City Council Works On Budget For 1988-89

City Council members met for three hours last Tuesday afternoon for a Budget Work Session. A final draft of the budget will be presented to the council at the next city council meeting to be held on July 12.

Mike Moore, city manager, said incoming revenues to the city has decreased over the last three years. He said this year is the first time the revenue has stabilized out. It is still low though, he said. But, he added, the City of Cisco, will be able to maintain the same level of service as last year.

Moore said there will not be an increase in any of the fees, but there will be a slight tax increase. Moore

said the increase will be 1 1/2 cent per \$100 value, or a 2.8% tax increase. He said this will equate to about \$8,000 for the city. He said this is not a lot of actual income for the city. He said the water bills and sanitation fees will stay the same.

Moore said over the last three years, the city has positioned out four employees and the city will not refill these positions. This year, for the first time in two years, the city employees will receive a 7% cost of living pay rate increase.

Moore said the only change in personnel will be a new position of a code enforcement officer. Moore

said this will be part of the city's economic development and a way to help clean up the city of Cisco. He said this will be a full time position. The officer will primarily address and enforce the city's codes of animal control, junk cars, weeds and trash on property, building codes and other similar violations and problems.

Moore said this is an upcoming budget position. The city will not be taking applications. He said the position is still a long way off.

Moore said the reason for a full time code enforcement officer is...

Afternoon games and contests with the egg toss, baseball throw, sack race, and three legged race will begin at 2:00 p.m. The



All of these "firsts, mosts and bests" boil down to the assets, profits and dividends of American corporations. Those corporations are the legal property of more than 25 million American shareholders, the optimistic men and women who dare to see opportunity.

Y.E.S. Program At Cisco Junior College Has 100 Students

One hundred young people are participating in the Y.E.S. (Youth Experience Success) program at Cisco Junior College this summer. Participants come from throughout the Big Country area to attend the two five-week sessions. The first group arrived June 5, and the second will arrive July 10.

The federally funded program is designed to motivate the youths to finish high school, be productive, realize they can go to college and be a success.

Students attend classes to sharpen their skills in English, math, computer and reading. Classes in drug education, drama, art, dance, etiquette and image building are also offered.

Y.E.S. participants are assigned worksites on campus. Wages for the students are paid from grant funds. The college pays the students \$3.35 an hour for their work. They are given \$20 a week and the college puts the remaining money in a savings account for each student. At the end of the five-week session each student is given the savings.

In addition to attending classes and working, students will take trips to the capitol, the LBJ Library, the University of Texas Athletic Department, Six Flags, the Omni Theatre, Dyess AFB and will go to a Texas Rangers game.

This is the second year Cisco Junior College has hosted the Y.E.S. program.


Last year's program was such a success, the funding and time was increased for the second year.

The average age of the students in the Y.E.S. program is 15-18 years old. The students are juniors or seniors in high school.

The students are from Rising Star, Abilene, Sweetwater and Hawley and other towns in the Big Country area. They work from 8 a.m. till 12, Monday thru Saturday. They attend their classes from 1-5 p.m., Monday thru Friday. In the evenings students attend special classes.

McGough also restores antique vehicles. He said he


works with dealers or individuals. He has antique parts for sale.

time. He said the Y.E.S. program is not a prison, but it's not like summer camp either. He said they interview the students to see what their skills are, and they are then assigned jobs. All the coaches have Y.E.S. secretaries, and there are a couple of crews that go around and work on campus. The Y.E.S. students fix football equipment, and water the football field and do handyman jobs. They also do the cooking and cleaning in the cafeteria. He said the second group of Y.E.S. students will work in the dinner theater program.

Even on Sunday the students are kept busy. They have a choice of attending church or study hall. They attend either art, drama or dance classes and can later swim and enjoy activities at the SUB. They also have special classes Sunday afternoon.

Frazier said a lot of the Y.E.S. students have a 4.0 average in school. A lot of them are from single parent homes or may be potential drop-outs. The Y.E.S. program is designed to help a student realize their own self worth. Coach Hoffman said they feel as though the Y.E.S. program will make an impression on the students, but they won't know for years, if it works.

If a student cannot adjust to the change in the Y.E.S. program, they are sent back to their home. He said the teachers and counselors will go out of their way to keep a student in the program. But sometimes, a student has to be sent home. He said two were sent home last year, and two have been sent home this year. Hoffman said they enjoy working with the Y.E.S. program. He said they wouldn't be there, if they didn't like kids.

Frazier said there were two students who attended the Y.E.S. program in Cisco last year who wanted to come back again this year. He said they could have gone to a bigger college, if they wanted to, but they chose to come back to CJC.

Carolyn Welcom, from Abilene, heads up the program. Rick Frazier is in charge of the students at Cisco Junior College. Frazier said he has a lot of help from other teachers and student helpers. Other teachers are Coach Joe Lawrence, Coach Rick Hoffmann, Tiana Rabb, Tony Theriault and David Johnson from Cisco. Also helping in the program are D.T. Crockett and Dorothy Newman from Abilene's Cooper High School.

College students helping with the Y.E.S. program are Shelby Nixon, Kyra Newman, Kay Scott, Melissa Bailey, Kelly Cooper, Renee Dillard, Rodney Williams, Shelly Smothers, Kathy Choate, Kirk Wallace, Lonnie Pevey and Ricky Chambers.

officer is pretty obvious. He said when it's appropriate, the officer will cite violators to court.

Moore said he feels one thing that will upgrade the city level is to make the town an attractive place to live and to do business.

The overall budget is pretty much the same as last year. He said they did budget in a new patrol car, to be bought from the DPS as they have done before. Moore said the city also needs a new garbage truck. He said the old one has been driven to death and it's time to get another one. He said the city and water department also need to purchase a truck.

Moore said one large term expense for the City of Cisco is the insurance cost. He said the city has to have liability and workman's compensation insurance and employee's health insurance.

Moore said this year's budget has the same level of money as last year so the city can give the same level of service. But, he said, if the cost of everything keeps going up, then the service of the city will have to go down. He said the city will have to work on minimal operation and maintenance.

Ambulance Membership Drive Extended 90 Days

Cisco and Eastland residents appear to have four choices in connection with the availability of emergency ambulance service:

1. Join and encourage others to join the present ambulance company membership rolls to get their income up to equal their expenses;

2. Subsidize the present ambulance service through the input of tax dollars;

3. Let the present company cease operations as it has announced it will have to do if something isn't done by the end of July, and then put in a cooperative service to be run on a volunteer basis, with equipment to be bought through public contributions and donations;

4. Or just not have an emergency ambulance service.

Lions Club president, Roy Dennis thanked all the directors for their help during the past year, while he was president. He also thanked Willard Johnson, secretary for his help.

J.V. Heysler was in charge of the program. He asked three Lions Club members to step outside the room and then explained to the other club members he was going to read a story to one of the men and let him tell it to the next one. He called Robby Robinson in first and read the story to him. He in turned told the story to C.B. Dill who then told the story to Olin Odom. Each man told a slightly different version of the original story.

Guest at the meeting were Ashli Ayer of Houston, Dietrick Odom, and Bradley and Crystal Dennis of Cisco.

A number of citizens discussing the problem Wednesday morning generally agreed that the first option is probably the only acceptable approach. The group Wednesday was a committee of representatives from Eastland and Cisco and the County who had been asked to explore the possibilities of maintaining ambulance service. A general public meeting was held last week at which state and other authorities reported on costs of establishing a service.

Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Patterson, owner-operators of Patterson Ambulance Service in Eastland and Cisco for the past seven years, had recently announced that unless they increase their income in some manner, that they could not maintain the service past the end of July: the end of the current membership year.

Showing that the ambulance service is regularly used, Patterson Wednesday morning showed that calls in the two cities so far this year are already up by 109 calls over the same period last year.

Asked how much it could take to overcome the shortfall, Patterson estimated that an infusion of some \$48,000.00, which would represent a \$2,000.00 a month

subsidy from both cities, could do it. He went on to explain how the over-regulation of the service has upped his expenses, and his lack of compensation from federal help and the general drop in memberships has resulted in the poor balance sheet for the firm.

Told that neither the cities nor the county has surplus tax dollars available to subsidize the service, all agreed that all could work together to encourage memberships enough to make the operation profitable for the firm.

In response to the enthusiasm and encourage shown him, Mr. Patterson agreed to maintain the \$36.00 per year family membership rate, and to extend the time as much as 90 days to accomplish the required membership.

The goal is 1,700 members and they can come from anywhere in the county, because he said he didn't want to be concerned with boundary lines when someone needs an emergency ambulance. Right now the firm keeps an ambulance in Eastland and one in Cisco, with a third on standby for use where it is needed.

Application forms will be distributed throughout the county, and the Patterson's business phone number is 629-2882.

Emergency calls to the service are handled through the Dispatch Service Number.

Martin Lutz Agrees To Be Airport Fixed Base Operator

Council members approved a resolution authorizing Mayor Joe Wheatley to execute a fixed base operator agreement with Martin Lutz for the Cisco Airport at the regular meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall.

Mr. Lutz is a pilot and a pilot trainer and will operate a flight school at the airport. The agreement became effective July 1.

Mr. Curt Covert, who had previously managed the airport, has moved to Lubbock. He sent a letter to Mike Moore, city manager, asking that his agreement with the city to manage the airport be relinquished. His request was approved.

Mr. Lutz will be authorized to operate, own and sell merchandise, including aviation gasoline, from the airport premises, and he shall be entitled to all revenues derived from the sales.

The only expense for the city of Cisco with the agreement is for general liability insurance that is required.

In other matters, city manager Moore told council members that a report sent off on the new wastewater treatment plant has come back with an excellent rating. He said the only problem with the plant is the grass on the water banks is not growing.

He told council members the street seal coating will start up again Wednesday. He said the work on West 14th is coming along pretty good. He said at the present time the city work crews have been cleaning up the town park for the Fourth of

July celebration. He said they want the park to look good for the holiday visitors.

Moore said the city has slowed down on spraying for mosquitoes. He said they will probably spray the city two more times during the summer.

Attending the council

meeting were council members, John Muller, Bural Chambers, Vernetta Pierce, Olin Odom, III, Arley Whitley and Allen Masters. Also attending were Mayor Joe Wheatley, City Secretary Ginger Johnson, and City Manager Mike Moore.

Gordon Spot

My co-worker, Extension Agent Crystal Wilbanks, will not be working for the next few weeks. She and husband, Skeet, are the proud parents of a baby boy. Tanner Shae was born Wednesday, June 29th. Congratulations to Crystal and Skeet!

The seventh round of sign-ups for the government's Conservation Reserve Program is July 18-August 5.

This sign-up period will give Texas farmers another opportunity to put highly erodible land into CRP for a 10-year period.

CRP is a part of the 1985 farm bill that is aimed at curbing crop production on highly erodible land and protecting that land from wind and water damage, and the program has been effective. Figures from the U.S. Department of Agriculture show that CRP has reduced soil erosion by 17 percent, more than 530,000 tons, since its inception in 1986.

Some 45 million acres have been targeted for the program across the U.S. Currently, 56 percent of that goal has been contracted nationally. Texas farmers have enrolled 3.2 million acres. Eastland County landowners have enrolled 49 farms totaling 3,568 acres in the CRP.

Farmers enrolling qualified land, as determined by the Soil Conservation Service, must keep the land out of production for at least 10 years and must plant a cover of grass or trees. During this period they will receive an annual "rental" payment from the government plus half the cost of establishing the ground cover.

Several new rules that took effect with the last sign-up will continue. One new rule requires that acceptable bid levels not exceed the local cash rental rates for comparable land, as determined by local ASCS committees.

In addition, filter strips along creeks may be enrolled even though they do not contain highly erodible land. Such strips must be 66 to 99 feet wide and must be parallel to and adjacent to perennial streams, permanent ponds or permanent lakes.

Farmers with highly erodible land also must have an approved conservation plan filed at their local SCS office by January 1, 1990. Failure to do so will result in a loss of USDA farm program benefits on all cropland. The approved plan must be implemented by January 1, 1995, to retain government payments.

Pecan aphids are beginning to cause honeydew problems on pecan trees. The small soft body insects suck food from the underside of leaves and secrete "Honeydew" or sugar water which falls down through the trees and is deposited on the leaves and any other object that might be under the trees. They usually build up in large numbers for about 2 or 3 weeks and then their population usually falls off as quickly as it appears.

However, if the honeydew is causing a problem, you can spray the trees with one of several insecticides to kill the aphids. These insecticides include Diazinon, Malathion, Zolone, Guthion and Dimethoate 267. If trees are small you may wash the aphids off with water provided you have good water pressure.

We have homeowner's fruit and nut spray guides in the Extension office if you would like to have a copy.

Fishing Outdoors

"Crankin"

Crankbaits have long been known as scout baits. Meaning that the ability to rapid fire and cover lots of water was a big plus for these lures. A few anglers however have mastered the cranks and rely on them as big bass producers.

The list of crankbaits is about as long as a person cares to make it. Covering Tipless Cranks (such as spots, and Rat-L-Traps), Shallow runners, deep runners, medium runners, floaters, sinkers, wide wobble, tight wobbles and no wobble. As far as color patterns go let your imagination be your guide because if you can think of a pattern its out there somewhere.

But regardless of the type you throw, the three main factors to consider prior to tying one on are: Match the size of your bait to the size of forage being fed upon, pick the proper forage (shad, crayfish, minnow etc.) and last and probably least considered by most anglers is the wobble or action of the bait. These should be matched primarily with the time of year you are fishing. Winter time a slow tight wobble, spring slightly wider wobble, summer time go for the gold with a very wide erratic running lure, fall again an erratic wobble if temperature permit.

When fishing crankbaits many anglers become easily disheartened due to either slow action or constant hanging from

time to time be patient and keep fishing the cover. Just as with any bait the closer to old Mr. Bass' home you can get the better your odds will be. And for the slow action, well as we have always tried to stress the key to any successful search of these green wonders hinges on being versatile. If your cranks aren't working lay it aside for awhile, but just like a trusty dog, keep it handy.

Biologists have stocked 5,000 Guadalupe bass into a special refuge for the species in the heart of scenic Lost Maples State Natural Area in Bandera County.

Dr. Gary Garrett of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Heart O' the Hills Research Station at Ingram said the refuge is intended to preserve the genetic integrity of Guadalupe bass, a species that has hybridized with introduced species in some areas. Guadalupe are a uniquely Texan species, found only in Central Texas river systems.

Garrett said crews stocked the Sabinal River and one of its tributaries, Can Creek, on Friday. They seined Can Creek prior to stocking and transported all the largemouth bass in that section of the stream to the Sabinal, giving the small Guadalupe every chance to become established. The

stream also has sunfish and channel catfish.

"Guadalupe historically have shared the same streams with largemouths," said Garrett, "so that is not a problem. But we wanted to determine the difference in survival when Guadalupe are stocked in a stream that has largemouths."

Guadalupe bass are similar in appearance to the spotted bass found in East Texas and much of the Southeastern U.S. Garrett said in spite of the similarity, genetic investigations have shown Guadalupe are a distinct species. Genetic variations also occur among stocks of Guadalupe from the various river drainages, he added.

Lost Maples is located four miles north of Vanderpool on Ranch Road 187.



First aid for insect bites, sore muscles, cut lips, and other summer bothers: ice packs you keep in your freezer until needed. Check your first-aid supplies.
Better tracking of diabetics' blood sugar levels is expected to be possible with a new blood sugar meter that stores data with dates and times. Pinprick gives enough blood for testing; meter works within 50 seconds.
Researchers at University of California/San Francisco are investigating whether it's the chloride in salt, rather than the sodium, that elevates blood pressure. Early results in testing various chemicals showed sodium citrate does not affect readings, but potassium chloride may.
In a Harvard study, women who took 800 mg. or more calcium each day cut their risk of high blood pressure by 22 percent. Doctors say the study supports the safety of non-drug therapies for hypertension.
Researchers at Louisiana State University are working with an enzyme that keeps plaque soft, so that an ordinary toothbrush can remove it. The enzyme was developed from yeast.



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County Commissioners Hold Re-hearing Wednesday

Eastland County Commissioners held a re-hearing Wednesday, June 29 on an appeal concerning eligibility for County Indigent Health Care. This was a called meeting, continuing an earlier discussion of a ruling denying payment to an individual.

The appeal was first brought to Commissioners Court at a regular meeting last Monday. An individual

living in the home of a daughter had been classified part of the "household" where she resided rather than as a person maintaining a separate home.

As part of her daughter's "household", the total family income was considerably above the limits set for indigent care.

The complicated situation included whether or not the county must pay the man-

dated portion of a \$7,500 bill from an out-of-county hospital. The mandated provider for Indigent Care in Eastland County is Eastland Memorial Hospital.

After reconsidering the matter, and reviewing a document from a State Human Resource person, the Commissioners ruled that the persons in the home consisted of two separate "households" - one

"household" of five persons, and another of one person - rather than a "household" of six people. This determination could have a far-reaching effect on payments here.

The one person requesting payment for Indigent Health Care in this case will now be considered under separate household criteria.

In other matters before the Court, Ralph Fickes, an agent on financing, discussed the topic of Jail expansion financing.

Statewide it costs about \$46,000 per bed to build or expand a Jail. But some facilities have been built for much less, such as at Henderson, Texas. The cost of the building there was \$32,000 per bed.

Some months ago an Abilene firm quoted a total of \$1.2 million as the cost of expanding the Eastland County Jail to 48 beds.

Eastland County Farm Bureau leaders toured the Texas Farm Bureau headquarters in Waco June 22 and were briefed on TFB programs and activities.

Accompanying the 2 local leaders on the trip to Waco were officers and board members from Farm Bureaus in Brown, Callahan-Shackelford, Coleman, Comanche, Erath, Jones, Runnels and Taylor Counties.

Bob Turner, Voss, state

director from this district, also accompanied this group.

Warren Newberry, TFB executive director, welcomed the county leaders and explained the structure of the Farm Bureau organization from the county to the national level.

Various department heads in the TFB briefed the visitors on current programs. Topics included a computer demonstration, commodity activities in-

formation and public relations, the TFB Young Farmers and Ranchers and youth programs, citizenship seminar for high school students, county auditing and bookkeeping service, and insurance and group purchasing services.

The Texas Farm Bureau, headquartered in Waco since 1938 when it moved there from Brownwood, now has 33,162 member families on its rolls. It is organized in 116 counties.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.
