There will be a variety of books, including children's, adult's, Biblical, history, cookbooks, and many more. Along with the selection of books, there will be home baked items.



Leon's Shad Still Dying Lake Leon has had its largest shad die off in years. And the bad part is that it is still going on. A number of anglers in our area are becoming quite concerned about this and have asked why. Each year lakes turn over, meaning just that oxygen depleted water surface forcing oxygen rich water down. A small number of fish are normally killed during this process. But the kill is not normally this large, or this restricted to species. On a recent outing at Leon we viewed only one other species of fish dead. And it was one single carp. I do feel the shad kill is related to the

Prior to this kill for around 112 months the depths of 8' to 20' were dead water. This was proved by trotlines who could not keep any bait alive at these depths. And this was over most of the lake at the same time. There were areas where this was not true, but they were few. During this time large schools of shad were huddled near the surface in an attempt to evade the oxygen dead water. When the final few feet of surface water became bad it appears the shad believed to be trapped due to the wide range in depth of the bad water. Thus killing thousands of our forage fish.

Shad is the number one food source for our black bass during this time of year. Hopefully the large kill will not be too hard felt on the bass and strippers since Leon did and I think still has an excellent pound per acre ration of available food supp-

Eastland Lake holds some fond memories for many of us and some excellent close at hand recreation for everyone. Excellent fishing, boating, swimming, quite walks and beautiful scenery. Once billed as the largest water source in the county, Eastland Lake is now being considered as a expendable item. Water in West Texas expendable? Well that's a" first for me folks as I'm sure, it is for a number of you. Eastland Lake is far to valuable a community for we the citizens not to allow its destruction. Not only because of its water supply, but it also acts as a silt trap for Lake Leon, a food deterant during heavy rains, urse as a close at hand recreation spot for all to enjoy. Let your voice be heard concerning the possible destruction of this valuable commodity 'water" in our area.

August 4th the Eastland County Bass Club will be holding its monthly meeting. The location has not been announced. For more information contact Eddie Green. At present August 14th is the date for the E.C.B.C. inerclub tournament, site to be drawn at the club meeting. he Prownwood Bass Club Open tournament this past weekend was deemed a winner: drawing over 150 entries. First place was taken by Herschell Duncan of the B.B.C. second Ben Villapando of the B.B.C. and third Bobby Maynard of the Ballinger and Eastland County Bass Clubs. I was unable to attend this event, but I understand the Eastland area was well represented, congratulations to the winners and all the anglers who were able to find a keeper.

Lake Victor Braunig has been one of Texas' most unusual reservoirs during the past decade, for several reasons.

It's murky waters support a remarkable biomass of fish, including introduced species such as red drum, hybrid striped bass and hybrid orangemouth cor-

The 1,350-acre power plant lake on the southeast outskirts of San Antonio has had its problems, however, in production of largemouth bass. For reasons yet unknown. native largemouths and Floridastrain bass traditionally have had poor spawning suc-

cess. But not this year. Dick Tuebke, manager of the Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department's Heart O' the Hills Research Station at Ingram said a recent cove rotenone survey turned up an amazing number of yearling bass that were produced by a national spawn. The lake had not been stocked with bass this year. "We collected 1,883 bass per acre in the two coves sampled,' said Tuebke. "This was a 300 percent increase over 1987 and the highest density of bass since we starting the sampling in 1981."

In addition to the young of the year bass, the crews picked up 21 largemouths in the 14-inch-plus category, including two measuring 20 inches and one 21 incher.

Luebke said an amazing 74 pounds of bass per acre were found in the survey this year, and this is a vast improvement over the 10 pounds per acre in 1987



TRY OATS TO REDUCE CHOLESTEROL LEVEL:

It's long been known that the fiber in oats lowers blood cholesterol in people who have high levels, thus reducing their risk of developing heart disease. Now researchers have also found it lowers blood cholesterol of people who have what are considered normal levels.

Research scientists at Northwestern University

School of Medicine have found that just two ounces a day of either oatmeal or oat bran, which equals about two cups of hot cereal or two muffins, can lower cholesterol by almost 5 percent in a matter of weeks.

Before you start eating bowl upon bowl of oatmeal be aware of two factors. First, the oat products in the studies were found to be helpful only as a part of a moderate-fat, moderatecholesterol diet. So don't count on oatmeal to combat the effects of a fatty diet.

Second, it hasn't been shown that just because two ounces of oats are effective in lowering cholesterol levels that more than two ounces will be even better. So don't go overboard on oats to the exclusion of other carbohydrates

ICE CREAM PIE 4 egg whites, stiffly beaten 1 cup sugar

12 cup, chopped nuts 12 cup graham cracker

crumbs 12 gallon softened ice cream strawberries

Add sugar to stiffly beaten egg whites, then add pecans and graham cracker crumbs. Spread this mixture in a baking pan and bake 30 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool. Spread with 12 gallon softened ice cream. Top with fresh or drained frozen strawberries. Put into freezer until time to serve. Delicious!

TEXAS AND THE LEGISLATURE



Workers' Compensation at the Crossroads

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it!" It's a phrase we hear often in Austin, and one I've had occasion to use myself. The sentiment is sound, but is it applicable to the Texas workers' compensation system?

Wokers' compensation is a complex and often misunderstood subject. The idea came to America from England and continental Europe in the early years of this century. Those were years when the largely unregulated factory system killed and maimed newly urbanized workers in record numbers. The common law remedies for occupational accidents were slow, litigious, costly and very uncertain. The cost of injury and death, in all but the most exceptional cases, fell on the accident victim, his or her family, charitable organiza-

tions and society at large. Workers' compensation laws sought to remedy the situation in an historic compromise: employers agree to bear the costs of occupational injuries without regard to fault, and in return workers agree to limit the employers' liability to

The system was thus a form of no-fault insurance designed to protect the injured worker from destitution and to protect society's support systems from the ravenous costs of job injuries. It is a major social program, predating Social Security and other Depression era pro-

grams by some 20 years. Workers' compensation programs are state programs, run under state laws and administered at the state level. When both the private and public sectors are considered, Texas employers will spend nearly three billion dollars on workers' compensation in 1988, and half a million. Texas workers will receive workers' compensation benefits.

Are employers' getting what they pay for? Are injured workers getting what they deserve? I submit that the answer to both questions is "No." Let's review the evidence

Except for a tiny number who fall under a special provision of the law, a worker who is premanently and totally disabled by a Texas job injury may receive a maximum of \$231 per week for a maximum or 401

weeks. This amounts to \$92,631 in compensation for a lifetime of lost wages. The money is in addition to medical benefits which by law are permanent, but which in practice are

routinely reduced to periods ranging from a few months to a few years. In over 40 states, the per-

manently and totally disabled worker can receive higher weekly benefits. In over 45 states that worker may receive benefits longer than 401 weeks (in most states for life.) And in virtually every other state the maximum benefits provided are greater than in Texas. The permanently, but not

totally disabled Texan fares little better. His or her maximum benefit of \$69,300 is lower than at least 35 states. The Texan temporarily idled by an injury which is not permanently disabling is due \$231 per week (40 states are higher) after 7 days of lost time (29 states start benefits faster.) The comparisons, incidentally, are compiled from State Workers' Compensation Laws, published by the U.S. Department of Labor. Check it out. Convince yourself as I did.

The monetary benefits provided disabled Texans are poor. If this fact were not cruel enough, Texas is one of only three states which allow employers legally to provide no workers' compensation coverage and no workers' compensation benefits.

Are Texas businesses getting a free ride at the workers' expense? Again the answer is "No."

General Motors has told our Committee that workers' compensation costs per employee at the Arlington assembly plant are the highest of the company's 12 assembly plants. They are more than double the cost in 10 of those plants.

The Howmet Corporation of Wichita Falls tells us that costs in the Texas castings division are as high as the combined costs in similar divisions in four other states, and this despite the fact that the Texas facility is the newest, best maintained, and has the fewest employees and most aggressive safety programs.

A New York based garment manufacturer, seeking to locate a facility which would provide 300 jobs, found applicable workers' compensation manual rates in Texas to be \$8.11 per \$100 of payroll. The highest rate among the 31 other states examined was \$4.43. The lowest was .90 cents. A small employer has told the Committee his premuim is \$20,000 per year, while the claims paid from that premium have been less than \$1,000 for each of the past several years.

We have heard similar testimony from such corporations as Kohler, Coca-Cola, Krogers, Proctor and Gamble, Justin Industries, American Airlines, Pillbury, and numerous other large and small employers. The Grant Thornton accounting consultants estimate Texas costs to be the tenth highest among the 48 states. Studies by academics seem to confirm this conclusion.

I believe the judgement is in: the Texas workers' compensation system is broke. It serves neither workers nor employers as it should and must. It needs fixing.

The Joint Select Committee has undertaken a broadbased study of the system to isolate the sore spots and

devise solutions. The study is still underway and solutions will undoubtedly emerge only slowly as we learn and deliberate. I believe, however, that a couple of

things are clear. First, Band-Aids will not suffice to cure the ills of Texas workers' compensation. The system, designed in 1917, has seen great improvements over the years, but now it must be examined with an unencumbered eye and revamped to meet the needs of Texas and Texans

in the 1990's and beyond. Second, the examination must be all encompassing. Neither the problems nor the solutions lie in one area or with one group. We must begin with safety in the workplace and systematically review the insurance system, medical services and costs, the Industrial Acident Board, the system of djudication and all other

The future of many Texans, and perhaps of Texas itself, is in the balance.



Tarleton State University Expanded Graduate Program

The fall schedule at Tarleton State University will feature an expanded graduate program. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board approved Friday the addition of a Master of Arts and a Master of Science degree at the University.

Dean of Graduate Studies, Dr. Ron Braberry, announced Monday that the
two new degree programs,
each with emphasis in three
areas, will be added to
University's curriculum.
The Master of Arts degree
offers options in History,
Government and English
while the Master of Science
degree has options in Biology, Mathematics and Agriculture.

"These degree plans have an emphasis on research," said Dr. Bradberry, "and each requires 36 hours including a thesis."

A majority of the previous graduate programs at the University were developed with an emphasis toward education. In fact the Master of Business Administration was the only program previously offered by Tarleton that was a nonteaching degree. Other programs already existing included the Master of Education (with five options), Master of Arts Teaching (three options), and Master of Science Teaching (four options).

Although the new degree programs were given the official "okay" on Friday, many months of preparation have gone into designing the curriculum. Increases in library holdings and in science laboratories and equipment plus selection of qualified instructors from among the TSU faculty contributed to the program's acceptance.

"The addition of these programs is a natural part of our maturing as a University," said Dr. Robert C. Fain, Vice-President for Academic Affairs. "In previous years our graduate program has concentrated on teaching and now we are moving toward research. There was a genuine need for these types of programs in this area and we are glad to have the opportunity to serve the community by offering the curriculum they desire."
