Delinquent Taxes Total \$16,000

City May Seize Property For Delinquent Taxes

The City Council discussed appropriate ways to collect delinquent taxes at the regular meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall.

City Manager Mike Moore said the City of Cisco will have a tax rate increase of 2.8 percent next year. Moore said this will generate a revenue of \$8,000 for the city. But, he said, if everyone paid their taxes on a timely basis,

the city would have enough revenue so that a tax rate decrease could happen.

Moore said the citizens of Cisco who pay their taxes on time are having to pay extra because of the delinquent tax payers. Moore said the council discussed having the names of the delinquent tax payers published in the local newspaper since it is a matter of public record. This will

be discussed more at the next city council meeting.

Moore said the city should have collected \$249,277 in taxes last year. But, \$62,320 of that amount is delinquent. Cisco has a bad history of collecting past due taxes, but now the city wants to change that.

Moore said the council members discussed tax seizures for delinquent

business personal property taxes. Moore said the law allows the city to seize sufficient property to pay the past due taxes. He said he is talking about businesses that have owed the city delinquent taxes for more than two years or more than \$500. He said the present delinquent business taxes total up to more than \$16,000.

Moore said he hopes

business and property owners will pay their past due taxes, before the city takes these drastic measures. But, he said, if he doesn't get sufficient response from property owners who owe the city delinquent taxes, the tax seizures will begin.

In other matters, the city council voted to endorse the Patterson Ambulance Membership Drive that is now in progress. Patterson said they must have 850 members from Cisco if they are to stay in this area.

Moore said if the people don't buy the membership, then the money will have to come from the city through a tax subsidy.

Council members reviewed a letter Mayor Joe Wheatley wrote about the Patterson Ambulance Membership Drive and approved the motion that it be published in the Cisco Press.

Municipal Court Judge Douglas Fry, worked a total of 114 hours during April, May and June, it was also reported to the City Council.

Judge Fry reviewed 271 cases with traffic tickets, 55 different complaints such as public intoxication, theft, violation of animal control

ordinance and others. The city of Cisco brought in a total revenue of \$6,967.00 from the municipal court.

Council members also approved, as amended, the final draft of the annual budget for 1988-89 fiscal year. Moore said the amended budget brought it up \$6,500 to make allowances to purchase another garage truck. He said this brought the budget to \$939,500 in the general fund and \$683,500 in the utility fund. This will be a total of \$1,623,000 for the upcoming year.

Moore said the final budget will have its first reading on August 9, and the second reading on August 23.

Council members also heard the current report on the city of Cisco employees retirement system. Moore said there was no change, but they are required to review it ever so often.

Attending the meeting were City Secretary Ginger Johnson, City Manager Mike Moore, Mayor Cisco Joe Wheatley and city attorney, Billy Wright. Council members attending were John Muller, Rural Chambers, Vernetta Pierce, Olin Odom III, Arlie Whitley and Allen Masters.

Kentucky Man Killed In Truck Accident Thursday

A man was killed and his son escaped injury early Thursday morning in an accident 4 miles west of Cisco on I-20. Henry Schofield, 51, of Mayfield, Kentucky was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident by Justice Of The Peace J.V. Heyser.

Schofield apparently went to sleep while driving an 18-wheel truck. The truck went off the side of the road and rolled over twice pinning the driver inside.

Robert Schofield, 17, also of Mayfield, escaped injury

when he was thrown clear of the vehicle during the wreck. Steve Foster, Texas Department of Public Safety Trooper said the accident occurred about 6:15 a.m. Thursday.

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department was called out with the Jaws Of Life, but they were not used. Lee's Truck Service towed the truck into town.

Cisco Funeral Home was in charge of local arrangements. The body will be sent back to Kentucky for funeral services.

Cortez Murder Case Awaits Grand Jury

Quick work by the Cisco Police Dept., the Eastland County Sheriff's Dept., and Texas Ranger Gene Kea to try to solve the murder of 25 year old Eastland resident, Teofilo Vallejo Cortez, has resulted in arrests being made and charges being filed.

A sixteen year old black male from Cisco and a twenty-three year old latin male, Manuel Marquez, Jr., have been arrested.

Marquez has been charged with murder and his bond has been set at \$150,000. There will be a hearing in Abilene, pro-

bably late in the week, to try to certify the juvenile as an adult so that he can be charged also.

Officers are still taking statements, according to Deputy Sheriff H.T. Fillingham, and all of the lab results are expected within two weeks.

The case is to be presented to the next Grand Jury, and may be tried either as a murder case or as a capital murder case.

Marquez was being held in the Eastland County jail and the juvenile was in Abilene's juvenile detention center.

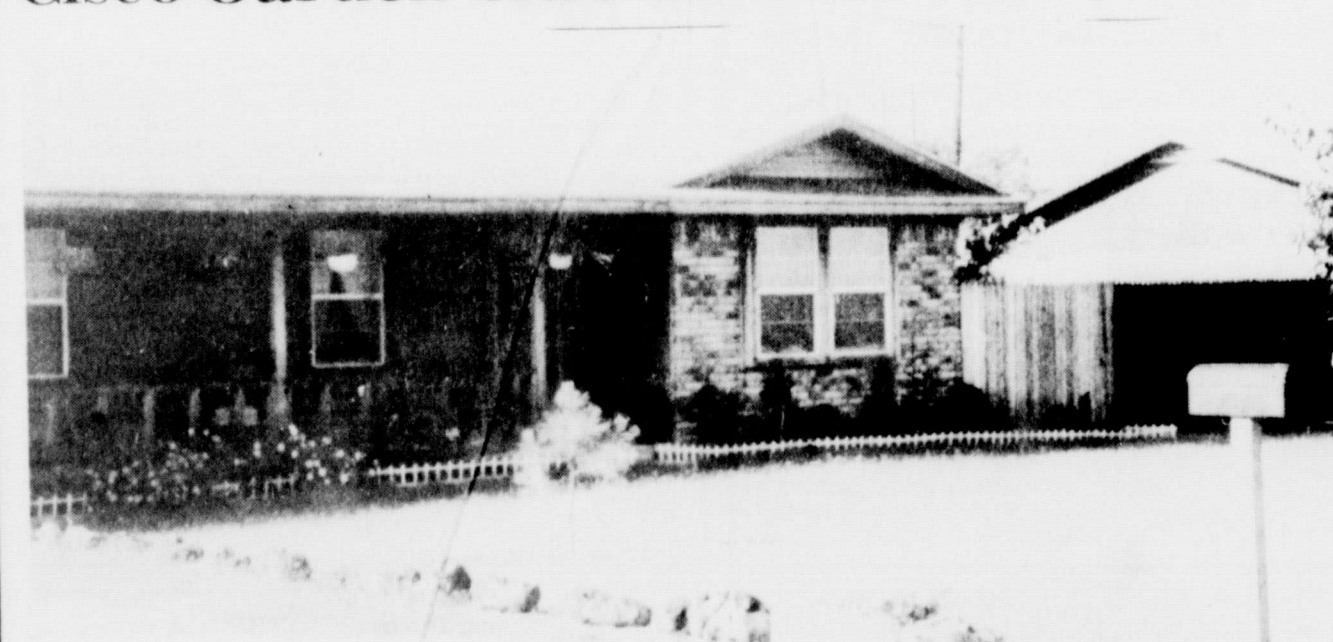
Both out of town and home games need to be filmed on Thursday and Friday nights. A new camera system is planned which will simplify the filming.

Open Letter To The Citizens Of Cisco Regarding Ambulance Service

Ambulance service for a community is often something we do not think about seriously until such time as we need it desperately. Then, in most cases, no dollar value could be placed on our being able to pick up a telephone, and in a short time have a well-equipped emergency vehicle manned by trained personnel at our doorway.

Seven years ago this summer, Patterson Ambulance began operation of their ambulance service here in the City of Cisco, with the service funded publically through a subscription membership program. The Y.E.S. program, stands for Youth Experience Success. This is the second year, CJC has hosted the program.

Mr. Crockett, who grew up in Cross Plains, is a teacher at Cooper High School in Abilene. Mr. Crockett said success breeds success. He said he has been successful in his life. He has always been able to feed his family and provide them with a home.

He said the Y.E.S. program was designed to teach young people how to feed themselves. He said people feel better about themselves when they work. And the Y.E.S. program is geared to get people working. He said they get young people and show them success.

The program is a 5-week

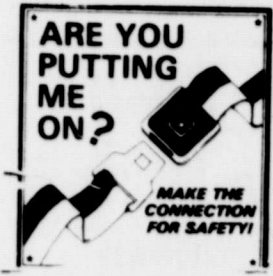

On July 11 Callahan County Judge Mack Kniffen swore in the first woman Deputy Constable ever in the county - Anita Buchanan of Putnam. This historical event took place when Precinct 8 Constable Arnold Pruet asked for approval from the Commissioners Court to appoint Mrs. Buchanan as his Deputy. She holds an Associate Degree in Criminal Justice, and has just completed 444 hours at the Law Enforcement Academy, and has been certified by the state. Mrs. Buchanan and her husband, Blayne, have lived in Putnam for the last 14 years. The Buchanans have two children.

At last Monday's meeting the Callahan County Commissioners asked Sheriff Bill Skinner about the progress of placing a Deputy in the Eula area. The Deputy was to have been located there by April 1, 1988. 

Special Task Force On Rural Health Care Delivery In Texas

Brazos River Authority Begins Special Water Quality Study

The Brazos River Authority has begun a special water quality study to help determine the appropriate stream standard in the portion of the Brazos River affected by the hydropower releases from Possum Kingdom Reservoir. This study is referred to as a Use Attainability Analysis (UAA). The Texas Water Commission and the Environmental Protection Agency have concurred with the study. The UAA will help determine whether the stream standards recently adopted by the Texas Water Commission are attainable

for the river segment immediately below the dam. The UAA will also document the abundant fish population and habitat present immediately below the dam.

The UAA required field measurements of the dissolved oxygen conditions during a hydropower release. The hydropower release must be during the warmest summer conditions. In order to meet the UAA requirements, the Brazos River Authority intends to make a hydropower release of four to six hours duration on two to three con-

secutive days in mid to late August 1988. This hydropower release should have only a minimal effect on the water level of the reservoir and is necessary to enable the Brazos River Authority to complete this important water quality study.

The hydropower release will be coordinated with the Brazos Electric Power Cooperative (BEPC) and will be made solely for the purpose of this water quality study. The BEPC has been extremely cooperative in curtailing hydropower generation since April 1987 when the reservoir water elevation was lower in connection with repairs to the dam.

KVMX Brings Back The Sally Jessy Raphael Show

The big media story of 1987 was Sally Jessy Raphael's decision to bring her popular nightly radio program to ABC Radio Network. Amid tremendous industry excitement, The Sally Jessy Raphael Show premiered in January, 1988.

Sally's phenomenal success in radio and television is unprecedented. When her local radio program began airing nationally in 1981, she was carried on a total of 23 affiliate stations. Less than three years later, the number had grown to over 300.

Sally Jessy Raphael was born in Easton, Pennsylvania and grew up in Westchester County, New York and in Puerto Rico,

where her father had a run exporting business. To this day, Sally considers Puerto Rico her home, and tries to return there as frequently as possible. She attended Carnegie Mellon Institute in Pittsburgh and earned B.F.A. from Columbia University in New York. She also attended the University of Puerto Rico.

Her broadcast career began over 30 years ago at WFAS radio on White Plains, New York, where she hosted "Jr. High News." Since then, she has held numerous different positions including rock'n roll disc jockey, television news anchor with WPIX-TV, New York, and cooking show host. She was also a news correspondent with Associated Press in the Caribbean and spent 20 years of her career covering Mexico, Paris and Aruba - at a time when a woman in broadcasting was a rarity. Sally's keen sense of business is evident in her several successful enterprises, including her own art gallery, wine restaurant and perfume factory. She is also a member of the Wine Media Guild.

The energetic and versatile Sally Jessy Raphael recently celebrated her 30th anniversary in broadcasting. Her graceful ability to handle the pressures of radio and television careers is strengthened by her rich home life and her ability to pursue - and realize - her dreams. She credits her husband of 23 years with support above and beyond the call of duty, and refers to her children as, "my expense, my love, and my sanity."

Gordon Spot

Sclerotinia blight is a relatively new disease of peanuts in this area. It has been very destructive to peanuts in Mason County and was identified in several Eastland County peanut fields last year.

Early symptoms include white tufts of cottony-like growth on stems near the ground line. Later stems shred and reveal black sclerotia inside the stems. Peanut plants die much like Southern blight symptoms. The fungicides that control Southern blight will not control Sclerotinia blight.

Botran is the only fungicide that has been effective in the control of Sclerotinia blight and it was not labeled for use on peanuts. However, last week the Environmental Protection Agency notified the Texas Department of Agriculture that specific exemption (Section 18) for the use of Botran to control Sclerotinia blight on peanuts has been granted.

The Eastland County Extension Agents are among more than 900 faculty members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service taking part in a professional development conference at Texas A&M University this week, July 11-15.

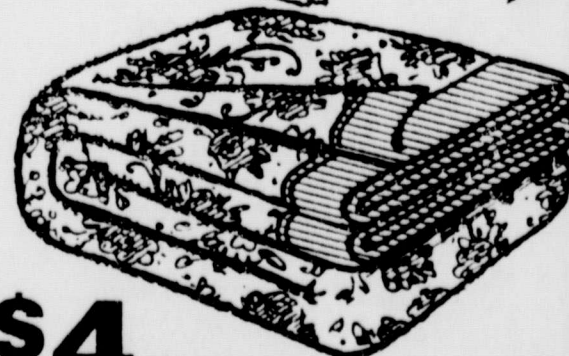

"Brownwood Open Set For July 24th"

Many of you have requested that lake reports be reported more often. These reports become more and more difficult as time progresses. This is due largely to anglers who are catching fish don't want to take the chance of someone fishing in the same place, method, and pattern they are. I will try to run some reports each week.

Lake Leon: Clear in main lake, off colored in river; black's fair on worms in shallow water some on top-water; catfish mostly slow with channels moving in on their south bank pattern under the bridge; crappie good in numbers but small.

Lake Proctor: Lake marking up, 4-5 above full, blacks good to 6 pounds on jigs in 6 foot of water, 2 over 6 lbs, 4 over 5 lbs, 4 over 4 lbs, caught last weekend in tournaments

some topwater action on small fish, catfish good on cut bait, crappie slow, hybrid stripers good trolling.

Lake Brownwood: Water stained, lake full, blacks fair to 3 pounds on black and white worms and buzz baits, striped fair to 8 pounds on white jibs, crappie good with limits in 3 hours to ¼ pounds on minnows, catfish excellent to 4 pounds all over on shrimp.

Lake Gibbons Creek: Water clear, 1 foot low; blacks excellent to 11½ pounds on black worms with blue tails and DB No. 3s; crappie good to 1½ pounds on minnows; catfish good to 6 pounds with minnows and shrimp.

Lake Granbury: Water clear in most areas; blacks good to 3½ pounds on POPRs and Zara Spooks off mossy points; striped slow; crappie good in 17 feet of water; catfish good with chicken livers and

shrimp; yellow cats good to 37 pounds on live perch.

Lake Hubbard Creek: Water mostly clear; blacks good to 7 pounds on black worms; hybrid striped good to 5 pounds on white cranks; crappie slow, catfish slow.

Lake Oak Creek: Water clear, black bass good to 9 pounds, 2 ounces in 8 feet of water; crappie fair on minnows; white bass good on slabs; catfish good to 5 pounds on shrimp.

Lake Possum Kingdom: Water clear, 13 feet low, blacks good in the 2-4 pound range on topwater; stripers hitting worms near the dam.

Lake Twin Buttes: Water clear, 3½ feet low, blacks good to 9.6 pounds several 8 pounders on 12 inch worms.

July 24th, Lake Brownwood, Headquarters at Flat Rock Park. Entry fee only \$25.00, optional \$5.00 big bass pot. What is it? The summer sizzler Open Tournament, hosted by the Brownwood Bass Club.

Based on an entry of 200 person the payback will be: 1st \$1,000.00; 2nd \$640.00; 3rd \$440.00; 4th \$320.00; 5th \$200.00; 6-10 place \$100.00; 11-15 place \$80.00; 21-25 place \$40.00.

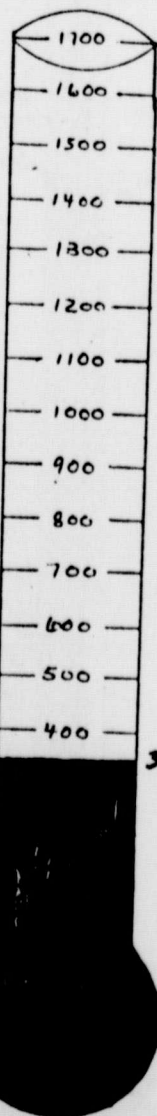

The Press received a report from Bob Bullock about the situation of sales tax revenues in Texas cities. Cisco paid in a total of \$9,017.78 in taxes during this net period compared to \$8,025.58 last year. That is a 12.36% increase.

This shows that Cisco's economy is beginning to gain strength. This also proves that more people are beginning to shop at home first.

Other cities in Eastland County that have an increase in their city sales are Eastland with 4.29%, Gorman with 17.54%, and Rising Star with 73.74% (Wow!). Ranger was down with -10.45%.

For the year total Gorman still has the highest sales tax increase with 10.28%. Next is Cisco with 7.54%, Eastland with 2.40%, and Ranger with 1.15%. Rising Star's percentage for the past year is -3.75%.

Bullock said that 915 checks totalling \$61.3 million in local sales taxes were sent Tuesday to cities that collect the local option sales tax at either one or one and one-half percent rates.

The program will be held July 18 through August 12. Registration will begin at 2:30 p.m., Monday.

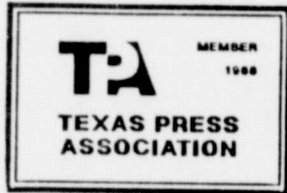
Al Anderson and Lloyd McGrew have filmed the Junior and Senior High School football games for several years now and have done a wonderful job of it, too.
