## Truck Delivered To Fire Department

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department has acquired a 1985 Chevrolet, one ton, 4-wheel drive truck to be used as a rural fire truck. The fire department bought the truck from the National Forestry Service.

Terry Haney, with the Forestry Service, delivered the truck last Wednesday.

Fire Chief Richard Connell said the truck will be greatly needed since this area has become so dry lately. He said they will need to add a pump, build a water tank, and equip the truck to pass fire fighters regulations.

Connell said they have a rebuilt motor for the Jeep rural fire truck they are

presently using, but they can't put it in, until they have another truck to use in its place. He said when the new truck has all the equipment added and the Jeep has the new engine, the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department will have two rural fire trucks.

Connell said they need to get the new truck into service as quick as possible. He said last Thursday, the Cisco Fire Department fought a grass fire located behind Rust Processing plant. He said they were at the fire for 5½ hours and were called back out Thursday night. He feels as though there will be more rural grass fires if this

area does not receive some heavy rainfall in the near future.

Connell said the Rural Fire Truck Fund was depleted when they bought the truck. He said there is some money left, but they will need more donations to get the new truck into operation.

Connell said it will cost about \$3,500 to put the equipment on the new fire truck. He said any money the fire department receives goes only to the rural fire fighting equipment. Donations can be sent to the Special Cisco Rural Fire Department Fund, c/o First National Bank, 400 Conrad Hilton,

Cisco, Texas 76437.

Connell said he and all the Cisco Volunteer Fire Fighters appreciate all the help they have received from everyone. He said they would not have this new piece of equipment if it wasn't for the ones who gave to the Rural Fire Truck Fund, and they are greatly appreciated.

## Commissioners Attempt To Hold Line

Eastland County Commissioners discussed income and expenditures during a called meeting (budget workshop) Thursday, Aug. 11. L.T. Owens, Commissioner of Pet. 3, presided. They requested that all Department heads reconsider their budgets, and

return the sheets - whether revised or left the same - back to the County Auditor's office on Tuesday, Aug. 16. These new budgets will be studied at another called meeting on Thursday, Aug. 18, 9 a.m.

The Commissioners asked that these new budgets be

left at the 1987-88 level, plus additional fixed costs on Social Security, Workman's Comp, and Insurance. There will be salary raise for anyone.

Even "holding the line" on expenditures to last year's level will not solve all the budget problems, Commissioners were told. Ray Pruitt, County Auditor, estimated that General Fund revenue would decline \$250,000 this year.

The County has two more years to go (approx. \$264,000) before the County Jail is paid off, Pruitt also reported.

A decline in tax property valuation was listed as a major cause of lack of revenue, as well as the loss of revenue sharing money and less fines coming through the court systems.

A County tax hike from approx. 28 to 30.5 was mentioned, but with little favorable comment. This amount is allowed by law before a rollback can be called by citizens, and was also said to be needed to bring in the same amount of money as used from the General Fund last year. (Approx. 1,786,000.) This does not include Road and Bridge expenditures, from a different fund.

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of pet. 4, said: "Taxes have been going up each year since 1951, and for once I'd like to see us just sit on it!"

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pet. 1, questioned the "drop in valuation" concept, stating that property owners he knew always had higher taxes when the tax percentage was raised.

Steve Thomas, head of the Eastland County Appraisal District, was called in to explain revenues and the lower valuation.

Thomas said that "On housing it's about half and half. Lots have been reduced." He explained that this had occurred in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Rising Star.

He also said that the most loss in tax value overall had been in oil and gas and some businesses. He added that every county in the state will be faced with the same situation.

Robinson said that it looked like the property owner was having to make up for the drop in mineral revenue.

The Commissioners said there was enough in County Reserve Funds to cover a shortfall for one more year, but one year only. They mentioned Indigent Health Care, and the cost of crime trials are areas where it was hard to know how much to budget.

They were not certain when the 1988-89 budget would be finalized, but it is required to be in place by Oct. 1.

The members voted to give \$25 to the American Legion Auxiliary Scholarship Fund.

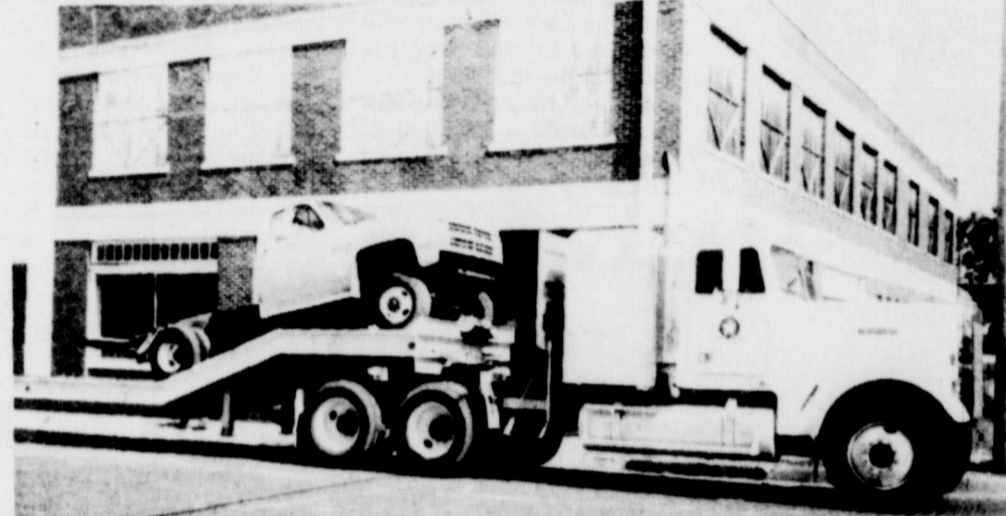

### Movie Filmed In Eastland Tells Of Effects Drugs Have On People

The new movie "Don't Run Away," which has been filmed in Eastland, that's right, in Eastland, was released at a presentation ceremony Sunday evening at Camp Inspiration.  
After a sneak preview of the movie, which runs one hour, Eastland Mayor Dub Hoffmann made the presentation to the cast and addressed the crowd which consisted of people from around Eastland County. Roy Gevara, representing

the Kiwanis Club, made a presentation to the businesses which had helped to sponsor this production.  
"Don't Run Away," directed by Oral Blackstock, is a movie which illustrates the effects which drugs have on young people and their families, and hopefully in a way which makes it real to young people.  
Eastland High School students make up most of the cast of the movie which says: "Don't run from your problems by using drugs, it

is better to 'face the music' and solve your problems. And parents should help their children and teenagers with their problems and not just throw them out on the streets."  
The production was underwritten by the Inspiration Church of God Youth Department, and special thanks are given to the Eastland Police Dept., the Eastland Memorial Hospital, and the parents of the youthful members of the cast, as their co-operation made the production possible.

Director and actor Oral Blackstock is a Jamaican who has spent three summers in Eastland. He will soon be returning to college in Florida to finish his last semester and to graduate.  
"The local reponse to our production has been great and people continually encourage us to make another movie," says Mr. Blackstock. "And they point to our involving the local youth in this community activity as one way to keep them out of the drug scene. I would love to make another, but I don't know yet," says Blackstock.

Oral Blackstock decided to make this movie as the best way to reach young people after he saw local Eastland County kids being drawn into drugs and alcohol, and wanting out. He saw them going through pain when they tried to withdraw from the drugs which suddenly controlled their lives after they had only tried them.  
Blackstock describes this movie as a starting point to inform young people about what they are facing.  
The local drug problem seems to begin with teenage drinking during the high school years. And the effects of alcohol, which is easily purchased in Ranger for the teenagers' consumption,

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetrics and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

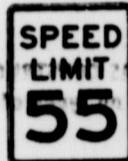

**County Commissioners Attempt To Hold Line - No Tax Hike?**

Eastland County Commissioners discussed income and expenditures during a called meeting (budget workshop) Thursday, Aug. 11. L.T. Owens, Commissioner of Pct. 3, presided.

They requested that all Department heads reconsider their budgets, and return the sheets - whether revised or left the same - back to the County Auditor's office on Tuesday, Aug. 16.

These new budgets will be studied at another called meeting on Thursday, Aug. 18, 9 a.m.

The Commissioners asked that these new budgets be left at the 1987-88 level, plus additional fixed costs on Social Security, Workman's Comp, and Insurance. There will be salary raise for anyone.

Even "holding the line" on expenditures to last year's level will not solve all the budget problems, Commissioners were told. Ray Pruitt, County Auditor, estimated that General Fund revenue would decline \$250,000 this year.

The County has two more years to go (approx. \$264,000) before the County Jail is paid off, Pruitt also reported.

A decline in tax property valuation was listed as a major cause of lack of revenue, as well as the loss of revenue sharing money and less fines coming through the court systems.

A County tax hike from approx. 28 to 30.5 was mentioned, but with little favorable comment. This amount is allowed by law before a

rollback can be called by citizens, and was also said to be needed to bring in the same amount of money as used from the General Fund last year. (Approx. 1,786,000.) This does not include Road and Bridge expenditures, from a different fund.

Billy Bacon, Commissioner of pct. 4, said: "Taxes have been going up each year since 1951, and for once I'd like to see us just sit on it!"

Richard Robinson, Commissioner of Pct. 1, questioned the "drop in valuation" concept, stating that property owners he knew always had higher taxes when the tax percentage was raised.

Steve Thomas, head of the Eastland County Appraisal District, was called in to explain

plain revenues and the lower valuation.

Thomas said that "On housing it's about half and half. Lots have been reduced." He explained that this had occurred in Cisco, Eastland, Ranger and Rising Star.

He also said that the most loss in tax value overall had been in oil and gas and some businesses. He added that every county in the state will be faced with the same situation.

Robinson said that it looked like the property owner was having to make up for the drop in mineral revenue.

The Commissioners said there was enough in County Reserve Funds to cover a

shortfall for one more year, but one year only. They mentioned Indigent Health Care, and the cost of crime trials are areas where it was hard to know how much to budget.

They were not certain when the 1988-89 budget would be finalized, but it is required to be in place by Oct. 1.

**Appraisal Dist. Considers Gift Of Bldg.**

After Perry Brothers, Inc., discontinued their Eastland store in a move early this year which closed many stores across Texas, the building on the west side of the Courthouse square which Perry's had leased for many years became vacant.

The T.C. Campbells of Abilene, owners of what was known as the Eastland Perry Building, decided to honor an aunt and uncle who were once prominent Eastland citizens.

In honor of Mr. and Mrs. T.L. Fagg, the vacant Perry Building was offered as a gift or donation to the Eastland County Appraisal District for its use as an office building or such.

Since the Eastland County Appraisal District operates as a service to benefit the thirteen taxing entities

which use it, and since it is highly regulated by state laws and regulations, giving it a gift of real estate is not a simple matter.

First, the Board of Directors of the Eastland County Appraisal District has to approve of the gift's acceptance, which they now have done. But that is just one step in the process.

Next, ten of the thirteen taxing entities in the district must give their approval, and that will probably take until September 10. Three have approved at present. The taxing entities consist of the six cities, the six school district, and the county.

If acceptance of the building is ratified by the taxing entities in a process which may take until October or November, the former Perry Building will

then become the future Eastland County Appraisal District Office Building.

Appraisal District Director Steve Thomas indicates that if the building is accepted and the District's offices are moved, the move may be made slowly to allow for renovation of the building using some of the District's operating funds. If the move is made more quickly, renovation costs will have to be divided among the taxing entities according to their size.

Eastland County, Eastland schools, and Cisco schools are the largest entities in the district, while City of Carbon is the smallest.

If the gift is accepted and the move is made, the County Courtroom will then return to the space on the second floor of the Courthouse

which now houses the Appraisal District offices. However the Commissioners Court will remain at its present location.

The former Perry Building has about 72 ft. of frontage on Lamar Street, and it faces the Courthouse.

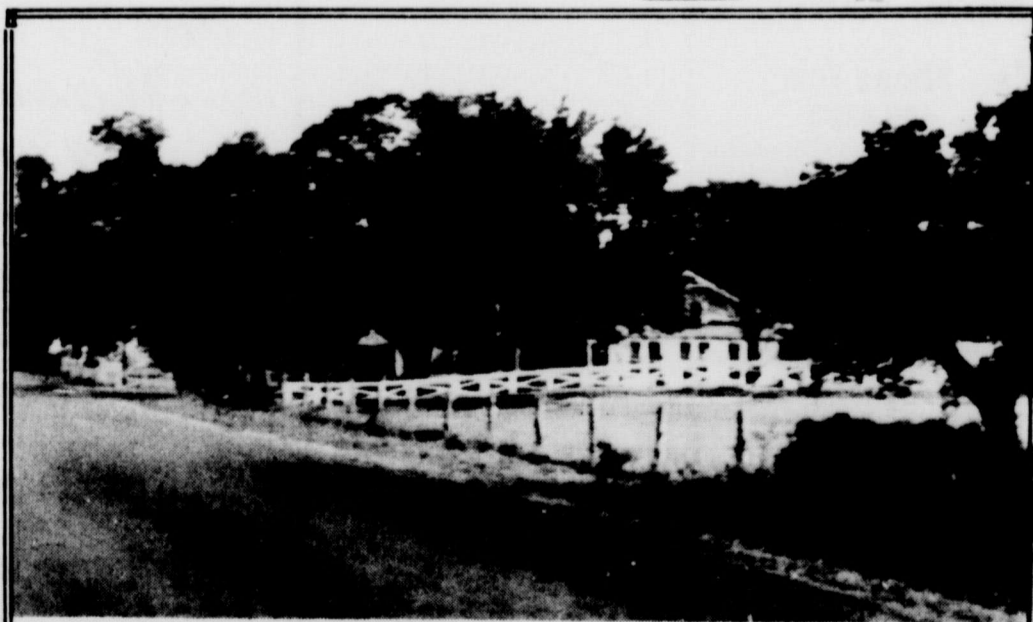

# Fishing Outdoors

By Terry Wilson

Texas Wildlife is progressing through the dry summer period with minimal losses, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Sporadic summer rains revitalized the habitat in some areas, although East Texas and portions of South

Texas remain drier than normal. Quail production has varied widely from area to area because of the spotty nature of spring and summer rains, according to Don Wilson, quail program leader. "Some areas, such as part of Eastern South

Texas and Rolling Plains of West Texas, may have pretty good quail crops this year," Wilson said, "but areas that the rain skipped may have very few birds." Turkeys generally are having a poor production year because of the dry spring, but statewide populations remain fairly high because of holdovers from the good 1987 nesting season. Deer hunters can expect little if any dropoff from the excellent hunting season of

1987, according to Horace Gore, white-tailed deer program leader. "Fawn production and antler development are probably down, but not enough that hunters in the field will notice any difference, he said. Hunters likely will find less than bush vegetative cover in the field this fall, he added. This should have the dual effect of making deer easier to see as well as causing the animals to be more active during daylight hours in search of food.

"During the spring it was beginning to look like a more severe drought was developing," Gore said, "but now it appears that enough moisture has fallen to sustain wildlife and have at least an average hunting season, if not an excellent one."

# Locally Made Movie Released

The new movie "Don't Run Away," which has been filmed in Eastland, that's right, in Eastland, Texas, was released at a presentation ceremony Sunday evening at Camp Inspiration.

After a sneak preview of the movie, which runs one hour, Eastland Mayor Dub Hoffmann made the presentation to the cast and addressed the crowd which consisted of people from around Eastland County. Roy Gevara, representing the Kiwanis Club, made a presentation to the businesses which had helped to sponsor this production.

"Don't Run Away," directed by Oral Blackstock, is a movie which illustrates the effects which drugs have on young people and their families, and hopefully in a way which makes it real to young people.

Eastland High School students make up most of the cast of the movie which says: "Don't run from your problems by using drugs, it is better to 'face the music' and solve your problems. And parents should help their children and teenagers with their problems and not just throw them out on the streets."

The production was underwritten by the Inspiration Church of God Youth Department, and special thanks are given to the Eastland Police Dept., the Eastland Memorial Hospital, and the parents of the youthful members of the cast, as their co-operation made the production possible.

Leading parts in the movie are: the two kids (David Dixon and Bob Dennis), the Christian parents (Mrs. Ruby Smith and Larry Smith), the non-Christian parents (Angela Schuman and Oral Blackstock), and the drug pusher (Lee Williams).

Director and actor Oral Blackstock is a Jamaican who has spent three summers in Eastland. He will soon be returning to college in Florida to finish his last semester and to graduate.

"The local response to our production has been great and people continually encourage us to make another movie," says Mr. Blackstock. "And they point to our involving the local youth in this community activity as one way to keep them out of the drug scene. I would love to make another, but I don't know yet," says Blackstock.

Oral Blackstock decided to make this movie as the best way to reach young people after he saw local Eastland County kids being drawn into drugs and alcohol, and wanting out. He saw them going through pain when they tried to withdraw from the drugs which suddenly controlled their lives after they had only tried them.

Blackstock describes this

movie as a starting point to inform young people about what they are facing.

The local drug problem seems to begin with teenage drinking during the high school years. And the effects of alcohol, which is easily purchased in Ranger for the teenagers' consumption, seems to remove resistance to drug use and may even add the desire for the anticipated 'high' which may come with drugs.

The peer pressure to try drugs is 'something else' and those who don't do as others do are labeled as a 'home boy,' says Blackstock.

Probably more young people locally are hooked on drugs around the age of nineteen, after leaving high school.

And local drug use is probably heaviest among middle- and upper-level class people as rated by their economic or income levels, suggests Mr. Blackstock. And he says that drugs are peddled in Eastland in a very sophisticated way, and that their use is covered up so that the general public will not realize their level of use and become alarmed.

There are parents, pastors and concerned people in Eastland County who are willing to help young people face the challenges of live positively and successfully, says Blackstock. But this generation may be facing greater pressures with less motivation and encouragement than the generations of their ancestors.

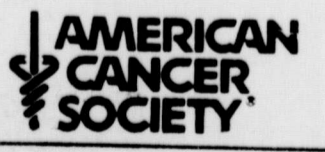

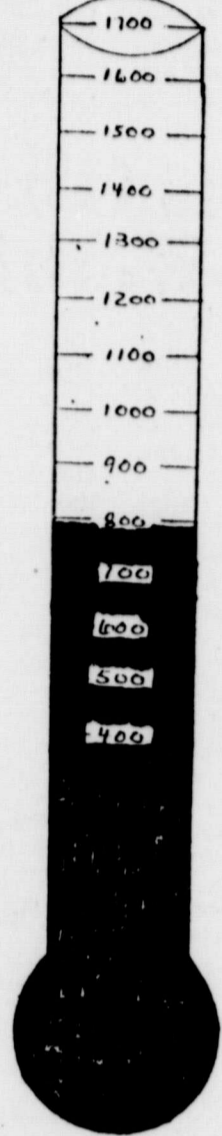
