## Drug Enforcement Program Considered A Success

Over 130 persons listened to four speakers and watched a video on the problems of drug abuse and ways to help stop the abuse, at the Drug Enforcement Program, held last Wednesday night, in Cisco. The Program, sponsored by the Cisco Lions Club and the Cisco Police Department was a depiction of the drug problem across the United States and in Cisco and Eastland County.

Chuck Huthmaker, canine enforce officer with the Department of the Treasury, U.S. Custom Service at the DFW Airport, brought a police K-9 dog, Jessie. Jessie gave a demonstration on finding a small pouch of marijuana hidden in a box set beside some empty boxes.

Jessie is an 8-year old Golden Retriever. Huthmaker said dogs have a 100 to 10,000 times better smelling capabilities than what man has. He said Jessie can smell out a small marijuana seed out of 100 envelopes. Huthmaker said this is where Jessie can help, because there is a heavy drug flow in the mail system. Jessie has been on the force for 6 1/2 years.

The dog is rewarded when finding drugs by getting to play with a rolled up cotton terry towel. This is how he is paid. Huthmaker said the dog believes that at the source of the odor of drugs is the towel. He said that is how they are trained. The dog was able to find the correct box and then proceeded to tear into the box by scratching and biting.

Huthmaker said the Supreme Court recently passed a law that says a police dog is an extension of the police officers senses. If a person is arrested because of the reaction of the dog, the evidence can be used in court.

John Lund, special agent with the U.S. Justice Department, narcotics division out of Ft. Worth, said drug use is a symptom of an underlying problem. He said the people in this area are lucky to be living in a rural area. He said the heroin problem in Dallas is extra bad. Lund said rural areas do not have the heroin problem of the larger cities because most addicts need to use the drug three to four times a day, and they want to be around other addicts. And, they need a town where they can steal merchandise to sell and buy more drugs, which in turn, leads to high crime.

Lund said the cost of marijuana is now \$500 a pound. He said in a recent national

survey, in high school seniors there is a slight decrease in marijuana usage. But, he said, the use of cocaine is really taking on fast. He said five years ago it cost \$60,000 a kilo on the Ft. Worth streets, but now it cost \$16,000. He said there is now a 250 percent increase in the availability of cocaine.

Lund said dope dealers do not ever stop. He said they can not be rehabilitated. He said another drug is speed, a white powder that ruins people and can be made and sold very cheap. He said it is a very devastating drug. He said a lot of speed factories are in the rural areas. He said if someone who lives in the country smells an obvious odor when the wind blows just right, to call the law, because their neighbors might be manufacturing speed. He said a lot of dopers from Fort Worth are here in this part of the country manufacturing speed.

Lund said if anyone sees a pickup parked somewhere loaded with chemicals and glassware to call the police. Someone who is manufacturing the speed will have a load of phenylacetic acid. Lund said if anyone walks by the pickup they can feel a tingling on their skin. He said this is one way to tell if it is the acid.

Lund said one way the law enforcement officers are ruining dopers and dealers is with the civil seizure laws. He said last year they seized \$5 million dollars in cash assets. Lund said, "But don't think any community is safe. The drug problem today is worse than what it has ever been." He added, "Nobody is safe."

Michael D. Dromgoole, special agent with the Drug Enforcement administration with the United States Department of Justice in Dallas, said experts today say it will take at least 10 years to turn the drug problem around. He said one way is to have Drug Enforcement programs such as the one Wednesday.

Dromgoole said peer pressure can work both ways. He said if groups can get started with students who are drug free, and they receive special discounts, and will be the first to be hired for a job, then it will begin to turnaround. He said it will take awhile, but it can be done.

He said America is the most drug abusing nation in the world. And he can't understand that because America is also the most educated and has the most

income for each citizen. He said the Texas Education agency needs to teach students on how to deal with peer pressure and how to be healthful beginning in kindergarten and then in the fifth grade start teaching about drugs.

He said the best kind of program though is where the entire community becomes involved. He said in Kilgore their drug problem was really bad, and the high school students volunteered to undergo a drug test. He said they had drug test every Wednesday and if a student showed positive they underwent counseling with no arrest. He said the peer pressure was turned around so that it is better not to use drugs. He said the police, parents and the schools need to become involved in getting rid of the drug problem.

Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains told the crowd that he believes that 90 percent of all the crime in Cisco is drug related. He said since he took over as chief of police, there have been 333 burglaries, 350 thefts 149 assaults, and 187 criminal trespasses. He said there has been \$542,561.75 worth of damage and loss in Cisco since 1983, and that's not counting the cost of the fires two years ago that were started to conceal burglaries. Rains said the Cisco Police Department has arrested people on drug charges, possession of drug paraphernalia, misdemeanor drug possession, felony drug possession, possession of marijuana and controlled substance.

Rains said 70 percent of all crimes in the United States are drug related. He said that 80 percent of the inmates in prison were involved with drugs. He said there are lots of speed labs in Cisco. He said there are two different kinds of speed. And, he said, taking speed is just like killing yourself.

Rains said three years ago there were four 10-year old boys caught smoking marijuana at the Cisco Elementary. Another boy in Cisco told Rains that he has using marijuana and speed since he was 14-years old.

Rains said the purpose of the Drug Enforcement Program is to raise a little bit of money for a narcotic dog. He said the Cisco Police force will work the dog if they get one. Rains said he has no sympathy for those who deal drugs. He said he feels sorry for those who use narcotics, but there is no sympathy for the pusher.

Rains said the police know who the dealers and users are in town, but it has to be under the right circumstances to make an arrest.

Sue Lacy, Cisco Service Club president, presented Chief Rains with a check for \$250.00, to be used to help buy the K-9 police dog. Rains said the fund had about \$1,000, and he did appreciate the thoughtfulness of the Service Club. Chief Rains said

# Eastland County To Decide If 911 Emergency Number Comes Into This Area

Gorman and Rising Star are very enthusiastic about the possibility of the 911 Emergency Number being placed in Eastland County, according to Mike Moore, Cisco City Manager. Moore talked to the council members during the City Council meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall. Moore said Eastland has not had a meeting about the 911 number yet, and Ranger is

looking for more input from their citizens, before they make a commitment. There has been a favorable reaction from the citizens of Cisco, Moore said. If approved, citizens in the six Eastland County towns can dial the three digit 911 Emergency Number and be in contact with the law enforcement offices, fire departments or ambulance service in their town. Moore

said at the present time there is a central seven digit phone number for the law enforcement offices, but the phone number is a toll call for Rising Star and Gorman. It is not long distance for Cisco, Eastland, Olden and Ranger. And the number is only for law enforcement, he said, not for the other two emergency services.

Moore told council members that it is that time of the year again for the city to establish a budget. He said he would like to do like they did last year and set up a work session to help work on a budget. Council members approved a time for the work session. It will be held at 3:00 p.m., on Tuesday, June 28 in the council chambers. Moore said council members need to have a draft for the fiscal year 1988-89, ready by the July 9, meeting. He said they will have the budget ready by the August 23, meeting so it can be approved at the September 13, city council meeting.

During the citizen-council discussion, Mrs. Floyd Fisher, presented a check to the city council in the amount of \$1,500. Moore said this amount is almost half the cost of paving the street in front of her home on East 14th. Moore said ordinarily that street would not have been paved, due to the fact that it is not a heavily travelled road, and it is a dead end street. He said the city will pay for the other \$2,200, that is the cost of the materials to pave the street. Moore said the city of Cisco has very limited resources and they have to abide with the city's street paving ordinances, but since Mr. and Mrs. Fisher are so willing to help improve the area in which they live, the City of Cisco will work with them.

Moore told council members he and Mayor Joe Wheatley have talked to the owners of Patterson Ambulance Service. Patterson serves Cisco and Eastland at the present time. The ambulance service does not receive any subsidies from either city. Moore said Patterson is a private business and the only involvement the city of Cisco has is the endorsement of the membership drive. Moore said Patterson told

Moore told Council members he would like to have a ballot printed in the local newspapers describing the 911 Emergency number and asking citizens whether they would like to have this service brought into Eastland County. He said Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., will charge each telephone customer a maximum of 50 cents a month, per line, in a business or home to pay for the expenses of the line. Moore said the cost could be less, but it will not be any more than 50 cents a month. He said when the amount is collected, then the 911 number will be put in.

In other matters, Council members passed the motion made to approve a Resolution of the City of Cisco, authorizing the Mayor to execute a contract with Eastland County Appraisal district for tax assessment services for 1988-89. Moore said the contract will become effective July 1, 1988, and shall continue for one year. He said this is a regular function Cisco has done since the city does not have a tax collector. He added there is no cost to the city of Cisco for this service.

Council members also approved the appointment of Joe Cooper as City Auditor for the fiscal year, 1987-88. Moore said Mr. Cooper has been doing this job for about 9 years and they are pleased with his work. There has never been an increase in his price and Moore said, Cooper is familiar with the city books.

Moore said Patterson told another woman, gave a check for \$50.00 check before the program began. Envelopes with forms inside were passed out to the people who attended the program. There were places for people to fill out their name, address, city and phone number and the amount they wished to contribute or to pledge to help buy the K-9 dog. A total of \$590.00 was given or pledged for the dog. If anyone would like to help with the purchase of a K-9 Police Patrol Dog, for the Cisco Police Department they may send their donation to the Special Police Dog Fund, Olney Savings, 701 Conrad Hilton Avenue

## Manage Lawn To Cut Water Bill

When the weather turns dry, don't just turn on your lawn sprinkler and then gripe about your high water bill.

By watering, fertilizing and mowing your lawn properly, you can reduce your water bill as much as 40 percent, said a turfgrass specialist.

"Conservation by the homeowner provides the only solution to high water bills and excessive water demands during our hot and usually dry Texas summers," said Dr. Richard Dumble with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

In small cities where industrial demand for water is low, lawn watering may account for as much as half of all the water used during summer months. Even in larger cities, lawns get 30 to 40 percent of all the water supplied by municipalities.

"Most Texas lawns use about 2 inches of water per week during the summer, and most of this usually comes from irrigation," Dumble said. "However, as little as 1 inch of water per week can keep lawns alive and green."

Exactly what can a homeowner do to reduce the summer water bill? "First, water your lawn only when grass starts to show signs of drought stress," Dumble said. "Look for discoloration and wilting. If leaves roll up in the late afternoon and footprints remain after walking across the lawn, then water within 24 hours."

"Once you've decided that your lawn needs watering, do it right," said the specialist.

"Most homeowners don't water their lawns properly. They either water too often, causing grass to develop shallow roots and making it a prime target for insects, diseases and temperature extremes, or they water too infrequently and apply too much water at one time, resulting in a lot of runoff."

"When watering, soak the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches," Dumble said. In heavy clay soils, watering for 15- to 20-minute periods may be necessary to prevent excessive runoff.

"Cutting back on lawn fertilization can also reduce

watering," said Dumble. Applying fertilizer in the spring and fall will generally keep your lawn healthy. Fertilizing during the summer, especially with nitrogen fertilizer, will green up your lawn, but it will also increase grass growth and water use.

"Mowing less often and cutting your grass at taller heights also will help keep your lawn in better shape during hot, dry weather," said the specialist. "St. Augustine grass lawns do well when mowed at a 3-inch height, and bermudagrass lawns can be cut at a 2-inch height."

## Highway Work Poses Hazards

The highways of Texas will be more crazy than lazy and hazy this summer. Summer is construction season, and soon increasing numbers of the familiar concrete barriers and orange traffic cones will provoke driver dismay all over the state.

But the temporary lower speed limits around work zones aren't a sinister plot to tie you up in traffic, and slowing down to the posted speed is not the mark of a

wimp. Just look at the facts. In the past three years, 58,291 accidents occurred in construction areas on Texas streets and roads. Of those accidents, 385 resulted in deaths.

"Construction and maintenance workers and managers want good traffic flow through construction areas, since that means fewer headaches and complaints," says Roger Welsh, the state highway department's deputy director for design and construction.

"But reduced speeds must be posted for many reasons: narrowed lanes, increased congestion, construction equipment, decreased stopping distance, and the danger posed by rubbernecking drivers," he explains.

Remember the last time you stopped by the side of the road? Recall the buffeting of the wind as cars and trucks zoomed past. Consider the damage a vehicle could do to you if the driver made just a slight miscalculation. Now imagine yourself in a highway worker's safety vest, working all day by the edge of the road, intent upon your task, while autos zip by at high speed.

Slowing down and staying extra alert in these zones is a courtesy toward the men and

women who do the risky work of improving highways. In this work environment, they can do little to protect themselves from reckless motorists; they must depend on the public to drive safely.

"Maintaining our roadways is of utmost importance," Welsh said. "The highway department is still catching up from years of low funding, when construction and repairs had to be deferred." At any one time this summer, 15,000 miles of state roadway will be undergoing work ranging

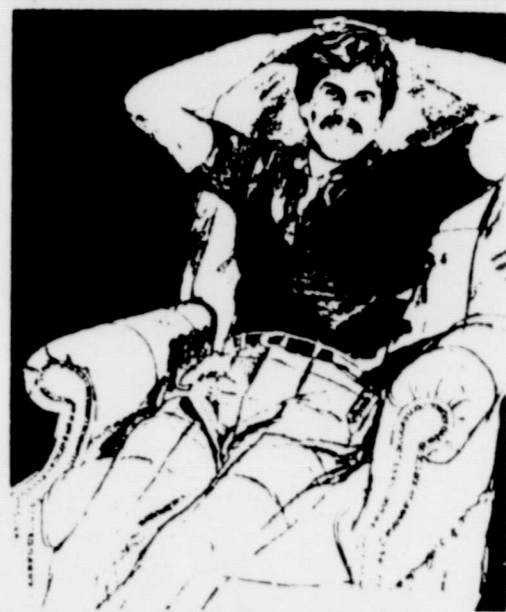
from resurfacing to complete reconstruction. City and county road departments will also be active.

Though road work is a nuisance, think what would happen if the work were curtailed. Soon potholes, congestion, crumbling pavement, wornout bridges, and other problems would slow you down everywhere.

So when you see "Reduced Speed Ahead" or "Slow" signs brandished by construction workers, drive friendly.

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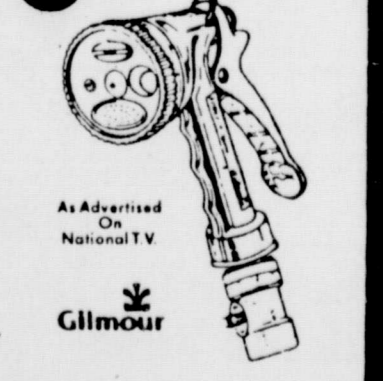
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# Cisco Junior College Production Of "Tied To The Tracks"

**Gordon Spot**

**By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—**

This is the time of year when all kinds of pests are causing problems in gardens, lawns and crops. Since a number of the phone calls to the Extension office are the same, I decided to list some typical questions and answer those questions in this column.

**What causes the black spots on rose leaves and what do I do about it?**

There are two major diseases of roses, blackspot and powdery mildew. Black spots ranging in size from one-eighth to one-half inch in diameter form on leaves. Infected leaves soon turn yellow and drop. This disease is more likely to occur when the weather is warm and humid.

Powdery mildew is a white powdery growth that occurs on leaves, buds and twigs causing them to be distorted and dwarfed. This disease is more likely to occur when the weather is cool and dry.

Both of these diseases should be prevented rather

than attempting to control after they occur. Begin the spray schedule as soon as new growth commences in the spring and repeat applications at intervals of 7 to 10 days throughout the growing season. But, if you haven't already started, begin now and prevent further damage. Some fungicides that will prevent both diseases are Benomyl, folpet (Phaltan), and triforine (Funginex).

**What causes tomato leaves to curl?**

The exact cause of this tomato leafroll is not fully known. Tomato leafroll appears about the time of fruit setting. The leaflets of the older leaves on the lower half of the plant roll upward. The overall growth of the plant does not seem to be greatly affected and yields are normal. This condition appears to be most common on stalked and pruned plants. It occurs when overwatering keeps the soil too wet for too long. It is also

related to intensive sunlight which causes carbohydrates to accumulate in the leaves. Some varieties are characteristically curled.

**What causes my tomato leaves to turn yellowish and fall off?**

This could be spider mites, diseases, or nutrient deficiencies. Examine the underside of the leaves for small red to greenish mites. If mites are found, treat with kelthane, malathion, or sulfur dust. Make two or

three applications at 5-day intervals for best results.

Each year my yellow squash plants do a peculiar thing. Toward early to mid-summer the plants which once produced yellow fruit start producing green or often yellow and green fruit. This is generally accompanied by a twisting or mottling of the leaves. What could possibly be causing this problem?

Your plants have been infected by a virus disease, most often squash mosaic virus. This virus is transmitted to your plants by insects which have been feeding on other virus-infected squash plants or perhaps some wild plant. Once the plant gets this disease nothing can be done. Best preventive measures include insect control and planting varieties which will mature early in the year.

The green squash is still good to eat if harvested at the proper stage of maturity. There will be little change in taste. But, it's best to pull the plant up and dispose of its since the virus will eventually kill it and it is a source of infection for your healthy plants.

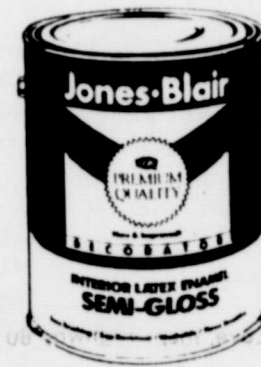

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# County Resources Association Continues Membership Drive

The Eastland County Resources Association met last Wednesday in Eastland Centennial Memorial Library.

Helen Osburn, presiding officer, reported that the organization was continuing with its membership drive. It now has ten members, some of whom joined during a recent mail-out. More letters will be sent out soon, she said.

The Association is seeking enough support, funds and volunteer work to deal with the critical needs of people in this County. Mrs. Osburn stressed that volunteer work was a very important part of it. This all-county group needs the support of leaders in every

community, she said.

Mrs. Osburn also asked for reports from those present. Margaret Corbell said that she planned to continue with the program of furnishing free garden seed to people who needed them to grow food. Some of those in the program plant the seed and give surplus to the needy.

Peggy Roberts, Director of the Multipurpose Center, said that had a very good supply of summer clothing at the Center. Those needs are being met.

The Multipurpose Center has also received a Homeless Client Grant to provide emergency places for the homeless to stay, she reported. This is a

recently appropriated fund.

Things did not look so good on Commodity Distribution, however.

"The commodities have been cut," Mrs. Robert said. "This month there will be butter, meal and flour, but no cheese."

"I'm sorry about the cheese. It supplimented the diets of a number of people."

She pointed out that the Commodity Program serves about 1500 people in the County.

Mary Dunn, Vista Volunteer in charge of the Food Pantry at the Multipurpose Center, said that she planned to purchase supplies for the Pan-

# Fishing Outdoors

The Eastland County Bass Clubs Fund Raiser winner was Rita Vasquez of Ranger. Rita will receive \$300.00 worth of merchandise at the Eastland Wal-Mart store. Bass Club officials want to say thanks to everyone who sponsored this fund raiser and a special thanks to the good folks at Wal-Mart who allowed members to set up in the store during National Fishing Week to promote this sport.

A recently completed pond study by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department appears to show that high population of threadfin shad can be detrimental to crappie production.

Biologist Clell Guest said while threadfin shad are a valuable forage fish for mature crappie and other predator fish, they compete with crappie fry for zooplankton and can cause reduced recruitment

(growth of immature fish into catchable sizes). On the other hand, Guest reported, stocking of threadfins into lakes with stunted crappie populations has improved the growth of crappie.

"The department has noted that crappie recruitment has been poor in some power plant-heated lakes that typically have dense populations of threadfin shad," said Guest. "This led us to believe the threadfins' presence might have some effect on crappie."

To determine this, a series of ponds at the department's Fort Worth Fish Hatchery were stocked with adult white crappie just prior to the spawning season. Adult threadfins were also stocked in some of the ponds. The ponds were drained in July and all fish recovered.

Guest said the production of crappie offspring

was reduced in the ponds with threadfin shad. Those ponds produced fewer, but larger, white crappie recruits. However, similar sized crappie in the crappie-only ponds were in poorer condition than those in ponds with threadfin shad. This suggests that threadfin shad improved condition and growth of surviving crappie recruits."

Guest said overall population structures of crappie and other fish in a reservoir should be taken into account before thread-

fin shad are introduced.

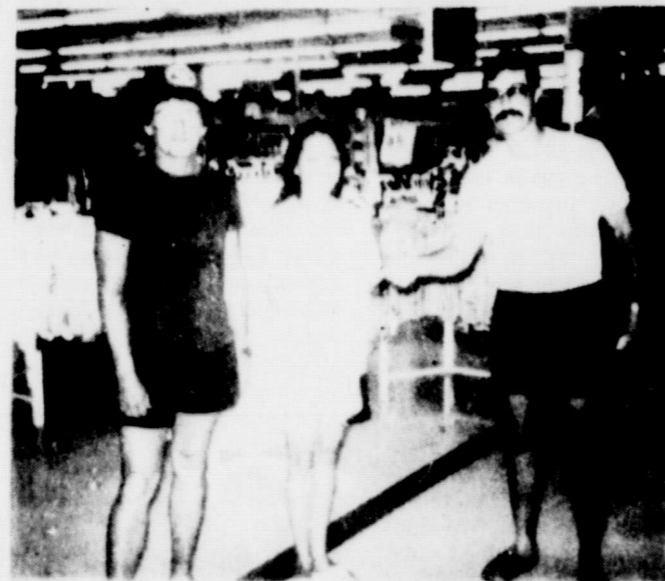

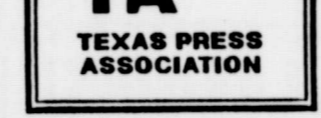
