Full Agenda For County Commissioners Monday

Eastland County Commissioners have a lot of items on their agenda when they meet Monday, June 27. The session will begin at 10 a.m. in the Courtroom on the second floor of the Courthouse. It will be open to the public.
A number of pipeline road crossings are listed, including one from Christie Gas, and others from Lone Star and Ensearch. A representative from Bengal Gas Transmission Co. will bring a request to lay a plastic gas pipeline in a county road right-of-way.
The Commissioners will consider a Petition for a County Road in Pet. 2. This will be presented by Clydell Lewis.
Also on the agenda is the purchase of radar equipment. Sgt. Jerry Mathews of the Department of Public Safety is bringing this request.
An appeal of eligibility for County Indigent Health Care will be considered by the Commissioners. Another agenda item will be a report on Jail standards and Jail inspection.
A Budget Conference and budgetary and appropriative matters are expected to take quite a bit of time. So the morning meeting could turn into an afternoon meeting as well.

David Callarman was approved as the delegate for the Texas Association School Board for the convention to be held in San Antonio. Ron Rhodes was appointed as the alternate delegate.

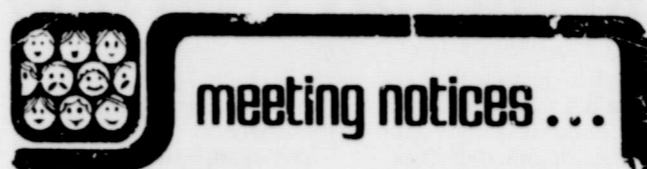

Increase Of Students At CJC Summer Session

Cisco Junior College has 886 students enrolled in their Summer session, which is an increase of 221 students over the attendance level of last year's summer session. This matter was presented to the Cisco Junior College Board of Regents at their regular meeting held June 13. All the members were present for the meeting.

In other matters, the board approved the May financial report given by Ralph Glenn.

Ralph Glenn and Herman Glueck approached the Board of Regents on the development of the B.B. Owens Land Site, located on Highway 80, just east of the Cisco city limits. The land was given to Cisco Junior

College. The Board made a motion to turn the matter over to Spencer Carver. Carver is the judge who worked with the agreement, when the land was given to CJC.

Board of Regent members moved to approve the increase of the Cosmetology fee for the fall semester that will begin in September.

The Board of Regents hired Cindy Dyer, of Baird, as the English instructor at the Cisco school and Burl Hallmark of Austin, a CPA, to be the Business Instructor in Cisco. Hallmark will be moving to Cisco this fall, it was reported. The Board also approved the part-time teachers as presented.

The Cisco Lions Club were shown a video on industrial plants in this area and around Ft. Worth for their program at their regular meeting held last Wednesday at Tradition's Restaurant.

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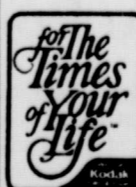

I've Been Wrong Before

In school they teach history and civics but the history class you can't skip is living in this World with no teacher ever equal to Old Mz. Experience. What puzzles me is the greater excitement over the offices most people have the least to say about who runs for and the very least influence in the functions of. The offices you are touched by most are local and the candidates are those you either know or can learn most about.

At times I vote against certain people but if neither major candidate suits me I vote a protest by write in or for a minor candidate who has no chance at all but NEVER would I vote for the lesser of two evils because evil is evil greater or lesser. Garbage about losing my vote never troubles me. At least it cannot be said that I was guilty of helping elect someone I don't approve of.

Reasons I have heard of for not voting include not wanting to be called for jury service since jury venaries are made from registration rolls. Another reason given for not registering is that "My vote don't count." To a great extent that is true until a race is so close they have a coin toss to decide who gets the office. At that time you risk getting the one you least want.

Certainly there are some who think it more important to watch their favorite soap opera than vote but while that segment prefer to retreat from reality by watching soap opera they are not watching the reality of their own lives. There are many who have voted regularly but seen their reality become steadily worse. They are frustrated and it would seem for good reason. Contrary to an old saying, hopes does not spring eternal within the human breast. We are so much exposed to the very rotten deeds of people in high places that they drop out.

I would not be surprised to hear jokes about our rulers in Washington (and make no mistake, they have made themselves rulers rather than servants) like the one about Diodgenese search ending in Mexico City. It could as easily end in D.C. either by the citizens at the bottom or by people in top government. Anyhow, the way the story went was that Diodgenese, the ancient Greek who went about in broad daylight with a lighted lantern saying he was searching for an honest man still roamed the World holding his light up and looking closely into peoples faces ended up in Mexico City where someone stole his lantern.

I hardly felt inspired to enter politics when Mother said she would never vote for an honest man because he could never remain honest in the contaminating influences in the capitols.

Even if we accepted that view we should try to elect the people who might do the most good while inflicting the least harm.

It hardly seems so much as twelve years past I sat in a local coffee shop talking to an aspiring politician who said, "If I can convince half of our citizens—". But I told him if the 50% he convinced weren't registered he got nowhere. "Well then, all we

need is the right 25%, then?" But about half of those registered still don't make it to the polls. "13% then?" Yes, but some Democrats vote a straight ticket and don't need persuaded while some Republicans would not be persuaded regardless so scratch maybe 3 or 4% more.

Slightly confused by then he asked just how many I believed did elect and how was the best way to convince them he was the best choice. So I told him that some people read and some listen before they make up their minds but many simply follow their favorite news man or other opinion molder and believe the decision is their own. Therefore, I advised him to go right on as before and as the others do but to particularly cultivate the good graces of editors, reporters, commentators and other opinion makers, yes, and even those who write nasty letters to editors for opinion columns. There are elections like in Israel where the parites select candidates behind closed doors and the public votes for one of the several parties rather than for individuals with the percentage of votes determining how many seats the party gets. Then there is the "American way" wherein it seems that with enough money contributed by special interests the public can be sold by the media on electing almost anybody. The days of candidates speaking from a stump, soap box or the bed of a backboard have been replaced by multimillion dollar TV blitz complete with make up men to be sure the nose doesn't shine to professional writers who deduce scientifically what is to be said and in what words. With all that the gripe about former actors like Reagan and Eastwood is invalid because they all have to be good actors on TV.

How strange it seems to some that the public participates less and less but many may be "turned off" if they wear out the remote control turning off politicians. Maybe if each home were equipped with a computer hook up where all they needed to do was push a vote button— Since the Constitution protects the religious freedom of those who think it is a sin to take part in the very governmental process that guarantees them that religious freedom we could not have laws as in some countries where they pay a fine if they fail to vote. So the great effort must be made from many sides trying to get citizens to register and vote. Should a thing supposedly so good and even vital require selling?

Do I intend to vote? ABSOLUTELY. There are some I just must vote AGAINST.

Ah wild, impetuous youth. I once was myself though looking at me some might doubt. Yes, wild, radical and full of rebellion. I was ever ready to figuratively seize the bull by the horns without pause to analyze the situation or consequence.

Some believe those were hectic days with war clouds gathering but to anyone at any time things can be hectic. While some of the boys left the CCC camp at Vista, Cal. to build an air field in Alaska I took a job at an aircraft factory in San Diego. Learning that workers (and loafers) at two other companies got more pay I joined the union in hope that collective bargaining might get equality.

It took over a year to decide that the "union" was little more than a dues collecting agency and too cozy with the company. A while after they got an agreement for the company to deduct union dues from our pay checks I decided to quit the union. However, the union people said I could not quit. Like an inexperienced young American I believed that having joined voluntarily I could just as voluntarily quit. Even the company refused at first to quit deducting dues.

Any more analytical mind would long before have decided that a company not able to give a nickel an hour raise would not assume the cost of changing papers to list deductions and do the extra bookkeeping to collect for the union which they claimed was a sworn enemy without something behind the scenes.

Being under 21 and at that time not subject to the draft, I cursed out the foreman and quit, went straight home and got engaged to be married. The company man told me that Roosevelt had issued an executive order freezing all defense workers to their jobs. I told him that if they had nothing better to do then sit and old FDR could sit around counting the days I was absent.

I quickly learned a job at a ship yard starting 30% higher than I had earned before and got married. Had I understood a certain terminology I could have drawn more than double. They said I could be a ship fitter if I knew "triangulation" but what was that? I had learned in 5th grade math that the sum of the square of the sides of a right angle was equal to the square of the hypotenuse. In the ship yard it was even simpler. Triangulation meant that if the sides of a triangle were in proportion of three, four, and five units the large angle opposite the long side must be 90 degrees. Thus the plate you were cutting would be squared at that end. Later I learned that people who make tests are either lazy or do not expect too much of the clouds they are to test and almost without exception the triangles they use are in the 3-4-5 proportion. The clinker was that once classified as fitters helper it would have been a long hard fight to be reclassified.

With the draft about to get me I didn't have the time and with a fitters classification I might have been exempted. Once again we are called upon to defend our American way of life and a load more of garbage I noted that they intended to push me into the Army so, having seen Navy recruiting posters about learning a useful trade I went Navy to demonstrate that Franklin D. was still not telling me what I had to do.

The recruiter said that all they had open was V6 Navy Reserve in the Navy Construction Battalion (the Sea Bees that is). Thinking that something was to be learned there I took it. Unfortunately, by avoiding the Army making a pack mule infantryman of me I found myself assigned to a seavander battalion which required nothing but a strong back and a weak mind. No transfers out were to be granted and as often before I felt boxed in. Then I decided to resist at every opportunity.

My resentment grew as I learned that with few

trained to lead, anyone with a college degree became an officer in 90 days even if the degree had absolutely no military application. A crafty bargainer could get a rating at the recruiting station and thus I was briefly (thank God briefly) under a chief petty officer who with tongue loosened by drink revealed that he had only been a stage hand in New York City than drove a taxi in Washington, D.C. Soon any respect I should have had for officers melted under the tropical sun.

Since half of our outfit got only three weeks of that years training Roosevelt promised our mothers their sons would get we were a bit rough. They claimed it was one of those terrible mistakes common in war but we had fired 15 shots with a regular rifle and 30 with a 22 cal. training piece before we shot Guadalcanal. Somehow those big city kids didn't give me a feeling of comfort. They hardly knew which end of a rifle to point and not sense enough to keep their heads down. Little wonder some died needlessly.

I was an angry young man with no convenient object to vent anger on. Thus, I was so insubordinate that the only reason I did not land in the brig was that with air raids and an island infested with Japanese they had no brig and one prisoner requires a three man guard detail. The men were needed elsewhere. Besides, I often vented my anger on work and on an argument loaded three times much cargo as another husky young man.

I believe the few old Anapolis trained officers didn't think the sun could rise unless piped up with a beatswains whistle. When one called me down for not addressing him as "SIR" I informed him that I was stuck for the duration of the war plus six months according to my enlistment papers after which I didn't give a hick of their lovely ships all went to the bottom. He near turned purple and went off talking to himself about "these blankety blank civilians in uniform." Not long after that one man became so violent that they built a stockade to hold him. After that I decided to "pipe down" somewhat.

My "ticket home" came barely six months after enlisting and my entire time in a sailor suit was 19 months with 13 of that served in hospitals. Now I see recruiting material on valuable training available reflect that even in a high tech service there still has to be someone who does the stinking job of hauling off garbage and it could be YOU. I advise young people to get all the education they can even if you barely get through or enlist early lest you end up in a raw, half trained war time unit with people like me.

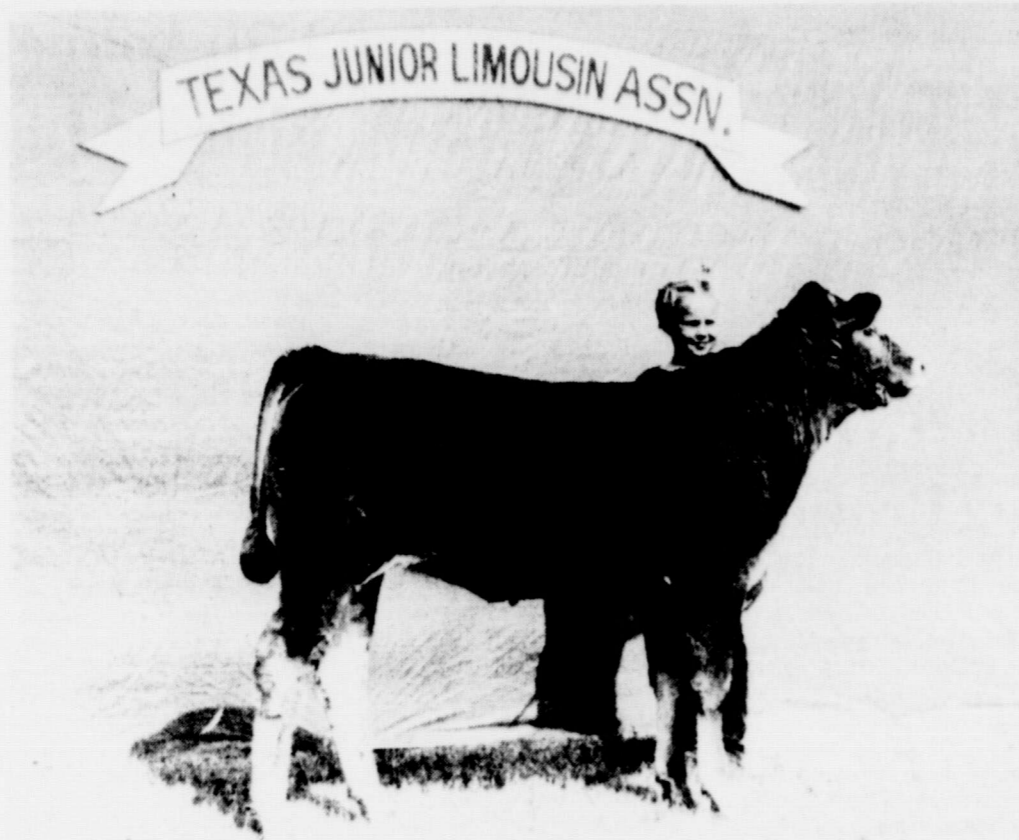

Beef Conference To Focus On Maximizing Profits

Maximizing profitability for Texas cattlemen will be the focus of the second beef industry conference at Texas A&M University July 7-8.

Much of the conference will be directed to trying to determine what production and marketing options will maximize profitability, said De Gordon, County Extension Specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

State and national industry leaders will be discussing current and future trends and directions of the cattle business.

In addition, they will talk about current beef cattle production practices across Texas as well as alternative practices. Much of the discussion will relate to the increased emphasis on lean beef and carcass merit. The move to leanness must be put into the whole cattle production, Gordon said, rather than just focusing on reducing the fat level in cattle.

At one of the conference sessions, research results will be released for the first time that examine carcass value of several breed types all the way to the retail meat case. Several speakers will

address misconceptions many cattle buyers and feedlot operators have regarding different cattle breed types.

The opening session of the Beef Industry Conference begins at 9 a.m. on July 7, in Rudder Center on the A&M campus. Special sessions will focus on lean beef, beef nutrition, carcass cutability, meeting industry needs, and cattle production and marketing options.

Conference details are available at the county Extension office, said Gordon.

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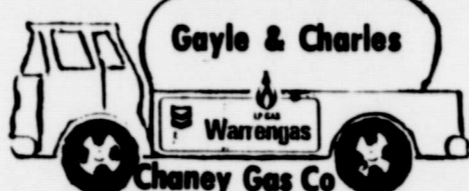

Hunter Education Course To Be Offered July 18-22

A hunter education course will be offered July 18-22 at 6:30 p.m. at Cisco Gun Club Rifle Range.

To get an idea of how many people are interested, pre-registration will be held at 9 a.m. Saturday, June 25, at the range, according to a Gun Club spokesman. Anyone interested in the course should pre-register so the instructors will know how much instructional material will be needed. Anyone having questions should call Gordon Strawn, 442-2010, or Tommie Lee, 442-1405.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is requiring a mandatory hunter education course for hunters whose date of birth is on or after September 2, 1971.

Effective September 1, 1989—Hunters whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971 through August 31, 1973, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Effective September 1, 1990—Hunters whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971 through August 31, 1974, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Effective September 1, 1991—Hunters whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971, through August 31, 1975, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Effective September 1, 1992—Hunters whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971, through August 31, 1976, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Effective September 1, 1993—All hunters who are at least 12 years of age and whose date of birth is on or after September 2, 1971, must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas.

Those exempt from the hunting course are hunters whose date of birth is on or before September 1, 1971; hunters who have been certified in the voluntary Texas Hunter Safety (Education) Program; hunters who have been certified through

another state's resource agency; hunters under 17 years of age whose date of birth is on or after September 2, 1971, when accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older.

The minimum age for taking the course is 12 years. Those under 12 may attend and receive recognition of attendance, but must retake the course after turning 12.

To successfully complete the course, one must attend a minimum of ten hours in two or more days; must be evaluated by instructor as acceptable in knowledge, skill and attitude; and score 70 percent minimum on an examination prescribed by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Certification is good for life and accepted in other states and Canadian provinces. All students receive a hunter education handbook, decal and patch. Proof of certification is a department prescribed card or temporary receipt which must be carried at all times while hunting with all firearms and archery equipment.
