series and one dose after the child's fourth birthday; polio regular series and last dose after the child's fourth birthday; MMR after the child's first birthday.

Pre-kindergarten registration will be held at the same time. To be eligible for

enrollment in pre-kindergarten a child must be at least four years old and must be unable to speak and comprehend the English language or from a family whose income, according to standards set by the State Board of Education, is below subsistence level.

## Literary Festival Will Be Held At Hilton Center On Friday And Saturday

Cisco will be a meeting place for Southwestern writers and editors when the Texas Circuit group holds a Literary Festival in the Hilton Community Center Friday and Saturday, March 25-26.

Dr. Monte Lewis is host for this special event. Dr. Lewis is editor of the Cross Timbers Review, a Cisco Junior College publication. Cross Timbers will also be represented by Dr. Cleatus Rattan, poetry editor, and Dr. Ken Hammes, fiction editor.

Judy Callarman and members of Phi Theta Kappa, a Junior College National Honor Society, will be assisting.

The Texas Circuit is a non-profit group, and this Austin-based organization will hold five festivals in Texas during 1988. The Cisco meet will be the only one held outside of a city area. The purpose of the festivals is to bring together publishers and writers to exchange information, study material, and learn of current needs in publishing.

Among the visitors expected in Cisco are Ertha Colson, Austin poet and leader of the black community, and British writer, editor and critic Peter Mortimer.

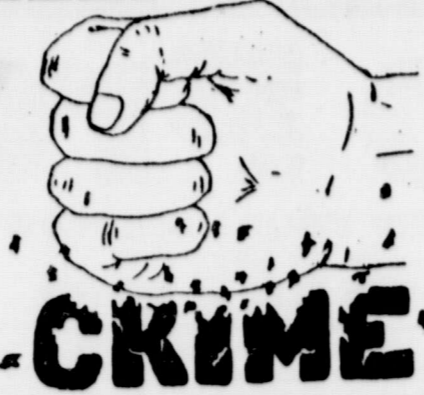

Powell, Ken Halford, Phyllis Halford, Pullman, Judge J.G. Lyerla, and Truman Kirk will join with 221 delegates that make up the 22nd Senatorial District of 14 Counties. These delegates representative support is spread out with Dukakis, 33.34%; Gore 25%; Gephardt 8.33%; and uncommitted 33.33%. The County Convention supported Dukakis with 31.11%; Gore with 24.45%; Gephardt with 4.44%; Simon 2.22%; and uncommitted with 37.78%.

"Compound" Clark of Desdemona spoke of his recent appreciation of local County elected officials. He closed with a touching rendition of a poem, "Good Ole Boy."

Elected Democrat officials participating in the Convention were County Treasurer Ruth Pugliese-Hart, County Judge Scott Bailey, District Attorney Emory Walton, Sheriff-Elect Dee Hogan, Constable Gene Hicks, Justices of Peace R.G. Lyerla and J.V. Heyser, Commissioner Richard Robinson, and retired Commissioner "Runt" Dill.

Jerry Sitton and Mary Dorcas Green was born only 20 miles from each other - he in Marlowe, Oklahoma, in 1911, and she in Hastings, Oklahoma, in 1916. They met in 1937 in Kilgore, Texas, where he worked as a newspaper reporter and she was a secretary/bookkeeper for a gas company. A mutual friend, thinking they would make a nice couple, arranged for them to go on a "blind date." It was not long before he popped the suggestion, "Miss Green, let's I and you get married."

They were married on March 26, 1938, in the pastor's study of the First Baptist Church of Hallsville, Texas. The Sittons continued

to live in Kilgore until he went into the U. S. Navy in 1942.

During World War II, Sitton was a navy flier. He was stationed in Livermore, California, where their daughter was born in 1943; in Olathe, Kansas, where in 1944 their son was born; and in the Philippine Islands. While he was overseas, his wife and children lived in

Walters, Oklahoma, to be near family members.

Lieutenant Commander Sitton served as a flight instructor for a time and flew transport planes between the Admiralty Islands and the Philippines.

After the war, the Sittons moved to Henrietta, Texas, where he was editor and publisher of the Clay County Leader for two years.

In 1947, Sitton purchased the Cisco Daily Press and moved his family to Cisco in 1948. Under his ownership, the newspaper became the Cisco Press. For many years, he wrote a popular column called "The Gay Philosopher," which eventually was renamed "People and Things."

After moving to Cisco, Sitton joined the naval reserve, in which he was active for 25 years. Sitton's holdings grew to include the RangerTimes, the Eastland Telegram, and the Rising Star under the collective title Eastland County Newspapers, Inc. Mrs. Sitton worked with her husband as a sometime-manager, reporter, bookkeeper, paperboy, and "girl Friday."

In 1950, Sitton established the Longhorn Press, a mail-order small book publishing company. He sold the Eastland County Newspapers to H. V. O'Brien in the early 1970's and claimed to retire. Although he continued to write "People and Things" regularly until last November. The couple still operate the Longhorn Press.

Since retiring, Sitton has worked in six foreign countries with newspapers having production problems under the auspices of the International Executive Service Corps.

Sitton is a long-time

member of the Masons, the Shriners, and the Lions Club, of which he is a past president. He has served on the Cisco city commission, the public school board, and the college board of regents. Mrs. Sitton was for years active in Girls Scouts and P-TA. She has been a member of the Hospital Auxiliary since its organization. They have been members of the First Baptist Church and the Cisco Country Club since moving to Cisco.

The couple's children grew up in Cisco, attending local schools and Texas colleges. Their son Jim now lives in Longview, Texas, where he works as an executive pilot. He and his wife Linda have three children: Kent, 18; Kathy, 14; and Melanie, 9.

Their daughter Judy is married to David Callarman. They and their three children, Leigh, 17; Brian, 15; and Mark, 13; live in Cisco. He owns and operates David Callarman Insurance, and she teaches English at Cisco Junior College.

## USDA Will Offer Assistance To

### Texans Hit By Range Fire

WASHINGTON - The U.S. Department of Agriculture has agreed to make emergency help available to ranchers and farmers whose land was blackened by a wall of flames that roared across five West Texas counties last weekend, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm says.

"Two programs have been approved by USDA," Gramm said. "The emergency feed program allows USDA to share the cost of feeding cattle; under a second program, USDA

can provide assistance to rebuild burned fences."

"The emergency feed program will pay half the cost of providing hay, feed grains, and mixed feed to help cattlemen who are hard-pressed to replace feed that was ruined by the fire," Gramm said.

"This will provide some rapid assistance," Gramm said of the department's decision.

"I have been assured by

the Texas Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service that the programs will be implemented immediately," he said.

"I intend to work to see the federal government participate to the maximum extent possible to help farmers and ranchers get back into normal production and to put the devastating impact of the fire behind us," Gramm said.

An estimated 289,700 acres of rangeland were burned by the fire that swept across portions of Shackelford, Callahan, Haskell, Coleman, and Throckmorton counties, Gramm noted.

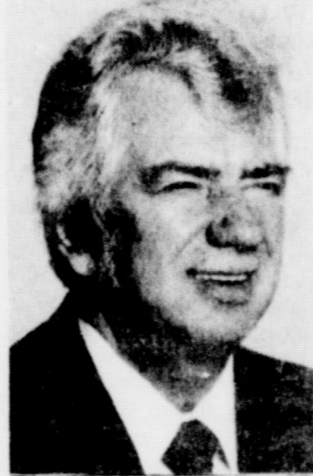

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling 647-1156.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

## Girl Scout Reunion To Be Held In Lubbock May 27

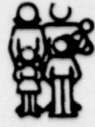

## The Family Matters

The man had a white-knuckled grip on the shopping cart as he pushed it tensely down the aisle. Inside the cart sat his two year-old son, screaming at the top of his voice while trying to climb out of the cart. The father kept talking in a moderate but tense tone of voice. "Be nice Marvin. Don't scream, Marvin. We won't be here much longer, Marvin. You can go outside and enjoy yourself when you get home, Marvin. An astounded woman went over to the father and complimented him on the patience he was showing to Marvin. "Lady," he replied wearily, "I'm Marvin!"

Discipline, the right kind at the appropriate time, is a difficult but extremely necessary responsibility of fathers and mothers. Knowing what to do to best teach and train our children to become responsible human beings in their pilgrimage to adulthood is sometimes a puzzle. Some parents go off to live their lives while they leave their children to fend for themselves and hope they will learn some lessons. Other parents beat their kids regularly "for general purposes," and leave it up to the bewildered children to figure out what they did or didn't do. Still, other parents want to be involved in the growth of their children but find that growth of the child demands new skills from them as parents. And parents of several children discover that each child is unique in his own way and must be related to individually. The wise man Solomon

wrote in Proverbs 22:6, "Train up a child in the way he should go, Even when he is old he will not depart from it." Train up a child "according to his way" is the literal translation, and emphasizes the uniqueness of each child, which the parent is to consider as he uses discipline that trains. Paul wrote in Ephesians 6:4, "Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord." Again, the emphasis is for the fathers to be involved in the life of his children, knowing them and the proper discipline they individually need to grow to be responsible adults, doing what is right.

Discipline that trains can be understood and applied. The characteristics of this type of discipline includes the following:

1. The responsibility of discipline must be shared by both parents.
  2. Remember, you are a parent, not a pal. You can certainly have fun together, but parents must maintain a balance of authority.
  3. Make the discipline for the deed. Don't overpunish for small misdeeds.
  4. Be consistent with all your children.
  5. Be consistent with how you handle an issue or situation. Discipline one time and not the next confuses the child.
  6. When you use spanking, be careful not to hurt the child, or spank for every little thing. As the child grows older, spanking should be used less and persuasion and reasoning used more.
  7. Never spank when you are angry, frustrated or embarrassed.
  8. Both physical and verbal methods of discipline should be done in private.
  9. Discipline should be for disobedience - not for ignorance or accidents such as bed-wetting or spilling a glass of milk.
  10. Explain to the child why he is being corrected.
  11. Always discipline in an attitude of love and verbally remind the child of your love in the process - wait 20 second, then reassure and touch with love.
- Becoming involved in the lives of our children demands the best parenting skills from us. As the involvement grows, we better understand the family matters.

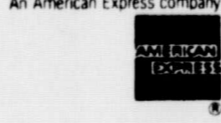

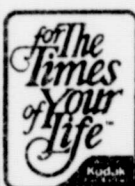

## March 23 Is Deadline To File For May 7 City Election

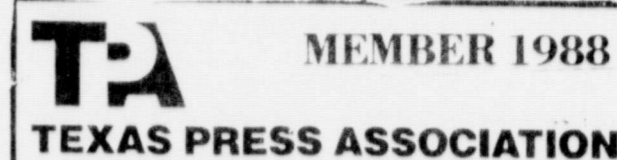
Wednesday, March 23, 1988, by 5 p.m. will be the last time that any candidate may file for a place on the ballot for the May 7, 1988 City General election.

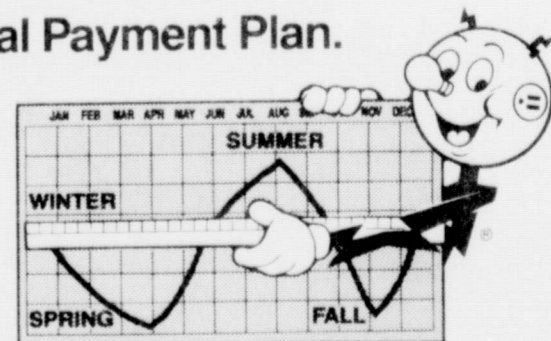

IS IT WRONG TO CRY?

When a friend or loved one dies, it is only natural for your emotions to GIVE WAY TO GRIEF. AND FOR YOU TO CRY.

Tears are therapeutic in more ways than many of us realize. They give us an emotional outlet, providing us with specific physical action we can perform.
