New Mexico Gets \$581,000 REA Loan

Seventeen rural communities in eastern New Mexico will get dial telephone service within a year.

It was announced Wednesday that a \$581,000 loan from Rural Electrification Administration to Eastern New Mexico Rural Telephone co-operative had been approved. The service will be instal-led in 17 communities in Curry and Quay counties.

Andrew Chitwood, president of the telephone co-operative's board of directors, and Oliver Kimbrough, manager of Farmer's Electric cooperative, disclosed they had received word of the loan from Sen. Clinton P. Anderson.

A wire Wednesday from Claude Wickard, head of REA, confirmed the announcement.

Chitwood said the board would go to work immediately on preliminary plans to set up 1,376 miles of telephone lines for service to an expected 1.665 subscribers. However, actual work will not start for several months, Chitwood said.

"There are many legal, managerial and engineering problems to be ironed out before crews can be put to work stringing lines," he ! said, "but we are ready to go ahead as fast as we can."

The loan represents 90 per cent of the estimated cost of the project. Farmer-members of the cooperative will put up the remainng 10 per cent.

The following communities will get service of the type afforded shoe, on the birth of a son, Mon-Clovis residents: Quay county-including Forest, House, McAlister, Wheatland, Porter and the town of Quay, Curry county-Center, Pleasant Hill, Texaco, Rosedale, Broadview, Grady, Field, Melrose, Ranchvale, St. Vrain and the Blacktown



TEXAS RURAL ROAD PROGRAM

gram shows that contracts which have been let or will be let and completed by the end of 1951 will increase the total of these roads to sixteen thousand miles. These roads will be under state

The passage of the Colson-Briscoe Bill (S. B. 287) invoked the largest program in the history of road building; which program is now well pnderway. This Bill, pro-viding state funds for construc-tion of rural roads makes available one and one-fourth million dollars per month for rural roads,

maintenance

beginning in September, 1949. The funds provided by the Bill are placed in a special rural roads fund. The Highway Dapartment is charged with the responsibility of construction and maintenance of these roads. Entered New Era

The Highway Department en-tered into a new era in 1943 when organic changes in the Federal Aid Law made possible the construction of rural roads and also urban extensions within the municipal limits of the cities. It was generally recognized that the finnancing of the program under Federal Aid Funds, which were matched by the State was too slow and that other sources of revenue were needed.

The Highway Department had planned a system of some eight thousand miles of farm-to-market roads in Texas prjected upon the use of Federal Aid money, state matching funds and some county

and the needs of rural citizens so great that the previous programs scarcely made a dent in the problem. The roads that were built under the first programs, only added to the demand for more roads; for they were sturdily built dustless surfaced, all weather routes. Farmers and ranchers who had put up with years of muddy roads when it rained and dust when the sun was out, saw the farm-to-market routes and urged that they, too, should have such

Side Dressing May Be Needed In Corn Fields

COLLEGE STATION, June 19-Farmers who applied from 200 to 300 pounds of 4-12-4 or 5-10-5 fertilizer per acre on their corn land have supplied enough phosphoric acid to produce about 60 bushels of corn but only enough nitrogen to produce 15 bushels, says M. K. Thornton, extension agricultural chemist of Texas A. & M. College.

He adds if the soil was already rich in nitrogen and potash, a big per acre yield of corn can be ex-pected if weather conditions during the growing period are favorable. Growing a properly fertilized and inoculated legume crop in a regular crop rotation system is one of the best methods for adding much of the extra nitrogen that will be the extra nitrogen that will be needed by the following crop, says family of Amherst were Muleshoe Thornton. The legumes, when they

plant food to the soil but also organic matter. This in turn improves the tilth of the soil and increases its water holding capa-

If the soil does not already have the necessary nitrogen stored in it, a low per acre yield will be harvested from small yellowed stalks, he says. Such corn will not stand a

To insure a good corn yield, he suggests the use of 200 pounds of ammonia nitrate or 300 pounds of soil in the beginning of the crop

1½ cups rolled oats

1 cup shredded coconut

2 eggs, well beaten

3½ cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla

Sift flour once, measure, add soda, salt, spices, and sugar, and sift again. Add rolled oats and coconut and mix well. Combine eggs, shortening, milk, and vanilla and add all at once to dry ingredients. For cookies with a rough appearance stir batter until ingredients are just blended. Or beat well for smoother, cake-like cookies. Drop from tablespoon on ungreased baking sheet 2 inches apart. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 15 to 18 minutes. Makes about 3 dozen large cookies.
