County Tax Rate Hike Is Likely

It appears that a raise in Eastland County Tax rates from 28 to 30.5 per \$100 valuation will be approved at the Commissioners Court meeting on Monday, Aug. 22.

The Commissioners will also adopt a Budget for the fiscal year of 1989, advertise for insurance and finalize election judges at this meeting.

The 30.5 rate was discussed at a County Budget Workshop Thursday, and is slightly under the 3 percent raise allowed by law without extensive hearings and a possible rollback election.

On Thursday County Auditor Ray Pruitt told Judge Scott Bailey and the Commissioners that revenues were down, and that more money would be needed to even maintain the budget at last year's level.

The Commissioners again requested that Department Heads hold their budgets on the 1988 level, with allowances for higher insurance, workman's comp and increased Social Security deductions.

They seemed to be united against a percentage pay raise, such as the 3 percent "cost of living" raises of former years. (There was no pay raise last year).

"I won't vote for a percentage pay raise again," said Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pet. 1. "It just gives the best raise to the people already making the most, and the gap just gets wider and wider."

Billy Bacon, Comm. of Pet. 4, agreed with this. There was some talk, however, of possible wage "adjustments" in some departments, if any extra "line item" money could be moved.

In other budgetary matters, Norman Christian, Pet. 2 Commissioner, made the motion that all expenditures covered by the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund be transferred to the General Fund. L.T. Owen, Pet. 3 Commissioner, gave a second to the motion.

Judge Scott Bailey suggested an amendment to this motion, stating that the tax rate levy for the General Fund be sufficient to accommodate this increased expenditure.

The Commissioners approved both the motion and amendment.

There was considerable discussion about the cost of County Insurance, which has gone up around \$57 monthly per individual for next year.

A letter from the Association of Counties reportedly said that "None (of certain insurance companies) were interested because of the age bracket of the people involved. They don't want the County's insurance policy."

Various other items from the budget were discussed, such as Constable's salaries, car allowances, etc.

Commissioner Billy Bacon made a motion that the salary of the Constable of Pet. 4 be cut back to the 1972 level.

That is the largest salary rollback possible by law. The Constable presently makes \$6900 annually, and has a car allowance.

None of the other Commissioners would second this motion, but Bacon says he would like to see the motion stand.

Probably this matter will receive further attention Monday - along with the taxes, budget, and other items.

Keyser Death From Natural Causes

Preliminary autopsy results from the Southwest Institute of Forensic Sciences in Dallas indicate that Mary Keyser of Gorman died of natural causes. Some officials do not agree.

Gorman Police Chief Cecil Funderburg says a report from the Southwest Institute of Forensic Sciences in Dallas states that Mrs. Keyser, 74, died after a blood vessel ruptured in her head. It may be as long as six weeks before the final autopsy results are sent to the office of District Attorney Emory Walton, the District Attorney stated.

Law enforcement officials first learned of the death of Mrs. Keyser last Tuesday after Mary Evans, her daughter, came from Arlington to take her mother back for an eye examination.

Mrs. Evans found the front door to her mother's home open and the house appeared in disarray. When the phone wouldn't work she hurried to a nearby phone and called

police.

Police Chief Funderburg found the body of Mrs. Keyser, and called Justice of the Peace Vardie Huff, who pronounced the woman dead.

Huff stated that he can't believe Mrs. Keyser's death was caused by a stroke. "No way," Huff says of her death and the report. "It's homicide of some kind." He says the woman's body was nude from the chest up, and her nightgown was found wrapped around her head. She had a number of bruises.

Chief Funderburg called Texas Ranger Gene Kea and County Sheriff Don Underwood to assist on the investigation. Funderburg says they used "All normal investigation methods, such as dusting for fingerprints and other procedures."

"The phone line was not cut," the Chief says. "I found a phone off the hook in the bedroom - that explains why the line was dead."

Funderburg received a

written report from Forensic Sciences Friday morning, verifying what he had been told over the phone. "They state 'No homicide,'" he says. "The report indicates that the bruises on Mrs. Keyser's body probably resulted from her being disoriented and bumping in-

to furniture while suffering from the stroke.

"They have not yet tested for toxology - as to whether medication might have contributed to her stroke."

"All I can say is that we have to depend on the experts and the facts say she wasn't murdered."

Glasgow Suggests DoHS Consult With Task Force

State Senator Bob Glasgow, D-Stephenville, in action as a member of the Legislative Budget Board, has made the motion that the Department of Human Services consult with the Task Force on Rural Health Care and the Legislative Caucus on Rural Health to assist in the evaluation of its reimbursement practices and to develop appropriate policy changes, as soon as is practicable.

"We on the LBB recognize the problems created by hospital closures in rural areas and the importance of

maintaining an adequate level of access to health care for the rural citizens of this state," Senator Glasgow said. "Medicaid is a significant purchaser of health care services, and Medicaid reimbursement policies affect the financial viability of rural health care providers." Glasgow continued. "We need to address this critical issue before any more of our physicians leave the rural areas." Senator Glasgow expects these adjustments to be made in the very near future.

CofC Has Ag Loan Forms

There is a little dab of money that the Texas Agriculture department has that will go a long way towards overcoming one of the major stumbling blocks for Texas agriculture in the 1980's, namely finding a source of affordable financing. What Texas farmers, ranchers and small businesses have lacked is a low-cost source of financing. The Texas Linked Deposit Program is now in place to help address this problem.

The Linked Deposit Program was authorized as a part of the Texas Agriculture Diversification Program, which was

enacted during the 1987 summer special legislative session as House Bill 49. Voters implemented this bill by approving Proposition 4 last November. Texans have authorized the state Treasury to deposit up to \$5 million in state funds in Linked Deposits in approved state depositories. These deposits are made at less than current market interest rates, provided the depository will make a below market rate loan for a like amount to a qualified project. Eligible project types include production of alternative crops, processing, and direct marketing of Texas' agricultural products.

In order to participate, all borrowers must follow the standard loan procedures with their financial institution and complete the very simple one page Linked Deposit Application. The maximum amount any one eligible borrower can receive is \$250,000 and a blend is allowable of any of

the three categories. Neither the State, the Treasury, nor the Department of Agriculture are liable in any manner for payments on any loan under the program.

The long term goals are to increase farm incomes, diversify agriculture production and improve the economic health of rural communities. The Linked Deposit Program provides a mechanism to help Texans invest in these goals and build a healthier, market-driven agricultural economy. 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Gordon Spot

Fleas attack both man and animals and often become a major problem during the summer months in Texas.

The tiny pests cause annoyance and discomfort and can also spread certain disease, a major one being bubonic plague.

Adult fleas cause the most problems as they have piercing sucking mouthparts and suck blood. Adult fleas may live from two months to two years. After each blood meal females lay four to eight eggs, which hatch in two to three weeks. They may deposit as many as 500 eggs in their lifetime.

Flea control may be difficult due to the circumstances under which the pests occur. Home infestations are often discovered a short time after a pet has

been taken out of the home. Immature fleas have completed development and, with the absence of the normal host, turn to man for their life-sustaining blood meal.

Satisfactory control of fleas for any length of time depends on these factors:

— Both adult and immature fleas must be eliminated from the home and yard by proper chemical control and sanitation measures, such as replacing infested bedding materials and cleaning carpets and stuffed furniture.

— Pets must be rid of fleas by using registered chemicals. In the case of rat or mice fleas, these hosts must be eliminated.

— Reinfestation must be

prevented by protecting pets with flea collars or other preventative chemicals during times of likely infestations.

Chemicals registered for indoor flea control include Baygon, DDP, dursban, malathion, methoprene, Ronnel and SBP-1382. Use a coarse spray on floors and baseboards. Treat one foot up the walls and under the house where possible. Check product labels prior to use.

Chemicals registered for outdoor flea control include Baygon, Cygon, diazinon, dursban and malathion. Treat animals' bedding or remove and replace with new material. Good coverage is necessary for good control.

To control fleas on host animals, use dursban, lindane or Vapona on dogs and Korlan, lindane, malathion and Phosmet on cats. Since some of these chemicals have specific restrictions, be sure to read the label prior to use. Some compounds may be harmful to greyhounds and whippets. Do not treat nursing puppies or kittens or animals that are ill.

Homemaking Hints

From Janet Thomas, County Agent—

PREPARING YOUR CHILD FOR SCHOOL:

Whether your child is a veteran of daycare and preschool or has never attended any school before, starting kindergarten is an experience that requires some preparation.

Children sense the different expectations that come with kindergarten. Suddenly school isn't just for fun; it's serious business.

A child without older siblings will have only fuzzy mental images of what school will be like. If he does have older siblings, the child may think of school as a place where the "big kids" go and where everyone already reads and writes.

Some children may have fearful, stress-inducing feelings about facing this unfamiliar world.

It's important for parents and children to plan their parting experiences and share feelings about them.

It is really recommended that parents and youngsters make several trips to the school so they can learn where the school is located, see the playground and maybe play on the playground. Reading children's books about the first day of school will also help youngsters get a more realistic picture of the school environment.

But the most important thing about visits or reading books is that it gives you a vehicle for talking with your child and letting him know that it's o.k. to feel scared.

According to the Texas Agricultural Extension Family Life Specialist, Dr. Sarah Anderson, researchers have noted that separation experiences can affect children's behavior. Brief periods of agitation, tantrums, withdrawal or changes in eating and sleeping patterns may occur if the child is anxious during those first days or weeks of school.

After a couple of weeks, parents should follow up with the teacher to check on how well their child is doing in the school environment. Many children love school from the first day and others will need some time, but eventually most all children adjust.

News Briefs

RANGER
The Ranger Community Chorus will begin its new concert season Monday, Aug. 29 at 7 p.m. in the Ranger Junior College Music Building. A highlight of the season will be the annual Christmas Concert with the Ranger Junior College Band at the Gholson Hotel.

Ranger General Hospital has requested the support of all citizens in order to keep the Hospital open. The Hospital does not have large endowments, and must depend on those who know of the type of work the institution is doing. Citizens in the Ranger area depend on the Hospital for both emergency and long-term services, and would find medical care remote expensive and difficult to obtain without Ranger General.

Brown's Pharmacy, located at 115 Walnut St., has been selected as Chamber of Commerce Business of the Week. Seldon Brown, owner and pharmacist, has been at 215 Main in the Gholson Hotel Building. Brown's Pharmacy is a full-service store, with prescriptions, prescription-related services, and many other needs and gift items. The pharmacist is on 24-hr call for emergencies.

CISCO
The City of Cisco property tax rate has been in-

creased from 55 cents per \$100 of property value to 58 cents per \$100. City Manager Mike Moore said this will average out to about \$9 more in taxes on a \$30,000 home. The city is "adjusting" the tax base to raise money to replace revenue from lost property and taxes.

The West Central Texas Water District recently approved the plan of Cisco participating in a water study with them. Abilene and Sweetwater will also participate. City Manager Mike Moore said the group will submit an application to the Texas Water Commission for a 50 percent grant to be used for a water study. Moore said the main goal of this study will be to make an educated determination of what is the best water source for the City of Cisco. "No matter what the study shows, the alternate water source is going to be expensive," the City Manager said. "There is no cheap water anywhere."

City Council members approved a resolution adopting the acquisition by the Eastland County Appraisal District of the old Perry's Bldg. on the Square in Eastland. Cisco is one of 13 taxing entities that voted on acceptance of this gift. Mr. T.C. Campbell, representing the Campbell Foundation, donated the building to the Appraisal District. It will be used as a District office.

The Cisco Junior College Board of Regents voted not to raise taxes this year, although it will reportedly mean a loss of around \$20,000. Dick Wooley, Board President, stated that the Board did not know how much longer they could continue to hold

taxes at the present level. In other business, the Board approved the Band and Belle trip to Washington to perform in the Apple Blossom Festival in the Spring of 1989.

A delicious collection of sweets will be for sale by the First Christian Church Youth Group at the First National Bank on Friday, Aug. 26. The Bake Sale begins at 9 a.m. and will continue until all the goodies are gone. Drop by and pick up your favorite cakes, pies or cookies.

EASTLAND

Eastland City Commissioners learned last Monday that residents in both Eastland and Ranger may have to approve a bond to update the water treatment plant and pump station bringing water from Lake Leon. Engineer Ken Martin met with the Commissioners, and on Tuesday Tommy Crowder of the Eastland County Water Supply District board of directors gave the information to a Business and Professional Women's organization. Crowder said the lake was constructed in 1955 to supply water to

both towns. Currently, 30 percent of the water from the lake goes to more than 4,000 homes outside the towns - many more than the plant was intended to serve. An intermediate or booster pump station east of Eastland would bring enough water to fill the city's tanks, Crowder said. A bigger storage facility for treated water or a "clear well" also must be built at the treatment plant. Other updating and improvements are also needed. The bond issue to finance this would be around \$1.6 million.

History will be relived at the Majestic Theatre this weekend with area and Eastland County people bringing a pageant of "Eastland County's First Wedding" to the stage. This major production was written and produced by Roy Lee Smith, directed by Mrs. Don Griffin, Ken Henson and others, with original music by Ruth York. Special lighting and sound effects, along with the costumes of the times and actual items used by early settlers of Eastland County make this play a trip back into history. The performance on Saturday, Aug. 20 will begin at 8 p.m., and Sunday, Aug. 21 performance will be at 2 p.m. Tickets are \$3 each, and may be purchased at the door until sellout.

Jury selection will begin on the Garcia Crime Trial next Tuesday, Aug. 21 9 a.m. in the 91st District Courtroom. Judge Herman Fitts of Palo Pinto will sit in on the jury selection and

the trial which follows. Defendants will be Joe Perry Sr. and Barbara Williams, with Special Prosecutor Bill Hart prosecuting the case.

Charles Hutto, High School Agriculture instructor and FFA advisor at Eastland High School, has been nominated to receive the FFA's Honorary American Farmer Degree. Hutto was nominated for the degree by the Texas FFA Association, and the

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

EPA New Labeling Information Regarding Insecticides

Beginning April 1988, the EPA began requiring new labeling information regarding the application of insecticides, herbicides and fungicides through irrigation systems, known as chemigation. The major impact of this label change is the requirements of the system which is used for chemigation.

To help producers better understand these changes, the Comanche County Extension Program Council Field Crops Committee has planned a field day for Friday, August 19, to demonstrate a system that meets the new EPA requirements for chemigation. The field day begins at 9:00 a.m. Eastland County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon says all Eastland County peanut producers are invited to attend.

The field day will be held at Travis Welch's irrigation pond which is located approximately one mile north of the store in Beattie on FM 588. To get to Beattie, Gordon says, drive 2.1 miles east from Duster on FM 587, turn south at Bethel Church on FM 2247 for 4.4 miles and turn west on FM 588 and drive 3.3 miles to Beattie.

Dr. Chip Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist, and Leon New, Extension Agricultural Engineer - Irrigation, will explain the new EPA requirements as put together on the demonstration system. The system will then be operated to demonstrate the required equipment and safety features.

All area producers are encouraged to come out and see this demonstration. If you presently use chemigation in your farming operations these new requirements will affect you" says Gordon.

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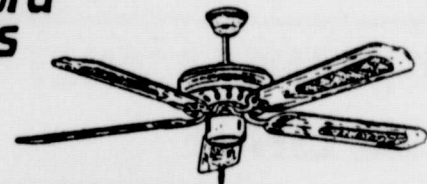

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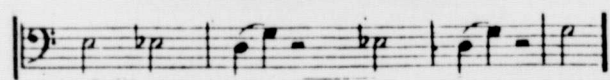

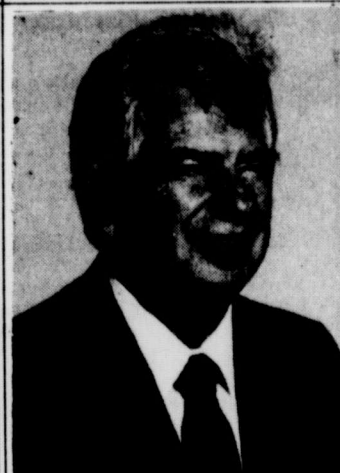

LETTER TO PARENTS:
Dear Parent or Guardian:

The Cisco School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for 35 cents. Children from households that meet Federal Income guidelines are eligible for free meals or reduced-price meals at 40 cents for lunch and 30 cents for breakfast. To apply for free or reduced-price meals, complete the enclosed application, sign it and return it to the school.

FOOD STAMP/AFDC HOUSEHOLDS: If you currently receive Food Stamps or "Aid to Families with Dependent Children" for your child, you only have to list your child's name and food stamp of AFDC case number, print your name, and sign the application. Since you have already given income information to the welfare office, the school can confirm your eligibility.

ALL OTHER HOUSEHOLDS: If your household income is at or below the level shown on the enclosed scale, your child is eligible for either free or reduced-price meals. To apply for meal benefits, you must provide the following information and sign the application: (1) list the names of everyone who lives in your household. Include parents, grandparents, all children, other relatives and unrelated people who live in your household, (2) list the social security number of each adult age 21 or older. If an adult does not have a social security number print "None", (3) list total monthly income and amount of income (BEFORE deductions for taxes, social security, etc.) each person received last month and where it is from, such as wages, retirement, or welfare. If you have a household member for whom last month's income was higher or lower than usual, list the person's expected average monthly income.

VERIFICATION: The information on the application may be checked by school officials at the school or school year.

REPORTING CHANGES: If you list income information and your child is approved for meal benefits, you must tell the school when your household income increases by \$50 or more per month (\$600 per year) or when your household size decreases. If you list a food stamp case number or AFDC number, you must tell the school when you no longer receive food stamps or AFDC for your child.

FOSTER CHILD: Your foster child may be eligible for meal benefits. If you wish to apply for meal benefits for a foster child, contact the school for help with the application.

NONDISCRIMINATION: Children who receive free or reduced-price meal benefits are treated the same as children who pay for meals. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, national origin, age or handicap. If you believe you have been discriminated against, write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

FAIR HEARING: If you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the result of verification, you may wish to discuss it with the school. You also have the right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing the following official: C.R. Saunders, P. O. Box 1645, Cisco, Texas 76437, 817/442-3056.

CONFIDENTIALITY: The information you provide will be treated confidentially and will be used only for eligibility determination and verification of date.

REAPPLICATION: You may apply for benefits any time during the school year. If you are not eligible now but need to apply later in the year, please fill out an application at that time.

You will be notified when the application is approved or denied.

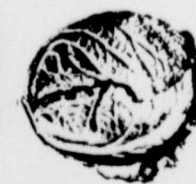
