when he was working in Moore County his partner was stabbed while answering a domestic violence call. Key said they were handcuffing a man, and his wife came up behind them and stabbed Key's partner because the officer was, 'bothering her husband'. The two officers were called because the man was beating his wife.

Key said if there had been a K-9 dog there at the scene the woman probably would not have tried anything. He said, "You would be surprised how quickly a dog will calm someone down." He added, a crowd of 200 people can be controlled better by one dog than one police officer with a gun. No one wants to be the first to arouse the anger of a dog.

Two other towns that have K-9 patrol dogs are Coleman and Dalhart. Key said they are satisfied with the results the dog has had on the drug problem there. He added, if Cisco buys a K-9, the Cisco Police Department can rent the dog and handler out to other towns for an hourly price. He said one neighboring town has shown a great

interest in this idea. The dog will only work for one handler. If the officer who is in charge of the K-9 patrol dog leaves, the dog will stay with the city and another handler will be trained.

Connell said the weather watchers were called out on Friday, April 29, when a line of thunderstorms moved into the Cisco area. These storms produced a tornado that touched down west of Cisco causing minor damage.

Connell said the weather watchers tracked the tornade and saw that the funnel was not an immediate threat to the town of Cisco. The funnel was moving away from Cisco. He said they were in touch with the weather watchers at all times, and if the funnel had been moving toward the population of Cisco, the tornado sirens would have been sounded.

Mr. Connell said if a tornado is headed toward the city limits of Cisco, the sirens will be sounded. He added if the tornado is on the ground in the city limits of Cisco, an authorized personnell will use the emergency cable alert system. He said this person can dial a certain number on the telephone, known only to him and other authorized persons, and take over all channels on the cable TV network.

He said everyone who has their TV on will be able to hear this person's voice warning them to take cover immediately. If this warning is given Connell said everyone needs to take cover immediately because it means a tornado will hit the town of Cisco in less than a minute.

ACCORDING TO the National Weather service, it is estimated that at any given moment nearly 2,000 thunderstorms are in progress over the earth's surface, and that lightning strikes the earth 100 times each second. Statistics

show that an average of a little over 100 people are killed by lightning each year in the United States and about 250 are injured.

About 27% of lightning deaths occur in open fields such as ball fields. Sixteen percent of the deaths occur under trees and 13% are water related such as on lakes and in swimming pools.

Many people feel that it is safe to remain outdoors until the rain of a thunderstorm reaches them. Unfortunately, lightning can and will reach outside the rain area to strike. The safest action is to seek shelter whenever you can hear thunder. A few minutes lost working or playing are nothing compared to losing your life.

Service suggests the
following lightning safety
rules:

•Move inside a building or car whenever a storm is near.

•Do not stand underneath a natural lightning rod such as a tall tree in an open area.

•Get out of and away from open water.

•Get off of and away from motorcycles, bicycles, and golf carts. Put down golf clubs.

•If you are hopelessly isolated in an open field and you feel your hair stand on end, lightning may be about to strike. Drop to your knees and bend forward putting your hands on your knees. Do not lie flat on the ground.

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

EFFECTIVE SCHOOLS: MEASURING UP

Think back ten years ago to the early - mid 70s and the many questions that were being raised about public institutions ... hard questions about schools and their effectiveness in educating our children. Government and university researchers questioned whether schools and teachers really made a difference. For the past ten years, researchers have been particularly interested in schools where so called "high-risk" students were achieving far beyond everyone's expectations. Time was spent in these schools looking at how they functioned. As data was on these compiled statistically unusual or so called "effective schools" clear reasons for their effectiveness came into focus and it wasn't that the students had the right "make-up." In fact, characteristics described below accounted for much of the students learning in

demographic factors. As a group, these common findings revealed that while all schools may appear alike and it's easy to conclude only student make-up accounts for the differences in learning, a closer look showed that schools and teachers do differ, and this accounts in part for large gains in student achievement. The following characteristics were present in those schools where students of all backgrounds were achieving

success Programs were guided by a clear sense of mission. Administrators provided instructional and curriculum

leadership. The environment was safe

and orderly. Teachers were teaching a goal-oriented curriculum. Student progress was carefully monitored.

School routines reinforced teaching and learning. Standards and expecta-

tions were high.

Personal relationships were positive. Achievement at all levels

was recognized. No matter the level of success, improvement was the No. 1 goal.

Because these conditions have become associated with effective teaching and learning, they serve as basic goals for all schools striving for improvement.

Explosion Ignites Gas Plant Flames which seemed to be Around 5 p.m. Wednesday

people in the Ranger, Olden, Eastland area heard an explosion and saw a fireball rise into the sky followed by dark billowing smoke.

Even though it seemed closer, a call to firemen from neighbors of the Houston Fluids and Leasing Company's middle natural gas compressor plant, located about four miles northwest of Ranger in the Northridge Field, reported the fire's

location. If any good has come from the many fires that firemen have fought in Eastland and nearby counties the past few months, it is that the fire departments in this area have become very experienced crack units, continually learning how to bet-

ter fight fires. Law enforcement officers and emergency vehicles sped toward the plant. The response was almost unbelievable as fire trucks from first Ranger, then Eastland, Cisco and even Gorman and the Strawn and Gordon area quickly came to the area. And about four rescue trucks and ambulances were either at the

scene or standing by. Roads leading to the plant were blocked by officers and firemen to keep unnecessary traffic from hindering fire fighters and to keep people away until the danger was

fully evaluated and brought under control. With ten or more fire trucks and two water tank trucks responding to the call, enough to bring the fire under control were allowed in to the plant while others

It was a magnificent demonstration of cooperation that controlled the fire in less than an hour. But there were two major

concerns for fire fighters arriving at the plant. Several oil storage tanks at the plant were filled with oil, and they were engulfed in flames.

Plant workers realized the danger in time to run, but two construction or repair workers ran one way while the plant operator ran in another direction. The two, who were uninjured except for minor burns, suspected that the other was trapped in the fire. But he had run about 200 yards to a house for help, and he suspected that his co-workers were still

in the blaze. The lone man who ran to the house was suffering from shock and was transported by ambulance first to

Ranger, then to Hendricks Hospital in Abilene. Rodney Pearson of Eastland was found to have burned lungs and is in

It looked like one metal building was melting from

the heat. And as usual firemen maintained a vigil at the

site, just to be sure and safe. Newspaper, radio and television personnel came to the scene with helicopters landing in a nearby meadow. Several were from Abilene

Others indicated that a gas line may have ruptured. Ranger Fire Chief Darrell Fox said that the fire seemed to have started in the motor water near the site and by not having equipment needed to fight a petroleum fire.
