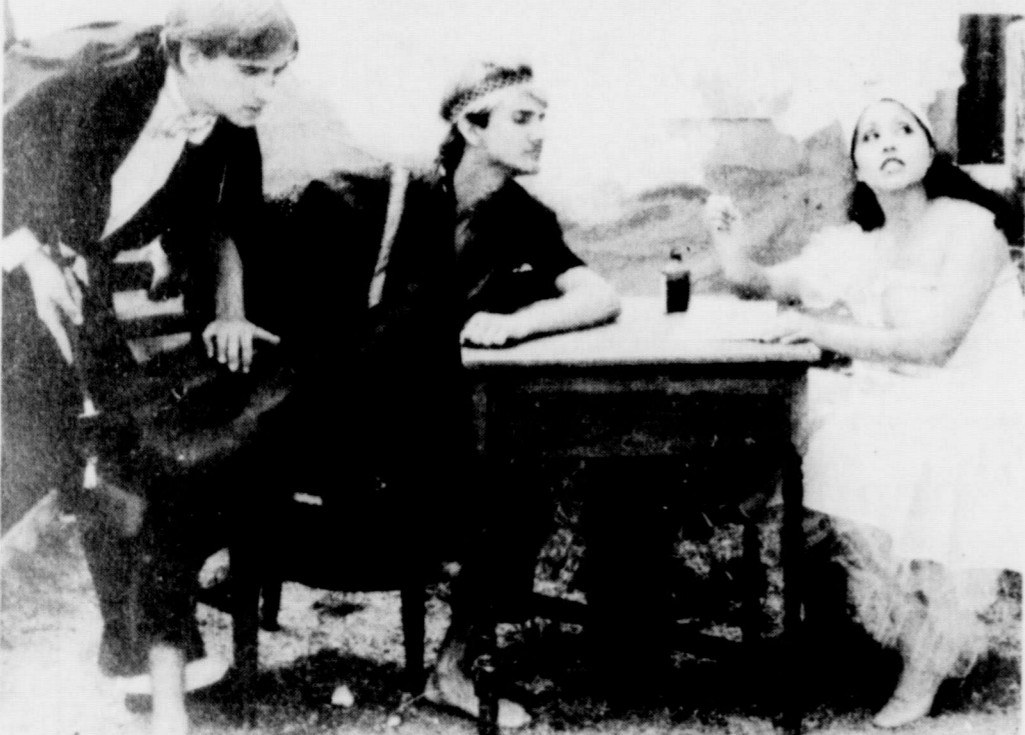


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DALIN ERROR, the villain, and Andy Berkovsky, his sidekick, propose forgery to Cecelia Aragon.

"Tied To The Tracks" is the first play in the Cisco Junior College Dinner Theater summer season. It is hilarious, silly, and a very clean cut family type play. It could easily receive a "G" rating. And the atmosphere, just adds the right touch to the play. It will be held in the Rockwell Lumber Yard. The hero, Sheriff Billy Bold is played by Sean

Jones. He even has the wavy hair to go with his part. The heroine Dakota Melody, who always has a smile on her face, and loves to sing and talk to the flowers is played by Wendy Wester. They really play their parts well. The two that steal the show though are the villain and the "drunken" Indian. Silius Scavenger, the villain, is played by Dalin Error and Chief Running Water is played by Andy Berkovsky. In one scene, Silius has the Chief's head down in a bucket of water and with his foot on the Chief's shoulders, he starts telling about his years of growing up. It's really hilarious. Silius can make you want to hiss and boo the villain. Other characters in the play are Farmgirls, Allison Williams, Leila Hawari, Deona Offield; Farmboys, Lonnie Betts, Nathan Urban,

Ben Foster; Mrs. Bradman, Danetta Bible; Theodora Barracuda, Sandy Mazel (who is a Shakespearean actress in the play); Cassie LaBamba Cecelia Aragon, Fifi LeFleur, Deona Offield; Laurette LeRoux, Sidra Sparks; Wild Prairie Rose, Tina Morris. Susan Wester and Frank Spangler, Jr., play the piano and drums. Olio participants who will perform before the show begins are Pat Owen and friends; Rocko, the Magnificent and his assistant, Miss Bubbles; The Magic Beat of 42nd Street; Madam Reedmond Undweep, gypsy fortune teller. Bill Austin will be the Master of ceremonies. "Tied To The Tracks" is directed by Tom Brown of Cisco. Performances are June 9, 10, 11 and 15-18. All are dinner performances at \$12.50 except for the performance on June 13 which is a dessert only performance for \$7.50. Tom Brown is the director. This is his first time to direct a musical. He said, "Carol and I are very lucky to have this group of people that are in the play. This group could have put on a performance in six days. They are that good." He said the cast members built the set in the Lumber Yard. The audience will be seated in the middle of a "town" consisting of a hotel lobby, jail, saloon, store and an outdoor scene with railroad tracks. Even though the set is outdoors, Carol said if the weather looks threatening by 6:00 p.m., before the performance, the set can be moved inside to the Hilton Community Center within 30 minutes. The play will then be presented inside. The entrance to the play is on the side by the Hilton Community Center. But, Carol said, parking will be available on East 5th, for anyone who would like to or needs to park closer to a gate. Carol said this is a good play for the entire family. To help with the cost of admission, there will be a picture of the villain in the Thursday, June 9, issue of The Cisco Press. Any child, 12-years old and younger, can color the picture with crayons, and bring the picture to the play and the cost of their ticket will be \$7.50. This will include a fried chicken dinner. The regular cost of the ticket will be \$12.50 without the colored picture. Carol said this special is being offered so that more younger children will attend the play. Sharpe Is Promoted At Cisco Post Office

Rodney Sharpe was recently promoted to the SPO position at the Cisco Post Office. The letters stand for Superintendent of Postal Operations. Sharpe took over Melvin Wende's position after Mr. Wende was promoted to Post Master. Sharpe's duties will include being the immediate supervisor over the city carriers and rural carriers. He will also supervise postal clerks and their duties. Mr. Sharpe's new position became effective May 7. Sharpe began working for the United States Postal Service on June 16, 1979, as a part time flexible carrier. He advanced to a part time flexible clerk and then to a full time distribution clerk. In September of 1981, he began working at the window in the Post Office, where he has worked until his promotion. Sharpe said, "I have worked for the Postal Service going on nine years and I am pleased to take this position. Growing up in Cisco, I have

been pleased with the service we give and we take pride in our work. One of my main duties will be making sure the people here keep getting the type of excellent service at the Post Office they have received in the past.

"I am open to the citizen's problems with the postal service and I want the public to feel free to contact me or Melvin Wende, Post Master, and talk about any problem. We are open to suggestions. The main thing I want to do in my job is to serve the people."

The reason July 4, is celebrated is because on that day, in the year 1776, the Declaration of Independence was announced by representatives of America's 13 original colonies. This declaration informed the world that the colonies, fighting for their freedom from Great Britain in the American Revolution (1775-1783) were now "free and independent states." On July 8, the first great celebration of this event took place in Philadelphia, Penn-

We greatly appreciate the different entities and personnel that help to keep our services available to you - Eastland Fire and Police Dept., Cisco Police and Fire Dept., DPS, Sheriff's Deputies, Civic Organizations, Schools, and all our creditors: especially Eastland National Bank, Meyers & Associates, Winnett Oil, and Rossander Insurance, Greenlight Auto, Mangum Service, and Caldwell Motors.

There comes a time in community service when a pat-on-the-back, a proven commodity, thanks for a job well done, and a small hand full of people who see a need and responds, is not enough.

It takes finances! Money! The Lack of Money is closing the door on our ambulance service. Lack of Membership support, no subsidies or benefits from County or Cities. Cut back on Medicare and Medicaid benefits for services rendered, County of Eastland not reimbursing for indigent care yet all other medical entities are paid for their services, last but not least; lack of persons not meeting their financial obligations and expecting us to give free services. The latter reflects on the local hospitals trying to receive discounted prices for the service we render yet when we needed the hospitals help in our own family and/or business crisis, we paid full price.

As we checked with some concerned citizens, they felt the ambulance bill is too high yet they fail to see the insurance needs for vehicle, personnel, and equipment, fail to see the need to comply with state and federal regulations that is rapidly changing and mandated, failure to see quality equipment for better performance and safety in transporting patients and failure to see the advance education to insure and increase quality of care.

Now what's for today? We will continue our normal course to serve as in the past as finances will allow. Should conditions continue to decline, the City that supported the ambulance service will have an ambulance in that City and the other ambulance will have to be parked, personnel relieved of their duties, and first come first serve emergency calls only.

We will provide members ambulance service until July 31, 1988. By the way, Cisco, Texas has more members!

Now what's for tomorrow? Tom and Carol Patterson regret that we can no longer serve in your community. We have other services and communities that support us completely and fully. We will continue to meet our financial obligations to our creditors and again thank you for allowing us to be a small part of your community. Our last day of business will be July 31, 1988. We have fought this battle for seven years, we have not been defeated, just changing battle fields in the game of life.

We would especially like to thank the Nurses and Doctors and Staff of Eastland Memorial Hospital as well as E.L. Graham for the opportunity to serve and learn.

People, you need your nurses and doctors, you may survive without an ambulance service, but you will not have a chance to live if your nurses and doctors aren't here. **SUPPORT YOUR LOCAL DOCTORS AND HOSPITALS!!!!**

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
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Area News Briefs

City Manager Mike Moore told Council members: "I would most emphatically and heartily recommend Judge Doug Fry to the position of Municipal Court Judge. He is fair, strong and compassionate." He also said, "Lois Holder is the current alternate Municipal Court Judge. She is very knowledgeable of her duties and has always been available when needed."

The City of Cisco collected \$6,750.12 in delinquent taxes during the month of April, according to Moore. The optional payment pay-out plan is still in effect for delinquent tax payers, he told the City Council. In other matters, the Council passed the motion to levy a two-percent gross receipts tax on the conduct of Bingo games within the city. This was the second reading.

But he said the cost of production has increased more than the cost of selling. He said in the 1970's the farmers did very well, but in the 80's the cost of production started really soaring, and the prices of the food did not.

Gordon said last years cotton sales had the biggest increase in years. It was a big boost to the state economy. Fruit and timber also increased. He said Texas is the third in the nation in agricultural income. It is the first in cattle, calves, sheep, mohair and spinach. There are 160,000 farms in Texas that average about 838 acres each. The value of each acre averages out to \$482 per acre.

The next morning Dale drove a couple of hours to his destination Presidio. (He passed through Terlingua and Lajitas. It was a beautiful stretch of highway.)

A hot sunny day over 100 degrees greeted him in Presidio. Residents say that the thermometer hit 124 degrees last summer.

At the Union Festival Sam Lewis introduced Dale by saying, "I would like to introduce to you a friend of mine. He is a cowboy artist from Cisco, Texas. He has brought some bronzes and is here to help promote the festivities."

At the same table where Dale was sitting was Susie Nelson, Willie's daughter. She has written a book about her dad and it is titled "Heart Warm Memories." She was promoting and autographing her book. Her husband and son Anthony were also present.

Susie and Dale shared a booth for book and bronze sales during the festival. Susie was delighted to find out that Dale had associated with her father Willie in his early career days at Brownwood. She wanted to know all about those days.

The citizens of Presidio (population - about 3,700) were rather "laid back." Being next door to the Mexican town Ojinaga, "manana" was frequently expressed. Dale met some very colorful characters such as Suitcase Sam and his lady Collie, a rock painter from Lajitas. (She sold lots of painted rocks during the festival.)

One evening Dale and a young couple went across the bridge to Ojinaga for a Coke and sightseeing in the main part of town. Dale said, there wasn't really much to see. The Mexican side, however, was an hour behind U.S. time.

The next day Dale began the 7 1/2 hour trip back to Cisco. He counted the trip successful. There were several good prospects and the festival was lots of fun.

Another art venture this

spring was a trip to the Lubbock Arts Festival on April 23-26. Hundreds of people passed by the booth. Some of them inquired about Cisco, saying that they knew someone who had lived there. 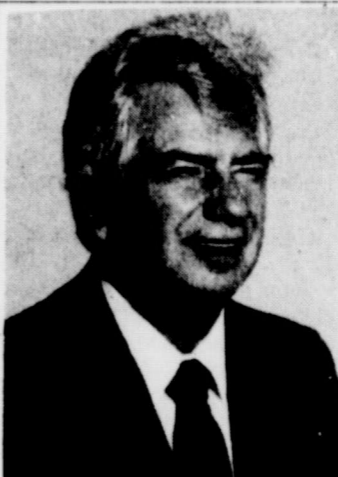

One way to fight a cold - get a new toothbrush! Researchers at the University of Oklahoma say that brushes hide a multitude of bacteria, causing sore throats and gum infections. They recommend a new brush every two weeks.

Vaccine against melanoma, the most deadly skin cancer, is being developed at New York University Medical Center. Researchers hope to prevent recurrences of the disease; in time, it may be possible to prevent skin cancer in high-risk people.

New studies offer evidence that use of spermicides does not cause birth defects. Research was reported in the prestigious New England Journal of Medicine.

New blood tests may measure the loss of bone mass in post-menopausal women, well before the woman is in danger of bone breaks. Tests were developed at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota.

Eastland County Area Receives Much Needed Rain Last Week

Finally, after the clouds gathered for days, Eastland County and all of the area was blanketed with rain. It was the first heavy rainfall this year after a dry winter and spring.

While some hail was reported in the county and flooding was occurring in Comanche County to the southeast, we have heard no reports of damage except for some lightning damage caused by the accompanying electrical storm.

In this area the heaviest rainfall report we received was 6.5 in. northwest of Rising Star, north 4.2 in. was reported north of Rising Star.

Cisco reports ranged from 4.8 in. to 5.5 in. with 4.1 in. reported at the Lake Cisco Dam. Lake Cisco was said to have gained nearly two feet of water.

Four inches of rain was reported in the Carbon area, while Eastland rainfall ranged from an area low of 2.63 in. in west Eastland to 4.4 in.

at the Dispatch south of the city.

Ranger reported 3.5 in. and at 8 a.m. Wednesday, Lake Leon was up 1.4 ft. with water continuing to flow into the lake. With about five inches of rain on the watershed area, Lake Leon's water level is near the top of the Morning-glory overflow. During the height of the electrical storm around 9:30 p.m. Tuesday, lightning struck the two-story Jerry Bob Greer home on Winsett Spring Road in Ranger. Sheet rock began to fall from the ceiling, the telephone and electrical power were knocked out, and a fire started. Apparently the rain was so heavy that it put out the fire, however.

The rain was almost a lifesaver as the prospect of entering the warm summer months without some moisture in the ground or additional water in the lakes was unpleasant at best.

But once the rain had started, it seemed determined to continue until the area is soaked. Thursday afternoon and evening brought scattered showers over the area and some hail between Eastland and Carbon. The strong thunderstorm extended west between Cisco and Rising Star also.

Later clouds from a thunderstorm which battered Abilene with baseball-sized hail moved through the area leaving from a quarter-inch to two inches of additional rain over much of the area.

By Friday morning Lake Cisco had gained more than 27 inches and Lake Leon was up another 1.3 ft., just 6 or 7 inches below the overflow.

And at press time Friday the heavily overcast skies were dark and the weather cool, indicating the possibility of yet another round of rain.

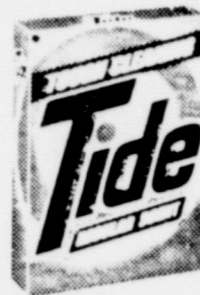
