# Teofilo "Freddie" Cortez Found Murdered Saturday

The Eastland County Sheriff's Dept., the Cisco Police Dept., and Texas Ranger Gene Kea are investigating the death of a man whose body was found floating in the nearly empty Lake Cisco Park swimming pool as a homicide, according to Sheriff Don Underwood.

There was enough blunt trauma to the head to have caused the death of the man floating in a couple of feet of stagnant water in the east end of the abandoned pool, which was known as the world's largest concrete swimming pool.

Tentatively identified as Teofilo Vallejo Cortez, aged 25 of Eastland, officers are awaiting positive identification and lab tests which can show the presence, if any, of drugs or chemicals which might be in the body.

Mr. Cortez, whose mother, sister and brother live in Eastland, had been employed in plant maintenance by Morgan Building Systems, Inc. of Eastland. He reportedly had been temporarily laid off last week.

Discovered Friday evening by visitors to the Lake Cisco Park, the body was

believed to have been in the pool since late Wednesday night or early Thursday morning, which was also believed to be the time of the death.

Officers are taking statements from people who

may be able to supply some details, so if you saw anything happening in the Lake Cisco Park late Wednesday or early Thursday, please call or contact the Sheriff's Dept. or investigating officers.

Officers made two arrests Monday night. A man was waiting to be booked on investigation of homicide charges Tuesday morning and a juvenile was in custody.

The Grand Jury was to meet on Tuesday also.

## CISD Board Of Directors Hire Three New Teachers

Three new teachers were hired by the Cisco Independent School District Board of Trustees at their regular meeting held last Thursday. Peggy Gruel, from Moran, will teach at the elementary school. Walter Williams of Eastland will teach Spanish and history at the high school. Amy Johnson, of Cisco, will be a part time English teacher and junior and senior high school counselor.

The board accepted the resignation of Cindy and Bryan McCullough. Cindy was a senior high school English and Spanish teacher. Bryan was the boys varsity basketball coach.

In other matters, the

school board voted to allow sick leave for all non-professional employees to accumulate to 30 days. This will include auxiliary, maintenance, secretaries, aides and all other employees other than teachers.

Steve Cozart was awarded the bid to work on the building of a concession stand in the cafeteria to be used for the basketball games.

Mr. Ray Saunders, CISD Superintendent, was authorized to choose the best liability insurance for the schools.

The board will meet later this month or early in August for a budget workshop.

## County Commissioners Vote To Make Lone Cedar County Road

Eastland County Commissioners voted Monday to designate Lone Cedar Country Club Road and links of roads adjoining it as County Roads, and to maintain them as such.

Norman Christian, Comm. of Pct. 2, where the roads are located, made the motion of approval. Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, seconded the motion. L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, and Billy Bacon, Pct. 4, joined with them in making the vote unanimous.

There was standing room only in the County Courtroom as the Commissioners considered what to do about this one mile of pavement leading south from FM 570 to the Clubhouse.

Joe Anderson and W.E. Sikes, President of Lone Cedar Country Club, brought a petition to the Court requesting that the road be declared a county road, and improvements be made. This petition was signed by 204 people.

W.E. Sikes said that the Lone Cedar Road was used by a mail route, a school bus, a state game warden, 242 Club members and their guests, and 40 families in that area of Lake Leon.

Lone Cedar Country Club was used by every community in the County, he stated. Last year more than 3,000 people were served meals there.

There was some discussion by the Commissioners as to whether to make the Lone Cedar Country Club Road improvement a County project, or to pay for it from Pct. 2 funds. Billy Bacon noted that it would cost about \$2,500 per mile to seal coat the road.

Richard Robinson offered help from Pct. 1 with the seal coating, a little at a time. He said that the names of a number of people in his Precinct were probably on the petition list.

He also said there needed to be some ditches fixed to keep water from crossing the pavement.

"I will share the cost," Robinson told Christian.

Visitors to the Courtroom applauded when the Commissioners gave a favorable vote to the designation of The Lone Cedar Road. As most of them left, the Commissioners continued with the next item on the agenda-- the measurement and reallocation of County Road Mileage for each Precinct, a discussion brought by Norman Christian and Richard Robinson.

County Judge Scott Bailey stated that 1975 was the last time mileage had been

figured on the rural roads. These figures are still used: 133.6 for Pct. 1, 139.9 for Pct. 2, 296.0, Pct. 3, and 164.4 for Pct. 4. The annual allotment for each Precinct is \$750 per mile.

Billy Bacon said: "This is different from at Cisco (the Lake). People rent that (homesites) from the City of Cisco, and I'm not going to maintain it."

He also said he felt "We're getting into a bed of worms" in getting county roads reallocated.

Robinson said that lines, boundaries and voting precincts were measured by population, not the length of the roads. He also said the Texas Highway Department was obligated to assist the counties in the determination of roadways, and this work should not cost anything.

"If it didn't cost anything to do this, that's fine," Bacon said.

Judge Bailey concurred that the State Highway Department should assist in the measurement of county roads. He also suggested that the Commissioners might want to put an amendment on their request, stating that no Precinct would get less dollars from the reallocation of roads - and any Precinct gaining mileage would take this increase from General Funds.

The Commissioners voted to request the State Highway Department to measure the roads in each Precinct, consulting with each Commissioner. The Highway Department was also requested to place any road they considered a County Road on a map and assign a number to it.

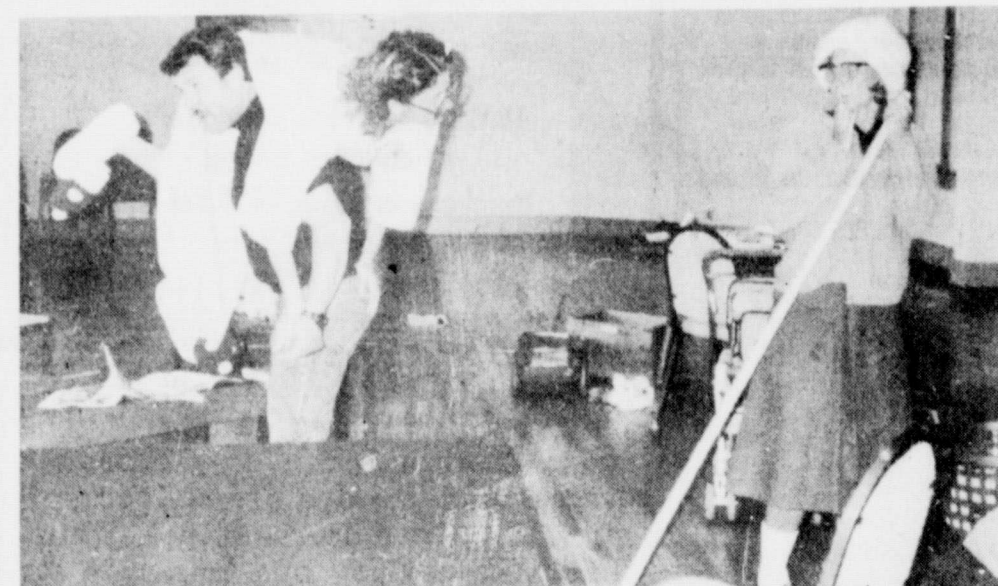
In other action during the meeting the Commissioners gave approval for Norman Christian to advertise an old 30x50 ft metal County barn in Olden for sale. This sits on .22 acres of land, and the land will be sold with the building.

Judge Bailey reported on information about the annual expenditures of the Department of Human Services in Eastland County. The Department is currently spending about \$6 million in the county, he said. This includes direct delivery services, contracted services, and staffing expenditures. Ten or twelve years ago the expenditures here were slightly over one million annually, he noted.

The Commissioners affirmed that the County would pay Indigent Health Care expenses allowed for an individual who had appealed to them before.

Other matters included a report on the County Jail. Billy Bacon said that 20 prisoners were currently in the facility, which is under the population allowed by the "guidelines" of the Texas Jail Standards Commission.

The Commissioners approved pipeline crossings to Ray Richey Management, Pct. 1, Christie Gas Transmission, Pct. 2, and Northridge Corporation, Pct. 3.

## Director To "How The Other Half Loves" Is No Cisco Stranger

Dr. Thomas F. Soare, professor of drama at Sam Houston State University, is no stranger to Cisco theatre buffs. After the 1986 dinner season in which he portrayed Daddy Warbucks in ANNIE and Count Dracula in the play of the same name, he returns in 1988 as director of the upcoming hilarious comedy HOW THE OTHER HALF LOVES as well as the king in THE KING AND I.

Soare came from an artistic background with a father who was a commercial artist and a cousin who was head of the DelMar College drama department. After active involvement in high school theatre, Soare entered the University of New Mexico as a pre-med major. In the midst of dissecting a squid, he claims to have realized that medicine was not his calling in life. After revealing this to his college advisor, Tom mentioned a desire to go into theatre at which point the advisor "advised me to strongly reconsider." Graduate work was done

at the University of Denver but was interrupted by the Army. Soare immediately applied for Army Security School where he learned to speak German fluently and was eventually transferred to Frankfurt, West Germany. During this time he was able to direct five plays, one of which was the first English version of THE DIARY OF ANNE FRANK to be performed in Germany. The production had such an impact that Soare was offered a civilian job by Special Services to act as entertainment director for the army in Germany.

Soare, over an eight to ten year period, claims to have directed everything from "Simon Shakespeare", including THE MERCHANT OF VENICE, which won 11 of 13 awards one being first place in the "Third Army Tournament of Plays."

Soare left the army and went to direct for two years at a Florida community theatre and, continuing his education at Florida State University, eventually earned

his Ph.D. in 1971, he was hired as a professor of drama at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville. Specializing in lighting design and theatre history, at SHSU he has directed such well-received plays as AMADEUS, OF MICE AND MEN and GREASE.

As director of HOW THE OTHER HALF LOVES, Soare describes the play as being "just enticing enough to be slightly risqué without offending anyone." With a strong cast and a skilled director, HOW THE OTHER HALF LOVES should be a "real audience pleaser."

Soare's appearance as Phra Mah Mongkut, the king of Siam, should be excellent as well, being Tom's third time at the role. His first was at The Point Theatre several years ago, the second last summer with Carol Brown as his director in Huntsville. Says Soare of the role: "It is my favorite! I know of no other role in the theatrical

## Louise Nelms Gives \$505.00 To K-9 Patrol Drug Dog Fund

Louise Nelms, of Cisco, recently presented Police Officer Chris Keys, \$505.00 in cash and checks to be deposited in the Cisco Narcotic Dog Fund, at First National Bank. Mrs. Nelms raised the money by having a garage sale at her home.

Nelms is a member of the Hemet DAV Auxiliary in San Jacinto Valley, California. She is also a strong supporter of the Cisco Police Department purchasing a K-9 Police Patrol Dog. The police department will need to raise a total of \$5,500 to \$6,000 to purchase the dog. A total of \$2,131 in deposits and \$260.00 in pledges has been raised for the K-9.

Mrs. Nelms took it on her own to hold the garage sale to raise money for the drug dog. She said, "I am happy to do something for the community of Cisco. If everyone will do a small community service, then this will be a better place to live."

She added, "The K-9 Patrol Dog won't stop the

drug problem here, but it will draw the hammer back against it."

Mrs. Nelms is also a strong defender of the local police force. She said she would like for the citizens of Cisco to support the police. She said everyday they step out, they are putting their lives on the line for the community.

Owen King, who is in charge of the bank accounts for the K-9 Patrol Dog Fund, said he wants to see more people get involved with the fund. He said one out of every five families in Cisco will have problems with some form of drug violation. Whether it be robbery, or family members or personal, they will be involved with the drug problem in Cisco, he said.

Mrs. Nelms agreed with the statistics and added, "We need to wake up the older people in Cisco of the problem. They are the ones getting robbed."

Mrs. Nelms said she worked in a VA hospital in La Lominda, California and saw what drugs can do to a person. She said several veterans who were in the hospital had drug problems they picked up while in Viet Nam. She said the memories of those young men are still with her and she wants to do something to help combat the drug problem wherever she is.

Cecil Deadman, pastor of East Cisco Baptist Church, said he would like to see more people become aware of the drug problem in this area. He said people are just hiding their heads in the sand, if they don't believe there is a drug problem in Cisco. ## Commodities Supply Dwindle

Cisco residents will receive food commodities on Tuesday, July 26, at the Gaslight Apartments, but there will not be very much food, according to Peggy Roberts, center director, with the Central Texas Opportunities.

She said they will have flour, milk and meal, but there will be a very short

supply of them. She said there is plenty of butter. Commodities will be given out on a first come, first serve basis.

They are beginning to phase out the program, and it does look bad, Mrs. Roberts said. The program was started to get rid of surplus food only, not to feed the hungry, she said. Ap-

parently the surplus food supply has dwindled.

She said the commodities will be delivered on a month to month basis. She said officials have indicated such few items are available there will probably not be any cheese, honey or rice delivered the remainder of the year.

"It was a treat to be at that Convention," Stacy says. "It was a big gathering - I understand around 40,000 people were

present."

The next week Stacy played for a large Baptist Church in Houston, and he will give a concert in Shreveport, La. in early July.

Along with all these performances he also played for the Arts and Entertainment Network, gave numbers at Church programs, and played for at least one wedding this summer.

It is always astonishing to realize that Stacy learned to play the trumpet by ear and memorizes music by listening to tapes and records. He has a repertoire of more than 140 trumpet concertos.

Stacy enjoys playing Church music, gospel, baroque, contemporary and classical - and does so with equal ease. He has now played in 48 countries around the world, and has received numerous Awards.

Differences in language and culture seem to melt away before the beauty of his playing. So whether in the great old cathedrals of Europe or Dallas, Texas, Stacy Blair is still Eastland's star Ambassador.

## Lake Leon's Eight Pounders

July 3rd a very special event took place at Lake Leon. The Cisco Lions Club held its 2nd Annual Benefit Bass Tournament. A percentage of each entry fee paid was earmarked for the Lions Camp at Kerrville, Texas. Forty-seven anglers were on hand for what proved to be a hard but rewarding day of fishing. Many of the anglers reported catching few fish and were placing blame on the moon phase and unstable air masses in the area.

At the close of the weigh-in, anglers were treated to one of those Lake Leon lunkers. Chuck Burgess brought in a monster bass that tipped the scales at 8 pounds 2 ounces. Chuck told us that this fish fell prey to a june bug and fire tail worm, as did his only other keeper bass, which

weighed in at 2 pounds 4 ounces. So as you can see without the break of the big fish, fishing was tough even for the winner. Second Place went to Jay Hunt, 8.24 pounds; Third Place, John Smith, 6.81 pounds; Fourth, Scott Pierce, 5.26 pounds; and Fifth, Butch Willingham, 4.89 pounds.

hosted by B.A.S.S. Chuck was drawn to attend the Lake Okechobee tournament. This event will pair amateurs with one hundred of the top pros in the country. December 1988 will be the month, which should place those Florida lunkers in full spawn. Congratulations to Chuck and all the anglers who will be competing at the Florida event and the other 100 who will be on Lake Sam Rayburn in June of 1989.

Saturday, July 9th, 17 members of the E.C.B.C. met at Lake Leon for their monthly club tourney. Fishing itself was excellent, but the catching proved to be another story. With the fishing hours set at 6 a.m. to 3 p.m., many anglers were looking to catch some easy fish early on top water. Only 1 fish was reported to have been taken on top-water early. Most of the day's catches were on worms and crankbaits. At the 3:30 weigh-in, the results were: 1st-Ron McCullough, 3 fish, 6.27 pounds; 2nd-Don Flowers, 2 fish, 5.01 pounds; 3rd-Chuck Burgess, 2 fish, 3.44 pounds; 4th-Steve Penn-

ington, 1 fish, 2.01 pounds; and 5th-Edd Simon, 1 fish, 1.75 pounds. Big bass of the day went to Ron M. with a nice Leon Lunker weighing 2.87.

Sunday, July 10th at Lake Proctor 48 members of the Brownwood Bass Club met for a tough day of angling. Proctor is still around 4-5 feet above full, and anglers were met with a draw-down effect. This being some sullied-up fish which were actually pulled out to the edges of cover and point drop-offs. Fishing hours were 6 a.m. to 3 p.m. The most popular baits were worms, frogs and crankbaits. At the 3 p.m. weigh-in, the results were: 1st-Andy Campbell, 3 fish, 11 pounds, 7 1/2 ounces; 2nd-Jack York, 10 pounds, 4 ounces; 3rd-Kendal Davis, 9 pounds, 1 ounce; 4th-Garland Bailey, 9 pounds; and 5th-Greg Denison, 8 pounds, 14 1/2 ounces.

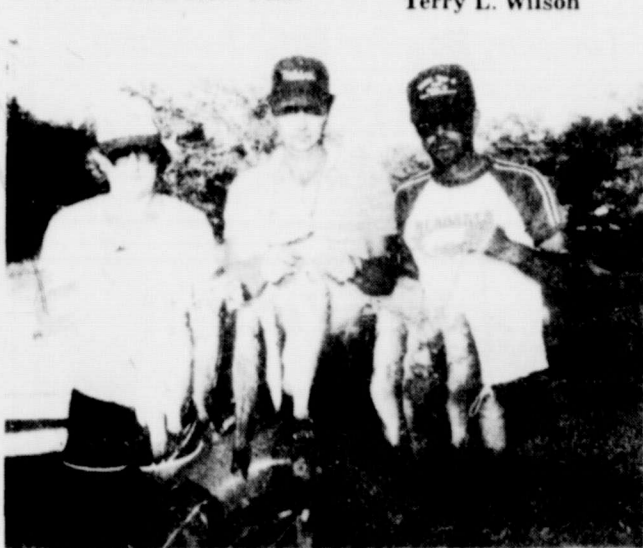
A total of 48 members were on hand, and believe me folks, each one of these ladies and gentlemen came to fish.

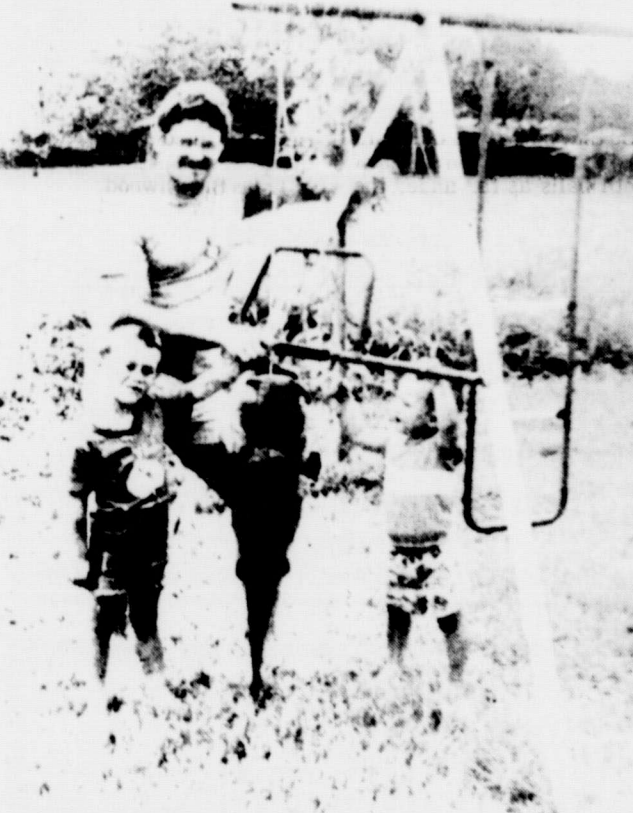

New music tape with in-the-womb sounds is designed to soothe the newborn. Anesthesiologist reports that adults find it relaxing, too.

Colchicine, an anti-gout drug, doubled the survival rate of cirrhosis patients in a long-term study at the Polytechnic Institute and the National Institute of Nutrition in Mexico City. Some patients had normal livers after treatment.

Researchers at Stanford Medical School found a direct relationship between olive oil in the diet and lowered blood pressure. Each gram of monounsaturates per 1,000 calories lowered systolic pressure 3/4 point, diastolic pressure 1/2 point.

New skin cream, Zostrix, relieves the discomfort of shingles. Active ingredient is capsaicin, the substance that makes hot peppers hot. It seems to inhibit the body chemical that telegraphs pain to the central nervous system.

# Eb Sitton, 72, Printer 3rd Victim Of Shooting

Eb "Pappy" Sitton, a retired printer for the Star-Telegram, died Friday, July 1, at a Fort Worth hospital. He was 72.

Funeral services for Mr. Sitton were held Tuesday, July 5, in the South Hills Baptist Church, with the Rev. Walter F. Reid officiating. Burial was in Cotondale Cemetery in Springtown.

He had been hospitalized since he, his wife and a daughter were shot by a masked man who entered their North Side home May 3.

The daughter, Alexandra "Inge" Sitton Heath, 27, died immediately and her mother, Martha Lindsey, 50, died two days later.

William Wesley Chappell, 51, has been charged with two counts of capital murder in the death of the two women, said Tarrant County Jail Sgt. D. Toland.

Chappell also is charged with three counts of attempted capital murder, one charge each of attempted murder, aggravated sexual assault, theft and burglary, Toland said. The suspect's bond on the charges is \$6.5 million.

Police said Chappell, who once dated another of Sitton and Lindsey's daughters, tried to set fire to their home Jan. 10.

He was previously convicted of a sexual assault on the former girlfriend's daughter and is being held on an appeal bond revocation in that offense.

His wife, Sally Chappell, 38, was also charged with capital murder in the May 3, shooting but has been released from jail to the custody of the Tarrant County District Attorney's Office.

Mr. Sitton was born in Marlowe, Oklahoma, and moved to Fort Worth in 1937 from Memphis, Texas.

He graduated cum laude and received his bachelor's degree in English and French from Texas Christian University in 1955.

Mr. Sitton was a sports writer and operated the Line-O-Type for The Cisco Press for a couple of years in the late 1950s. He was a printer for the Fort Worth Press for 20 years during the 1950s and 1960s. He was a printer for the Star-Telegram for seven years until he retired in 1978. He made the transition from hot type to cold type. He regularly wrote letters to the editor of the Star-Telegram.

He was a member of International Typographical Union, now the Communications Workers of America, Union Local No. 12201, and Sigma Phi Iota, a foreign language honors fraternity at Texas Christian University.



# Drug Committee Is Formed

On Friday, July 8 the Citizen's Committee on Drug Abuse was officially formed. This committee has only one objective: confronting the drug problem in this area in every way that it needs to be confronted.

A great deal has been said lately, concerning what we in this area cannot do about the problem, along with a long list of reasons why we shouldn't even try.

The Committee on Drug Abuse is determined not to be stopped cold by this type

of negative attitude. To help insure that this will not happen we have decided that we will work as a very diversified group, composed of a cross section of the community and area. Among those who have endorsed our effort and expressed their intentions to work with us on an official or informal level are parents, school officials, law enforcement agencies, recovering addicts and other agencies and individuals. With this type of broadly based con-

cern and effort geared toward a common goal, there cannot help but be advancement toward this goal.

At the meeting on Friday night, three programs were approved by a majority vote. They are as follows:

1. (Establishment of a directory of area services available for chemically dependent persons and their families.) After printing, this directory would be made available to all who would be in a position to utilize it.
2. (Seminars and

workshops program for students.) This program would include a series of workshops and seminars held in this area, and staged throughout the school year. The content of these programs would be geared toward such things as the dangers of drug experimentation and abuse, peer pressure and how to manage it, coping skills, stress management, enhancement of self esteem, and other topics that would emphasize the positive aspects of being chemical free. Most importantly it would provide helpful skills to enable the student to remain chemical free.

3. (Scholarship program for Eastland County

schools.) The requirements for eligibility would be set up, so as to make the Scholarship a direct incentive for attendance of the Seminars and workshops.

(Both of the school programs will be presented to school officials and the school board for their approval, as will the contest and methods to be incorporated into each individual seminar and workshop.)

Also approved at the meeting Friday night, was a fundraising event to be held in September. This event will be a songwriter's showcase, and should prove to be a success, due to the wealth of talent in this area.

Proceeds from this event will go towards the scholarship fund.

This committee is intent on carrying out these three programs as a beginning to a concentrated effort toward making a dent in the drug problem in this area.

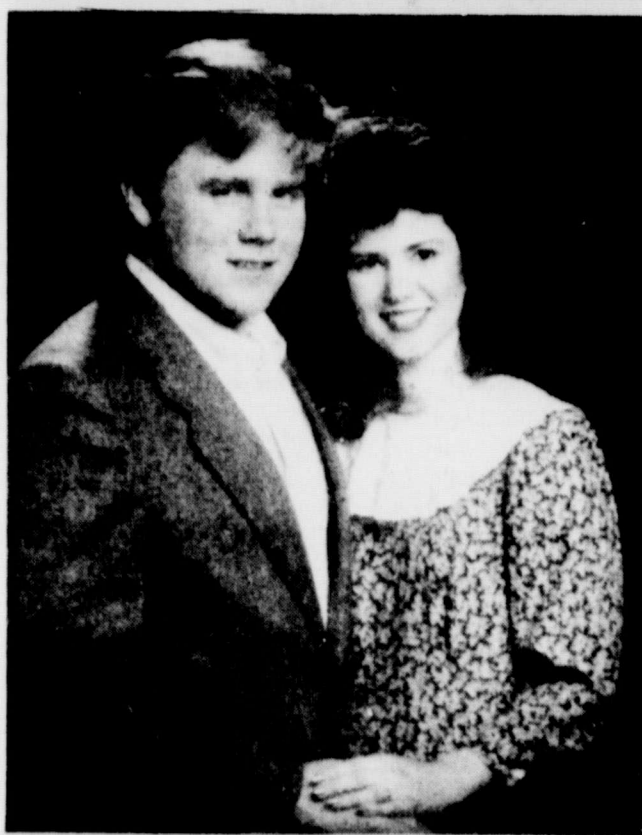

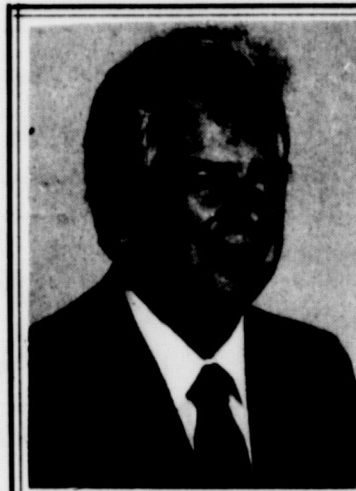

New Hagen made move to adjourn; seconded by Bud Clack. Voted on and passed by everyone standing and listening to closing prayer by Marshall Ivie.

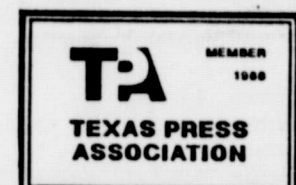

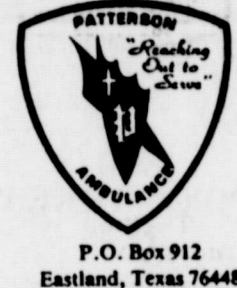

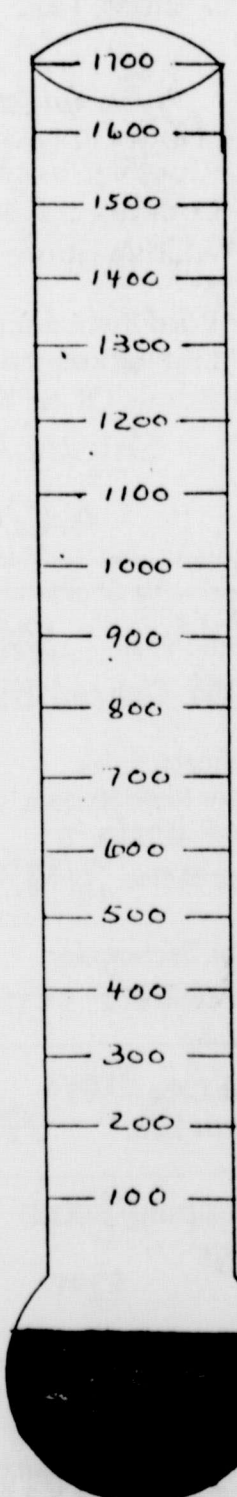

In Savannah, she went to work as the "Morning Drive Personality" at WWVA radio and also resumed her theatrical career. 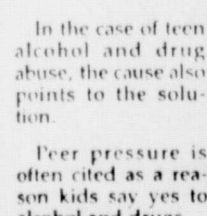
