The Cisco Gun Club held its first shoot of the year Saturday, starting at 11 a.m. with a kids' shoot. The youngsters are very competitive and the results are as follows:

Starting at 12 noon, the adults began their competition. The weather was nice, which always adds to the enjoyment of these activities. There were 12 adults and two youngsters who competed in the six events. The young people may compete with the adults, but do so as equals. The matches started with the pistol competition; 22 pistols followed by large pistols. These matches are shot at a 25 yard target with the highest score winning.

The .22 rifle was shot next, again the highest score wins. This target is shot at 50 yards. In the shotgun event, five clay targets are thrown, one at a time. People who have five consecutive hits shoot a sudden death type match until all competitors have missed (except the winner, of course). The large bore rifle is next with a hunter class target, shot at 100 yards. This match allows for three sighters and then

one shot of each of five individual targets with the highest total score winning. The .22 silhouette shoot is the last event. In this event, the competitors shot a total of 20 shots. (All shooting in this event is done standing with no rest or support.) There are four banks of five NRA regulation silhouettes. The first bank at 43 yards, the second at 65 yards, the third at 84 yards, the fourth at 100 yards. This is a very sporting event, especially if it is windy.

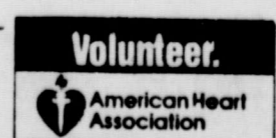

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Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

This week, April 24 - May 1, is Soil and Water Stewardship Week. The theme of this year's observance is "Stewardship Is Our Future." This focus is especially appropriate as our need for stewardship is vital if we are to maintain

the productive capabilities of our basic natural resources of soil and water. Together we must work for the good of all to utilize, conserve and properly manage those resources in our care. It is a good time for us to reflect on the na-

tion's renewable resource problems and consider actions to resolve or reduce their impact.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts have sponsored Soil and Water Stewardship Week in the United States since 1955. The decision to set aside a week each year to acknowledge before God our gratitude for His gifts of soil and all the bountiful resources associated with it has met an evident need of a great many people. This

week has become a special time to remind all people that these gifts of the Creator warrant their best in creative conservation and considerate management.

With hot, dry weather looming ahead, homeowners and others involved in landscape development should focus on water conservation.

Water conservation can be practiced in all areas of landscape development

and maintenance, including plant selection, irrigation practices and equipment, and soil preparations. These practices can be aesthetic as well as practical.

You can lower your landscape water usage in several ways:

—Use native and adapted plants. Native plants often thrive on existing growth conditions and reduce the need for extra irrigation. Many plants have been introduced that show adap-

tability to soil, rainfall, and temperature conditions.

—Take advantage of innovations in irrigation practices and equipment. The landscape irrigation business is experiencing a revolution, with new timing devices, low pressure systems, drip irrigation and other highly specialized water devices focusing on more efficient water usage. Irrigation systems and small ponds and fountains also can effectively

use water as an aesthetic addition to a landscape.

—Use mulches for insulation. By providing an insulation layer between the sun and soil, mulches prevent rapid drying and lower soil temperature in hot weather, which keeps the top soil from crusting or hardening. Low-cost materials such as hay, grass clippings, bark and pine needles are excellent for mulching and can add appeal with texture and color.

Properly prepare the soil. When soil has been loosened and improved with plenty of organic material, such as peat, pin bark or compost, it will hold significantly more moisture and release it over a longer period of time. However, organic materials break down over time and need to be supplemented.

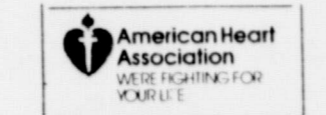
years old and over may apply by submitting an essay on why they feel they should be chosen to attend 4-H Congress. These essays must be submitted no later than Friday, May 6th.

Health care accounted for most of the welfare benefits received by residents of Eastland County during the past year, according to the recently released annual report of the Texas Department of Human Services.

"By far the largest amount of welfare money goes toward the health care of elderly and disabled Texans," said Regional Administrator Ray L. Dunavant of Abilene. "As a result, the Texas Department of Human Services is the largest purchaser of health care in the state."

For the fiscal year ending August 31, elderly and disabled residents of the county received \$4,141,176.00 in medical assistance, with \$3,132,170.00 of it going toward nursing home care and for hospital, physician and other medical services and \$ for prescription medicine.

Needy children and their families in the county received \$ in medical assistance.

Needy children and impoverished elderly or disabled individuals are the main beneficiaries of the department's programs and services.

Food stamps valued at \$804,567 put food on the tables of a monthly average of 1,457 county residents. Food stamps are redeemed like cash by local grocers. The program is 100 percent federally funded. The department pays half of the

administrative costs of determining eligibility and issuing the coupons.

Aid to Families with Dependent Children, the department's only cash grant program, distributed \$182,182 to 92 families living in poverty in Eastland County. Monthly grants average about \$57 per month for each individual, less than half of the national average monthly grant of \$122. The money is designed to help poor families pay for necessities.

The typical needy family receiving this aid consists of a mother and two children. Texas ranks 46th among the states in the size of its public assistance grants. Only Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Tennessee offer less.

State law requires the department to respond to reports of abuse and neglect of children, without regard for a family's income. In County, the department served 113 individuals in troubled families.

Reports of abuse and neglect are received through the local office of the Texas Department of Human Services or through a toll-free hotline telephone number, 1-800-252-5400.

The department took action on 5 cases of alleged AFDC and food stamp fraud in the county. Suspected fraud can be reported on a toll-free fraud hotline, 1-800-252-2526.

Mr. and Mrs. Pittman's youngest daughter, Chanda, was fatally injured in an automobile accident on January 20th of this year. Chanda was a devoted soccer player and an active member of the Comet soccer team. Darryl Adams presented Chanda's team picture and her gold medal to Mr. and Mrs. Pittman and Chelsea. This family was also presented with a stan-

ding ovation from all the parents and children in the theater. Mr. Adams announced that the Board of the Eastland County Soccer Association has voted to establish a scholarship fund in Chanda's name for children who wish to play but cannot afford all or part of the required fee. The Board has also voted to establish a memorial at the new Eastland County Soccer Complex in Chanda's name. If anyone wishes to contribute to either of these funds, they can do so by contacting Darryl Adams in Cisco at 442-2475 before 9:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Dear Editor,

In regards to Mr. O's "Guest Slot" column in the April 7th issue; I would like to make a few comments. I think it is a fine idea if enough enthusiasm can be generated. Most of that enthusiasm will have to come from the business owners; the majority of citizens are wage earners and have enough to do, to live on those wages. They really aren't going to be interested in improving business as they view that as the owners responsibility. There are some that are "civic minded" and they are pretty well known. The ideas will have to be something that will draw people in from outside the trade area. It will have to be more than just a title. Some ideas will be humorous and some serious; more than just a title. Some ideas will be humorous and some serious; more than one idea should be considered as different ideas can be used thru out the year.

Yes, of course, I have an idea. It starts off humorous, but can be built upon. First—a slogan, "Cisco... located in the heart of the Mesquite Na-

tional Forest." It's humorous, it's memorable. People are going to want to know where the national forest is, what's a mesquite tree, what's going on anyway. On the side of honoring distinguished visitors, well take a survey of the city and find out where all the Mesquite trees are. Try to get as many property owners as possible to promise to never cut them down. Have a city map with their locations plotted. Then if you want to honor someone, name one of the trees after them. Give them a map showing where the tree is located along with an official certificate. Keep an updated map in the Mobley for visitors to see that come by the Chamber of Commerce. 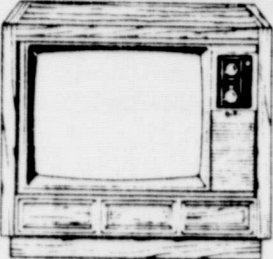

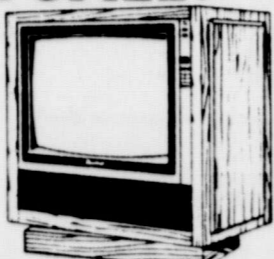

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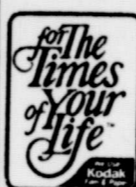

The following article appeared in the newspaper in Newcastle Upon Tyne, England. It was written by Peter Mortimer, British publisher and author, who was in Cisco recently to attend the Literary Festival at the Hilton Center. The article was entitled "Town that was robbed by Santa."

The article was as follows:
HEAD West on the lonely highways of Texas, close on one thousand miles tip to tip, through the desert scrub, the mesquite, the hot winds. Almost lost in the desert plains is the tiny town of Cisco.

It grew with the railroad and the oil boom. The trains are now few, the oil boom

over.
Cisco has less than 4,000 people, 33 churches and two claims to fame. In 1919 Conrad Hilton bought his first hotel here. The Cisco Hilton sounds an unlikely phrase; the ugly red-brick building of stunted growth, now called the Mobley, is a museum and social center, the setting for the equally unlikely literary festival this remote town is staging.

Bazaar affair
At Christmas, 1927, Santa Claus robbed Cisco's First National Bank. Eleven people were injured in the resulting shoot-out as "Santa" and his cronies made their get-away and one of the robbers was eventually dragged from the local jail and lynched.

Reading your poetry in the middle of the Texas desert is a bizarre affair. Cisco is also a "dry" town with NO SMOKING signs in the Mobley.

A funless affair? Far from it. Cisco people turn out in force for the readings.

Oscar, a black man-mountain and local institution, cooks the best beef and pork sausages and spicy sauced barbecue I have ever tasted and local historian Monte Lewis weighs in with supplies of his home-brewed (English) beer.

It's extraordinary to get such a large appreciative audience in such a place.

They are elderly, non-urbanished, yet they virtually clean me out of all remaining book stock and greet the writers with such enthusiasm as to make the readings seem almost revivalist.

My own performance is with the black American poet Eartha Coulson, a dramatic performer accompanied by her friends' strong singing voice. A sense here of the printed word uniting different cultures and countries.

Loris Essary and I are coming to the end of our freewheeling tour, heading East to our final reading destination, Temple, Texas, a relaxed cheese and wine affair to a group of creative writing students.

People hunger to learn of other cultures - witness the continual interest on this tour on the North Shields fishing book, every copy now sold.

From Temple down to Loris's home town of Austin, the State capital. We've now driven 4,500 miles, given eight readings over 19 days in eleven states, we've hit conditions from the arctic to almost sub-tropical. It's been a frantic creased suitcase of an experience, travel, performance, late nights, more travel, exhaustion and exhilaration.

The dusty Chevy has traveled mountains and deserts without a whimper and we have lived hand in glove with surprisingly few frictions.

Impressions of America whizz around the senses.

Memories of the freeways, brilliant diners, clean, fast, friendly, food international but unpretentious.

You fall in love with almost every smiling waitress and glumly recall the stone faces of English motorway cafes.

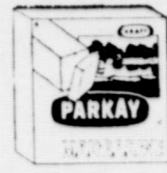

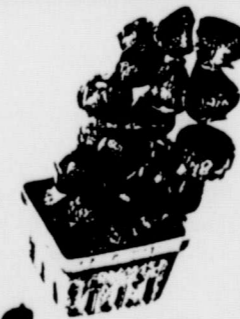
