Thursday will be the 95th anniversary of the cyclone that virtually destroyed the town of Cisco at 9 p.m., April

28, 1893. More than 20 persons lost their lives in the storm and a number more died as a result of inuries suffered that night. Newspapers stories written about the tragedy said that every building in the little community of Cisco was either destroyed or seriously damaged, including every church building that was standing in the town at that

On the night of the great storm, the cows came running home early as the winds began to gather. The sky was one of the blackest ever recorded, but when the storm was over, the moon came out to bathe the wrecked town in beautiful moonlight.

By Sunday morning, April 30, the town was jammed with people, some who had come out of curiosity and some who had come to help clear away the debris and care for the stricken. Neighboring towns sent work crews, food, clothing and other supplies to help the people of Cisco start back up the road to recovery.

Quoting from an account written in a 1952 issue of The Cisco Press, by the late Mr. R.W. (Bob) Mancill, who was one of the witnesses of the storm, "There was about 23 people killed outright and some 15 more died later of injuries received during the storm. It came from the west and was furious while it lasted. A terrific rain came with the storm. Had the cyclone arrived Tuesday night instead of Friday night, the death list might have totalled 1,000 as the famous Cisco Silver Cornet Band gave a free concert in the opera house Tuesday night. This building was a 2-story stone structure.

'We had borrowed a piano for the occasion, but could

not find ever one of the keys. J.W. Carter, from whom the piano was borrowed, would not let us pay him for it. His home was also destroyed, and the piano would have gone with the wind anyway.

'After the storm passed we got together and began a search for the injured and dead. I was one of four that went to the est side first. We first located Mrs. William Knight, who was so badly injured that she died while the doctor was working with her. We carried her to Martin Drug Store.

'We returned to the east side and found Dave Cameron dead. We carried him to the store of John F Patterson which was located where the Reynolds Building

now stands "We started out again and heard a terrible roaring in the south part of town, and when we investigated we found that it came from West 12th street. We all went into the house and found out that it was Fred Grist who was only three days old. We

'Several people have asked me which building were the Hickman children in when they were killed. The five Hickman children were killed in the stone building at 417 Avenue D. They had a store in front of the building and lived in the back. They were all in bed at the time, and their parents were biown a number of yards east and were not killed.

"On Saturday and Sunday all frieght trains through here were lined with people on top of the cars and the town was full of sightseers.

'We got our water then from Twin Lakes, and J.V. Smith, the pumper, kept pumping all night, not knowing that there had been a storm. The storage tower

City Of Cisco Reminds **Everyone Not To Post** Signs On Telephone Pole

On September 9, 1986, the City Council passed an ordinance prohibiting the posting of signs on utility poles and public property. important ordinance and please do not attach these unattractive garage/sale signs, for sale, etc. signs to utility poles or public property within the city limits. Regrettably, there will be no choice but to prosecute repeat violations of the ordinance, and a fine of up to \$200.00 could be assessed if found guilty.

Just over one year ago, agricultural history was made. One industry took control of its own future into its own hands says, Bill Brown, Co-chairman of the Eastland County Beef Referendum Steering Committee. Betty Hart is the other County Co-chairman.

On October 1, 1986, the nation's beef producers began working together on a program called the Beef Checkoff. The idea was that every single producer and importer would invest \$1 per head of cattle sold towards beef promotion, research, consumer education and advertising

Working together, the beef industry decided to take a gamble: it would seek to reverse the decade-old decline in consumer demand for beef and to fight back against misinforn ed critics who claim beef is not nutritious

The purpose of the program is simple: fight back with facts and information about beef, and thereby change consumer attitudes and help build demand.

So far, the program is working well. For starters, everyone pays - even importers. That helps make the program fair and equitable, and it ensures that the investment is spread throughout the industry.

A common misperception among some beef producers is that Checkoff funds are mostly used for "overhead" such as offices, salaries, airline tickets, etc.

In fact, exactly the opposite is true. Beef Board administrative costs are strictly limited to 5 percent of all Checkoff dollars collected.

There is also a strong element of local control. "Up to 50 cents of every Checkoff dollar may be kept by state beef councils, where local producers can make decisions about local programs,' says Brown.

Finally, the key to the program is that it is run by the producers themselves. A 113 member Beef Board oversees the program. The Board consists of representatives of every segment of

the beef industry. More than 100 Programs

A common misunderstanding is the assumption that the Beef Checkoff is primarily a program of advertising. In fact, only about half of all Checkoff dollars are used for national, regional and institutional advertising.

No one questions the fact that the advertising has the most immediate effect on consumers. In one recent study, 14 million selfdescribed "light" beef users purchased beef more often after seeing Checkoff-funds





As we head toward the hot summer months, please keep our water conservation program in mind and eliminate the waste of our







County Commissioners Hear About Delinquent Tax Collection - Other Matters

Eastland County Commissioners heard a report Monday from an Austin-based firm which collects Delinquent Taxes for the County.

Appearing during the regular meeting was Dan Jones and Attorney Shelburn Veselka, representing the firm of Jones, McCreary, Veselka, Beck and Allen.

They discussed tax collection for previous years, and answered questions from County Judge Scott Bailey and the Commissioners.

Veselka reported that Delinquent Collections were up in Eastland County. He gave the following figures.

1984 - \$25,0001985 - \$63,0001986 - \$80,000

1987 - \$90,000So far in 1988 the group has collected \$30,000. These figures are based on calendar years instead of fiscal years. The firm is paid 15%, of all monies collected.

Veselka said he did not have the figures on taxes still uncollected, for this data was being put in Courthouse computers right now. Nancy Trout, County Tax Collector estimated that \$250,000 was delinquent, however.

The Attorney reported that his group had filed 152 cases for court action during the last several years. They are also selling abandoned and vacant property, and that with heavy delinquency. A number of notices are required by law before this can be done. At this time the firm is in the process of researching mineral titles to determine who owns some of this property

Veselka described the program of delinquent tax collection as "active, ongoing," and "going quite well.

Judge Bailey asked him if

the firm could provide updated lists of delinquent suits to the Commissioners, keeping them better informed.

Commissioner Norman Christian, Pct. 2, asked if the firm could give out more specific information to the public on property that was

Veselka replied that the firm would do what they could on both of these re-

of Pct. 1, asked about delinquent parcels which no one had bid one, and which were being held in a trust capaci-

Veselka replied that the owner had a two-year redemption period in which he could reclaim the land by

half miles south of the Pleasant Hill Church, which is nine miles south of Cisco. Bacon said that he felt sure a heavy load had caused it to go under, due to the manner in which it was reported.

Someone called Bacon on the phone to report that the bridge was out, and when Bacon asked who was calling the man said "I'm sure not going to give you my name,' and then hung up.

Traffic was diverted around the collapsed bridge, and construction begun on a new bridge immediately. A new 16 x 24 ft. bridge was completed by Friday.

One of the items on the agenda concerned the setting up of Rural Firefighting Districts in the county. In this plan, people who live outside the city limits of the towns would be assessed about three percent per \$100 valuation to pay for the fighting of fires in their

areas. Commissioner Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, said that the cities are now paying the major portion of firefighting all over the county.

"With the loss of Revenue Sharing money, something needs to be done to provide equipment," he said.

Other discussions centered around the use and application of compensatory time (Comp Time) to comply with Federal Wage and Hour laws. The Commissioners hope an Official from the Wage and Hour Division office will be able to meet with them soon and explain more about these complicated regulations.

Ray Pruitt, County Auditor, told the Commissioners that when work begins on another budget all need to take special note of revenues as well as expenditures. The County revenues are down at this time, he said, yet in a case or two County offices are over budget.

After considering more budgetary matters the Commissioners adjourned



County Commissioners Hear About Delinquent Tax Collection - Other Matters

Eastland County Commissioners heard a report Monday from an Austin-based firm which collects Delinquent Taxes for the County.

Appearing during the regular meeting was Dan Jones and Attorney Shelburn Veselka, representing the firm of Jones, McCreary, Veselka, Beck and Allen.

They discussed tax collection for previous years, and answered questions from County Judge Scott Bailey and the Commissioners.

Veselka reported that Delinquent Collections were up in Eastland County. He gave the following figures.

1984 - \$25,0001985 - \$63,0001986 - \$80,000

1987 - \$90,000

So far in 1988 the group has collected \$30,000. These figures are based on calendar years instead of fiscal years. The firm is paid 15% of all monies collected.

Veselka said he did not have the figures on taxes still uncollected, for this data was being put in Courthouse computers right now. Nancy Trout, County Tax Collector estimated that \$250,000 was delinquent, however.

The Attorney reported that his group had filed 152 cases for court action during the last several years. They are also selling abandoned and vacant property, and that with heavy delinquency. A number of notices are required by law before this can be done. At this time the firm is in the process of researching mineral titles to determine who owns some of this property.

Veselka described the program of delinquent tax collection as "active, onand "going quite well

Judge Bailey asked him if

the firm could provide updated lists of delinquent suits to the Commissioners, keeping them better informed.

Commissioner Norman Christian, Pct. 2, asked if the firm could give out more specific information to the public on property that was to be sold for back taxes.

Veselka replied that the firm would do what they could on both of these re-

Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, asked about delinquent parcels which no one had bid one, and which were being held in a trust capaci-

Veselka replied that the owner had a two-year redemption period in which he could reclaim the land by paying back taxes.

After considerable discussion on taxes, the Commissioners turned to jail matters. Comm. Billy Bacon, Pct. 4, reported that 22 prisoners were currently in the County Jail, with four men and four women waiting to be transported to the State Department of Corrections.

Bacon also reported on another matter. He said that last Thursday a rural bridge collapsed about two-and-onehalf miles south of the Pleasant Hill Church, which is nine miles south of Cisco. Bacon said that he felt sure a heavy load had caused it to go under, due to the manner in which it was reported.

Someone called Bacon on the phone to report that the bridge was out, and when Bacon asked who was calling the man said "I'm sure not going to give you my name,' and then hung up.

Traffic was diverted around the collapsed bridge, and construction begun on a new bridge immediately. A new 16 x 24 ft. bridge was completed by Friday.

One of the items on the agenda concerned the setting up of Rural Firefighting Districts in the county. In this plan, people who live outside the city limits of the towns would be assessed about three percent per \$100 valuation to pay for the fighting of fires in their

areas. Commissioner Richard Robinson, Pct. 1, said that the cities are now paying the major portion of firefighting all over the county.

"With the loss of Revenue Sharing money, something needs to be done to provide equipment," he said.

Other discussions centered around the use and application of compensatory time (Comp Time) to comply with Federal Wage and Hour laws. The Commissioners hope an Official from the Wage and Hour Division office will be able to meet with them soon and explain more about these complicated regulations.

Ray Pruitt, County Auditor, told the Commissioners that when work begins on another budget all need to take special note of revenues as well as expenditures. The County revenues are down at this time, he said, yet in a case or two County offices are over budget.

After considering more budgetary matters the Commissioners adjourned.







In fact, the TPWD has combined application forms for Big Fish awards, state records, lake records and the lunker catch and release program into one handy

If you catch a fish you believe qualifies for a big fish award, you need only to complete the application form, weigh the fish on a scale certified for trade by the Texas Department of Agriculture, obtain the signature of two witnesses to the weighing and send the application to TPWD Headquarters, 4200 Smith School

Road, Austin, TX, 78744. The person applying for the certificate must have hooked, fought and landed the fish without assistance.

Species eligible for big fish awards, and the required minimum weights are: spotted seatrout, 7 pounds; blackdrum, 35 pounds; southern flounder, 6 pounds; largemouth bass, 8 pounds; king mackerel, 30 pounds; red snapper, 20 pounds; smallmouth bass, 4 pounds; spotted bass, 4 pounds; crappie, 3 pounds; white bass, 3 pounds; striped bass, 15

pounds; hybrid striped bass, 8 pounds; channel catfish, 12 pounds; blue catfish, 35 pounds; flathead catfish, 50 pounds; walleye, 6 pounds; rainbow and brown trout, 2 pounds; and sunfish, 1 pound. Other species may be considered when appropriate.

Channel catfish fishing continues to improve at Lake Montice!lo near Mount Pleasant.

Biologist Mark A. Webb said creel and cove rotenone sampling indicate catfish populations have expanded since 1983, and continue to be basically under-utilized by anglers. "Our winter creel data show that only six percent of fishing pressure was directed at catfish, but channel cats made up more than half the total catch," said Webb, pointing out that most anglers were seeking largemouth bass.

"Channel catfish fishermen catch well over 10 times more catfish per hour of effort than bass fishermen catch bass per hour," Webb continued. He said the good catfish angling was noted in all areas of the lake and at all hours of the day and night.

Cove rotenone surveys show a continual increase has occurred, from 10.6 pounds of catfish per acre in 1983 to 55.1 pounds per acre in 1987, Webb said.







What will you pay for gasoline? That is not a question connected with the price of oil so much as what you might be WILLING to pay if you had to. As we are not in this world alone, we should understand that

what others have done and will do bear on the answers. Even when oil was at \$2.35 a gal., the people in Europe paid as much as ten times what we did for gasoline. The difference was almost entirely TAX. You can bet that crude prices won't change the bite government takes out of us. The old economics teaching that price is determined by supply and demand neither fits monopoly nor tax situations except that when they get too greedy, the public, if they are smart

enough, find alternatives. But since many believe that the economy of Texas depends on oil, it might be a good idea to look at the indications for the future. Will we see \$36 crude in the near future? Not unless the dollar becomes worth far less than at present.

The North slope fields have hardly been tested let alone put into full production. North Sea production is no longer pushed because of lower prices. The expected fields around the Falkland Islands have yet to see the first well but for expectation of that production Britain fought a war. Russia expects to continue getting her share of world markets even if it means cutting into Arctic fields claimed by U.S., Canada, and Norway. Then there are the talked-of vast fields in the

China Sea. Thus, if a company big enough to finance the super deep discoveries in Eastland County should hit it they might well sit on it and await depletion of existing fields to make it more profitable. Pessimistic as I may seem, I simply cannot expect any great upsurge in the economy based on crude oil. The boom has busted and the key to profitable crude production lies in more efficient methods of squeezing out what is

already tapped.

Meanwhile, the price at the pump cannot be boosted above present levels without creating competition from alternative fuels made from unmarketable agricultural products. The present price is only slightly below the cost of alcohol fuel now but cheaper corn and milo could crowd that cost down. Lube from soy and caster beans has been claimed superior in quality but not price. The farmer no longer fuels his power with home grown hay and grain but he should never be counted out of the calculations. Biomass gas from feed lots is already an economic reality and alcohol waits in the wings with claims of less air pollution and longer engine life. The only "get rich quick" oil business from here on will be more of the crooked speculation of recent years with the number of

available suckers greatly reduced. Some uninformed people talk of how much oil the Saudi Arabs PUMP but with our stripper fiends we are in fact in competition with Saudi production which FLOWS for the most part and they do not have the expense of pumping.

While the Arabs engage in an almost frantic effort to bring

their nations up to modern standards they face long range

depletion like we have experienced but don't hold your breath waiting for it to revive our economy. Any increase I expect in fuel prices will probably come, you guessed it, from taxes. Meanwhile the alternate energy program by which government poured vast sums from your tax dollars into the coffers of Gulf, Exxon and other super rich outfits determined to control our fuel business regardless of source has receded into the dust of history only to be re-run at some far future date for higher tax supported largesse. There was never in fact an honest drive to market alternative fuels last time but I can

Remember when lead arcenate was queen of the arcenicals but it was the arsenic part of that insecticide we feared? For a century or so the mixture of lead and zinc oxides made thing white and clean looking. Those pigments had 'blooming qualities' which produced superior coverage. Now what happened to lead paint? Enough lead could be absorbed through the skin, ingested with their lunch from slight smears on the hand or at the edge of the mouth that before many years as a painter they had "painters colic", a form of lead poisoning accompanied with violent stomach cramps. Only whiskey gave relief and almost without exception the old time painters were alcoholics, drunks they called them AT THAT POINT IN TIME. But what caused the elimination

of lead paint after all those years? From 1969 to '76 an ancient Roman grave yard in England was checked. All the skeletons contained ten times the normal lead content, even the children. Then someone versed in both Roman medical problems and familiar with the symptoms of lead poisoning made a mental connection. Romans were prowd of their water supplies which came mostly through lead pipes, they drank from lead cups, cooked in lead pots and even sweetened wine with lead oxide. The head aches, listlessness, deformed limbs, mental-retardation and sterility which plagued Romans as their empire declined became more obvious. Yet AT THAT POINT IN TIME lead was not considered hazardous at all.

In fact, it has only recently been suggested that water from copper pipes shoud be let run a while in order to flush out any lead which might have dissolved into it when standing at soldered joints. And what about the joints in tin cans which used to be sealed with lead solder? Well, even AT THAT POINT IN TIME we were being advised not to let food set in cans once opened.

Could we have been much smarter and healthier if we had known? Maybe I am not really as lazy as I seem. Maybe it is lethargy brought on by lead I accumulated long ago. At least it is the best excuse I can offer for the lead in the seat of my

pants AT THIS POINT IN TIME.



Diabetic Summer Camp Scheduled

Every summer, over 300 young people between the ages of six and eighteen attend a very exclusive camp near Gainesville. The entrance requirements are strict: the child must have diabetes.

Too often, regular summer

camps turn away a child with diabetes because of their special diets and medical needs. But Camp Sweeney, organized over 35 years ago, is a place for the diabetic to learn while having fun. All of the activities of regular summer camp are offered: horseback riding, swimming, boating, fishing, arts and crafts, riflery and many more spots, plus movies, dances and carnivals in the evenings. Sandwiched between the fun things are interesting sessions on medical and dietary information to help the

campers take care of themselves and learn to live productive lives with their

affliction under control. Diets are formulated according to each individual's needs, giving the diabetic valuable examples of how to exchange foods to include an occasional "treat" so he won't feel left out around his friends at home.

Located on rolling wooded acreage 10 miles northeast of Gainesville, the site is bordered on the south by a 34-acre lake. Three, threeweek sessions are held every summer, with the opening session scheduled for June 5. Others begin on June 26 and July 17. A medical staff and experienced counselors are always present and keep a close eye on the campers in a one-to-four ratio, many of them former campers themselves.

The camp is a United Way agency, and scholarships are available for any child whose family is unable to pay the full session's fee. No child is turned away because of race, regligion, or national origin.

Established in 1950, Camp Sweeney was the first educational and recreational training center in the South for children with diabetes mellitus. Thousands of youngsters are living a selfsufficient, healthy life due to their training at Camp Sweenev
