Department has acquired a 1985 Chevrolet, one ton, 4-wheel drive truck to be used as a rural fire truck. The fire department bought the truck from the National Forestry Service.

Terry Haney, with the Forestry Service, delivered the truck last Wednesday.

Fire Chief Richard Connell said the truck will be greatly needed since this area has become so dry lately. He said they will need to add a pump, build a water tank, and equip the truck to pass fire fighters regulations.

Connell said they have a rebuilt motor for the Jeep rural fire truck they are presently using, but they can't put it in, until they have another truck to use in it's place. He said when the new truck has all the equipment added and the Jeep has the new engine, the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department

Conneil said they need to get the new truck into service as quick as possible. He said last Thursday, the Cisco Fire Department fought a grass fire located behind Rust Processing plant. He said they were at the fire for 51/2 hours and were called back out Thursday night. He feels as though there will be

> Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, questioned the "drop in valuation" concept, stating that property owners he knew always had higher taxes when the tax percentage was raised.

Steve Thomas, head of the Eastland County Appraisal District, was called in to explain revenues and the lower valuation.

Thomas said that "On housing it's about half and half. Lots have been reduced." He explained that this had occurred in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Ris-

He also said that the most loss in tax value overall had been in oil and gas and some businesses. He added that every county in the state will be faced with the same situa-

Robinson said that it looked like the property owner was having to make up for the drop in mineral revenue.

The Commissioners said there was enough in County Reserve Funds to cover a shortfall for one more year, but one year only. They mentioned Indigent Health Care, and the cost of crime trials are areas where it was hard to know how much to budget.

AUXILIARY MEETS





The peer pressure to try drugs is 'something else' and those who don't do as others do are labelled as a 'home boy', says Blackstock.

Probably more young people locally are hooked on drugs around the age of nineteen, after leaving high school

And local drug use is probably heaviest among middle- and upper-lower class people as rated by their economic or income levels, suggests Mr. Blackstock. And he says that drugs are peddled in Eastland in a very sophisticated way, and that their use is covered up so that the general public will not realize their level of use and become alarmed.

There are parents, pastors and concerned people in Eastland County who are willing to help young people face the challenges of live positively and successfully, says Blackstock. But this generation may be facing greater pressures with less motivation and encouragement than the generations of their ancestors.

Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines

1. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age . A mammagram every 1.2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over An annual physical examination and annual mammagram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammagram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast

A screening mammagram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

County Commissioners Attempt To Hold Line - No Tax Hike?

Eastland County Commissioners discussed income and expenditures during a called meeting (budget workshop) Thursday, Aug. 11. L.T. Owens, Commissioner of Pct. 3, presided.

They requested that all Department heads reconsider their budgets, and return the sheets - whether revised or left the same back to the County Auditor's office on Tuesday, Aug. 16.

These new budgets will be studied at another called meeting on Thursday, Aug. 18, 9 a.m.

The Commissioners asked that these new budgets be left at the 1987-88 level, plus additional fixed costs on Social Security, Workman's Comp, and Insurance. There will be salary raise for

expenditures to last year's level will not solve all the budget problems, Commissioners were told. Ray Pruitt, County Auditor, estimated that General Fund revenue would decline \$250,000 this year.

The County has two more years to go (approx. \$264,000) before the County Jail is paid off, Pruitt also reported.

A decline in tax property valuation was listed as a major cause of lack of revenue. as well as the loss of revenue sharing money and less fines coming through the court systems.

A County tax hike from approx. 28 to 30.5 was mentioned, but with little favorable comment. This amount is allowed by law before a

rollback can be called by citizens, and was also said to be needed to bring in the same amount of money as u ed from the General Fund last year. (Approx. 1,786,000.) This does not include Road and Bridge expenditures, from a different


A \$200.00 reward is being offered for information leading to the arrest and indictment of those responsible for recent thefts at Hallmark Garden Center in Eastland, according to

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




