Sue Lacy, president of the Cisco Service Club said the deadline was extended so more young women will have a chance to apply for the scholarship.

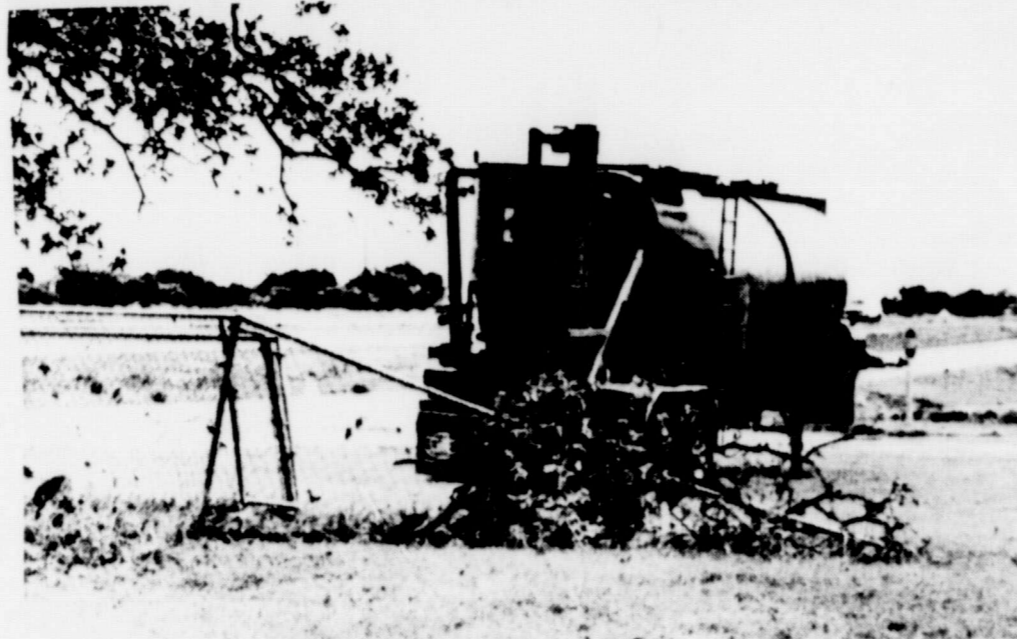
The scholarship was set up by the Service club in memory of Sue Witzsche, who was a devoted Service club member and an active community worker. The scholarship was set up in 1977.

Applications are being accepted from young ladies who have lived in Cisco for at least one year. The applicant can be a high school senior or someone who has been out of high school for awhile.

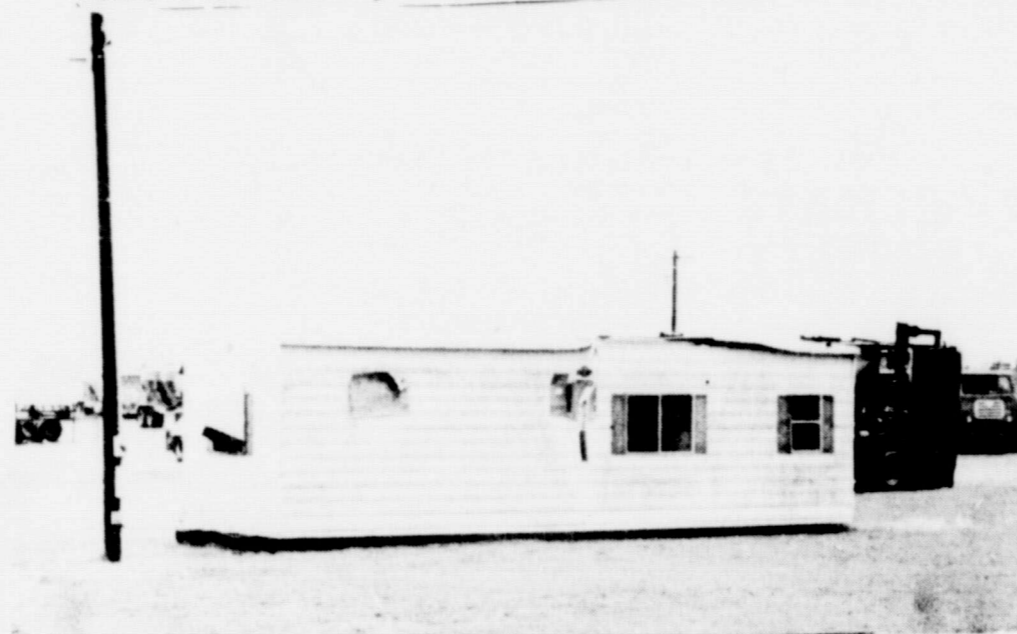

## No Heavy Damage Reported By Cisco Tornado Last Friday

A tornado touched down on the outskirts of Cisco causing damage on the Troy Hightower property last Friday evening around 6:45 p.m. The Hightowers live on the I-20 Access road about 1 mile east of the Cisco city limits.

Gaye Hightower said her husband, Troy and their two children, Vonda a junior at Cisco High School, and Corey a 7th grade student were at home when they notice dirt in their front yard began flying straight up. She said when they saw that, they went into the basement.

The tornado described as being 100 foot wide, destroyed their TV antenna and picked up their lawn furniture in front of the Hightower home and dropped it in the pasture behind their home. An old refrigerator in the back of their home was also picked up and dropped in the pasture.

Mrs. Hightower said most

of the tornado damage was in the pasture. She said there was a mesquite tree in the pasture that was twisted off at the trunk. The tree was about 20 inches thick. She said two other trees were also uprooted.

A storage building next to the Hightowers at Fleet Cemeteries was damaged by the tornado. Roofing on the building was torn off by the force of the storm.

Robert Rains, assistant manager at Thrift Mart, was the first to call in and report the tornado to the Cisco Fire Department. Rains said he stepped outside the store and saw the tornado. Rains said after he reported the tornado, he went back outside and watched it until the tornado dissipated.

Truet Horton, Cisco Fireman, said a woman who was coming into Cisco from Rising Star on her way to Graham told the fireman the tornado dropped down by her car once. She drove into

town and stopped at the fire station, where she stayed for two hours until the storm passed.

Larry Weikel, Cisco police officer and Cisco Volunteer Fireman was out south of town as a weather watcher, when he spotted the tornado. He said the funnel stayed on the ground for about a quarter mile.

Pea size hail was reported in the area of the tornado. Area rainfall ranged from over an inch south of Cisco to half an inch at Lake Cisco.

## Saturday Elections To Be Held In County Towns

Saturday, May 7, is election day and the polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. for voting in local elections.

City Council, School Board, Hospital Board, Junior College Board and Water District Board are items that will be seen in various combinations on ballots in Eastland County, but all won't be on any one ballot.

An issue will be on one ballot, Cisco voters will vote on whether to legalize playing bingo, which presently is not legal as it is a form of gambling.

In Carbon five candidates, incumbent Angie Clower, incumbent Danny Norris, T.D. Whitehorn, Jimmy Hughes and Dewaine Coonce, are running for two at-large seats on the Carbon School Board. Vickie Sallee is unopposed for an unexpired term on the School Board.

Mayor Royce McGaha is running for another term in Carbon, while Truman Bryant is running for Place 1 and Dale Wayne Walker is running for Place 2 on the Carbon City Council. All three are unopposed.

Cisco has Ron Rhodes and Randy Taylor running

for Place 6, and David Callerman, Ron Patton, Gwynn Tharp and Danny Schaefer running for Place 7 on the School Board.

On the Cisco City Council, Cheryl Robins and Olin Odom seek Place 3 while Place 4 is between incumbent Vernetta Pierce and Edd McGough.

Joe Cooper - Place 2 and Billy Reynolds - Place 3 are unopposed for the Cisco Junior College Board, while Emmett Rich opposes incumbent Lloyd McGrew for Place 1, and incumbent Dean Madison is challenged by David Gill for the Place 6 two-year unexpired term.

Jerry Morgan and Emma Lee Donovan are running for two of the three seats up for election on the Cisco Hospital District Board.

In Eastland City Council incumbents C.W. "Dub" Hoffman, Jr. and Don Griffin are unopposed.

Incumbent David L. Coan and Delbert Grace are running for Place 6 on the Eastland School Board, and Larry Vernon and Ted Martin are running for Place 7.

Robert G. Perkins and Tom Crowder are running unopposed for re-election

as Eastland's representatives on the Lake Leon Water District Board.

Incumbents Daryl Hirst and Windell Treadway are running unopposed for the Gorman School Board.

Graydon Baze and Kenneth Roberts are running for Mayor, while Hershell Cordell and James Michael are running for Place 4, and L.F. Kellogg is unopposed for Place on the Gorman City Council.

No one has filed for the four Gorman Hospital District seats.

No seats are up this year on the Ranger City Commission.

On the Ranger School Board, Mary Wells and Will Johnson are running for Place 3, incumbent Kenneth Williams and Ronald H. Prossie for Place 4, and Wayne Bradford and Dirk Zollinger for the Place 2 unexpired term.

Phylecia Schooling is opposing incumbent Lee Russell for Place 1 while Places 2, 3, 6 and 9 are uncontested on the Ranger Junior College Board.

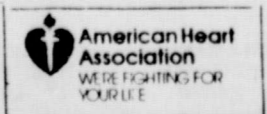

## Charles Crawford Chapter Of DAR Has Meeting

The Charles Crawford Chapter of the DAR met April 25th at noon at K-Bob's Restaurant. The meeting was opened with the ritual prayer. After lunch, Regent Flora McCannies led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag of the United States of America, followed by the President General's message from the current DAR magazine.

The Defense Report was given by Helen McAnelly. It concerned the terrible drug problems that burden our country, and the toll of lives and resources they take.

Treasurer Bernice Durham was absent because of illness, so Flora McCannies gave the treasurer's report.

The program on "History of the Continental Congress" was presented by Dinah Wilson. The first Continental Congress convened in Philadelphia. It was initiated to consider and act on the situation arising from the "Intolerable Acts" enacted by the British Parliament in retaliation for the Boston Tea Party and other acts of opposition to British rule.

About fifty delegates, including John and Samuel Adams and Patrick Henry, met on September 5, 1774 to try to restore harmony with England, but they did call for a boycott of British import and export trade. They adjourned October 26, 1774.

The second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia May 10, 1775. Parliament had rejected the petition of the first Continental Congress. Revolutionary ferment was growing. The assembly of the Continental Congress was considered a revolutionary act, but the delegates, including George Washington, still tried to find means of reconciliation with the mother country. However, in August of 1775, the British Crown had issued a proclamation for suppressing rebellion and sedition in the colonies; in September they had contracted for the use of 20,000 Hessians to use against the colonists.

After that, opinion turned more and more toward independence, and on July 4, 1776, the Declaration of Independence was adopted. This Continental Congress adjourned December 12, 1776.

Mrs. Emily Perkins gave a talk on repairing and restoring bridges over the Sudbury and Assabet Rivers near Lexington and Concord where the American Revolution began. Those present at the meeting were Mmes Emily Perkins, Dinah Wilson, Helen McAnelly, Sarah Alford, Flora McCannies, and two visitors, Connie Hightower from Rising Star and Patsy Lenard from Cisco.

Jigs will catch just about any fish that swims. Since jigs can be hopped along the bottom or retrieved directly, they are versatile for any fishing situation. A bucktail jig, for example, consists of a lead body and a deer-hair skirt. It is a favorite with crappie, bass and saltwater fishermen.

Usually the fishing line is tied directly to the jig. No snap or swivel is used. Jigging, especially effective

live in rocky structure, requires an abrasion-resistant line, like Berkley's Tri Maxor Big Game line. Most jigs have a single hook that rides upward. They slide remarkably well through heavy cover.

When fishing in clear water, use a small diameter line and a small jig. This combination allows a natural presentation.

Flipping is a popular jigging method whereby a rubber skirted jig, often-times adorned with a pork or plastic trailer, is flipped into brushy cover. Jigs used in brush have weed guards to reduce hanging up. As the jig falls bass and other fish strike instinctively. Brute force and 20-30 lb. test line help haul heavy bass from the heavy cover.

It is important to select the proper size jig. Heavy jigs are useful for deep presentations and when fishing in heavy cover. Small jigs, weighing as little as 1/64th oz., are the choice for panfish, such as bluegill or crappie. It's impossible

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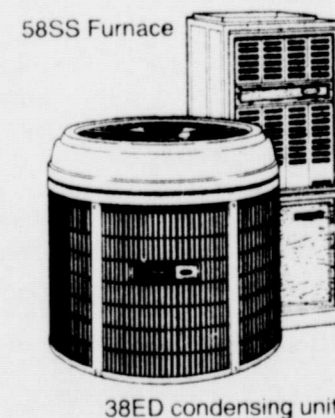
