## "How The Other Half Loves" Is Great Play

The first time I saw a rehearsal for the play "How The Other Half Loves," I was a little skeptical about the type of play it was going to be. During the rehearsal, Caroll Brown, who plays Teresa Phillips, was taunting her husband, Bob,

(Sean Jones) decide they can help the Detweilers with their problem too, and invite them over for dinner. The dinner scene which depicts Thursday and Friday night, at the same time, shows off the talent of all the performers, especially Tina and Dalin.

The stage is set up so that the two dinner scenes can be played at the same time, with the Detweiler's twisting from one table to another while sitting in their chairs. Trouble erupts, with Frank and Teresa trying to help and eventually everything becomes so twisted around, nobody is sure, who is having the marriage problems. One scene is very funny when one of the husband's runs out of the home ready to seek vengeance. Someone yells, "Stop him, he might shoot her." And the reply is, "With a monkey wrench?"

## Ambulance Service Availability Depends On Membership

The continued availability of emergency ambulance service for Cisco, Eastland and surrounding communities depends on the immediate expansion of its membership lists, officials have announced.

A concentrated effort is underway to expand the number of participating members so that the emergency service can remain in operation.

Mr. and Mrs. Tommy Patterson, owner-operators, had previously announced that they would have to terminate the service at the end of July because of lack of support, have, after being assured by officials in Eastland and Cisco of the need for such service, agreed to extend for three months, their efforts in order to maintain the service.

"The encouragement we have received," Mr. Patterson said, "indicates that the public does want our service to continue, and with sufficient participation, we'll attempt to continue."

The \$36.00 membership, in effect, helps provide the availability of the service, but does not, in fact, underwrite the total cost of providing the service, in view of the equipment, trained personnel and mandatory requirements necessary to provide such a service, he explained.

Therefore the company does in fact collect payments from member's insurance companies if the company provides for such coverage.

Therefore, those persons who already have insurance with private companies which provide emergency ambulance service, are invited and urged to secure memberships in order to assure the local service.

An application form appears in this issue of this newspaper and citizens are

urged to clip it, fill it out and mail it with a check to P.O. Box 912, Eastland, as soon as possible.

The Patterson home/office is at 301 S. Ostrom St., where the memberships may also be secured. Their business telephone number is 629-2882.

Mr. Patterson has met with concerned officials on several occasions in an effort to work out a system to be able to continue the service.

All have agreed that an increased membership is the one best way to support the program and make it possible for the service to continue.

Mr. Patterson is emphasizing that the membership is not an insurance policy, and in a statement, further clarified the membership agreement. Persons with additional questions are invited to contact the firm for further details.

Mr. Patterson said in a statement:

"All current ambulance memberships expire mid-night July 31, 1988!"

"Our membership drive for 1988/1989 is now under way and we strongly urge every citizen of Eastland, Cisco, and surrounding areas to renew or purchase a membership!"

"This current membership drive is from July 8, 1988 thru October 1, 1988. During the membership drive period, memberships

can be purchased for \$36.

"After October 1, all memberships will be \$45 and will go into effect 24 hours after receipt. If Patterson Ambulance Services does not receive 1700 members, memberships received will be prorated and refunded. Memberships that have been utilized will not be refunded.

"Every family member currently covered on your medical insurance policy will be honored on your ambulance membership.

"Medicaid recipients emergency need for ambulance will be met to the nearest hospital for treatment.

"Your insurance carriers will receive claims for services rendered and due Patterson Ambulance Service. Remember, your membership is to help provide an ambulance service to your community and provide you with cost saving factors. Third party insurance will be filed on those medically requiring an ambulance for transport to and from doctor's office/clinic (or non-admittance calls to the hospital), within your city limits.

"Should the claim be denied a charge of \$35 will be filled to the patient. Out of town will cost an additional \$1 per mile. Hospitals (for admission only) over 60 miles for members only will cost \$1.50 per mile.

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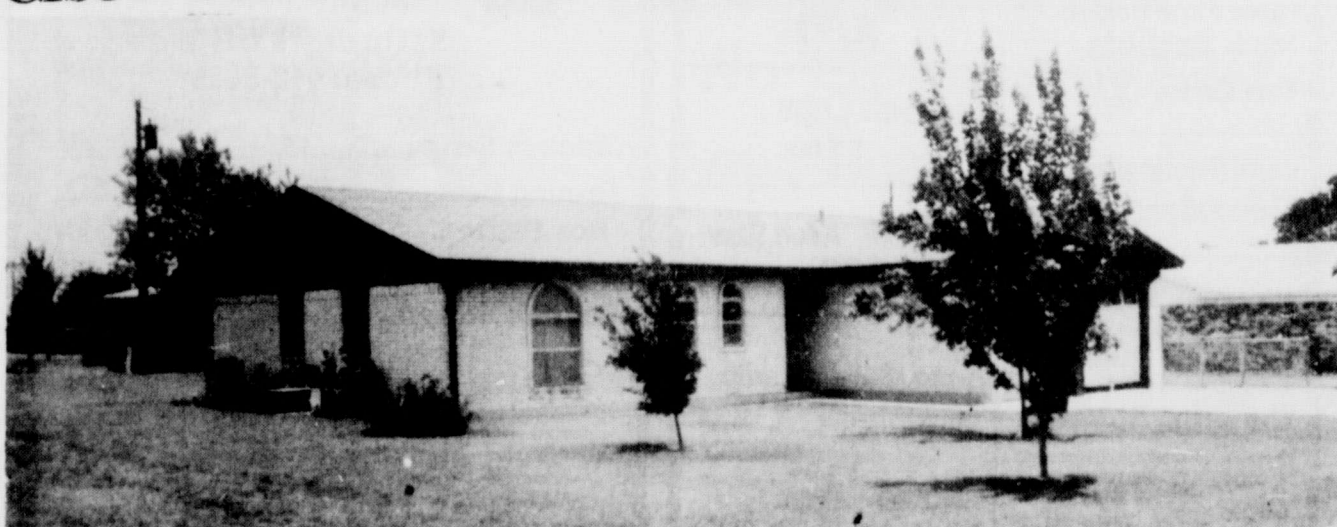
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## Cisco Garden Club Yard Of The Week

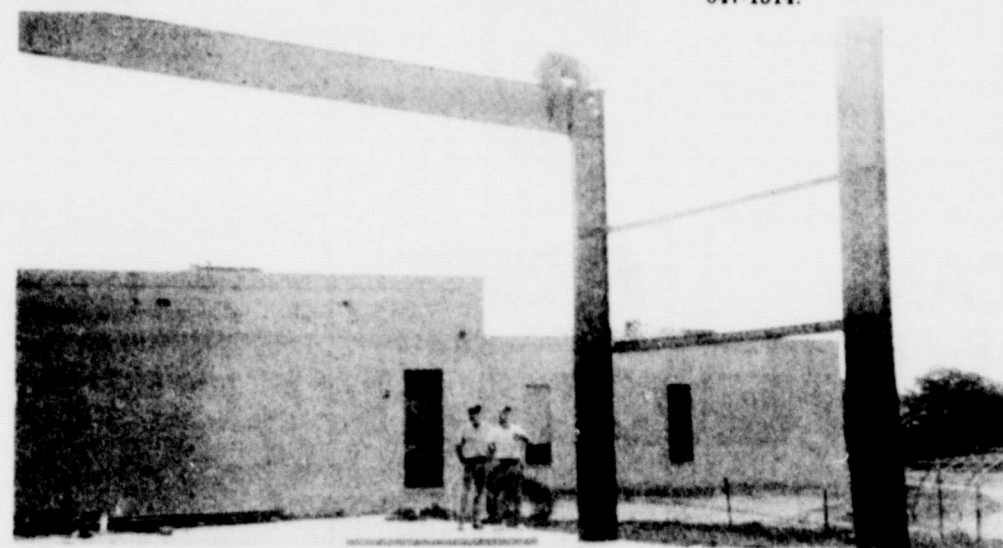

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

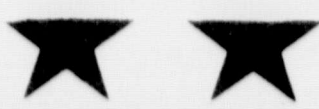
A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

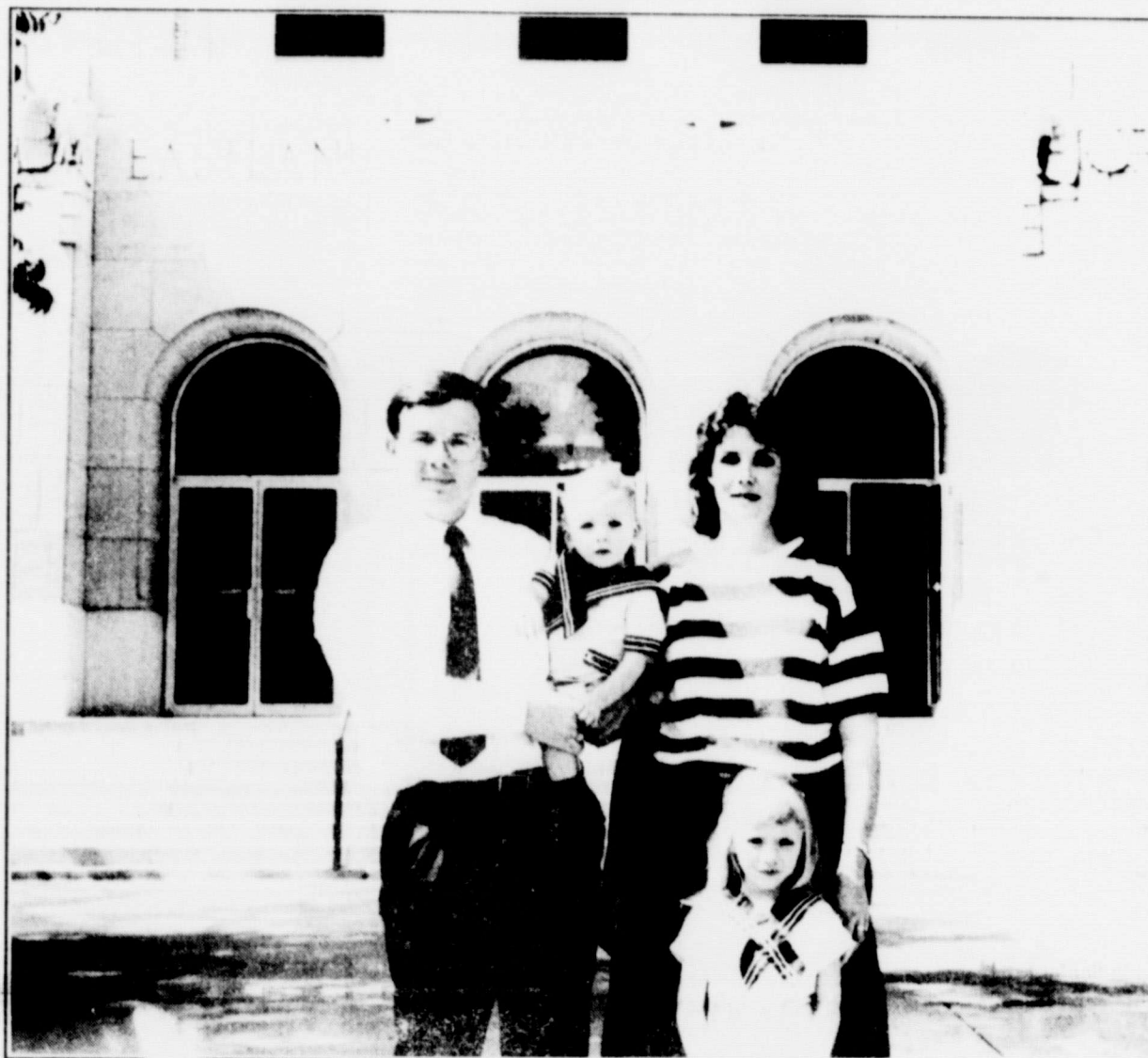

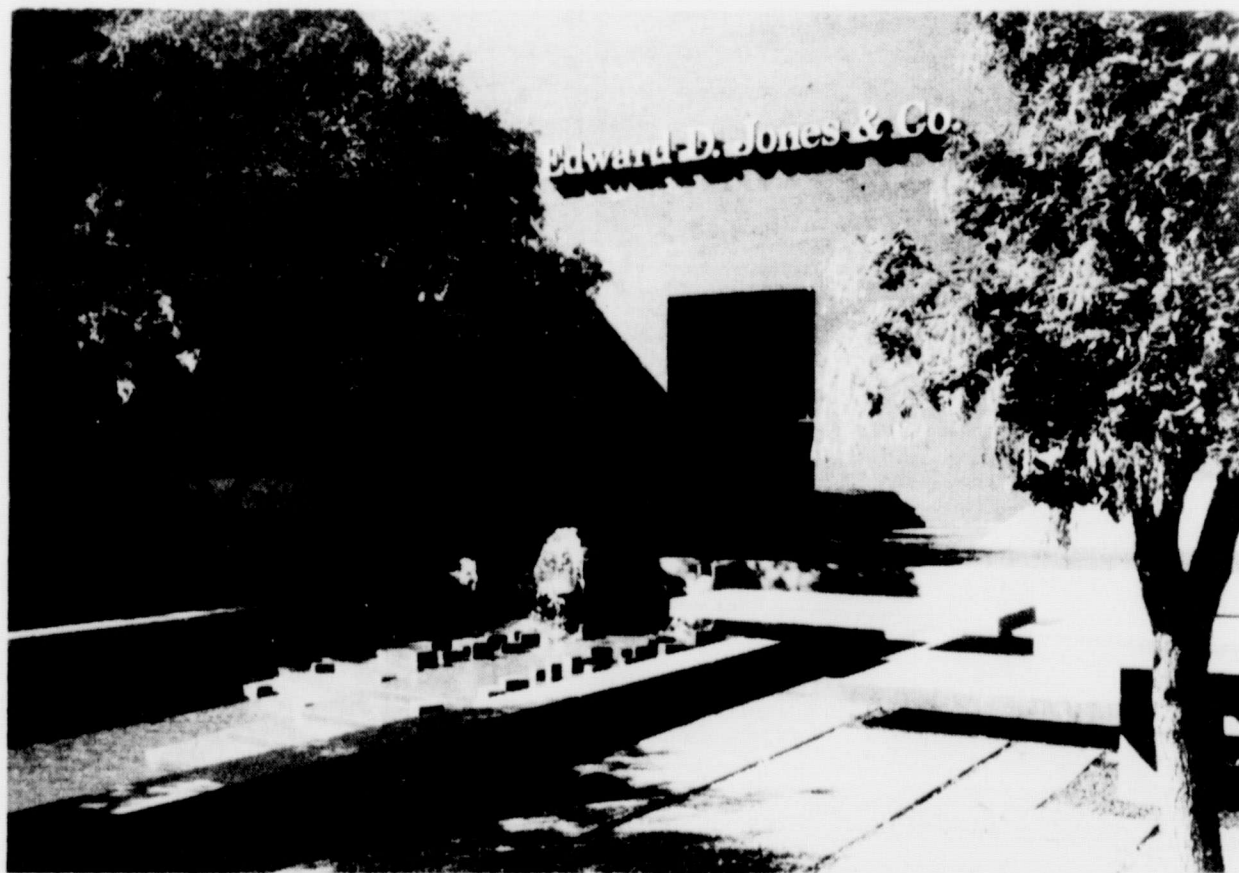

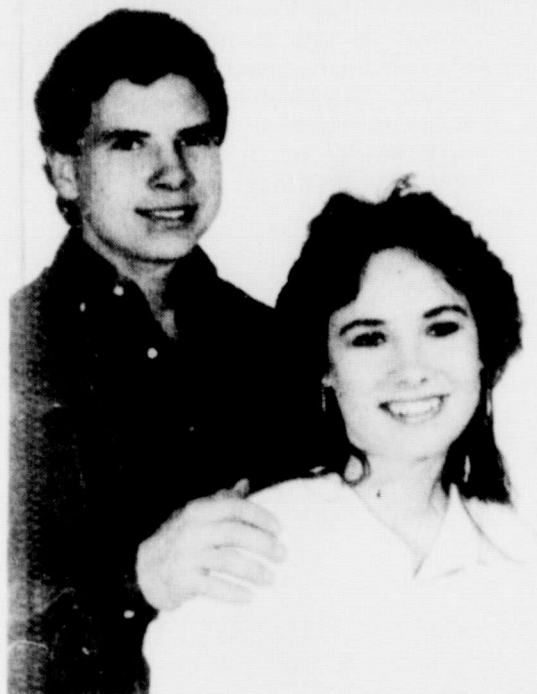

**Pharmacy Topics**

First aid for insect bites, sore muscles, cut lips, and other summer bothers: ice packs you keep in your freezer until needed. Check your first-aid supplies.  
Better tracking of diabetics' blood sugar levels is expected to be possible with a new blood sugar meter that stores data with dates and times. Pinprick gives enough blood for testing; meter works within 50 seconds.  
Researchers at University of California/San Francisco are investigating whether it's the chloride in salt, rather than the sodium, that elevates blood pressure. Early results in testing various chemicals showed sodium citrate does not affect readings, but potassium chloride may.  
In a Harvard study, women who took 800 mg. or more calcium each day cut their risk of high blood pressure by 22 percent. Doctors say the study supports the safety of non-drug therapies for hypertension.  
Researchers at Louisiana State University are working with an enzyme that keeps plaque soft, so that an ordinary toothbrush can remove it. The enzyme was developed from yeast.
