Cisco Store Robbed

Town and Country Food Store in Cisco was robbed of an undetermined amount of money early Monday morning, according to a report from Bert Elliott, manager. Laura Hutt, employee, said a man walked into the store and asked for the money in the register and for a sack to put the money in. After he

had the money he told Hutt to lie down on the floor until he left. She never saw the car he was in.

Cisco police officer Larry Jernigan was making his patrol thru town, and drove by Town and Country and saw a man get into a small dark colored car and drive onto I-20 heading west. Jernigan said there was nothing suspicious about the man.

When Jernigan came back around to the store, he couldn't see Mrs. Hutt, so he drove into the store's parking lot. Mrs. Hutt came running out telling the officer she had been robbed.

The man described as a white male in his early 20's was approximately 5'8" tall. He was stocky built and had a scarred, rough looking, unshaven face. The suspect indicated to Mrs. Hutt that he had a weapon.

In 1937 he started a radio shop in downtown Cisco, getting in on the ground floor of another electronics enterprise when he began selling television sets in 1952.

But one of the highlights of his business years was a trip in 1958 to Phoenix, Arizona, for training by the J.I. Case Company.

At this meeting Henry Schaefer sat for the first time at a banquet table seating 750 people. He navigated in this crowd by using a technique he had learned: when you crawl in a crowd you must either go ahead or behind—never in the middle among a sea of feet.

Eventually Schaefer sold out downtown and moved his business beside his home on 22nd street. There he still continues to get a lot of work. "I guess I'll never retire," he says. "I can't imagine what it would be like to do nothing."

Over the years his activity has increased on behalf of the handicapped.

"Before 1975," he explains, "There really wasn't much, in the ways of laws or organized work, in helping disabled people lead more normal lives."

But some Federal laws were passed that year—I think it was during President Ford's term.

"Since then, the Barrier-Free program has really moved forward in some areas, such as the North states and West and East Coasts. I'm sorry to say that the South and Southwest are still behind."

He lists some of the worst barriers for handicapped persons as sidewalks with no access, high steps with no ramp, narrow doors, a bathroom without special features, the driving of a car, and some forms of public transportation.

Many years ago he built special equipment for his own car, and drives it without any trouble. But airplanes now provide the easiest long distance transportation for the disabled, he says.

Schaefer has booklets and other information listing the towns, parks, motels and shopping areas across the country which have barrier free arrangements.

"There are about 200 severely handicapped people in Eastland County," Schaefer notes. "Some of them you never see, for they are home bound. Others are in Nursing Homes. A few are able to get out and work."

Recently Schaefer was appointed as a board member of Special Education for a Tri-County area in Texas. He is intensely interested in this work, and feels that it fits right in with the Barrier-Free Project.

As he speaks to civic groups and individuals, Henry Schaefer keeps thinking of a special wish—that his hometown of Cisco take the lead in such a program; that it become a place where handicapped people can work and shop freely, and that it be listed in one of the magazines or booklets he gets.

That would be a fitting tribute to Schaefer.

(Schaefer said he works with 55 lawyers in the Barrier-Free program with advocacy, legislation, rehabilitation, awareness, independent living, access, employment, rehab, engineering, networking, mainstreaming, job training and civil rights.)

Everyone laughed, joked (there were jokes and cute sayings everywhere, inside and out), visited and snacked until noon, including those in and out of the swimming pool.

Some of the foods served for lunch, other than the brisket, plain and barbecued) included macaroni and cheese, pinto beans, mashed potatoes,

broccoli and cheese, two casseroles of baked beans, German potato salad, deviled eggs, yeast rolls, fresh fruit salad, cranberry jello salad, cookies, peach and berry cobblers, banana nut cake, pecan and vanilla chess pies, Rice Krispies treats (plain and peanut butter), and a table with chips, dips, colas, coffee and tea. The snack table was available all day. This food all came together by each family bringing their favorite dish or dishes.

After lunch, the games began. The younger ones mostly swam and played on the trampoline, but the older cousins inhabited the carport playing table games, but the parents, aunts and uncles of the older cousins snatched a chair or sofa and took a nap or rested for about an hour.

During this lazy part of the day, a friend of the Finks, Melvin Travis, dropped by for a chat.

When it was time for supper, the hosts and hostesses grilled hamburgers, cheeseburgers and served them with the usual condiments.

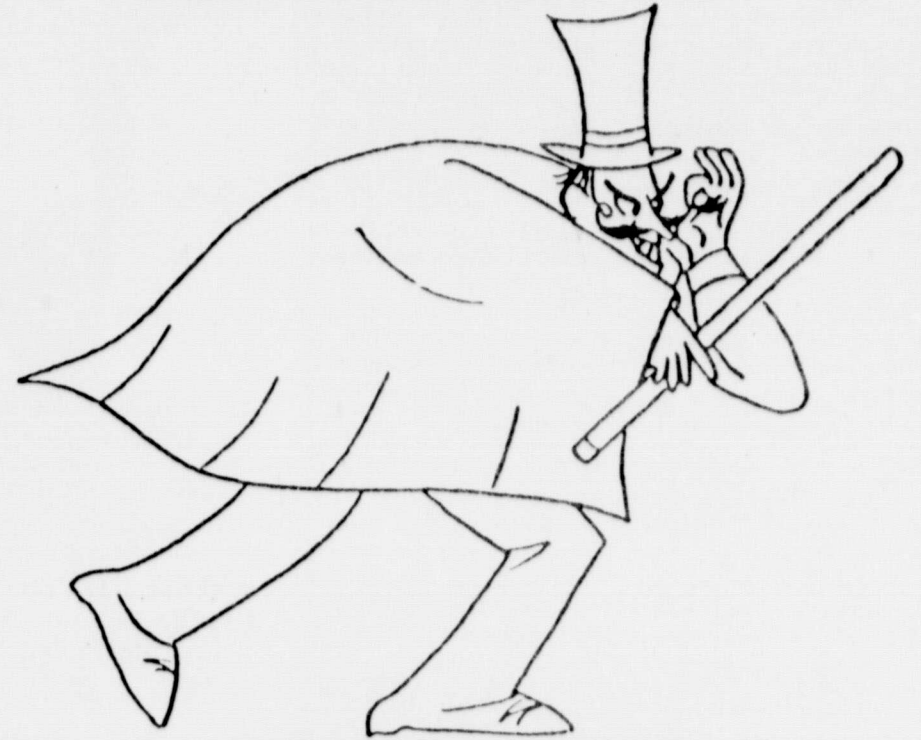

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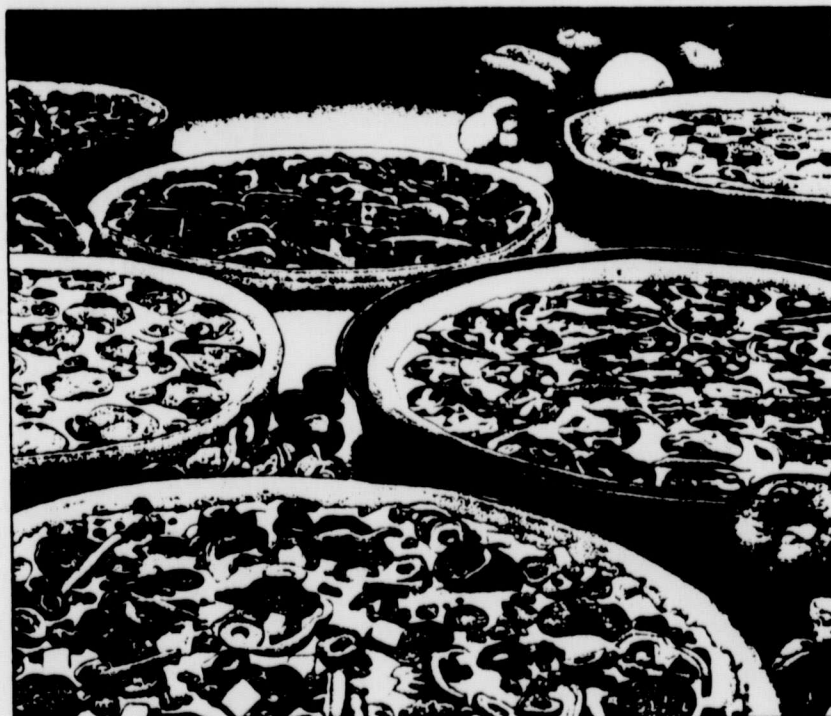

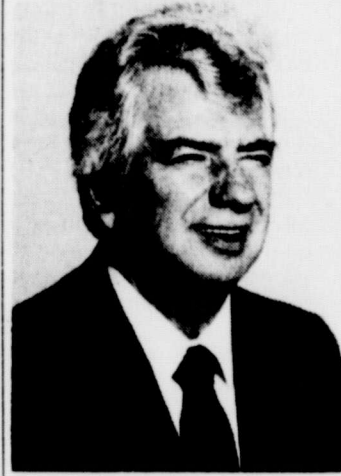

CJC Summer Production 'Tied To The Tracks'

Cisco Junior College's opening summer dinner theatre production of "Tied To The Tracks" has required hard work and much effort from many sources but perhaps none as great as that of Tom Brown, the director and designer of the production.

Tom has an extensive background in theatre, first becoming interested in theatre his junior year of high school when he performed in a "Some Like It Hot" type of comedy. The production was such a success that he did an encore performance the following year. His interest and involvement continued on varying levels but was really "sparked" when he met his future wife, Carol, who was then the director of Temple Civic Theatre. Since that time he has been involved in an average of one show a month, serving as actor, director or designer for such productions as "Cat On A Hot Tin Roof," "Stop The World I Want To Get Off," "West Side Story," "Mary, Mary," and numerous others.

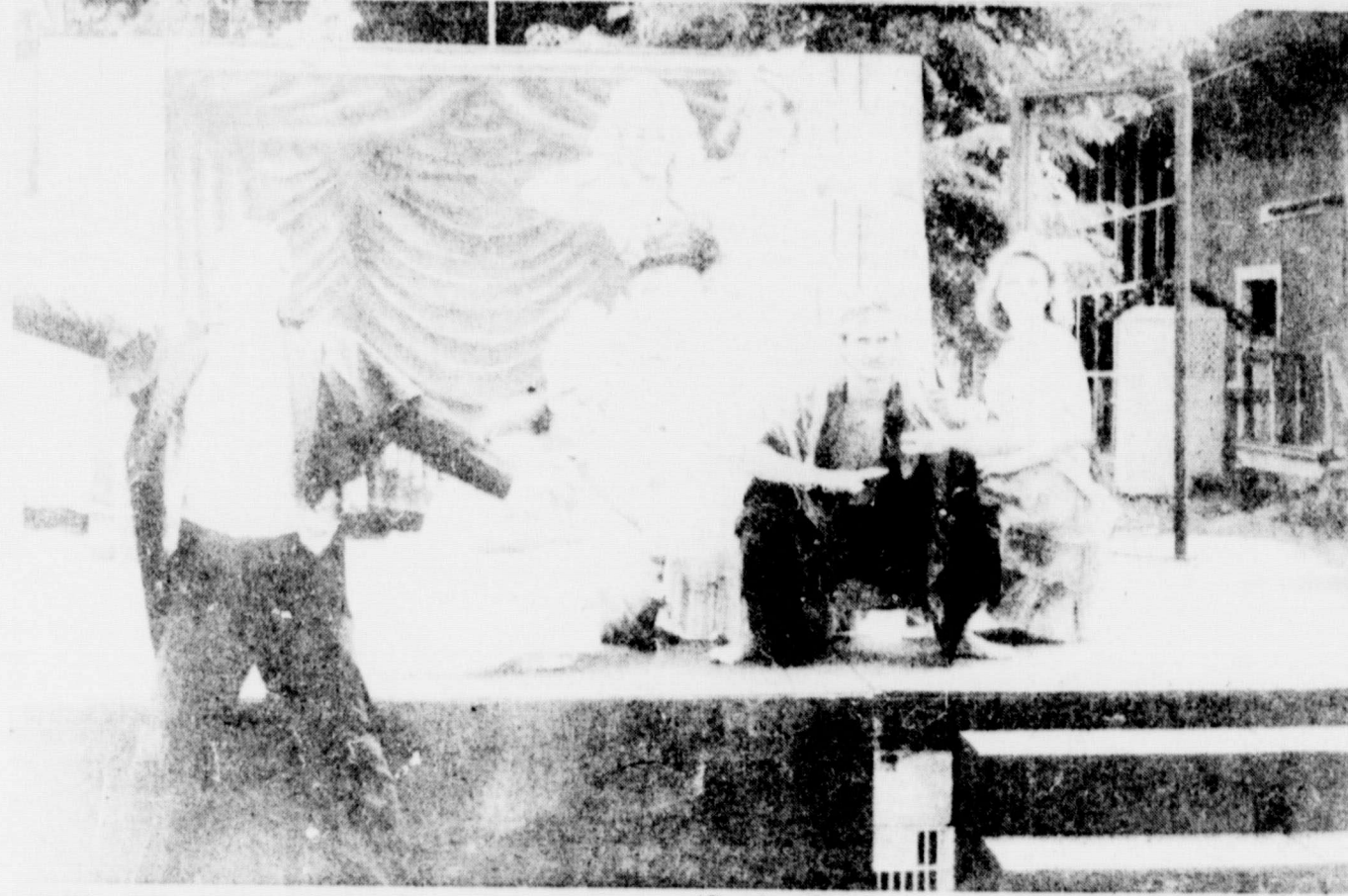
With his extensive background in theatre workshops, seminars and productions, Tom is well qualified to direct "Tied To The Tracks." "I prefer dinner theatre. You can sit comfortably with your friends in a much more intimate at-

mosphere. The informal, friendly atmosphere," he states, "make a viewer more at ease and therefore, able to further enjoy the show."

The AARP Tax-Aide program is reminding all taxpayers who must make quarterly payment on their income tax that the second payment is about due. The Internal Revenue Service requires that taxpayers owing more than \$500 on their income tax return for 1988 must pay an estimated tax quarterly. Estimated tax is the amount of tax you expect to owe for the year, after subtracting the amount of tax you wish to have withheld from salaries or wages.

The deadline for the second quarterly installment is June 15, 1988, and you may

be charged a penalty for not making the payment on time. Taxpayers who must make estimated payments should use the 1040-ES payment voucher that is dated "Due June 15, 1988," and should also be sure to write on the payment check or money order their social security number and "1988 Form 1040-ES." This is very important so as to prevent the loss or misplacement of your check. All estimated tax payments from Eastland, Callahan and Stephens counties must be mailed to "Internal Revenue Service Center, Austin, Texas 73301" by June 15, 1988.

All taxpayers do not need to pay estimated tax, but if you have any questions or should need assistance, call your nearest Senior Citizen Center and make an appointment with an AARP Tax-

TEXAS AND THE LEGISLATURE

by SENATOR

BOB GLASGOW



Texas' tax structure has not worked well at times when oil revenues were down and other important economic elements were weak. Because of this, since 1983, the State Texas has been experiencing a fiscal crisis. This required the Texas Legislature during Regular and Special Sessions over the past several years to reduce funding and eliminate or reduce services. When this was not enough, due to the severity of the crisis, additional revenue had to be raised. Given the long-standing problem and recognizing the need for a revision of the Texas tax system, during the 1987 Legislative Session, the Legislature passed H.B. 2. This legislation created the Select Committee on Tax Equity.

The mission statement of the Committee is to recommend to the State the standards and options for developing a fair, viable and economically competitive state and local tax system capable of generating sufficient revenues to meet expected needs in the future.

Membership is composed of four public members appointed by the Governor; two public members and two members of the Senate appointed by the Lt. Governor; two public members and two members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and the Comptroller of Public Accounts. I was appointed to serve on this Committee.

The Committee began conducting meetings in May, 1987. The next regular meeting is scheduled for 9 a.m., Thursday, June 30 in the Senate Chamber of the State Capitol in Austin.

Through extensive research as well as these monthly public hearings, which have been held across the State, the Committee is gathering information on available revenue options and defining the relationship between taxes and the benefits Texans receive for their tax dollars. We are additionally evaluating the impact of Federal tax reform on the Texas State and local tax system, businesses and individuals, as well as the forecasts of the most likely range of State and local revenue needs. It is the Committee's responsibility to present its findings and recommendations to the Legislature and Governor.

before the 71st Regular Session convenes in January, 1989.

In 1986, Texas received \$18.4 billion from all revenue sources. Taxes amounted to \$10.2 billion of this total, or about 55.6%. The largest of the individual State taxes is the sales tax, producing 42.3% of total tax income. This contributes almost 25% of the overall State income. The sales tax was first enacted in 1961, and had virtually no changes until 1984. As you know, Texas is one of five states which does not impose a corporate income tax and one of seven which does not impose a personal income tax. When combining State and local taxes, Texas is in the low middle when considering per capital taxes.

As mandated by the law which established this Committee, areas of study are to assess the impact of state and local taxation on economic development in this State; the relative portion of the total amount of these taxes that is received from each segment of the business community and each category of individual taxpayers; and the relationship between taxes and the revenue needs of state and local governments and between the tax burden and benefits taxpayers receive from government in this State.

There are nine criteria being used as a framework of reference in the Committee's efforts to evaluate the Texas state and local tax system and possible tax policy alternatives. They are essentially the features which can be said to be characteristic of a "good" tax system. They include: adequacy, equity, efficiency, economic competitiveness, stability, simplicity, balance, broad based taxes and intergovernmental linkages.

The changes made to the tax system during the Second Special Session of the Legislature in July, 1987, are included in the area being analyzed. At that time the budget for fiscal years 1988-1989 was balanced, and the Comptroller has recently released estimates reflecting that there should be no deficit to eliminate at the end of Fiscal Year 1989. Part of the balanced budget was accomplished by one-time provisions which will not be available in 1990 and the years to follow. The loss of revenue from these temporary measures must also be considered.

Letter To The Editor

Editor:

Most insurance companies consider any place over twenty years old, and over five miles from a fire department too great a risk to insure.

We live in a thirty year old wood frame house eight miles from the nearest fire department. In the past three years our insurance premium has increased from \$350.00 a year to \$850.00, with steadily reduced coverage.

We have never filed a claim in the eighteen years we have lived here, but are down only to one company that will offer us any insurance. If this company decides not to renew our policy next year, the Federal Land Bank will probably demand the balance due on our loan on the house.

I have written the chairman of the State Board of Insurance, the chairman of the House Committee on Insurance and my state senator for help in reversing the trend for rural insurance.

I have suggested to them that a rural home owner's insurance pool be established similar to the pools for high risk automobile drivers or workmen's compensation coverage. If a policy holder does not file any claims for some period of time - say five years - the premiums could be reduced as an incentive not to abuse insurance coverage.

With the insurance industries' position on rural coverage, I would not build a new home in a rural area and will advise anyone else not to. They may insure a new home now, but they are presently free to drop coverage whenever they think the risk is too great.

I urge all rural residents to write Austin in support of the insurance pool or suggest your own ideas to improve the rural insurance dilemma. Two important addresses are:

Homemaking Hints

HOW DO YOU LIKE YOUR DENIM?

The popularity of denim clothing is a wonderful example of the old saying that "you can't please all of the people all of the time." For every person who likes faded denim, there seems to be another who is unhappy about creases, steaking or color loss.

Denims Always Lose Dye
Changing in most denim fabrics are inevitable because they're indigo piece dyed fabrics. The dye is applied in a heavily concentrated form so the residuals are most on the surface of the fabric. Friction with the body, rubbing or mechanical action during laundering will dislodge the dye particles from clothing.

The loss of color will be most apparent on creases, double seam thickness and edges, since they receive greater abrasion. Heavy denim lacks draping capabilities and retain the same position of creases in the washer and dryer, this also contributes to color loss and streaking.

Reducing Color Loss, Creases and Streaks

So what if you don't like the creases and streaks? They can't be eliminated, but you can reduce them. Turn the garment inside out for washing if it's not heavily soiled. Underload the washer, increase the water level and shake out the garment before putting in the dryer.

Another alternative is to buy jeans made from a polyester-cotton blend. The dyes used on blends are different from the dyes used on 100% cotton, and are less likely to fade.

Fading Your Denim and Jeans

Do you like the faded, streaked look for your jeans and other denim clothes? If you do, you can save some money by purchasing regular denim cloth or clothes and fading them yourself.

At least two companies are marketing products for fading denim at clothing. **Fast Fade For Jeans** is made by the Rit Company. It's a concentrated pre-wash

product designed to fade and soften jeans and denim. The product claims that it fades and softens jeans right in the washer without damage to the fabric.

Old Blue is a denim pre-wash that softens and fades in one washing. It's manufactured by Malco Products, Inc.

Cautions On Bleaching And Fading

Bleaching jeans will weaken the fibers, so they will not be as strong and durable as they were before the bleaching process. Commercial pre-wash products may also have a similar effect.

Rubbing wet denim with a pumice stone or rubbing an emery board on seam edges, pockets and other areas to produce a stone-washed or worn look also weakens the fabric in those places.

However, people who like the faded look will gladly trade durability for fashion.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK: Summertime means lots of fresh garden squash. Try this delicious squash casserole.

South-Of-The-Border Squash Casserole

- 1 1/2 lb. yellow squash, chopped
- 1 med. onion, chopped
- 2 tsp. butter
- 1 4 oz. can chopped green chilies
- 2 tsp. flour
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1/2 c. grated Monterey Jack cheese
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 c. cottage cheese
- 2 tsp. chopped parsley
- 1/2 c. grated Parmesan cheese

Saute - squash and onion in butter in skillet until tender-crisp.

Add - chilies, flour, salt and pepper, mixing well.

Pour - into greased 2-quart baking dish. Sprinkle with Monterey Jack cheese.

Legal Notices

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform consumers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though Cisco's water system is not in violation of current standards. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The following specific language is required by EPA in this notice:

"The United States Environmental Protection Agency sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

"Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

"EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

"Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

"1. if your home or water system has lead pipes; or
"2. if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and if the home is less than five years old, or if you have soft or acidic water, or if water sits in the pipes for several hours."

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder or flux were used in your home plumbing.

The City of Cisco will continue to monitor for potential lead exposure in the city's water system through regular testing of water samples for lead content. The City will also mitigate potential exposure by the continual strict enforcement

of the city's plumbing codes which prohibit the use of lead, lead pipes or lead solder in home plumbing.

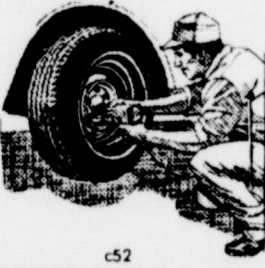

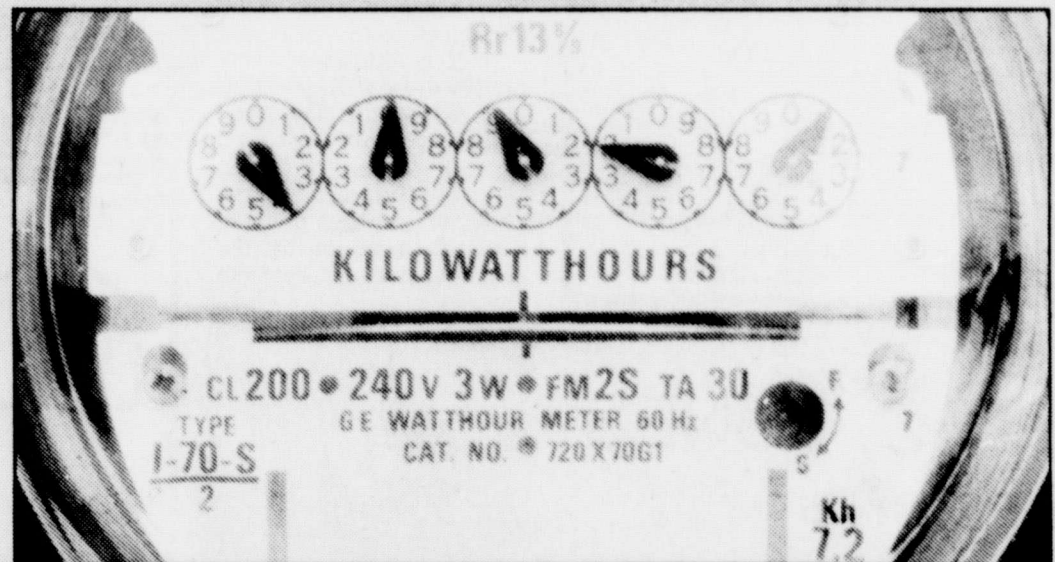
