Cisco Hospital To Offer New Program To Their Customers

E. L. Graham Memorial Hospital is sponsoring a new program for its patients, called "CARE PLUS," according to Marvin Walters, Hospital Administrator. Anyone can sign up for this program and there is no charge. As a patient it means extra care, additional services, and even saves you dollars.

CARE PLUS entitles a patient to receive an automatic 10 percent cash discount on their deductible and co-insurance. This reduces the patient's out of pocket costs. The 10 percent discount is offered up to a maximum of \$300 anytime a person uses the services as a member of CARE PLUS.

CARE PLUS offers to its members free insurance filing, free insurance counseling, one free visitor meal and free telephone and television in the patient's room.

As a special benefit of CARE PLUS, each member can have one free visit to the emergency room each year. This is a savings of \$34.00. This does not include the physician's fee or x-ray and laboratory services.

CARE PLUS members receive a free annual outpatient physical examination. The outpatient physical examination includes a blood pressure check and urinalysis. Cisco Firemen Return To Fire Several Times Before It's Out

Members of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department were called out on 12 different calls last Thursday to fight two major grass fires and other smaller fires, according to Truet Horton, Cisco Fireman.

On Wednesday, March 23, a grass fire started east of Cisco around the Sunshine Valley Mobile Home Park. The fire started when the sparks from a passing train ignited the dry grass. This area is so dry that the fire

was easily rekindled over the next few days and Cisco Firemen were called out several times to extinguish it.

At 1:00 p.m., Cisco firemen were called out to a grass fire on Texas Highway 6, north of Cisco. The cause of the fire is under investigation. Cisco Firemen were called back out to the site one other time on Thursday when the fire rekindled.

Later that afternoon at 3 o'clock, Cisco Firemen extinguished a grass fire on Interstate 20, west of town near the rest area. A grass fire on South 183 was quickly put out by the Cisco Firemen at 7:49 Thursday evening and at 8:00 p.m., Cisco Firemen responded to a fire alarm at Magnum Baptist Church.

Last Friday the Cisco Firemen had to return to the fire site between Cisco and Eastland when another train came through the area and sparks from the train's wheels started the fire back up again. About the same time a grass fire was reported to have started near United Energex, also caused from a passing train. Firemen were called out to help extinguish the rekindling of the grass fire on Highway 6.

On Saturday, March 26, the only calls Cisco firemen

made were back to the grass fire site on Highway 6, once, and back to Sun Valley three times.

Last Monday afternoon, Cisco firemen quickly extinguished a grass fire on Highway 80 west, across from Cisco Pump. They were called out Monday night to check on a report of smoke at the Dairy Queen. It was caused from an electrical short.

Horton said he would like to urge everyone in this area to be extremely cautious of accidentally setting a grass fire. He said don't throw matches out and don't throw cigarettes out, because cigarettes can start fires too. With the low humidity and all the dryness this area has had, he said this area now has major problems.

Horton said everyone needs to be real observant of people around a grass fire or people leaving such an area at a high rate of speed since some of the grassfires occurring lately have not been from natural causes.

If a citizen sees something suspicious, they should contact the sheriff's office of the Cisco Police Department. Horton said that information such as a license number, make and type of vehicle would be very helpful to law enforcement personnel.

Senator Glasgow To Speak At Citizenship Banquet Thursday

The Honorable Bob Glasgow, State Senator of District 22, will be the guest speaker for the annual Cisco Rotary Club Citizenship Awards Luncheon to be held on Thursday of this week, March 31, at the Traditions Restaurant.

The occasion will be in honor of two Cisco High School graduating seniors -- Jason Phillips and Jill Reynolds -- for the demonstration of traits of good citizenship during four years as students at CHS.

Senator Glasgow, who is Chairman of the Senate Rules Committee and Vice Chairman of the Finance and Economic Development Committee, is one of the most influential legislators in Austin. First elected in 1980, he was soon cited as an "instant superstar" by Texas Business magazine. His record includes the passage of 40 bills that he sponsored during his first session, which ranked him first among freshman legislators for that session. His performance since has been equally impressive.

Last year he was selected as one of the "Ten Best" of Texas Monthly magazine. Since being in Austin, he has worked towards many measures which have strengthened the Texas Criminal laws, and has also

been active in promoting and supporting legislation for jobs and education.

Glasgow was born in Eastland County in 1942 and grew up in Stephenville, where he graduated from high school. He then served three years in the U. S. Army. After his discharge, he attended Tarleton State University and the University of Texas School of Law. He was an administrative assistant to Governor Preston Smith during and following law school, and in 1971 he returned to Stephenville to enter private law practice. He was appointed District Attorney there in 1972, and elected to the post during the fall election of that year. He served as D.A. until he made his successful bid for the State Senate in 1980.

The senator is married to the former Deanna Carr of Huckaby, and they have three children.

Rotarian Eris Ritchie, chairman of the Awards program, has invited members of the general public to attend the 12 noon luncheon Thursday. "Any who are friends of the Reynolds and Phillips families, or any who would like to come and hear Senator Glasgow speak, are most welcome to be with us," he said. The price of the restaurant's prevail-

ing cost for the luncheon meal will apply, he stated. Several Rotarians plan to bring their wives and other special guests for the occasion.

Roads And Bridges Among County Commissioner Topics

Eastland County Commissioners held a regular meeting on Monday, March 28 in the Courthouse. All four Commissioners were present.

After opening the meeting County Judge Scott Bailey excused himself to attend a funeral. He asked that L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, preside until he could return.

Several agenda items dealt with roads and bridges on county roads. Four State Highway Engineers attended the meeting, including Bryan Neaves of the Eastland office, Woody Howell, who inspects bridges, and Leon Taylor

and Tom Nupert of Brownwood. Also present was Clyde Brock, acting Eastland County Maintenance Superintendent.

Howell reported that 58 County bridges had been inspected. These are structures at least 20 ft. long. Engineers had recommended closing two of these structures, with 18 more to be posted with load limits. Of the two slated for closing, one - in Pct. 2 - had been removed, and a low-water crossing put in its place.

The other bridge, in Pct. 3 below Gorman is still being used. According to L.T. Owen, Commissioner of that Precinct, people in Comanche County would have to go miles out of their way if the bridge was out.

"If I have to close that road, I want some of you Highway people to go there with me - I can't run too fast," Owen said.

He told of his problems in trying to get Highway funds to fix that bridge. And recent State allocations left out Eastland County but provided funds to Stephens and Comanche counties, it was reported.

He stated that the people of his city felt that since this is an FM Road, and a primary line, the people should not have to bear the expense - or at least all of it. "Who started this road widening, anyway?" asked Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4.

Bryan Neaves of the Highway Dept. replied that most of the work (five miles) was in Comanche County, with only one-half mile in Eastland County and Gorman. Contracts have already been let in Comanche County.

The Commissioners called on District Attorney Emory Walton for an opinion from the State Attorney General's office as to whether a County should pay for road work inside a city limits.

Walton brought copies of a statute, summing it up by saying that a county may expend funds in a city - with limitations - but before they can do this it has to be budgeted.

"Since we can't legally pay for that (work in Gorman) unless it's on a budget, that kills it right now," said Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1. The other Commissioners agreed.

Garrett replied that Gorman didn't have that utility work on a budget either.

On jail matters, Billy Bacon reported 18 prisoners

in the County Jail. The water heater for the facility went out recently, he said, and the County had to buy a new 92-gallon heater, price \$2,500.

The Jail will be inspected by the State Jail Standards Commission on Wednesday, March 30, Bacon said. He added that hopefully the Jail will pass the inspection. The Jail failed to pass the State inspection in 1986 and 1987.

On other business, the Commissioners approved a request to designate the name of a road in Pct. 4 in memory of Chandra Pittman. Last January Chandra died in an accident on this road.

Also approved was a request to re-name the Eastland County Child Welfare Board the Eastland County Child Protective Service Board. As Judge Bailey said: "The word 'welfare' is not so popular anymore!"

"Write and tell us when you get them up," they were instructed. "We've been told that the FHWA may refrain from participating in Federal projects in counties that do not comply."

In other road matters, Mayor Charlie Garrett of Gorman appeared, representing his City. He discussed the Utility Adjustment on the portion of FM 2921 which goes through the City of Gorman.

Last month the Commissioners voted to pay the County portion of this roadwork, totalling \$4,909. Garrett said the City of Gorman is being billed \$3,713 for three poles inside the city limits.

Interlocal Crime Task Force In Need Of Equipment

The West Central Texas Interlocal Crime Task Force is in need of some equipment for its five officer force and is seeking donations from residents of the 14-county area it covers, according to

Billy Rains, Cisco Police Chief.

Rains is a member of the task force governing board and was involved in the formation of the task force. Rains attended a board meeting held on Thursday, March 17, in Abilene and learned the task force, which has only been in operation since December, 1987, had 30 defendants with criminal cases pending against them on that date. From that total 27 cases are felonies. The majority of the arrests are related to possession of, or delivery of, narcotics or marijuana.

The task force has filed forfeiture proceedings on two vehicles, 12 guns and other items. It has also filed proceedings on over \$11,000 in cash.

Rains said the task force has worked in Eastland County a couple of times and

were involved in a sizeable drug bust made in the county.

Although the task force received funding for one year as the result of a federal grant awarded through the Criminal Justice Department of the Texas governor's office, the task force is in need of donations—mainly equipment and supplies, if it is to continue at the same place it has already set during its three month tenure.

Rains said the task force is in need of dependable used vehicles and money to be used as "buy money". Rains said everything that is donated to the task force will be forwarded on to George Solis, special task force prosecutor, in Abilene.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt. Appointments may be made by calling 442-3951.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Cisco on Tuesday, April 5th.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

Farmers Home To Elect New Members

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 5 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Jack Phillips, County Supervisor said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of

Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Phillips said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old re-

quirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Phillips said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the peti-

tion." Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one

member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Phillips said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

"Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 1309 East Main Street in Eastland," Phillips said.

What Caused The Fires?

The question on many peoples' minds these days after so many fires have burned so much of Eastland County and North Central Texas is, "What or who is starting the fires?"

The answer seems to be more than one cause. It is very dry at present and range fires start easily. Carelessness always causes a few fires, cigarettes are thrown out auto windows, and sometimes even the sun shining through broken glass or a discarded bottle can cause a fire. We need to be careful about these things, but the recent plague of fires

indicates two more possible causes, trains setting fires and possibly arson in some cases.

We have been told that people were present along stretches of the railroad when a train or trains passed and that fires were igniting one after another along the railroad behind the train. People including firemen who witnessed this said that no one else went close to the tracks before the fires began, and that they had no doubt that trains started some of the fires.

One such train was reportedly stopped and in-

formed that he was setting fires. The reported result was that the fires stopped being set when the train stopped, but started popping up behind the train when it continued.

The explanation from one long-time fireman is that exhaust buildup blows from the engine exhausts of the trains and smolders in the grass, on trees or poles, or on the crossties, until the wind brings it in contact with something that will burn easily or whips the smoldering into a flame. And crossties, poles and trees were also found burning

dresses.

along the tracks. Hot boxes also sometimes cause fires, but they seem to blaze up immediately.

Several of the fires starting along the tracks were in places very hard to get to, and anyone in the area would likely be seen.

But not all of the fires started along the tracks, some have been started along roads distant from the tracks. Since arson was suspected in some of the fires west of Eastland County, it has to be a consideration when investigating the cause of some local fires. However at present, local officers questioned say they have no evidence to indicate arson. At the same time, there have been just too many fires for the usual accidental causes, so rural people are keeping up a watch for anything suspicious, we are told.

The railroad did pay the cost of a bulldozer to help control one fire along the tracks, but that was just part of the cost, and we were told that firemen out of their pockets paid for another. They left their jobs to help others for free and were saddened with the cost.

Ranchers have also paid dearly as they lost the food for their livestock, and contrary to what some so-called experts say, burning the pasture off also hurts the land. Fence posts must also be replaced.

Visit With Astronaut Alan Bean Highlights Trip

26 Sheriffs Since 1875 In County

With Election Records and Commissioner's Court Minutes being kept in Eastland County in 1873, former County Clerk Johnson Smith compiled a list of Eastland County Sheriffs and County Clerks who were elected after that time.

Sheriffs were: H.S. Schmick-1875, A.J. Stuart 1880, G.W. Shannon 1881, J.K. Schmick 1882, Sam Finley 1892, Joe Whitesides 1896, J.L. Nobles 1898, J.R. Skinner 1912 and H.E. Lawrence 1916.

Elected Sheriff after 1920 were: Sam Nolley 1920, J.D. Barton 1922, R.W. Edwards 1924, John S. Hart 1926, Virge Foster 1928, Loss Woods 1936, John S. Hart 1942, J.B. Williams 1946, Frank Tucker 1950, J.B. Williams 1954, Lee Horn 1960, and L.E. Sublett 1964.

Later additions to the list include Ronnie White, Johnnie Morren and Don Underwood.

RANGER

Fishing Outdoors

Freshwater Fishing Limit Overhaul Proposed

The following article should be a special interest to anglers of all species. I want to thank the good folks at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for making this information available.

New length limits on several popular freshwater sport fish highlighted fishing regulation changes proposed by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials last week.

The proposals will be subject to public comment in hearings during April before being considered for final adoption by the Parks and Wildlife Commission in its May 12 public hearing. If adopted, the changes will go into effect Sept. 1.

Many of the proposed changes are designed to standardize regulations, and in many cases to enhance law enforcement efforts, fishery staff members told the commission.

One of the standardization moves would place all black basses under the same minimum length limit. Under the proposal, largemouth, smallmouth, Kentucky spotted and Guadalupe bass all would be subject to the statewide 14-inch minimum, except on

lakes with special regulations. This also would include the Panhandle region where currently the minimum length limit on largemouth bass is 12 inches. Currently the minimum length limit on smallmouth, spotted and Guadalupe bass is 10 inches. The daily bag limit would remain at five black bass in the aggregate.

Another proposed standardization would change all slot limits for largemouth bass to a standard slot of 14-21 inches. Under this limit bass between 14 and 21 inches in length would have to be released, but three bass per day shorter or longer than the slot size could be retained. The lakes affected are Calaveras, Fork, Monticello, Fayette Power Project, Gibbons Creek, Houston County and Nacagdoches.

The change is recommended to simplify and standardize exceptions to statewide standards while allowing for continued production of trophy fisheries at those reservoirs, the staff said.

Lake Worth near Fort Worth, which currently has a 14-18 slot, would return to the statewide 14-inch minimum length and five bass per day bag limit.

The staff proposed to

establish an 18-inch minimum length limit and three per day bag limit on largemouth bass at Lakes Mackenzie in Briscoe County, Fairfield in Freestone County and Pinkston in Shelby County. Those lakes currently have a 16-inch minimum length limit and a bag limit of three largemouths. On four other lakes that currently have a 16-inch minimum, the proposals would replace that limit with the statewide 14-inch minimum and five per day. They are Squaw Creek near Glen Rose, Aquilla Creek near Hillsboro, Tradinghouse Creek near Waco and Coletto Creek near Victoria.

The 18-inch minimum and three largemouths per day bag limit also is recommended for the new Joe Poole Reservoir southwest of Dallas, which is not yet open for fishing. Officials said the limit would help the lake produce quality bass fishing and protect the fish from being overharvested after the lake is opened.

The first-ever catch and release only regulation for bass has been proposed for waters in three state parks. They are Purvis Creek State Park Lake near Athens in Henderson County (currently closed to the public), Calliham State Park Lake in the Calliham Unit of Choke Canyon State Park near Three Rivers (the lake is in an unopened portion of the park and is not yet open to the public for fishing), and

Lost Maples State Natural Area near Vanderpool in Bandera County. The change would maximize fishery potential and catch rates at Calliham and Purvis Creek, and protect Guadalupe bass in the sanctuary designated for the species at Lost Maples.

Another change would create a statewide 18-inch minimum length limit on striped bass and hybrid striped bass. The current bag limit of five per day was not recommended for change, but the possession limit would increase from 10 to 15 fish in the aggregate. Staff members said the length limit on striped bass would promote more reproduction by allowing more fish to reach spawning age. Hybrid stripers would better utilize available forage and provide better quality fishing under the limit.

Also proposed was the first-ever bag limit and minimum length limit for white bass. If adopted, the bag limit would be 25 per day, and only white bass over 10 inches long could be retained. The proposal would increase survival to reproductive size to increase natural reproduction and yield, staff members said.

The staff proposed to increase the minimum length limit on channel and blue catfish from the current nine inches to 14 inches, and increase the minimum on flathead catfish from nine to

24 inches. These changes also are aimed at increasing survival of fish to reproductive age and ultimately increasing yield.

The department also recommends special limits on channel and blue catfish of five per day and 14-inch minimum length in rivers and streams within boundaries of state parks or city limits, and on lakes smaller than 500 acres in size. This is recommended because recruitment of catfish is often limited in these situations, necessitating supplemental stocking. This also would distribute the harvest among more anglers in high-use areas.

Because of ongoing negotiations with Louisiana, department officials propose a 12-inch minimum length limit and 10 per day bag limit on largemouth bass at Toledo Bend Reservoir and Caddo Lake, both on the Texas-Louisiana border. Also, a 50-per-day limit on crappie with no minimum length limit was proposed to achieve uniformity of limits on the border reservoirs.

Also proposed was a regulation that would prohibit the use of electronic tracking devices used to tag and follow the movements of fish. Officials said this method could be used unfairly to locate fish, especially species that tend to school.

The department proposes to add four reservoirs to those having a 10-inch minimum length limit and 25

per day bag limit on crappie. Three of the lakes are currently closed to the public. They are Purvis Creek, Joe Poole Reservoir southwest of Dallas and Ray Roberts Reservoir south of Dallas. The same crappie limit would go into effect on the new Big Creek Lake near Cooper in Delta County.

This proposal was made to prevent overharvest of initial year classes and assure maximum sustained yield, officials said.

Several recommendations were made for use of fishing devices other than rod and reel. The staff recommended that trotlines, juglines and throwlines be used to take non-game fish only, except catfish may be taken. It is also proposed that trotlines have 600 feet maximum mainline length, be re-dated every 10 days instead of the current 90 days and be fished under water. Trotlines would be prohibited in streams or rivers within boundaries of state parks or within city limit, and in lakes less than 500 acres in size.

A proposal would specify that dip nets and gaffs are to be used to aid in landing of legally caught fish only. The regulation no longer would allow taking bait fish with dip nets.

Another proposal would prohibit the use of hand-operated devices under

water, except for spear gun and gear.

In salt-water, staff proposals would establish a 14-inch minimum length limit on king mackerel to make the limit the same as Spanish mackerel, set the bag and possession limit on

three fish for Spanish mackerel to conform with the federal fisheries management plan, and set a bag limit of one tarpon a day with a 48-inch minimum length limit.

Seventeen Texas Hospitals Closed

AUSTIN—In 1987, 17 Texas hospitals closed, according to the Texas Hospital Association, the industry's trade association. This compares with 18 closures in 1986, nine in 1985 and eight in 1984. Of the 52 hospitals that have closed in the past four years, five have reopened under either different ownership or management.

Nearly all of the 52 hospitals in Texas that closed during the past four years were relatively small, and the majority (31) were located in rural (non-metropolitan statistical areas) counties, said Karl Shaner, Dr. P.H., vice president, research and information services.

Only two of the 52 closed hospitals had more than 100 beds. A total of 692 beds were closed in 1987, as compared to 627 in 1986, 355 in 1985 and 272 in 1984. The five facilities that reopened account for 169 beds.

"With regard to their ownership status at the time of closure, nine hospitals were publicly-owned, 13 were private/non-profit institutions and 30 were investor-owned, either by individuals or a corporate system," Shaner noted.

In Texas, small and rural hospitals account for 220 of the 530 hospitals in the state, and serve an estimated 3 million people. Of the 52 closures, 29 hospitals were the only provider in their communities. "This means that in 29 small Texas towns, people's access to health

care services has been curtailed and compromised," said Charles Bailey, JD, vice president of legal affairs.

Why have so many hospitals closed in Texas? The bottom line answer is financial problems, Bailey noted. "The problems experienced by small, rural hospitals are caused by many of the same factors affecting urban hospitals, such as lower occupancy rates, more intensely ill patients who require more complex care, increased regulatory requirements, and inadequate payment from Medicare/Medicaid programs," he said.

"Because small, rural hospitals also serve a greater than average proportion of Medicare patients, recent changes in the payment and review of care provided Medicare beneficiaries have had a more profound effect on their facilities and their ability to preserve financial stability," he added.

"Rural hospitals also face the problems of attracting sufficient numbers of qualified professional personnel and physicians, less access to capital and insufficient funding for marketing and diversification in order to respond to a more competitive health care environment," Bailey noted.

Since 1980, hospitals have seen a decline in discharges and in their average daily census; however, this has affected small and rural hospitals more severely. "In the first half of 1987, average

occupancy rates were 25 percent in small hospitals with fewer than 25 beds, and 33 percent for hospitals with 26-49 beds," Bailey said.

Small, rural hospitals are more affected by declining patient revenue margins. Higher inflation in the goods and services hospitals purchase, more severely ill patients with increased lengths of hospitalization, and slow growth in outpatient visits, which in previous years offset the financial effect of drops in inpatient use, contributed to the continued downturn in revenue margins for 1987, according to economic analysts for the American Hospital Association.

Combined with declining revenue margins is an increase of nearly one percent in the average length of stay for 1987, which had declined during much of the 1970s and in each year from 1982-85. The increase in length of stay in the first half of 1987

was highest among patients over age 65, a group for whom hospitals have incentives and pressures to reduce stays. "This places an additional strain on hospital expenses, as they are paid a fixed rate for Medicare patient hospitalization," Bailey noted. Medicare patients account for more than 35 percent of all hospital services delivered, and in rural hospitals, may account for 60-75 percent, Dr. Shaner noted.





TENS—transcutaneous electric nerve stimulation, the tiny electric "shock" that eases pain—has now been adapted by dentists. They use it to relieve post-surgical pain and to ease the pain of TMJ, temporomandibular joint syndrome.

A large dose of Vitamin E before bypass surgery limits the development of destructive particles known as free radicals, according to researchers at the Mayo Clinic. Without the supplement, Vitamin E levels fall fast after surgery.

Plastic surgeon in New York has developed a non-allergenic "clay" that can be molded for more natural-looking results. It's placed under the skin and then shaped.

Two antibiotics are better than one in cases of pelvic inflammatory disease (PID), according to the Centers for Disease Control, because no one antibiotic is effective against all the organisms that cause PID.

French researchers report some success against Type 1, or "juvenile" diabetes. The disease results when the beta cells of the pancreas don't create insulin as they should. In the French test, niacinamide, a B vitamin, seemed to slow down destruction of the beta cells; a number of diabetics are in remission.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists." By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman

who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90-97 percent survival rate. However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt has approximately a 50 percent survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on Tuesday, April 5.

Wanda's Corner by Wanda Hallmark

Everyone is urged to be real observant of people around a grassfire or people leaving such an area at a high rate of speed, since some of the grassfires occurring lately have not been from natural causes.

The fires between Cisco and Eastland were started by sparks from the wheels of a passing train, but some of the other fires in this area are suspicious. If you see anything that looks suspicious call the Cisco Fire Department or the Cisco Police Department.

An intentionally set grassfire is considered as criminal mischief and the degree of such a charge would hinge on the amount of damage done by the fire. Possible charges include a Class B misdemeanor (loss of more than \$20 but less than \$200), a Class A misdemeanor (loss of more than \$200, but less than \$750) a 3rd Degree Felony (more than \$750, but less than \$20,000) a 2nd Degree Felony (bodily injury suffered in fire) or a 1st Degree Felony (someone is killed.)

Punishments which could be assessed by a jury include a \$1,000 fine and six months in the county jail for a Class B misdemeanor; a \$2,000 fine and one year in the county jail for a Class A misdemeanor; a \$5,000 fine and 2-10 years in the state penitentiary for a 3rd Degree Felony; or a \$10,000 fine and 5-99 years in the state penitentiary for a 1st Degree Felony.
