Police Chief Talks About People That Vandalized Cisco Cemetery

"People who tear up tombstones are low life scum in my opinion," according to Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains. He added, "These are the worst kind of people. I can deal with thieves, burglars and murderers a lot better than someone like this."

The Cisco Cemetery was vandalized on March 22, according to a report from the Cisco police. Mr. Anton White, Cisco Cemetery Association president, said the vandalism occurred between 5 p.m., Tuesday, March 22, and 8 a.m., Wednesday.

The tombstone vandalism occurred in the older part of the cemetery close to the middle, according to Rains. He said most of the grave markers had hispanic names on them. The tombstones were turned over and some were broken.

Rains said they have no suspects at the present time, but they are investigating the incident. He said when the people are caught they will be charged with desecration of venerated object at the gravesite. This will be Class A Misdemeanor.

Rains said, "With this kind of destruction of a cemetery this shows what kind of people these vandals are, when they are able to do Continued On Next Page...."

Reception To Be Held For New Postmaster

Melvin Wende has been notified by the Fort Worth Management Sectional Center of the United States Postal Service that he has been promoted to Post Master at the Cisco Post Office. Wende officially took over his new position on April 1. Wende took over the job left by Wylie Cox, who was transferred to Mineral Wells last year.

Representatives from the Fort Worth office will be in Cisco Tuesday, April 5, for an installation ceremony to be held at 3:00 p.m. After the installation a reception will be held in the main lobby of the Cisco Post Office.

Everyone is invited to the installation ceremony for Mr. Wende and especially encouraged to attend the reception to be held afterward. There will be coffee, punch and snacks served during the reception.

Wende, who is a veteran of the United States Air Force, has worked for the United States Postal Service since 1976. He started working as a part time carrier in the Cisco Post Office and worked his way up to a dual appointed part time carrier and sub rural carrier. Wende said in 1980 he became a regular city carrier and in 1982 he

became the superintendent of postal operations.

Wende and his wife Lynda were both raised in Cisco and attended Cisco schools. They have two children, 11-year old Larry and 8-year old Lyle. They are members of the Redeemer Lutheran Church where Melvin is the president of the congregation and Lynda is the church secretary.

Wende said, "Becoming a Post Master has been a position I have worked for, for several years and I will perform the duties of the Cisco Post Master to the best of my ability. Our work will be for the best of the postal customers." He added, "My family and I are tickled about the promotion and I hope this works out best for the community and for my family."



From Page One ... something like this. It makes no difference whether they are kids or adults, these are the worst kind of people."

Rains said he would appreciate any information that will help lead to the arrest of the ones who damaged the cemetery. If anyone has any information they may call him at the Cisco Police Station at 442-1770.

Rains said in other matters, the Cisco Police Department had a total of 49 offense reports for the month of April. Rains said of that total, eight were criminal mischief reports, ten were burglaries, four were DWI reports, nine were for thefts, five were assaults, one unlawful carrying of a prohibited weapon, two theft of livestock, one enticing a minor, one runaway

juvenile, two harassment by one, one theft of service, one theft by deception, one desecration of a grave site and one disorderly conduct.

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Teachers Have To Be Informed Of Students With AIDS

More than 700 Texas Educators voted March 10 that teachers should have the right to know if they have students with AIDS in their classrooms. The resolution was passed at the eighth annual convention of the 45,500-member Association of Professional Educators (ATPE), the largest independent educators' association in the country.

Ruth Stewart of Cisco ISD attended the convention, which was held March 10-12 in the Corpus Christi Bayfront Plaza Convention Center.

In related action, the delegates voted down a provision stating that teachers should have the right to refuse to teach students with

AIDS, and they approved two resolutions that would require age-appropriate sex education taught by trained teachers.

The delegates also approved a resolution stating that student test scores should not be used as a part of teachers' or administrators' performance evaluations.

A highlight of the convention was the keynote address by state Sen. Carlos Truan (D-Corpus Christi) on March 11. Truan discussed the recent court ruling that Texas' school finance system is unconstitutional and proposed possible solutions to the problem. The ruling is currently under appeal.

Students Win Citizenship Award

"Our Texas forefathers had the wisdom to put the assets of Texas into education," according to Senator Bob Glasgow. He added, "Everyone says Japan has the best education system. They do have the better education for the elite children, but Texas has better education for all children." Glasgow talked to a large crowd last Thursday at the annual Rotary Club Citizenship Award Luncheon held at Tradition's Restaurant.

Jill Reynolds and Jason Phillips, seniors at Cisco High School, received the coveted Citizenship Award. Glasgow congratulated the two students and told them that education is the most important thing in this country.

Glasgow encouraged everyone not to be a Sunshine Soldier or a Summer Time Patriot. He said Texas is in bad shape right now, but everyone needs to get involved in their town. He said, "If you are living in Cisco, but not putting any effort back into the town, then you need to get involved." He urged everyone to become involved in the Chamber of Commerce, and find out what is going on at Cisco High School and Cisco Junior College. He said everyone also needs to support this great town of Cisco by shopping at home first.

Glasgow said it has not been fun to serve on the budget committee for the

State of Texas the last four years. He said Texas has lost one third of the economy from the drop in oil prices and one fifth of the economy from problems in the agriculture area.

Glasgow added that 85 percent of the state's money goes to four areas, education, highways, health care, and law enforcement. He said if the budget gets cut anymore, it will have to be from these areas.

Glasgow said that in Texas, education is equal throughout the state. He is not in favor of combining school districts. He said the state of Texas cannot keep turning criminals loose. The prison system has to be changed. He said he is in favor of changing the state's franchise tax. He said the present law has been in effect since 1902. Other areas that need to be changed are the state tax and workmen's compensation.

Eris Ritchie, Cisco Rotarian, introduced Senator Glasgow to the crowd. He said the Senator was born in Gorman, Texas and was the District Attorney for 8 years in Stephenville. Ritchie said Glasgow has been of great help several times to the community of Cisco.

Mr. Ritchie started the Citizenship Award in 1966, when he was president of the Cisco Rotary Club. Ritchie said the awards are based on meritorious conduct in cleanliness, thriftiness,

courtesy, loyalty, honesty, respect for authority, service, dependability, scholarship, sportsmanship, auto driving habits, and leadership.

Ritchie said the Rotary Club appreciated the help of Cisco High School teachers and principal Jack Martin for helping them pick a young couple for this award. Ritchie said their names will be engraved on a plaque to be placed in the trophy case at Cisco High School. Reynolds and Phillips each received a plaque from the Rotary Club. Ritchie said this country needs more students like the two who received the award.

Guest at the Rotary Club luncheon were the parents of Jill Reynolds, Bill and Patsy Reynolds. Bill is a Rotarian. Jill's grandmother, Mrs. Faye Gardenhire, and brother and sister, Van and Meg Reynolds were also at the luncheon.

"Texas" Musical Drama To Open June 15

Lightning has struck over 1,000 times at "TEXAS," the Musical Drama noted for its spectacular sound and light, creative dancing, outstanding music and unforgettable setting.

Audiences reach for umbrellas as gigantic explosions of sound vibrate in the canyon and flashes of light crackle down the 600 foot cliff to strike a huge tree in its path.

It all happens in seconds and yet for 22 summers has continued to astound over 1.8 million spectators from all over the world during performances of "Texas."

This season, the musical drama opens on June 15th and plays each evening at 8:30 p.m. except Sundays through August 27th beneath the cliffs of spectacular Palo Duro Canyon near Amarillo.

Nearly \$150,000 of the latest in sound and light technology have been added to the production to bring to life the early visions of Pulitzer Prize winning author, Paul Green.

Combined with an intriguing script and the talent of 80 actors, singers and dancers, "Texas" entices all ages and continues to draw record average audiences of over 1,600 persons each night.

Using hundreds of colorful props including a train, surrey, windmill, and horses; "Texas" winds a romantic tale of the struggles of the early farmers and cattle ranchers and how their eventual collaboration brought the railroad and prosperity to the region. Not only are the stage areas used, but the ground, rocks and cliffs behind the sets.

THE FOUNDER

"TEXAS" tells of the land and the spell it cast over the men who settled it," Margaret Harper, founder of

the show, said. In 1961 after reading in the **READER'S DIGEST** about Paul Green's outdoor dramas in other regions of the United States, Harper wrote the letter that enticed the famous writer to visit Palo Duro Canyon.

"My husband and I had lived for some time in South America and sometimes when you return to a place you see things differently," she said. "This glorious canyon was virtually unknown and closed in the evenings."

The seed was planted, and Green, intrigued by the vast 120 miles of majestic cliffs and the spirit of the people, began the script. Six years later "TEXAS" was a reality.

SPECIAL EFFECTS

Much of the innovation for the production came from Neil Hess, Director for the production and Lynn Hart, Lighting Designer and Technical Consultant.

Hess worked with Paul Green in shaping the show and has been a major force in the success of "Texas" since its beginning. He also serves as director of Dance at West Texas State University and as artistic director for the Lone Star Ballet.

In addition to his work with "Texas," Hart was a creative and design consultant for the 1980 Winter Olympic games and is an ongoing creative advisor to Disneyland since 1978.

"Texas" has the largest and most sophisticated light and sound production of any permanent outdoor show," Hart said.

Green had said, "Using sound and light, it will be possible for us in the audience to experience the blizzards they suffered, the sand storms they faced."

It is true. Hair stands on end during the thunderstorm. Tranquility falls over the crowd as birds sing and crickets chirp. A wild ballet of fire signals a prairie fire, and a realistic train rumbles across the prairie.

ON THE STAGE

The script remains virtually the same. During Paul Green's lifetime, it could be changed only by him and when a slow scene was spot-

ted, Green perfected it.

Hess changes the choreography yearly to highlight the dancer's special talents. Hess is also instrumental in the design of all costumes as they relate to motion and color on stage. No detail is left unturned.

Paul Green selected the music for "TEXAS," (though it is occasionally rearranged), and Hess uses a fifty voice choir and a small orchestra as the



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backbone for many scenes.

Cast members are salaried and come from all over the United States. Many have reached professional heights after receiving instruction with the "TEXAS" company.

SURVEYS

Mrs. Harper's gift to the Panhandle continues to draw travelers from all over the world to see "TEXAS," not just once or twice, but as many as 15 times. Surveys show that over half the audience has previously seen the production. Nearly 80% have travelled over 100 miles.

Quoting visitors from other countries, Mrs. Harper recalls that they often say, "Now I know why your country is as it is, now I understand you better."

"This," Mrs. Harper believes, "is the best praise we can receive."

"TEXAS" plays nightly except Sunday at 8:30 p.m. from mid-June through late August in the Pioneer Amphitheatre in Palo Duro Canyon State Park. In 1988 the show begins on June 15th and continues through August 27th.

An optional chuckwagon barbecue dinner is served prior to each performance from 6:30 to 8 p.m.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

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Gordon Spot

Rainfall during the past fall and early winter has not been as abundant nor as widespread as it was in 1987. Thus, the weed infestation on rangeland will not be as heavy as it was in 1987. However, weeds will be a problem in some areas. Many weeds have germinated on these areas and are present in the rosette stage. Ranchers should be encouraged to check their rangeland to determine if they have a weed infestation of sufficient density to cause reduction in grass production.

A good weed crop may benefit sheep and goat raisers. However, a weed infestation will generally reduce grass production that is needed by cattlemen.

If a rancher identifies a weed problem early, the weeds can be controlled with herbicides. Most of the annual weeds and western ragweed are easier to control with herbicides if application is made at the proper time and growth condition. With good growth conditions and plants in the early vegetative stage of growth, most annuals and western ragweed may be controlled with 2,4-D. 2,4-D amine may be used in areas receiving more than 25 inches of annual rainfall while 2,4-D low volatile ester should be used in areas with less rainfall.

Grazon PplusD (1:4 mixture of picloram - 2,4-D) and Weedmaster (1:3 mixture of dicamba - 2,4-D) are excellent weed control herbicides. They will provide good control when annual weeds and western ragweeds are in the early vegetative stage of growth. These herbicides will also provide good control when growth conditions are somewhat less than ideal and plants are in a more advanced stage of growth. The mixtures of herbicides may be obtained by mixing Banvel (dicamba) and 2,4-D or Grazon PC (picloram) and 2,4-D.

Annuals are difficult to control during and after flowering. However, certain perennial species such as bullnettle, silverleaf nightshade and perennial broomweed (broom snakeweed) are often easier to control during the flowering stage.

If mesquite control with broadcast application of liquid herbicide is planned, weed control may be obtained from the mesquite spraying operation. Grazon PC of Banvel should be used in the herbicide mixture to obtain weed control.

Certain weed species provide food and cover for some wildlife species. Herbicides may be used in a manner to leave some of the weeds for wildlife. An early application of 2,4-D will control annual

broomweed and early germinating annuals, but will allow later germinating plants such as croton and snow-on-the-prairie to survive. Also herbicides may be applied to leave untreated strips.

A weed infestation of eight or more plants per square yard can cause a significant reduction in grass production. This loss in production comes as a result of competition for soil moisture and the shading effect of weeds on grass plants. Data has been obtained through result demonstrations to document the increase in grass production resulting from weed control with herbicides. These data have shown that a pound of grass can be grown for every pound of weeds controlled. The improvement in grass cover as a result of the weed control practice also provides increased production during the year following treatment.

Proper grazing management is essential to obtain the maximum benefits from weed control. Good grazing management will also help keep a good cover of grass and reduce the possibilities of weed infestation.

For effective and efficient use of herbicides for weed control, spraying equipment should be properly calibrated and application should be made during conditions appropriate for herbicide application.

Just wanted to share this.

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

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

Pecan Grafting To Be April 8th

Pecan budding and grafting will be taught at an Eastland County Pecan Propagation Workshop Friday, April 8th. The workshop will be held in the Agricultural Building at Cisco Junior College and will be sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

The workshop will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Agriculture building, which is located on the east side of Highway 6, across from the main campus. Charles Walker, president of the association, says everyone wishing to learn how to bud and graft pecans should attend.

Dr. Larry Stein, Extension Horticulturist from Stephenville, will be the instructor. From 9:30 a.m. until noon, he will show illustrated slides along with a discussion on the techniques of budding and grafting. He will also discuss the recommended varieties of pecans for this county.

After noon, the workshop will continue in a pecan grove where demonstration will be given and participants will practice the skills of pecan grafting.

Walker says, the growers association will sell the budding and grafting wood and tape at the school. The technique of pecan grafting can be learned by anyone. Men, women and students from all areas of West and Central Texas have been trained at the workshop during the past 35 years, says De Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent.

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





Tornadoes Claim 42 Lives in Texas in 1987, Avoidance Hints Outlined

Tornadoes in the United States last year claimed 59 lives in eight states from Michigan to Texas and Florida, according to the National Weather Service.

Texas was hardest hit with the loss of 42 lives. Arkansas and Mississippi recorded six tornado deaths each, and a single death was recorded each in Alabama, Florida, Louisiana, Michigan and Minnesota.

The largest single killer tornado in 1987 nearly obliterated the small Texas community of Saragosa, killing 30 of the town's 285 residents. Half of Saragosa's victims were attending a preschool graduation ceremony in the community center.

Although tornadoes are most prevalent in Texas between April and June, they have occurred in every month. An average of 119 tornadoes occur in Texas each year.

The National Severe Storms Forecast Center in Kansas City, Missouri, issues watches to indicate when and where severe thunderstorms and/or tornadoes are most likely to occur. During watches, everyone in or near the watch area should be alert for signs of threatening weather and make preliminary plans for ac-

tion. Warnings are issued by local national weather service offices when severe thunderstorms or tornadoes are indicated by radar or reported by trained spotters or other reliable sources.

People can survive tornadoes if they heed warnings and take protective actions. The National Weather Service suggests the following tornado safety rules:

- Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls.
- Protect your head.
- In homes and small buildings, go to the basement or to an interior part of the lowest level. Closets, bathrooms and interior halls offer the best protection in many cases.
- In schools, nursing homes, hospitals, factories, and shopping centers, go to pre-designated shelter areas. Interior hallways on the lowest floor are usually best.
- In mobile homes or vehicles, leave and take shelter in a substantial structure. If there is no nearby shelter, lie flat in the nearest ditch or ravine with your hands shielding your head.

HOUSTON—From baseball statistics to the names of the stars in the sky, computers help us keep track of it all. Now computer technology makes it possible to get information right away about cancer resources in Texas.

The computerized Community Resource Directory, new from The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital's Cancer Information Service (CIS), makes it easy for cancer patients and the well public to locate cancer care and screening facilities that are nearest them.

To find out about cancer services in an area, callers need only dial 1-800-4-CANCER, toll-free in Texas, or (713) 792-3245, in Houston. Counselors are available to help callers from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Made possible by funds

provided by the Texas Cancer Council and the Texas Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs, Inc., this database contains approximately 75,000 entries that were collected from more than 2,500 agencies across the state.

"Many people are not aware of the variety of cancer-related services available in communities across Texas," says Emily Parnell, manager of M.D. Anderson's CIS.

"With the touch of a button, we can do a comprehensive search of the services available in a caller's community or anywhere in the state," she adds. "Our records reflect the latest information about the services that an agency or hospital provides."

Included in the Community Resource Directory is in-

formation about treatment facilities, financial aid, and where to get medical supplies for cancer patients.

Families and friends of cancer patients can request information about home-care assistance programs, counseling and support groups.

The directory also has information about clinics that provide exams such as the Pap smear or the mammogram—for the early detection of cancer—that will benefit the public.

The database will be updated continuously and all agencies will be surveyed annually to make sure that the information included is as current as possible. Inclusion in the database, however, is not an endorsement of any program or service. The decision about whether to take advantage of the services provided by a

resource will be up to the caller, Parnell says.

In addition, Parnell says callers can continue to call the CIS for information about the diagnosis, treatment and rehabilitation aspects of cancer. Answering more than 155,000 such requests, she adds, has been the hallmark of the CIS since its inception in 1976.

"With the initiation of this computerized system, we believe that we have taken an important step in helping to meet the public's cancer information needs," Parnell says.

Scarlet Fever

Scarlet Fever, also known as scarlatina, may sound rather ominous to some but indeed is simply a skin rash that occasionally accompanies a streptococcal infection. Strept stands for a type of bacteria called streptococcus which can cause a number of illnesses, most commonly in the throat or tonsils (strep throat) or on the skin (impetigo). The rash of scarlet fever usually begins about 24-48 hours after the onset of fever, sore throat, headache or vomiting. It often begins in the armpits, groin and neck, then becomes more widespread. The cheeks may be flushed, the area around the mouth pale, and the tongue may develop a characteristic "strawberry" appearance. After a week or so, the skin may begin to flake off and may require several weeks

to entirely clear. The rash of scarlet fever is simply a manifestation of a strept infection in the body and therefore itself is not contagious. Impetigo is actually a strept infection in the skin and therefore is contagious. Strep throat and impetigo require antibiotic therapy (usually penicillin or erythromycin). Scarlet fever will clear on its own as the strept infection resolves. Strep infections can also result in some complications several weeks after they disappear, most notably rheumatic fever and a type of kidney disease. Rheumatic fever can be largely prevented by proper treatment of the original strept infection.

If your physician treats you for a strept infection, be sure to follow his or her instructions, and take the whole course of antibiotic prescribed, usually ten days, if given by mouth.

TENS—transcutaneous electric nerve stimulation, the tiny electric "shock" that uses pain—has now been adapted by dentists. They use it to relieve post-surgical pain and to ease the pain of TMJ, temporomandibular joint syndrome.

A large dose of Vitamin E before bypass surgery limits the development of destructive particles known as free radicals, according to researchers at the Mayo Clinic. Without the supplement, Vitamin E levels fall fast after surgery.

Plastic surgeon in New York has developed a non-allergic "clay" that can be molded for more natural-looking results. It's placed under the skin and then shaped.

Two antibiotics are better than one in cases of pelvic inflammatory disease (PID), according to the Centers for Disease Control, because no one antibiotic is effective against all the organisms that cause PID.

French researchers report some success against Type 1, or "juvenile" diabetes. The disease results when the beta cells of the pancreas don't create insulin as they should. In the French test, niacinamide, a B vitamin, seemed to slow down destruction of the beta cells; a number of diabetics are in remission.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt. Appointments may be made by calling 442-3951.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Cisco on Tuesday, April 5th.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
- V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

It was entitled "Detect Tornadoes with TV or Radio." "Here's a tip for using your television set or radio to detect tornadoes when such danger has been broadcast for your area.

"Using Your Television—Warm up set and turn in Channel 13, then darken the screen to almost black, using the brightness control. Then turn to Channel 2 and then leave the volume down.

Your tornado detection device is now in operation. Lightning will produce momentary white bands of varying widths across your screen. (Color sets produce color bands.) A tornado within 15 to 20 miles will produce a totally white screen which remains white, or a screen filled with color on color sets. Should this occur, turn off your TV set, take a portable radio, and seek a place of shelter immediately.

"This system was discovered by Newton Weller of West Des Moines after 12 years of study. It works because Channel 2 on every TV set is at 55 MHz. Lightning and tornadoes generate a signal near this frequency which overrides the brightness control. Channel 13 is at the high end of the frequency band and it's not affected. This is why the darkness must be set on that channel.

"Using Your Radio—Use a portable radio for emergency instructions and in case of power failure. If the radio is turned to the 550 kHz band, lightning will cause intermittent static. A tornado will cause steady, continuous static.

"Most homes have these two warning devices. It might be well to clip these instructions and keep them on hand during tornado season."

Don't forget to set your clocks ahead one hour before you go to bed Saturday night. Daylight Savings Time goes into effect this weekend. This year's DST extends from the first weekend in April to the last weekend in October (Oct. 30).

A decision was made during the past year or so to extend DST for some additional weeks each year. In the past DST went into effect the last weekend in April.

This Sunday is also Easter. All the churches in Cisco are expecting a large crowd for the morning services. Easter is one of the major holidays that is celebrated in church.

The reason Easter is celebrated makes it the most exciting holiday in the Christian religion. And the reason for the celebration is because Christ did not have to stay in his grave after he died on the cross! This is what every Christian looks forward to, that we won't have to stay in our grave either! Death is not the end of a life! Our Precious Lord took care of that for us! I urge you to attend the church of your choice on Easter Sunday. You will receive a blessing when you do.


