County Judge Scott Bailey and County Commissioners had planned a public hearing on the proposed budget for 1989 when they met in the Courthouse Monday, June 13.

Seven of the County Officials had failed to turn in their proposed budgets by this date, however. So the hearing could not be completed.

Judge Bailey did discuss some of the uses of Federal Revenue Sharing money, in case any more is sent the

It can be used for County Extension work, Law Enforcement Public Transportation (Road and Bridge Fund), Rural Firefighting, Libraries, he said

On the general expenditures, the Judge said each Commissioners meeting would probably have to include a budget worksession until matters were finalized. The fiscal year begins Oct. 1, 1988.

Attention then turned to rural roads. Paul E. Fox, who lives 4 and one-half miles N.E. of Desdemona, Pct. 2, spoke to the Commissioners about road conditions in neighborhood.

"People say Christie Oil and Gas has torn up our roads," he said. "We had no roads to begin with."

He said that local roads "are in worse shape now than they were in 1945." Damage to a low-water crossing has made the road to Howard Cemetery almost impassable, he said.

"People wonder what our tax money is supposed to be spent for," he remarked. "We pay the extra \$5 Road and Bridge Tax. Who gets it?

Mary Archer, who lives on the same road, told of heavy and dangerous truck traffic, noise and dust. She had moved there from a city to get away from traffic and noise, she said and landed around something like Grand Central Station. She said she felt that Christie Gas needed another route to their plant.

Joe Shepard, Vice President of Christie Gas Transmission Corp., also spoke to the Commissioners. "We have definitely roughed up the roads in the area, especially with the roads not having any base," he said.

He explained that 20 to 40 trucks travel this narrow country road about 14 hours each day, and a lot more traffic is due when Christie Gas enlarges the plant. By October the plant will be larger than the old El Paso Hydrocarbon System, he said.

"We will need an all-

m.p.h. speed limit on County Road 436, a 1.9 mile stretch which leads down to EBAA Iron, located five miles southeast of Eastland. Some traffic was reported to be moving as fast as 70-80 m.p.h. on that little road.

The Commissioners looked at a letter from Charles W. Heald, District Engineer from the State Department of Highways. He reminded them of Federal Safety inspections on bridges

In other matters, Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pct. 4, reported that 22 prisoners were in the County Jail, and it "looked clean." He was also pleased to report that a San Angelo firm had finally fixed the outside speakers on the Inter-coms. This should keep the facility in compliance with "guidelines" of the State Jails Commission.

> As you know, the "mosquito season" is upon us and the muchly needed rain Cisco received last week followed by the hot, sunny weather we are experiencing now has

> Water is the key ingredient in breeding of mosquitos. All mosquitos start their existence in water and need water through their early life stages. Adult flying mosquitos frequently rest in grass, shrubbery or other foilage, sustaining themselves on the moisture. In breeding, some mosquitos lay their eggs in standing water where the eggs hatch in a day or two. Other mosquitos however, lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers in which they remain unhatched for weeks or even months until the eggs are covered with

> The City of Cisco has already started a program of regularly "fogging" to help control the mosquito problem, and plans to continue the program throughout the summer season. However, to help control and alleviate the mosquito problem there are many things individuals can and should do. Some of the things that should be done around your home and community are to properly dispose of old tires, tin cans, bottles, jars, buckets, drums, and other containers and debris on your property; empty small toddler-sized wading pools at least weekly and store indoors when not in use; repair leaky pipes or outside faucets; scrub and change water in bird baths twice weekly; empty water pans of pets daily; AND MOST IMPORTANTLY, KEEP YOUR LAWNS AND ALLEYS MOWED REGULARLY.

Of course, the problem of mosquitos cannot be completely solved, but every effort made to remove any place where they might breed and thrive will be of great help. With the cooperation of all its residents, the mosquito problem in Cisco can be significantly alleviated.

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Fishing Outdoors

Old Whiskers is Biting June isn't known for being an excellent big catfish month in our area. Small channel catfish is the normal June fish. Well this year unexpected and greatly needed rains have turned the big yellows on in area lakes. This past weekend at Lake Leon a 43 pound, 22 pound, and a 12 pound yellow were reported.

Hubbard Creek yielded a giant 93 pound yellow which could qualify for a I.G.F.A. record properly documented.

Lake Daniels saw two cats in the 30 pound class. And these cats listed are only what we found out about, I'm sure many more were caught.

I mentioned June as an excellent channel catfish month, well they are not disappointing us so far. At Lake Leon anglers were using skinner lines with cut bait to load the boat. One group reported removing 15 channels in the 3-6 pound range. These lines were placed in newly inundated vegetation in 1 to 3 feet of water. Oxygen and migration of forage fish pulled these channels in to the shallows with a big appetite.

Surprisingly some of the trotliners we talked to were still reporting bait dying in the 8-12 foot water as they were prior to the lake rise. The areas of this dead water are not as large as prior to the fresh water, but is still affecting some lines. And don't forget to update your tags on your lines or chance having them removed.

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

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


Kyle Anderson Graduates From Junior College




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
