## Firemen Looking For New Jeep Truck

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department is looking for a Jeep Truck like the one they have now, to purchase and use as another Rural Fire Truck, according to Richard Connell, fire chief. Richard said they are checking around now, to see what they can afford. He said at the present time, there are no Jeep trucks for sale.

Chief Connell said after the truck is bought, the firemen will have to put a pump, hose and a rebuilt engine on the truck. He said they presently have two motors rebuilt, one for the truck they use now and one for the truck they plan to purchase. Connell said they will buy the second Jeep truck when enough donations come in. Connell said they can't put the motor into their present rural fire truck until they have another truck to take its place in case they have to respond to a fire.

Members of the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department have answered several alarms this month, according to a report from C.W. Guthrie, fireman. Firemen extinguished a grass fire on July 4th. On the 8th of July, firemen extinguished a fire in a

barbecue pit on West 11th. Firemen also assisted with the removal of the body of Freddie Cortez from the Cisco Lake Park on the 8th. Cisco firemen extinguished a fire in the Cisco Landfill on July 9. On July 14, Cisco firemen took the Jaws of Life to the scene of the truck wreck on I-20, and extinguished a car fire on the corner of 8th and Ave. E. Cisco firemen extinguished a grease fire at the home of Jerry Jeffcoat on Sunday. The fire caused heavy smoke damage to the kitchen area.

## Burglar Attempts To Rob Store

Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains was called on Saturday, to investigate the attempted burglary of Thrift Mart Grocery Store in Cisco. The attempted burglary occurred last Friday night. Rains said a suspect climbed on the roof of the store, by the furnace and tried to make their way into the store through the air conditioning vents, but failed to gain entry to the store. Rains said the attempted burglary may have connections to a robbery at the Thrift Mart Grocery Store in Eastland the night before the Cisco incident.

Chief Rains said at the present time the Cisco Police Department and Eastland County Sheriff Deputy H.T. Fillingim are investigating the fire at Tradition's Restaurant Sunday morning. Rains said the fire looks suspicious.

On July 10, Officer Larry Weikel answered a call from Allsup's Convenience store when a car drove off owing the store \$18.50 worth of gas. Officer Weikel arrested Larry T. Starnes from Odessa for possession of a controlled substance on July 10.

Officer Chris Key investigated the report on July 12, for the burglary of the coin operated machines at Lobo Car Wash. Damage was estimated at \$35.00. Officer Kenneth Preston investigated the report from Town and Country of a Class C theft on July 12. A car drove away without paying for \$7.00 worth of gasoline. The case is under investigation.

Officer Donald Wiley investigated a report from Dollar Video on July 14, of a VCR that someone had failed to return. The store also reported a case of criminal mischief when they discovered bricks in the flower bed petition in the carport had been either knocked or kicked out. The amount of damage was unknown.

Officer Larry Jernigan investigated a report from Shirley Ingram for criminal mischief to her 1972 Ford Van. The incident happened in the 1100 block of West 8th, on July 4.

Officer Donald Wiley answered a call about a simple assault case on July 5th, at Lake Cisco point. Rusty Wells reported the call.

Chief Rains also responded to a call on July 5th from a woman who said she was receiving harrasing phone calls and letters. The case is under investigation.

Rains also investigated the report of a burglary of a building at Naylors Used Cars on July 5th. It was reported that \$345.68 worth of tools were taken from a storage building.

On July 6th, Officer Chris Key investigated the report of the theft of two shotguns

and one 22-rifle taken from the residence of Arnold Hollingshead. The case is under investigation.

Chief Rains also investigated a report from Bret McMillan, on July 6, in reference to the theft of two Honda rear view mirrors taken from his motorcycle. The mirrors valued at \$137.90 have been recovered.

## Life On The Quiet Side

Did you know that you could grow a small house plant from fruit and vegetable scraps that, ordinarily, you'd just toss out? For many indoor gardeners, young and old, there's a special appeal to start a plant this simple way.

Besides gaining the usual satisfactions of gardening, you'll be able to witness, first-hand, the way a new plant sprouts. Children find this fascinating to observe day by day. And many of their elders also appreciate getting a lovely, leafy house plant from what would otherwise go to waste.

Pineapple is a favorite plant from the kitchen. You can grow this common bromeliad from the top of a grocery store fruit. Remove flesh, let top dry for a week

out of sun, then plant. Avocado is another kitchen favorite. Stick wooden picks in center of avocado pit, then suspend it in a glass of water (bottom of pit should barely touch water). Sprouts within weeks. Plant in potting soil.

Many are successful at growing lemon, grapefruit and orange plants from seed. Let seeds from grocery store citrus fruits dry 1 or 2 weeks; then plant one half inch deep.

The sweet potato is perhaps an all time favorite plant from the kitchen. Stick wooden picks in tubers; suspend, upright in glass of water (water should cover tuber halfway). Plant in pot after roots and leaves appear and watch the beautiful ivy like plant grow by leaps and bounds. This plant needs plenty of water.

## Do Not Post Signs On Poles

On September 9, 1986, the City Council passed an ordinance prohibiting the posting of signs on utility poles and public property. As stated in the ordinance, the posting of such signs, posters and other such placards on utility poles and public property throughout the city creates an unsightly nuisance, significantly contributes to the litter problem, generally detracts from the beauty of the community, and also creates a hazard to utility company employees who have to climb these poles.

The City of Cisco is again requesting that everyone voluntarily comply with this

important ordinance and please do not attach these unattractive garage/sale signs, for sale, etc. signs to utility poles or public property within the city limits. Regrettably, there will be no choice but to prosecute repeat violations of the ordinance, and a fine of up to \$200.00 could be assessed if found guilty.

Keeping our city clean and beautiful requires the community-wide effort of all our citizens. Your cooperation in this matter and show of community pride would be greatly appreciated.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials said application forms and instructions may be obtained in person or by mail from TPWD headquarters, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, TX 78744, or by calling the statewide toll-free number 1-800-792-1112. The forms also may be picked up in person at the

## J.D. Murphree WMA at Port Arthur

The deadline for returning completed forms to TPWD headquarters is 5 p.m. August 1. A drawing will be held to select the hunters. There is no application fee, but a fee of \$40.00 will be charged successful applicants.

Approximately 180 alligator hunting permits will be issued for the Murphree area, located on the south side of State Highway 73, three miles west of the State Highway 82 intersection. Another

eight permits will be issued for hunts on the new Mad Island WMA, located 15 miles south of El Maton in Matagorda County.

Last year, 198 hunters at the Murphree area harvested 178 gators.

The general alligator season for selected areas of Southeast Texas is Sept. 2-18. Tag quotas will be announced during the first week of August, after alligator census surveys are completed, according to Dr. Bruce Thomas, alligator program director.

For a number of years now many members of the Eastland County Bass Club have commented about the small purses, which are awarded during club tournaments. There has been much discussion on this matter, but no action has been taken. The single most important factor to remember is that this organization was not formed to win money or actually to even award cash. Trophies were once the only award offered, and sometimes members had to even wait a little to get those due to lack of club funds.

Many possible solutions to the money problem have been offered. The bottom line is without more participants an increase is not likely. However one possible solution has been brought to my attention and I thought I would pass this along.

Based on last years 16 man average per event the E.C.B.C. cleared an average \$80.00 per event. Originally this money was used to purchase trophies for our top 3 winners in each event. It has been suggested that since we now award 1 plaque per person our trophy cost are cut by about 1/2. The money previously kept by the club could be turned back into the prize awards. A 10 percent off the top would probably cover the cost of plaques at the years end it was pointed out. This would leave a First 50 percent, second 30 percent, and third 10 percent. This based on a field of 16 entrants would look like this First \$80.00, Second \$48.00, Third \$16.00. These figures are based on the percent of entry of \$10.00 for the tournament. It was suggested also that with a 90 percent pay back that the E.C.B.C. could possibly recover some of its lost membership by reducing the entry some. A possible set up that was mentioned was to go \$8.00 tournament \$2.00 big bass with both being mandatory. Then having an optional big bass pot of \$5.00 paying one to three places.

As it was mentioned the

bottom line to it all is to raise participation before the pot can be sweetened. If only 10 percent of the entry money is kept for the club this would mean members would have to seek other means to finance club expenditures.

The Eastland County Bass Club is an important resource for our area in many ways. And growth can occur with some work and cooperation from the members and the community.

The comments above are the words of an E.C.B.C. member who is attempting to start the ball rolling towards growth for the E.C.B.C. and stop recession.

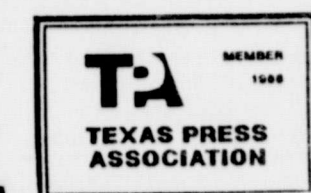

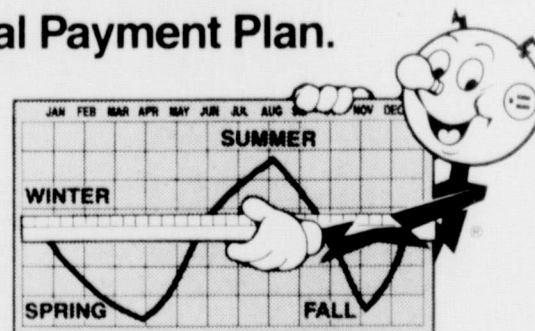


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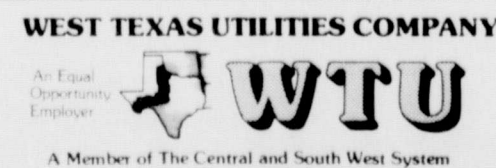
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
