Cisco Services Thursday At 2 For J.W. Sitton Publisher Emeritus

Funeral services for Jerry W. Sitton, 76, longtime Cisco and area newspaperman, will be at 2 p.m. Thursday, May 26, 1988, at First Baptist Church of Cisco with Rev. Jim Manning, pastor, and Rev. Ken Diehm, pastor of First United Methodist Church, officiating.

Interment will be in Oakwood Cemetery in Cisco under the direction of Kimbrough Funeral Home.

Mr. Sitton died Monday, May 23, 1988, in Humana Hospital in Abilene.

He was born Oct. 1, 1911, in Marlow, Oklahoma, and married Mary Dorcas Green March 26, 1938, in Hallsville, Texas. They recently celebrated their fiftieth wedding anniversary.

He began his newspaper career during high school in Memphis where he worked as a janitor and cub reporter and poured slabs of lead used for type. He studied journalism at the University of Texas, leaving school in 1936 to work for the Kilgore Daily News. Mr. Sitton was the first reporter on the scene of the New London Schoolhouse explosion in 1937. He caught a ride with an ambulance driver to the gasleak explosion 15 miles away that killed 280 children and 14 teachers.

He joined the U. S. Navy in 1942. During World War II, he was a navy flier. Lieutenant Commander Sitton served as a flight instructor for a time and flew transport planes between the Admiralty Islands and the Philippines.

After the war, the Sittons moved to Henrietta, Texas, where he was editor and publisher of the Clay County Leader for two years.

In 1947, he purchased the Cisco Daily Press and moved his family to Cisco in 1948. Under this ownership, the newspaper became The Cisco Press.

After moving to Cisco, Mr. Sitton joined the naval reserve in which he was active for 25 years.

Sitton's holdings grew to include the Ranger Times, the Eastland Telegram, and the Rising Star under the collective title of Eastland County Newspapers Inc. At one time, he was co-publisher of the Baird Star. In 1950 he established the Longhorn Press, a mail order small book publishing company, which he and his wife continued to operate.

In the early 1970's, he sold the Eastland County Newspapers and claimed to retire. He continued to write his popular column "People and Things" until last

November. During his retirement, he worked with the International Executive Service Corps, serving as a production consultant to newspapers in Colombia, Ecuador, Jamaica, Guatemala, Panama and El Salvador.

He was a member of First Baptist Church, past president and member of Cisco Lions Club, past member of Board of Regents of Cisco Junior College, Cisco Independent School District Board of Directors, and Cisco city council. He was a member of Veterans of Foreign Wars in Eastland, John Williams Butts American Legion Post No. 123, Cisco Masonic Lodge, Cisco Country Club and Moslah Shrine of Fort Worth.

Survivors include his wife, Dorcas Sitton of Cisco; a son, Jim Sitton of Longview; a daughter, Judy Callarman of Cisco; six grandchildren, Kent Sitton, Kathy Sitton and Melanie Sitton of Longview, and Leigh Callarman, Brian Callarman and Mark Callarman of Cisco; six brothers, Jack Sitton of Farmington, New Mexico, Eb Sitton of Fort Worth, Joe Sitton and Bob Sitton of Cisco, Dick Sitton of Ore City, and Buck Sitton of Lubbock; three sisters, Rebecca Walker of Cisco, Gladys Bunker of Sallisaw, Ok. and Nell Snyder of Seattle, Washington.

roadway, requested that the Court make this a County road - that the situation was extremely hazardous as it now existed.

Cyrus Frost also spoke to the Commissioners, saying that he was not appearing as an attorney, but that he felt that people were rightly using the roadway as an access to property. If they had to go to court he thought they would prevail.

There was considerable discussion, but the Commissioners made no decision on adopting the right-of-way as a County Road.

Under consideration also is a Resolution to adopt the 911 Emergency System in Eastland County. Under this plan each phone in the County would be adapted to the 911 signal for fire, illness, need for police, or any other emergency.

Sheriff Don Underwood told the Court that a Resolution from the County Commissioners and each City entity as a joint effort was needed before a cost estimate would be done on the project. A direct vote of the people is not needed to get it started.

"I still think the people ought to have a say in this," stated Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4.

Most Commissioners spoke in favor of the plan, but it was suggested that they get out and see what the public thought of it before making a final decision.

On jail matters, Comm. Billy Bacon reported that 19 prisoners were currently in the County Jail.

New Deadline For Taxpayers To Protest Property Values

Property owners have an earlier deadline for filing a notice of protest with the local appraisal review board (ARB). Effective for the 1988 tax year, a property owner must file the protest by May 31 or no later than 30 days after an appraisal notice is delivered, whichever is later.

The filing deadline is one month earlier than the old one of June 30. The earlier deadline gives a local review board more time to hear and decide property owners' complaints about value.

Appraisal notices are not

sent to all property owners. The chief appraiser must send a notice under three circumstances: for a new property, for a property where the owner rendered a lower value than the appraisal district's value, and for an increase in value over the prior year.

The ARB will schedule a hearing when it receives a taxpayer's protest in writing. The ARB will then mail a written notice to the property owner listing the date, time and place of the hearing. The property owner will have at least 15 days notice of the hearing.

The ARB must schedule a single hearing for property owners who own property in undivided or fractional interests, including owners of mineral interests.

Appraisal districts have official notice of protest forms for property owner to use, or they are available from the State Property Tax Board at P.O. Box 13900, Austin, Texas 78761-3900. Although an official form is not mandatory, the notice must be a written document that identifies the property owner, the property in question and indicates some dissatisfaction with the property's appraisal record.

Property owners must present evidence and information that supports a different determination than proposed by the appraisal district.

Any property owner who acquires property after January 1, but before the filing deadline, may protest an appraisal. Property is appraised as it existed on January 1.

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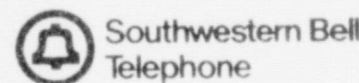
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Fishing Outdoors

Insurers Announce Discounts For Auto Antitheft Devices

New automobile insurance discounts for vehicles protected by antitheft security systems will soon be available for Texas motorists, announced John Nance, chairman of the Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office (TAISO).

Pursuant to enabling legislation passed by the 70th Texas Legislature, Nance said that his organization received approval from the State Board of Insurance for insurers to voluntarily offer discounts on the comprehensive portion of auto policies. The discounts will be available for private passenger autos and commercial vehicles up to 25,000 pounds.

Eastland Counties, covered in District 63 (Northeastern Counties), could see discounts of from six to fifteen percent, according to the information just released. Six percent could be earned in category one; nine percent in category two; 12 per cent in category three; and 15 per cent in category four.

"Discounts may be as much as 25 percent off the comprehensive coverage," said Nance, "with typical savings of 10 percent."

The two factors determining the exact percentage of the discount for private passenger autos are the level of protection afforded by an antitheft system and the rating territory in which the vehicle is garaged. The percentage of discount is higher in rating territories which have been experiencing the greatest theft losses and for antitheft systems

which offer the greatest security.

Category I antitheft systems provide 2 to 10 percent discounts, depending on the rating territory, and include any one of the following:

- anti-hot-wiring system that prevents the car from starting;

- armored device such as horn, bell or siren that is activated by a door, hood or trunk sensor;

- window identification system where the motor vehicle identification number is permanently marked on at least two windows other than the small vent windows;

- armored steel collar covering the steering column which prevents access to the ignition system.

Category II systems provide 4 to 15 percent discounts. Vehicles eligible for Category II discounts must have a Category I device plus an anti-hot-wiring circuit, automatic shutoff and reset and two or more of the following:

- glass sensor that activates an alarm if it detects the sound of breaking glass or metal in contact with glass;

- vibration sensor that activates the alarm if any part of the vehicle is bumped;

- motion sensor that activates the alarm if the vehicle is jacked up or towed;

- ultrasonic sensor that activates the alarm if an ultrasonic field is disturbed inside the vehicle.

Category III provides 6 to 20 percent discounts. In addi-

tion to meeting Category II requirements, a vehicle must be equipped with a hood restraint that prevents access to under-hood components plus a backup battery which trips an alarm if the main power source is disconnected or if wires to the alarm are cut or disconnected.

Category IV provides 8 to 25 percent discounts. The vehicle must meet Category III requirements and have a passive method of activating or deactivating the alarm system.

"A Category I antitheft system can be something as inexpensive as window identification etchings," said Nance. "Savings on a typical 1988 car in the \$10,000 to \$12,500 price range will be approximately \$19 in Houston; \$13 in Dallas, San Antonio, El Paso and Brownsville; \$10 in Fort Worth; \$5 in Corpus Christi, Beaumont, Austin and Longview; and \$4 in Amarillo. Of course, savings will be greater on more expensive cars."

Nance also reported that the discount for a typical commercial 1988 step van that cost \$10,000 to \$15,000 new would be \$6 to \$70 depending on rating territory and the antitheft devices installed.

"These discounts are part of the insurance industry's ongoing campaign to promote loss reduction efforts and hold down the cost of auto insurance to Texas consumers," said Nance.

"Although the antitheft discounts are voluntary, we expect a high level of in-

terest by companies in providing them, not merely because this is such a competitive business," Nance said, "but because we as an industry truly believe it will contribute to a reduction in auto theft in high-risk areas."

After May 29, companies participating in the discount program will file formal notice with the State Board of Insurance, indicating whether they will offer the discounts statewide or only in specified rating territories. "We expect to start seeing these discounts made available within the next 60

to 90 days," said Nance.

TAISO is licensed by the State Board of Insurance to advise it and provide technical support on all automobile insurance matters. Located in Austin, TAISO publishes the automobile manual rules, rates, rating procedures, policy and endorsement forms for all automobile insurance written in the State of Texas. TAISO's 401 member companies write more than 90.4 percent of the premium volume for regulated automobile insurance in the state.

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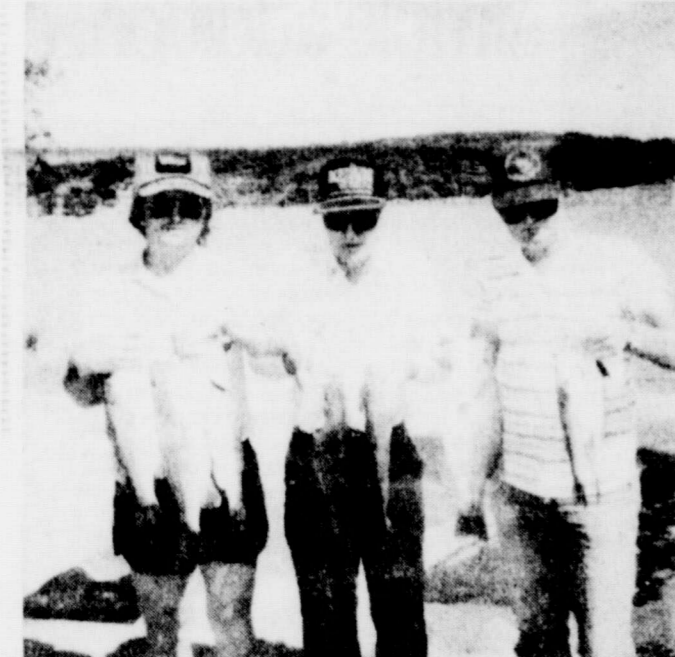

"Beetlejuice" To Show At Majestic

Perhaps the most aggressively funny comedy to spring into theatres since last year's "Raising Arizona," "Beetlejuice" has the same wicked, violent, cunningly over-the-wall comic ambience that categorizes the best of both Monty Python and Looney Toones. Director/Animator Tim Burton, whose last effort was "Pee-wee's Big Adventure," has toned down the Pee-wee-esque wackiness in favor of more pointed satire, and has come up with an even more magical, faster-paced universe than the one Mr. Herman inhabits, with gags that are more often not invidiously, gut-wrenchingly hilarious.

Adam and Barbara Maitland (Alec Baldwin and Geena Davis) die in a car accident, and their spirits are consigned to spend eternity haunting their own beloved country home in Connecticut. This is fine with the Maitlands until Barbara's sister sells their house to a cadre of terrifyingly trendy New Yorkers, the Deetz family. Delia Deetz (SCTV's Catherine O'Hara), it turns out, is a talentless sculptress, and immediately sets about turning the Maitlands' quaint country cottage into a nouveau deco hellhole. In a novel twist, the deceased effectively find themselves haunted by the living.

Adam and Barbara don Delia's designer sheets and try to make vaguely otherworldly noises in an effort to

shoo the family away, but the Deetzes prove simply too self-absorbed to notice anything as subtle as ghosts. The Maitlands are forced to consort with Beetlejuice, a slovenly, fearsomely unmannered "bio-exorcist" and the only poltergeist frightening enough to scare the Deetzes back to Manhattan.

"Beetlejuice" is rated PG for language, violence and some B-calibre gore.

I've Been Wrong Before

Mother had never had much luck getting Dad to go to church with her though I do recall three or four times. So when my youngest brother was a sophomore and myself a junior in high school she stated that having raised four young men she was not going to church alone. That night I was stuck. The First United Presbyterian church was a fine building with a great pipe organ.
I sat there as the opening music played but it seemed that the organist switched time and tempo right in the middle and then people started filing out. Good grief, that seemed like a short service. Out of ear shot from the members Mother informed me of how embarrassed she had been when I snored so loud I near drowned out the preacher. Pokes in the ribs made it louder instead of waking me.
Needless to say the other brothers were drafted as escorts to church on nights thereafter. My family insist that my snores are enough to rattle windows but I guarantee you I can only recall three or four times they were loud enough to waken me. Honestly.
During middle age I was always wide awake in church but as I grow older I sometimes feel myself slipping off. I recall one old deacon who often snored softly during prayer meetings. Never was he more noisy than to provoke a snicker or two. he was a hard working farmer and I had worked with him a couple of times enough to know that on week nights he had reason to be exhausted. I have no excuse because I don't work any more.
I will allow that at Harmony Baptist Church that name Harmony has seen times when it was a blessed hope more than reality but I have known of no discord in recent years though if I should doze off the sound may be quite off key.
I once read that in some colonial churches they had a man who held a pole with feather on one end to tickle any lady who dozed during a lengthy service. However, on the other end of his long pole was wooden ball and I am glad I was not born in colonial America.
Only in 5th, 6th & 7th grade did they call me "Teachers Pet" and then only in history and geography, those classes they seemed to hate most. Why those subjects should be so distasteful I do not understand unless it was that they too often required memorizing dates with no real time line or reference to what went on simultaneously nor causes and long term effects. Maybe a connection should have been made by the writers of texts. As the saying goes, "They couldn't see the forest for the trees." Geography seemed to fall short by teaching what was produced where without anyone mentioning what such production did in the world nor how it influenced us.
TRUE HISTORY IS NOW. Even as people are the result of heredity and environment and each machine is a collection of simple machines based on discoveries at separate times, so are political and religious actions and organizations the results of forces, traditions and reactions from the past.
It may well be that the forces working to destroy our institutions have hit on a real weak spot when they attack traditional history as when they put out supposed facts that make those once looked up to as less than admirable people. Given the combination of many students dislike for history the excuse that it wasn't honestly presented is seized upon as adequate excuse for a miserable grade. Then too, the destroyers can count on ignorance to support much of their claims. I am probably too intolerant of ignorance because of my own realization of how very little of what there is to know that I have mastered. We do seem less tolerant when others reflect our own shortcomings.
Of history I believe I know a bit more than average but of politics I am in sad shape. Therefore I resent it highly when a politician seems to tear down the little history I hope I know. For example, it makes the hair on the back of my neck stand up if I hear a political hack blarney about "the two party system on which our nation was built." THAT IS A LIE. Washington and others among the Founders decried machinations of political parties and called them all destructive. There were several parties before the Civil War with only one Republican candidate before Lincoln was elected as the first Republican president. The war and its aftermath did tend to polarize many people and thus reduced the number of parties. But a straight two party system simply was not in the beginning. That is but one example of distorted history which is right now. Many others exist.
Geography and history often interface as when one knows that the Dardanells is the straits separating Europe from Asia Minor. From the Bosphorus on the East the Black Sea empties through the Sea of Marmara to the Hellspont into the Aegean Sea. There during WW II Churchill wasted a horrific number of British and Australian troops in an idiotic attempt to separate German and Turkish forces. The exact place was Gallipoli and the connection with literature that it was the site referred to originally in the phrase "There will always be an England" the grave site where so many brave lads lie. Now long forgotten.
I venture to guess that without the maps on TV a vast number of Americans wouldn't have the foggiest where the Straights of Hormus are located.
That old stuff about, "What you don't know can't hurt you," is daily disproven in relation to drugs, AIDS, cancer, politics, economics and too many ways to enumerate. If the fruit of the Tree of Knowledge had been the proverbial apple or anything like it rather than carnal knowledge things would certainly be different.
Factual knowledge uplifts in most cases and as it leads to truth and truth is righteous then what is foolishness but degradation and sin?
I can learn any language I want to. I just NEVER WANTED TO.
It seems that the controversy over demands for English to be declared the official language in some states and in federal government will continue. Each side seems to feel that their cultural heritage is threatened.
Each side argues strongly their points of discrimination, Tower of Babel, economics, culture, civil rights, educational deprivation, legality, and so on. The catch is that neither side listens but they still talk on.
As each citizen contributes to either the common good or common debt it should be obvious that a child who does not get the most education he or she could will become less beneficial and more probably a drag on society then what helps that little one most helps all.
The demand that the majority adjust to the language of any minority regardless of the size is equal to the mentality of the old story about "All the soldiers-in the company are out of step except my boy."
Every effort sinuati, no, it MUST, be made to teach little children English in early school years before he or she falls behind and is socially and economically crippled. We provide special parking, ramps etc. for physically handicapped but pay a higher price in welfare, prisons, and even more in lost potential we fail to put forth the extra effort required to start them off right. The victims of circumstances become identifiable in the lines of the deliberate nonproducers and anti-socials. Instead of tax contributors they become tax eaters. Letting them become tax burdens makes no sense, like dollars and cents.

Homemaking Hints

This is the time of year that many high school and college students start looking for summer employment. Finding a job is not easy.

This month I attended a state in-service training session on Job Skills and Satisfaction which was taught by Dorothy Taylor, Family Life Specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

In today's column, I would like to share with you some excellent suggestions on how to "package yourself" when interviewing for a job.

PACKAGING YOURSELF

Applying for a job is like giving someone a gift - you are both the presenter and the gift.

Five essential elements you need before going for an interview are: credentials, correct speech, appropriate dress, good personal hygiene and a positive attitude.

CREDENTIALS:

Your credentials are those things that can be written on your resume, which is only a specific format for listing them. Credentials are those things that make you believable; they give you credibility and show that you can do the job.

There are three kinds of credentials: Personal, Academic, and Occupational. Personal credentials include recommendations from current or former employers, current or former teachers, friends, and others who can support you in this job application. Academic credentials are diplomas or certificates showing your preparation for this job. Occupational credentials are work experiences that have developed skills needed for the job you're seeking.

SPEECH:

The way you speak is at least as important in your job search as any other single factor. Only in careers where you don't deal with people can you get by with sloppy English. Use good grammar. Keep the tone of voice pleasant. Avoid profanity or expressions which may offend others. Speech is one of the first personal attributes with which any potential employer has contact. Don't let it be the last.

DRESS:

Clothing and appearance are important in the work world. Although there is no universal "right way" to dress, there is an appropriate attire for the particular occupation, season and location. Your clothing should show good taste.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS:

First impressions are important, and your clothing is usually the first thing about you that anyone will notice. Research studies show an 8-20 percent higher starting salary for appropriately dressed and well-groomed applicants. Most employers interpret neatness as evidence of skills when evaluating potential employees.

PERSONAL HYGIENE:

Laxity in personal hygiene will not be noticed as quickly as inappropriate clothing or speech, but it will certainly leave the most indelible impression. Sloppy habits can sabotage your changes at a job, whether it's poor hygiene related to clothing, hair, body or teeth. Being clean and well-groomed is essential to making a good impression. Don't chew gum or use any form of tobacco.

ATTITUDE:

Attitude is part of your personality and includes all the other elements of your

personal packaging. You can be sure that your attitude will be tested in an interview as well as the way you react to questions. Your behavior will indicate the kind of team player you are. Positive thoughts about yourself and other people, together with enthusiasm, are two additional elements that every boss likes his or her team players to have. Don't criticize other bosses or companies, nor do you want to vent your own personal problems.

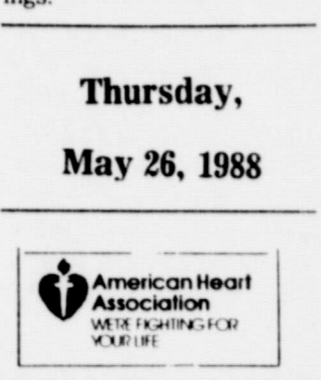
Recipe For The Week

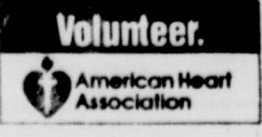

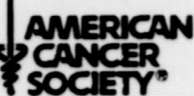

The problem has arisen because many counties have constructed or purchased a building for the purpose of housing their administrative offices. These County Commissioners Courts are desirous of conducting their business in these buildings but are prohibited from doing so. Under Texas law, most Commissioners Courts are required to meet in the courthouse. Counties which meet certain criteria, however, are allowed to acquire a building and use the auditorium for the commissioners court.

"I feel we need to afford all counties the same opportunity to designate an auxiliary building as its official meeting place, when the building serves as the administrative facility for the county. This discretion should not be limited to those counties within a certain population."

Pecan Tree Spray Time

The adult moths of the casebearer have started laying eggs on the tips of the

The eggs hatch four or five days after they are deposited by the moths. About three days after the small larvae emerge from

ONCE UPON A TIME IN TEXAS, there lived a newspaper that reported all kinds of things, from weddings to recipes to obituaries to local news and deeds, to club and church news, to water and power rates, to local elections. TIMES GOT TOUGHER for the newspaper in spite of helping it's town grow. In just 18 months, the price of newsprint increased 30 percent, and it cost 20 percent more just to mail the same newspaper. The newspaper faced the same higher taxes, increased minimum wages and all of the other new challenges to business as did everyone else. Just the cost of keeping its doors open increased to \$526 per day for every 2,500 circulation.

The newspaper was forced to reduce its staff a bit, along with some of its local coverage because the dollars just don't have the same reach as prior years.

THE TOWN STARTED LOSING its close kinship and upbeat manner. And its citizens became less interested in ideas for the future of a town in which they were losing contact . . . and information.

BUT THE NEWSPAPER (every newspaper) kept plugging along, attending countless local meetings and events. And its staff worked long hours to find ways to produce a better newspaper for the town, and to provide businesses with a valuable means of selling their goods and services, and informing readers about everything from government to fashions and foods.

TEXAS NEWSPAPERS are always plugging, because they enjoy exercising "Freedom of the Press." But please understand, this freedom doesn't come cheaply. It costs lots of dollars to keep it going. So help to put a happy ending on this story for both your town and its newspaper . . . SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL NEWSPAPER, AND ITS ADVERTISERS, because they're truly helping your town!

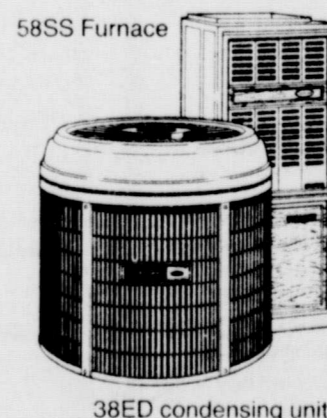

Trauma Awareness Week May 22-29

May is National Trauma Month. Texas Trauma Awareness Week is May 22 thru 29. The American Trauma Society is sponsoring activities during May around the nation and in Texas. Texas Department of Health and the Bureau of Emergency Management join the American Trauma Society in urging the EMS community and the public to become

more knowledgeable about and active in trauma prevention programs. EMS can play an important role in educating community members to change lifestyle elements to reduce the risk of trauma and in learning how to provide lifesaving care when trauma does occur. We encourage you to seek community educational programs on injury prevention and basic emergency care.

Trauma - preventable injuries - is the leading killer of people under 44 in Texas and across the nation. Texas Department of Health reports that in 1986 there were 4,440 accidental deaths of people ages 1 to 44 in Texas. May 22 thru 29 is Texas Trauma Awareness

Week and Gene Weatherall, Chief of the health department's Bureau of Emergency Management, has urged local emergency medical services to bring attention to the fact that trauma is preventable. "Motor vehicle accidents, burns, drownings, gunshot injuries - none of these has to happen," says Weatherall. "EMS and ambulance firms provide important public service when they help to educate families and children about preventing accidents and trauma."

Here are some specific trauma prevention suggestions:

•Motor vehicle accidents: Use seat belts, do not drink and drive, maintain safe driving speeds, buckle up your baby.

•Drowning: Swimproof yourself and your kids - make sure they can swim and discourage swimming alone. Do not let small children be unattended near water. Do not go into a rapidly flowing creek or river.

•Burns: Install smoke alarms at home and have an evacuation plan in case your home catches fire. Teach

children how to "Stop, Drop and Roll" if their clothes catch fire.

•Choking: Children most often choke on small pieces of food or candy; adults most often choke on food when partying and drinking accompanies eating.

•Gunshot injuries: Keep guns locked up, and lock ammunition separate from weapons. Horseplay with weapons is deadly. When hunting, be sure of your target! Enroll your children as soon as they are old enough in a gun safety course.

Tom and Carol Patterson Ambulance Service says that if accidental injuries do occur you still have time to prevent death in 95% of the accidents. "Make sure an injured victim can breathe, make sure there is a pulse, and stop any bleeding. CPR may help someone who is not breathing and does not have a pulse, and direct pressure over a wound is the best way to stop bleeding. Using the Heimlich Maneuver, simple abdominal thrusts, can dislodge what may be caus-

Long-term study in Finland of a cholesterol-lowering drug, Gemfibrozil, shows that it reduces the rate of heart attacks by 34 percent. While total cholesterol were lowered only slightly, levels of high-density lipoproteins increased markedly. Gemfibrozil causes fewer side effects than other anti-cholesterol drugs.

Diabetics seem to get fewer calluses when they wear cushioned running shoes. A Salt Lake City podiatrist reported on an 18-month survey.

Relatively new surgical instrument, a hysteroscope, enables doctors to examine the uterus without making an abdominal incision. Used mostly for diagnosis and biopsy now, the scope is expected to simplify certain surgical procedures.

A large dose of magnesium, given as soon as a heart attack victim gets to the hospital, seems to protect against dangerous arrhythmia, an Israeli study found. Normally, the heart loses magnesium -- and stable electrical activity -- at the time of an attack.

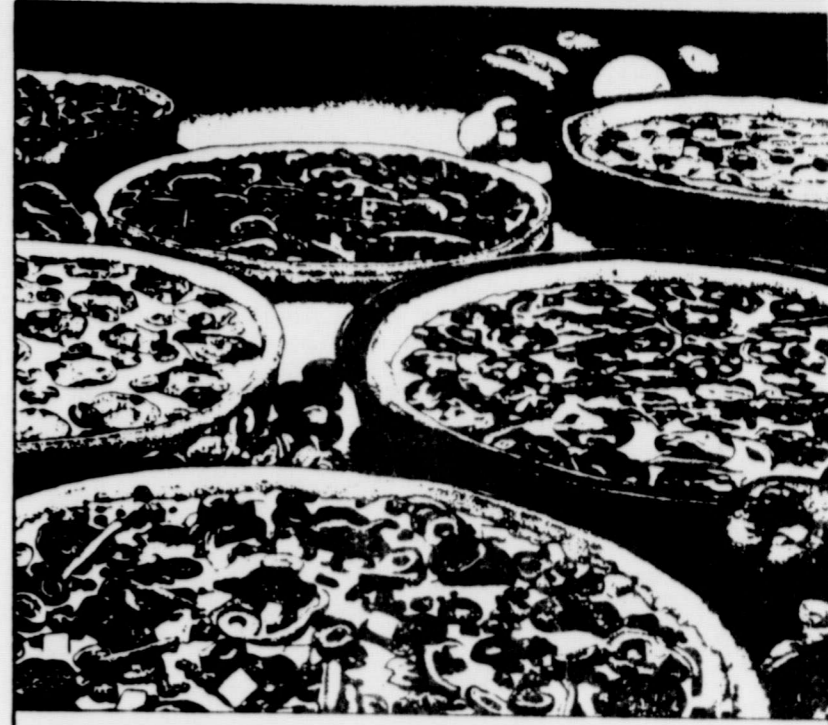

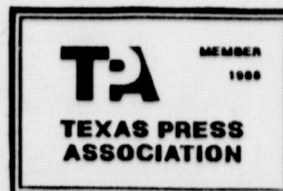

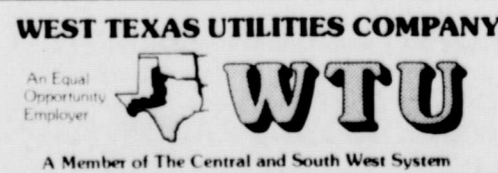

- Never use electric tools in rain or on any wet surface.
- Keep electric cords clear of your working area.
- Keep ladders or long-handled tools clear of power lines. Even wooden ladders can conduct electricity.
- Be careful when digging. Call your Local WTU Office to locate underground power lines in your area.
