# **Cisco Man Arrested For Weekend House Fire**

A 35-year old Cisco man was charged with second degree felony arson late Monday afternoon in connection with a house fire over the weekend. Ralph King was arranged before Judge Bush of Ranger. Bond was set at \$50,000.

According to Cisco Chief of Police Billy Rains, the suspect had alledgedly set multiple fires in a home at 609 East 14th. Damage to the home was estimated at \$25,000.

Rains said the suspect is accused of setting fire to curtains and bed clothes in the kitchen and bedrooms with a cigarette lighter. No one was at the house when Cisco firemen arrived. The suspect was picked up at another Cisco location, returned to the house, and then jailed.

In other police reports Chief Rains took a report from Randa Bishop of Cisco on July 22, about a theft from her residence. A child's yellow and blue electric Suzuki four wheeler was taken from her yard between

8 and 10 p.m., on July 21. Cisco Police Officer Donald Wiley took a report of simple assault from Jack Heinzman of Cisco. There was an argument between him and his stepson. No charges were filed.

The Texas Legislature and the Health Care Providers are very disturbed concerning the situation that is facing the rural population in regard to health care for all ages in the near future.



# Health Care At Home: A Look At Self-Testing Kits

### by Bob Myers

More and more Americans are using home diagnostic kits to test or monitor themselves for a range of health conditions-and to help control their health care expenses, as well.

Home diagnostic kits are a relatively inexpensive way to alert people about a potential health problem, such as high blood pressure, colon cancer and diabetes. But these kits are not intended as substitutes for proper medical diag-nosis and treatment. A "positive" reading may not necessarily mean that you have a certain condition, but it almost always means that a visit to the doctor is in order. Briefly, here is a round-up of just some of the many home

testing kits you can find on most pharmacy shelves: Pregnancy. The first and

most popular home diagnostic kit was introduced in 1977 for pregnancy testing. Through a simple urine test that detects a hormone present only after conception, a woman can tell whether or not she is pregnant in the privacy of her own home. Some kits give results in as little as 45 minutes. When used properly, most of these test are believed to be 98% accurate.



variety of home blood pressure monitoring kits available. For people with hyper-tension, these monitoring devices can play a key role in controlling this widespread condition. Today, even young people with normal blood pressure levels are turning to blood pressure monitoring to periodically check up on their own cardiovascular wellbeing.

If you have any questions about self-testing kits, ask your pharmacist. He or she can explain the purpose of the test, how to use it properly, and what you should do if you get a "positive" result. All home diagnostic kits receive careful scrutiny from the U.S. Food and Drug Administra-

### 1988 PROPERTY TAX **RATES IN CITY OF** CISCO

This notice concerns 1988 property tax rates for CITY OF CISCO. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. Compare it to the tax rate the taxing unit proposes for this year. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value. 

# STATEMENT OF NONDISCRIMINATION

If your wife owns property, solely or jointly, or if she is heir to an estate, she should have a will of her own. This applies in quite a few other cases, too.

Husband and wife may be double victims of a fatal accident. The husband may have designated his wife as major beneficiary in his will. Without the wife's having a will of her own, distribution of her share of the estate will not have been provided for. Her share may be subject to state laws, tying it up for long periods right when it may be needed.

If the wife is a business partner in a family business, it is to the firm's advantage to have its business continuity assured by her having a will.

After, the man has made his will, he should discuss with his lawyer a separate will for the wife. Above all, be sure to consult your attorney. We've seen bad situations arise because no wills were made or because they were drawn up by amateurs.
