

Delinquent Taxes Total \$16,000

City May Seize Property For Delinquent Taxes



City Manager Mike Moore said the City of Cisco will have a tax rate increase of 2.8 percent next year. Moore said this will generate a revenue of \$8,000 for the city. But, he said, if everyone paid their taxes on a timely basis, the city would have enough revenue so that a tax rate decrease could happen.

Moore said the citizens of Cisco who pay their taxes on time are having to pay extra because of the delinquent tax payers. Moore said the council discussed having the names of the delinquent tax payers published in the local newspaper since it is a matter of public record. This will be discussed more at the next city council meeting.

Moore said the city should have collected \$249,277 in taxes last year. But, \$62,320 of that amount is delinquent. Cisco has a bad history of collecting past due taxes, but now the city wants to change

Moore said the council members discussed tax seizures for delinquent

business personal property taxes. Moore said the law allows the city to seize sufficient property to pay the past due taxes. He said he is talking about businesses that have owed the city delinquent taxes for more than two years or more than \$500. He said the present delinquent business taxes total up to more than \$16,000.

Moore said he hopes

business and property owners will pay their past due taxes, before the city takes these drastic measures. But, he said, if he doesn't get sufficient response from property owners who owe the city delinquent taxes, the tax

In other matters, the city council voted to endorse the Patterson Ambulance Membership Drive that is now in progress. Patterson said they must have 850 members from Cisco if they are to stay in this area.

seizures will begin.

Moore said if the people don't buy the membership, then the money will have to come from the city through a tax subsidy.

Council members reviewed a letter Mayor Joe Wheatley wrote about the Patterson Ambulance Membership Drive and approved the motion that it be published in the Cisco Press.

Muncipal Court Judge Douglas Fry, worked a total of 114 hours during April, May and June, it was also reported to the City Council.

Judge Fry reviewed 271 cases with traffic tickets, 55 different complaints such as public intoxication, theft,

ordinance and others. The city of Cisco brought in a total revenue of \$6,967.00 from the municipal court.

Council members also approved, as amended, the final draft of the annual budget for 1988-89 fiscal year. Moore said the amended budget brought it up \$6,500 to make allowances to purchase another garage truck. He said this brought the budget to \$939,500 in the general fund and \$683,500 in the utility fund. This will be a total of \$1,623,000 for the upcoming year.

Moore said the final budget will have it's first reading on August 9, and the second reading on August 23.

Council members also heard the current report on the city of Cisco employees retirement system. Moore said there was no change, but they are required to review it ever so often.

Open Letter To The Citizens Of Cisco Regarding Ambulance Service

Dear Editor, I would like to respond to Ms. Hillis letter in Sunday's paper. First there are three statements to be quoted. Water, water everywhere, nor any a drop to drink,"

Those people down there who run the town don't want any new business to come in." "That bank ain't going to loan any money or help any business come in unless they can get a large chunk of the money for themselves."

If you stand around and talk to most anyone about Cisco you will hear most everyone make the last two statements. The first one tho, is the immediate problem. All around Cisco is water, Lake Leon, Lake Hubbard Creek, Lake Brownwood, Etc... But here in Cisco there is hardly enough water to drink much less anything else. The lake didn't use to be this way, so

Because the water shed that used to feed into the lake is now dammed up by stock tanks. Before any run off can get to the lake it has to fill up the tanks first and then run around. Now this is not to condem the ranchers because the tanks were built as a water conservation measure. But the situation exist and there is no remedy for it.

why is it now?

Lake Cisco is not the lake it used to be. I can only guess as to why the tournament was held at Lake Leon, but I



would say they knew they wouldn't get much response to Lake Cisco and they would to Lake Leon. The situation of Lake Cisco is well known thru out the region.

That situation is also why we will not get much if any businesses to move in here. Would you moved into a town and invest your money if you knew there might not be a water supply in two or three years? Of course, they go to Eastland, Lake Leon stays fairly full. Also, it is my own feeling that "Those people down there..." do want business to come in, but they want it to be manufacturing

business. You cannot blame them if they really don't want competition to move next door. But, we will never get manufacturing until we get a water supply. So we might as well forget that as not one can afford to pay to bring in outside water. There are only two ways to bring money in, manufacturing or tourism.

Right now tourism is Cisco's only way. Cisco is going to have to sit down and start coming up with concrete ideas to promote tourism, and it will have to be a bunch of ideas. We will have to have things that happen in the winter as well as spring and summer and fall. Cisco will also have to be willing to provide the facilities for tourist to stay

and to use. Fix up the old swimming pool for use as a fair area and as a camp ground. Use

Special Task Force On Rural Health Care Delivery In Texas

Dr. Jim Bob Brame, chairman of the "Special TAsk Force on Rural Health Care Delivery in Texas," has announced the sixth in a series of statewide hearings being held to discuss the current and future health care needs of persons in rural areas of Texas. Task Force members include State Senators Chet Brooks and Richard Ander-

The hearing will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday, July 20, at West Central Texas Council of Governments, 1025 E. North 10th - Judge Ely Blvd., Abilene.

The nine member committee is charged with developing a health care delivery plan that can voluntarily be implemented by local governments to provide and improve levels of service.

Brazos River Authority Begins Special Water Quality Study

The Brazos River Authority has begun a special water quality study to help determine the appropriate stream standard in the portion of the Brazos River affected by the hydropower releases from Possum Kingdom Reservoir. This study is referred to as a Use Attainability Analysis (UAA). The Texas Water Commission and the Environmental Protection Agency have concurred with the study. The UAA will help determine whether the stream standards recently adopted by the Texas Water Commission are attainable

for the river segment immediately below the dam. The UAA will also document the abundant fish population and habitat present immediately below the dam.

The UAA required field measurements of the dissolved oxygen conditions during a hydropower release. The hydropower release must be during the warmest summer conditions. In order to meet the UAA requirements, the Brazos River Authority intends to make a hydropower release of four to six hours duration on two to three conThe finds and recommendations of the task force are to be submitted to the 71st Texas Legislature.

Topics to be addressed include medical malpractice liability, insurance, physician and nursing shortage, emergency medical transportation, access to care and reimbursement issues. All interested persons are invited to attend.

The hydropower release will be coordinated with the Brazos Electric Power Coopertive (BEPC) and will be made solely for the purpose of this water quality study. The BEPC has been extremely cooperative in curtailing hydropower generation since April 1987 when the reservoir water elevation was lower in connection with repairs to the

KVMX Brings Back The Sally Jessy Raphael Show

The big media story of 1987 was Sally Jessy Raphael's decision to bring her popular nightly radio program to ABC Radio Network. Amid tremendous industry excitement, The Sally Jessy Raphael Show premiered in January, 1988.

Sclerotinia blight is a relatively new disease of peanuts in this area. It has been very destructive to peanuts in Mason County and was identified in several Eastland County peanut fields last year.

Early symptoms include white tufts of cottony-like growth on stems near the ground line. Later stems shred and reveal black sclerotia inside the stems. Peanut plants die much like Southern blight symptoms. The fungicides that control Southern blight will not control Sclerotinia blight.

Botran is the only fungicide that has been effective in the control of Sclerotinia blight and it was not labeled for use on peanuts. However, last week the Environmental Protection Agency notified the Texas Department of Agriculture that specific exemption (Section 18) for the use of Botran to control Sclerotinia blight on peanuts has been granted.

The Eastland County Extension Agents are among more than 900 faculty members of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service taking part in a professional development conference at Texas A&M University this week, July 11-15.

certification.


