County Jail Passes State Inspection

The Eastland County Jail passed the annual state inspection on Wednesday, March 30, earning a certificate of compliance. Robert Dearing, inspector with the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, listed no deficiencies in the 24-bed facility. The building was constructed in 1980. During state inspections in 1986 six, and in 1987 nine items were found to be defi-

cient. In December 1986 the county was ordered to remedy overcrowding. Last March the Jail was in danger of being closed because of defective wiring, and the inter-com system. Judge Scott Bailey, County Commissioners and other officials have met with the State Jails Commission in Austin, a number of times to discuss the problem of non compliance.

The Commissioners have allocated money for various repairs, including the electrical system, plumbing improvements, and up-dating of the inter-com system.

Last Monday the Commissioners finalized the purchase of property adjoining the Jail for possible expansions.

Cisco And Eastland To Purchase Emergency Alert Cable System

City of Cisco council members approved the interlocal contract agreement with the city of Eastland regarding joint ownership of a Cablevision Emergency Alert System at their regular meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall. In the agreement Cisco and Eastland will jointly purchase a cable TV override emergency alert system. Eastland shall own one half and Cisco will own the other half. The emergency alert system shall be installed and located in Eastland at the office of the TCI Cablevision of Texas, Inc. City Manager Mike Moore told council members in case of an emergency, such as a tornado or other natural disaster, authorized personnel will be able to dial a certain telephone number, and break into every cable television station on the air and broadcast the emergency.

Moore said this will be the best way to warn people of an emergency, since 80 percent of the citizens in Cisco and Eastland are cable viewers. Moore said there has to be a confirmed tornado sighting before the emergency alert system can be used. Moore said the city will still activate the sirens in case of such an emergency. As of the end of March, the City of Cisco has completed one half of the fiscal year, according to Mike Moore, in the city manager's report. Moore told the council the City of Cisco did not spend an excess amount of money during the month of March. He said the April report will

be a little different. Moore said the city had to spend money in April to fix the water leak on Highway 6, and to buy two police cars. Moore told the council he is glad the city had the cash on hand for these needs. Moore said the city had collected 50 percent of the 1987-88 budget estimate from water sales, sewer fees and interest earned. Moore said the city had spent 46 percent of the 87-88 budget appropriations by the end of March. Moore told the council the City of Cisco collected \$12,015.86 in delinquent taxes. This amount includes the penalties and interest on these delinquent taxes. Moore said the city is still willing to go into a monthly payment agreement with individuals who owe the city of Cisco past due taxes. Moore told the council in the city manager's report

that the dog catcher's hours have been changed. The dog catcher now has more hours to do his job. Moore said the catcher's job will be more effective with these changes. Moore told the council the waste water lagoon is working properly now. He said the recent trouble was caused by a water turnover that can happen with a temperature change. Moore said the water has turned itself back around and now the city will have to work to control algae growth. Moore also told the council the city is in the process of building a softball field south of Rylee Field on Avenue B. Moore said the field will be strictly for fun and pleasure. He said this is one of the projects the city has that will have to be worked on a little at a time. Moore said the city will have a pretty nice ball field there in the near future. Moore said the city of Cisco will start on seal coating the streets soon. He said the city will keep seal coating the streets until the money set aside for this job runs out. Moore said the city has ordered pipe and they have the manhole rings to begin the work to extend the sewer line so they can connect Lee's Truck Service to the line. Moore said this work will begin soon. Mayor Joe Wheatley told Moore, "The city of Cisco employees have done a fine job of hauling the trash and leaves off during the clean up campaign. It has certainly helped the city of Cisco look better." Moore told the council members the city of Cisco are very fortunate to have the employees they have now. Moore said they all work together as a team.

The couple are at home in Hurst, Texas.

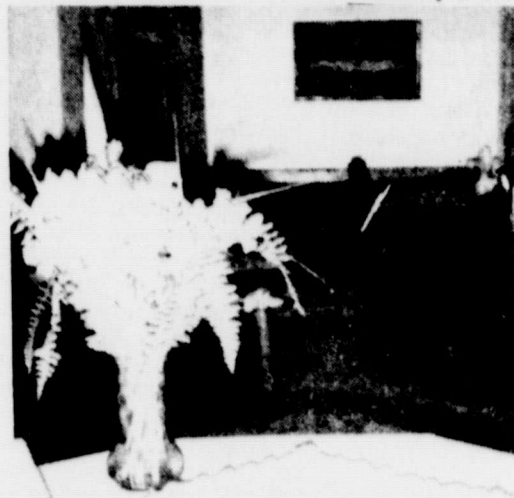

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent

Families spend numerous hours a week doing laundry and ironing. This week I received some research information that I find personally helpful and will pass on to you.

SETTING DYES:

There are a variety of "home remedies" for setting dyes in fabrics. Did you know that none of them is effective?

The two most popular methods recommend using salt water or vinegar. These methods probably have their origins in the old dyeing processes where salt was used in the dyeing procedures for cotton and linen, and vinegar was used during the dyeing of wool.

The University of Nebraska recently investigated a variety of these treatments. They researched the effectiveness of salt and washing soda; salt and vinegar; salt vinegar and alum; Epsom salts; salt; and a detergent prewash.

None of the treatments were effective. Some actually increased the amount of color loss in the fabrics following laundering. Home dye-setting treatments, although widely recommended, do not work.

PERFORMANCE OF COMBINED DETERGENT/FABRIC SOFTENER

This research compared the effectiveness of separate fabric softeners and detergent/softener combinations on a 100% cotton terycloth fabric. The fabrics were tested after the first and fifth launderings for wicking and soft hand. The results show that, while using detergent with fabric softener may be more convenient, this combination is not effective in softening the fabric. Separate fabric softeners were found to be effective in keeping the fabric soft to the touch.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Fish is one of Texas greatest natural resources. High in nutrition and low in calories, fish is a wonderful food to prepare.

SPICY BAKED FISH

3 pounds of fish fillets or small pan-dressed fish
1 1/2 teaspoons paprika
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/4 teaspoon onion powder
3 tablespoons melted diet margarine
Lemon wedges

Cut fillets into 1 1/2 inch strips. Combine dry ingredients in a shaker. Sprinkle fish with dry mixture. Arrange on prepared baking sheet. Drizzle with margarine and bake at 350° for 10 minutes per inch of fish thickness. Serve with lemon wedges and Fisherman's tartar sauce.

FISHERMAN'S TARTAR SAUCE

1 cup of "lite" mayonnaise
1/2 cup plain yogurt
2 tablespoons chopped dill pickle
2 tablespoons minced onion
2 tablespoons chopped pimiento-stuffed olives
1 teaspoon lemon juice
Dash pepper
Combine all ingredients and chill. Makes 2 cups sauce.
