



LOCAL FRANCHISEES CELEBRATE OPENING OF 10,000TH McDONALD'S--David, Nina, and Margaret Harmond, McDonald's franchisees in Eastland, Texas, celebrated the milestone opening of McDonald's 10,000th restaurant in Dale City, Va. on April 6. They were among 2,500 franchisees and international joint-venture partners attending McDonald's biennial owner-operator convention in nearby Washington, D.C.

McDonald's founder Ray A. Kroc opened his first McDonald's restaurant on April 15, 1955 in Des Plaines, Ill. In 1987, McDonald's worldwide sales exceeded \$14.3 billion. McDonald's serves 22 million customers each day in 49 countries. Seventy-five percent of McDonald's restaurants are locally owned and operated by independent entrepreneurs.

Free Garden Seed Available At Eastland Centennial Memorial Library

Mrs. Corbell received this "Seed Grant" for the Association as a part of the 1988 "Operation Green Plant". This is a practical effort to assist in food production for the needy.

Mrs. Corbell and Librarian Helen Osburn hope that qualified people who wish to plant the seed will come by.

The Beef Checkoff: A Report Card

Just over one year ago, agricultural history was made. One industry took control of its own future into its own hands says, Bill Brown, Co-chairman of the Eastland County Beef Referendum Steering Committee. Betty Hart is the other County Co-chairman.

On October 1, 1986, the nation's beef producers began working together on a program called the Beef Checkoff. The idea was that every single producer and importer would invest \$1 per head of cattle sold towards beef promotion, research, consumer education and advertising.

Working together, the beef industry decided to take a gamble: it would seek to reverse the decade-old decline in consumer demand for beef and to fight back against misinformation critics who claim beef is not nutritious.

The purpose of the program is simple: fight back with facts and information about beef, and thereby change consumer attitudes and help build demand.

So far, the program is working well. For starters, everyone pays -- even importers. That helps make the program fair and equitable, and it ensures that the investment is spread throughout the industry.

A common misperception among some beef producers is that Checkoff funds are mostly used for "overhead" such as offices, salaries, airline tickets, etc.

In fact, exactly the opposite is true. Beef Board administrative costs are strictly limited to 5 percent of all Checkoff dollars collected.

There is also a strong element of local control. "Up to 50 cents of every Checkoff dollar may be kept by state beef councils, where local producers can make decisions about local programs," says Brown.

Finally, the key to the program is that it is run by the producers themselves. A 113 member Beef Board oversees the program. The Board consists of representatives of every segment of the beef industry.

More than 100 Programs
A common misunderstanding is the assumption that the Beef Checkoff is primarily a program of advertising. In fact, only about half of all Checkoff dollars are used for national, regional and institutional advertising.

No one questions the fact that the advertising has the most immediate effect on consumers. In one recent study, 14 million self-described "light" beef users purchased beef more often after seeing Checkoff-funds ads.

More than \$4 million will be spent this year on research -- research that is designed to respond to questions raised by critics. One recent study helped demonstrate how beef is important as a source of iron. Other scientific studies are looking for the true facts relating to cholesterol, cutability, and safety of beef products.

Checkoff dollars fund a wide array of marketing and promotional programs that help bring consumers those facts. For example, the "Meat Nutri-Facts" kit has been distributed to more than 5,000 dietitians and 2,000 grocery locations throughout the United States. And the Checkoff has distributed more than 20,000 beef promotions displays and handouts at grocery stores as well as a series of informational videotape cassettes called "Meat Features".

Investment Dividends

Beef producers are beginning to look at the Checkoff as an investment that will pay real dollar dividends over the short and long term. And the investment is already starting to pay off.

One independent study found that consumer purchases of beef increased an average 28 percent where checkoff "point-of-purchase" materials are available. In another study, veal purchases increased as much as 32 percent as a direct result of a special veal promotion campaign in one test market.

Overall, consumer attitudes about beef are changing -- for the better. In one six month period, the number of Americans who believe beef is an important part of their diet increased from 51 percent to 56 percent.

Decision Day

On May 10th, beef producers have an important decision to make. They are being asked to vote on their future. May 10th is the day that a nationwide referendum will be held on the future of the Checkoff.

Any individual, regardless of age, who has owned cattle between October 1, 1986 and March 31, 1988, is eligible to vote. Voting will take place at the Eastland County Extension office in the basement of the Eastland County Courthouse, during normal business hours, and registration will take place in that office on the same day.

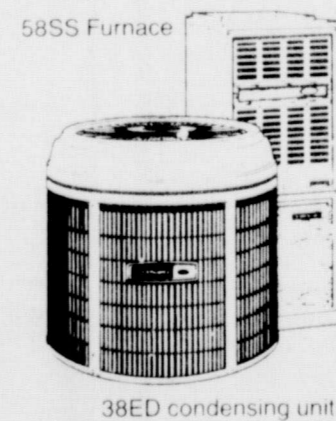

Millers Sell Abstract Co. To Corporation

The end of an era has come and the beginning of a new era is here. Eastland County Abstract Company has sold their Abstract and Title Insurance plant to Eastland County Abstract Company, Inc., Wm. F. Bowles, President.

Eastland County Abstract Company was owned by Mr. and Mrs. Earl Bender until the death of Mr. Bender in 1967. Pat Miller managed the company for a year and Mrs. Bender sold the business to

Pat and Annelle Miller on March 31, 1968. They owned the plant until March 31, 1968.

Mr. Bender was County Clerk and Mrs. Bender was manager of Texas Bonded Abstract Company when they were married in 1922. Mr. and Mrs. Bender formed Earl Bender & Co., in 1923. Between 1923 and 1944, they purchased the Texas Bonded Abstract Co. of Galveston, Texas, which was the first abstract plant that Maco

Stewart owned. Mr. Stewart formed Stewart Title Guaranty Company, which is one of the Title Insurance Companies that Eastland County Abstract Company now represents. They then bought Luckel and Darnell Abstract Co., and Eastland Abstract Co. The newly formed company was called Eastland County Abstract Company.

When Pat and Annelle Miller bought the abstract plant, they realized the need

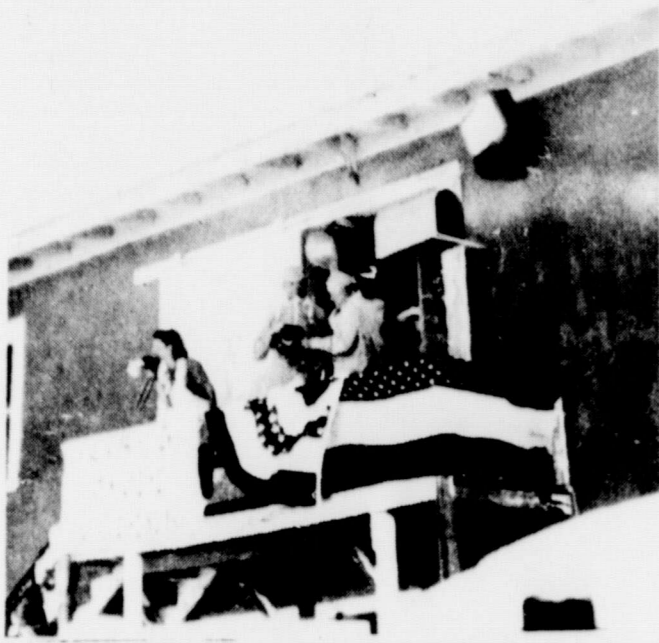

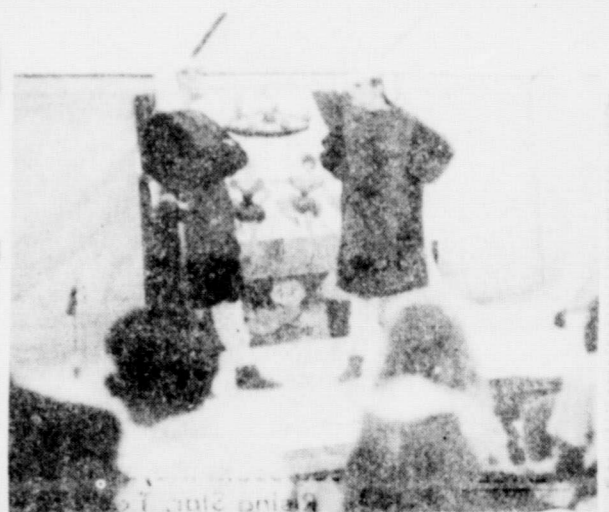

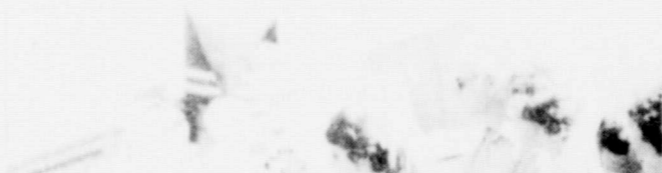

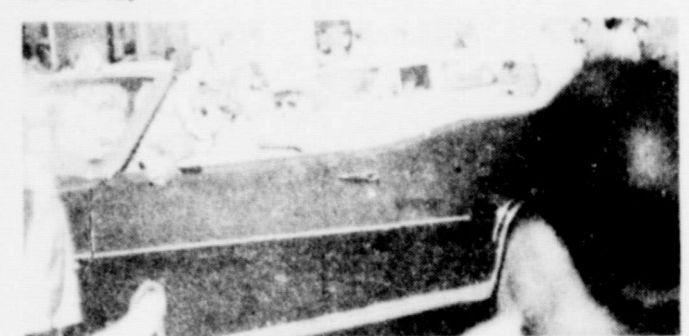

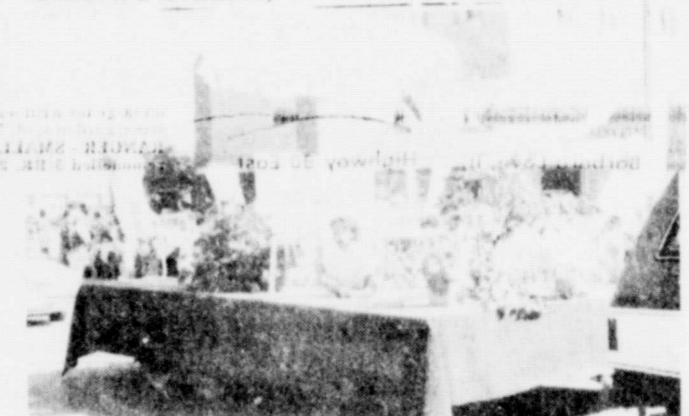

REMINDER! Voluntary Water Conservation Must Continue

The City of Cisco reminds all residents that the water level of Lake Cisco remains very low and that the city's voluntary water conservation ordinance is still in effect. During this hot and particularly dry weather, everyone must be more cognizant of their water consumption and help eliminate waste and unnecessary water use. "In order for our conservation efforts to be truly effective, it is imperative that everyone recognize the situation and cooperate," according to City Manager Mike Moore.

The voluntary water conservation program means that lawn and garden watering is restricted to two days a week -- Tuesday and Saturday, from 1 A.M. until 12 Noon. It also requires our residents to fix water leaks as quickly as possible; not allow water to run down the gutter; hand-water whenever possible; and generally eliminate the needless waste of water.

The City asks that the people of Cisco work together in order to conserve our precious resource of water. Necessity requires that the City definitely frown on flagrant violators of the voluntary water consumption program, because if the voluntary program is not successful, the City would have no choice but to consider mandatory water curtailment which could include higher water rates.

As we head toward the hot summer months, please keep our water conservation program in mind and eliminate the waste of our water!

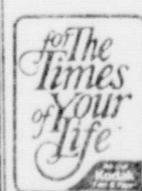

Jurors Can Not Discuss Parole Eligibility During Sentencing

Jurors aren't permitted to discuss parole eligibility during sentencing deliberations — but it isn't against the law for them to know some basic facts before serving. Discussing it during deliberations can result in a mistrial, officials report, but knowledgeable jurors who know the current Texas Department of Corrections procedures concerning

parole might make more intelligent decisions, some hold. A State Senate bill reduced the amount of time prisoners must serve from one-third to one-fourth, and a recent House bill reduced the amount of good conduct time inmates can earn. Both laws become effective Aug. 31, 1987. As it now stands, accor-

ding to a Parole Officer speaking to the Eastland County Law Enforcement Association recently, a person who goes to T.D.C. on a 60-year sentence and does not earn trusty status through cooperative participation, will serve nine years. The same 60-year sentence for a cooperative prisoner could be as little as six and a half years.

A one-year cooperative prisoner could be out in one month and nine days; a non-cooperative one-year prisoner, one month and 24 days.

A non-cooperative five-year prisoner could serve nine months; a cooperative five-year prisoner, six months and 15 days.

Crowded conditions at the state prison units are bringing about the early paroles, the official pointed out. The speaker further pointed out that of the total admissions to TDC, 58.2 per cent are first time offenders. Returning offenders (41.8 percent), are made up of those with prior incarcerations and parole violators.

Of the first time entrants, 26.8 per cent have no prior criminal history and 31.4 per cent are probation violators, either from probation rule violations (15.5 per cent) or new offenses (15.9 per cent).

A local official says that he uses a rule of thumb of ten per cent, for the amount of a sentence that a convicted person will actually serve. Reasons for revocation of probation including absconding, failure to pay, failure to report, association (with criminal elements), and other.

Convictions for new offenses resulted in the highest number of revocations for admissions: 34 per cent on probation violations and 71 per cent for parole violations. The accompanying chart help explain the current operating procedures for TDC confinements.

County Treasurer Attends Conference

COLLEGE STATION--Ruth Pugliese Hart joined some 200 other elected officials for the 16th Annual County Treasurers' Seminar at Texas A&M University, April 18-21. The program is designed to educate county treasurers on a wide range of responsibilities to include

investments, cash management, record keeping, reporting and disbursements of county funds. Participation in this seminar enables county treasurers to achieve and maintain certification as required by state law. The seminar commenced with a legislative hearing on

April 18. Members of the House Committee on County Affairs heard testimony from numerous county officials on issues affecting the office of county treasurer. The interim charges of this House Committee include possible reorganization of the structure of county

government and the possible abolition of the county treasurer's office.

Ruth Hart explained, "The treasurer is the chief financial officer for the county whose function should remain separate from those of the auditor." In most counties where the office of county treasurer has been abolished, the responsibilities were given to the county auditor. "This eliminates the checks and balance concept which is vital for a sound financial operation within the county," explained Ruth Hart.

County treasurers who successfully complete the four-day training receive twenty (20) hours of continuing education credits from Texas A&M University. The annual seminar is one of the educational programs sponsored by the V.G. Young Institute of County Government, a part of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

WEAK BEER
American television, tite and endless, a warning to our own "progress"; American politics, a ludicrous eternal pantomime to elect a new President, the razmatazz undermined by the (mainly) dull transparent candidates dragging their platitudes nationwide; American highways, a breath of air after our choked motorway, their drivers as calm and even tempered as our own are churlish; American beer freezing, weak, to a degree that suggests no alcohol content whatsoever. Plus the dreaded "lite" beer inexplicably weaker still. American pride, which via a new national magazine and cosmetic television series is now rewriting the Vietnam defeat into something honorable; American newspapers, fat, serious, often colourless and over given to syndicated columnists with little local connection.

Freewheeling around America, that sense of hugely diverse culture; Red Indian to Protestant work ethic, a vast melting pot of nationalities which somehow is one. For despite its troubles, the USA is undeniably one nation, a single identity inside which are celebrated a whole variety of different ones.

It is this aspect of unity which the other giant, the USSR, must envy — witness the Soviet's desperate, often unsuccessful attempts to coerce some of its far-flung republics to "think themselves" Soviets first and foremost.

The USA is a spoilt, generous people, blindly consuming alarming amounts of the world's resources. Their genuine affection for the British and sense that we have something to offer them often flatters our own jaded capabilities.

They are a nation whose distorted image world-wide, is via the mass culture forms of film and television, uncritical art forms which over the decades have created a potent illusion, a USA which exists mainly in the fertile imaginations of the image makers themselves.

This clinging to a dream is a powerful motivation though. Where else but this maddening fascinating place could supreme power be handed over to a B-movie ac-

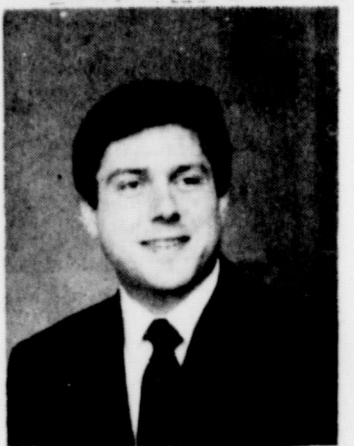
