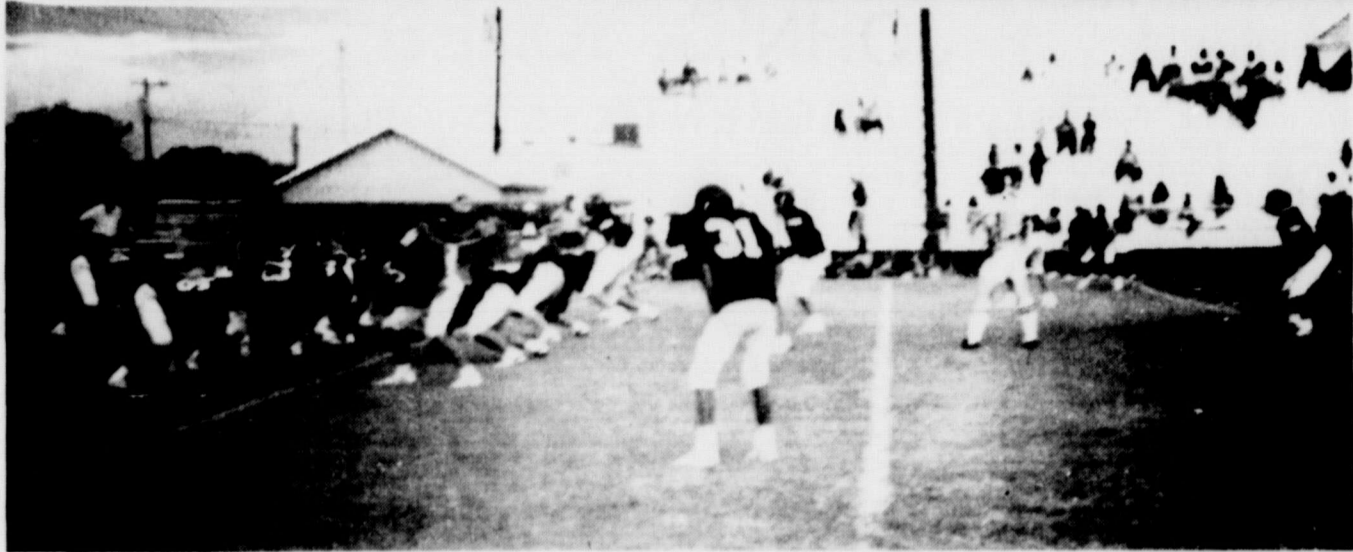

County Commissioners Set Tax Rate- Adopt "No Growth" Budget

Eastland County Commissioners Monday set a tax rate of 30.5 cents per \$100 valuation. This is 2.5 percent above last year's tax rate of 28 cents, but slightly under the 3 percent increase allowed by law before a possible rollback.

Jury Selection Underway For Garcia Trial

Jury selection for the Garcia Crime Trial was underway in the 91st District Courtroom Tuesday morning, with Judge Herman Fitts of Palo Pinto presiding. Five hundred people have been called as prospective jurors.

Accused in the case is Joe Perry Sr. and Barbara Williams. They are represented by court-appointed attorneys Leslie Vance and Steve Davis, both of Eastland. Attorney Bill Hart is Special Prosecutor in the case.

At press time prospective jurors were still being questioned, with some told to return at 1 p.m. It appeared that a number of people were asking to be excused from jury service. The selection is expected to take most of this week.

Gifted And Talented Meeting To Be Held Monday

A General orientation, for a new gifted and talented program, will be held at 7:00 p.m., Monday, August 29, at the Cisco Elementary Cafeteria. This will be a new program at the elementary school, according to Bob Lindsey, principal.

The public is invited, especially the parents of children who have been identified as eligible for this new program.

UMW Annual Rummage Sale To Be Held

The United Methodist Women will be hosting the rummage sale to be held in the Fellowship Hall at the church on Thursday and Friday, September 1 and 2. The hours will be 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. This has been an annual occasion each September for many years.

All proceeds help meet local, district and state obligations and expenses of the UMW.

Homemade pie and coffee will be offered for sale throughout both days.

The Commissioners reaffirmed homestead exemptions on residences of the elderly and disabled, and homestead exemptions on the Road and Bridge tax for all ages. The usual discounts will be available for those who pay taxes before Jan. 1.

Also approved Monday was the 1988-89 budget, which is basically the same as those of the last two years. There will be no salary increases, but some allowances are made for increased rates in insurance, Social Security, and Workman's Comp. The budget total is expected to be around \$3 million, according to County Judge Scott Bailey.

The votes on both the tax levy and budget came in the afternoon, after lengthy discussions on departmental budgets, spending policies, law enforcement, insurance, and other matters.

County Sheriff Don Underwood had an item on the agenda requesting a transfer of funds from the Sheriff's Department to the Jail Budget. Underwood was not

present at the meeting, but Commissioners were told that the Jail Budget is bare, but the Sheriff's Department has money.

Personnel from the County Auditor's office said about \$5,000 each month was being spent for the jail, and enough was needed to operate through the last month until the next fiscal year, Oct. 1. The Commissioners approved the transfer.

Two Constables, Gene Hicks of Rising Star and Ted Parrish of Cisco, were in the Courtroom to discuss their salaries. This had reference to remarks by Comm. Billy Bacon at last Thursday's meeting that Parrish's salary should be cut to 1972 levels.

Gene Hicks said, "To single out Constables and cut salaries back to 1972 while all other county officials draw the same pay would be discrimination against Constables."

He had take-home pay of \$551 per month and many miles to drive, Hicks remarked. "Other people in the Courthouse are drawing

that much each week," he said.

Parrish commented on the amount of work he had, saying there are no records kept to inform people of how much work a Constable actually does. He said he only has a \$50 per month travel allowance, and had to pay anything above that out of his own pocket.

In other business, the Commissioners authorized the advertising for bids for Group Health and Hospitalization Insurance. County employees and officials are covered for all hospital and dental expenses, but the rate has jumped about \$57 per person monthly. The present policy will be retained for now.

Bids were opened for purchase of a county barn and .22 acres of land in Olden. Only two bids came in - one from Charles Reed of Ennis, Texas for \$579, and another from Jim Kennedy of Olden for \$5134. The Commissioners accepted the bid from Kennedy.

The next regular meeting of the Commissioners Court will be on Sept. 12.

Action Needed To Avert Medical Crisis In Rural Hospitals

Unhappy with the results of an Abilene health care meeting, AARP Health Advocacy Services Associate State Coordinator, Roy Cartee, found the example he was seeking in Fisher County, then he called an Eastland County Health Crisis Meeting.

A group of hometown folks, representing a good cross section of interested county people and the media, were present.

Explaining that politicians and bureaucrats sometimes cause the problems, Mr. Cartee asked that the problems be defined without their input, then that a task force zero in on the problems, and finally go to the politicians with solutions or proposals.

Cartee stated that options for good health should be available, but that they are becoming less in Eastland County, and he asked, "Why? Is Eastland County facing a health crisis?"

There is a pending disaster, we all agree, points out Mr. Cartee as he bids us look at the next twelve years. Money will be drained from the county until there is a total collapse of medical services, he suggests. There will be many more elderly, including some of us, and there will be a big increase

in both the need for and the cost of medical services in Eastland County. Over 35 percent of Eastland Counties will be over 60.

We are spending vast sums for medical care and yet we are slipping backward, says Mr. Cartee. The big city regional hospitals are bleeding the money from our county. Your money supports big city hospitals when you go there, so if continued, you may have to travel to hospitals in the future. There may be no local doctors or emergency care.

And when you travel to regional hospitals, you spend money in those cities, draining it from the local economy. And Medicare and insurance money goes to that city's economy, not ours.

If hospitals fail, doctors and nursing homes will soon leave also.

Discussing if the failure is due to bad management, outside interference, or lack of interest is not enough. We must make a workable solution for Eastland County, says Cartee. Having medical services today doesn't mean that we will have them in the future.

Eastland Hospital Administrator Marsha Carr stated that players must

work together as a team to win, and that county medical services must work together to survive. She also pointed out the health care picture is broader now including nursing homes and different levels of care.

County Judge Scott Bailey said that some make things happen, some watch what happens, and some wonder what happened. He suggested that we make things happen. Transportation is bringing the cities closer, but some people and services are still needed in rural areas, according to Judge Bailey, who notes that medical expenses don't decrease after one comes under Medicare. Customs, morals and habits influence one's ability to pay for medical care also, comments Judge Bailey, and ten percent of the County's budget goes for indigent health care. Indigent is defined as less than one-fourth of the poverty level. He also adds that the state doesn't always send funds due.

Eastland County has spent \$11,000 this year, with most of it going to the Brownwood Hospital for care which was available in the county.

The county has dropped from five to three hospitals with one half of the county in three hospital districts. The hospital in the Gorman Hospital District went under

but the District is still paying for it.

In cases of injury and sudden illness, the first treatment is the most important, so something must be done quickly to retain medical care for the county.

A representative from Gorman explained that they had the doctors but couldn't keep the hospital going financially due to Medicare. Now the building will be sold and a one half million dollar debt will have to be paid. The loss of hospital employees was a blow to the town also. Residents are now traveling to DeLeon for medical care.

Ranger General Hospital Administrator Bill Johnson pointed out that rural hospitals are operating under pressure and they have to meet government criteria. They are offering new and varied services in an attempt to survive as Medicare only pays about 42 percent of Medicare costs.

A nurse caring for fifteen patients in a rural hospital costs as much as one caring for two hundred in a regional hospital, says Mr. Johnson, but the rural hospital gets less money from Medicare.

Mr. Cartee stated that doctors are sanctioned weekly in his territory by the government, which means they cannot receive Medicare money. This in turn causes the hospital they use to collapse.

Dr. Oswalt and Dr. Matthews, both of Eastland, verified that the statements were naming the problems, and Dr. Matthews added that local hospital expenses have been cut to the limit.

"It is my opinion that there is no way for a hospital here to survive," said Dr. Matthews, "I believe that all three of the county's hospitals will go under." He stated that the government brought new doctors like him to rural hospitals, only to then shut them down, driving away the doctors.

Being close to fifty miles from a big city hospital in almost any direction puts Eastland County in serious danger if local hospitals are

lost, it was agreed.

Mr. Cartee then appointed a committee of four non-medical people to study the problem and work toward developing a task force to push for solutions.

The committee, chaired by Roy Cartee, included Jack Roberson of Cisco, M.H. Perry of Eastland, Jack Baze of Gorman, and Mrs. Sally Thomas of Ranger.

Another meeting will be called to make the move from committee to task force, according to plans.

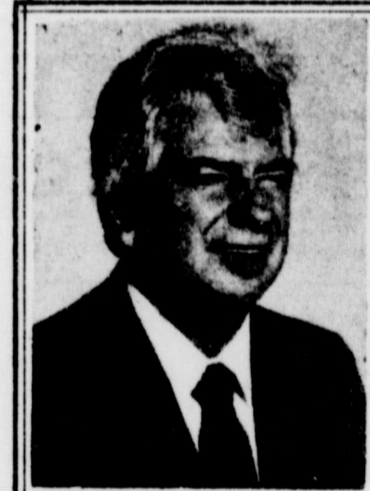


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Carbon News

Pharmacy Topics

Some reconstructive surgeons have experimented with using special balloons to stretch remaining skin instead of performing a skin graft. Balloon is inserted under the skin, then inflated, a little at a time, over a period of several weeks.

Magnesium is extra important in blood pressure control, the Honolulu Heart Program found. Researchers suggest that men should get about 420 to 475 mg. a day.

Preservative for organ transplants keeps them in good condition longer, so patients and doctors can be better prepared and so the organs can be tested for disease. Long able to keep kidneys up to 30 hours, doctors are now using lactobionate, an artificial milk sugar acid, for the liver and pancreas. Next: testing it for hearts.

If gum disease is treated with antibiotics as well as mechanical cleansing of plaque and pus, recurrence can be lowered to one or two percent. Research was done at the State University of New York at Buffalo.

FISHING OUTDOORS

I know most of you probably don't want to hear this, but Leon's Lunkers struck again over this past weekend. We learned of a 7 pounder two over 5 pounds and a special 4 pound plus fish taken by Dr. Bass. What's special about this fish is it was reported to have been taken on a buzz bait not a Dr. Bass jig. Congratulations to all these hawg hunters on Leon now, most of these larger fish are being caught by just 2 or three anglers. What's their secret? Well of course with the upcoming E.C.B.C. Bass Tournery September 11, 1988 information of this sort is guarded more closely than George Bushes running mate's name was. But we are sure if you don't have a hook in the water, chances are you won't catch on of these Lake Leon Lunkers.

Boaters caught in unexpected summer thunderstorms sometimes make a tragic error by trying to outrun the storm back to the boat ramp.

If you're caught in a storm you should head for the nearest sheltered shoreline. Many lives have been lost when boat operators for some reason feel they have to get back to where they put their boat in said Capt. Larry Willford, water safety director for the T.P.W.D. Law Enforcement Division.

Afternoon thunderstorms that form quickly in Texas can be turbulent and dangerous, but they generally subside within a half-hour or so, Willford noted. "Most landowners will be understanding about boaters taking temporary shelter at their boat docks or shorelines when the weather gets rough."

Fishermen and other boat operators should make a check of weather forecasts a standard procedure before launching, and then keep a sharp eye for the threatening clouds. Areas with dead standing timber in the water also should be avoided when high winds threaten.

All safety equipment, including U.S. Coast Guard approved personal flotation devices for all passengers, should be on board. Hunting permits for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Type II public hunting lands program have gone on sale across the state, offering holders of the \$35 permits access to 670,000 acres of land.

The Type II program is entering its second year with a number of new regulations aimed at improving the quality of the outdoor experience on the areas. This includes for the first time at \$10 Limited Use Permit for those who want to visit one or more of the 84 units but do not hunt or fish. A survey of Type II permit purchasers indicated that approximately 53 percent utilized the areas for nonconspicuous uses.

Type II units are scattered across Texas, with most of the acreage in the East Texas, Trans-Pecos and Panhandle regions.

The new acreage includes 17,000 acres in the Panhandle that is available for pheasant hunting along with some waterfowl areas. New

forest project corporation lands opened for hunting this year are Temple-Eastex (64,980 acres), Kirby Forest Products (22,030), and Champion International (3,564 acres).

Other additions to the Type II system include U.S. Forest Service areas: Caddo (Fannin Co.), Alabama Creek (Trinity Co.), Bannister (San Augustine Co.), and Moore Plantation (Jasper and Sabine Co.). Public use of these areas previously was administered under the Type I public hunting program.

The Parks and Wildlife Commission adopted several new regulations that should increase public participation and provide for better hunting. These include restriction of all motor vehicles to designated roads; restriction of camping to designated campsites, prohibition of buckshot on all Type II areas; delaying opening date of the general deer season on four National Forest Areas (Alabama Creek, Bannister, Caddo and Moore Plantation) until Dec. 1, and requiring all persons on Type II areas to wear hunter orange during the times when taking of deer is permitted.

Restrictions on vehicle use and camping will permit hunters to range further afield without encountering disturbing influences. Some areas will permit waterfowl hunting only Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday to avoid constant hunting pressure from displacing the migratory species.

Persons who purchase the Type II Wildlife Management Area-Public Lands Permit are permitted to enter and hunt, fish, camp and hike on all 84 units of the system. A 61-page map booklet is issued to each permit purchaser. It includes detailed maps of each unit and legal game available.

Children under 13 may

enter and participate in all activities free as long as they are accompanied by a permitted parent or guardian. Holders of the \$35 Type II permit are eligible to enter in drawings to select participants in limited hunts for mule deer, pronghorn antelope and one mature desert bighorn sheep ram.

Type II permits are issued on the basis of one permit per 15 acres of land, which this year adds up to approximately 40,000 permits. The limitation is designed to help prevent overcrowding in most instances, although opening day of deer season is the one event that attracts most hunters.

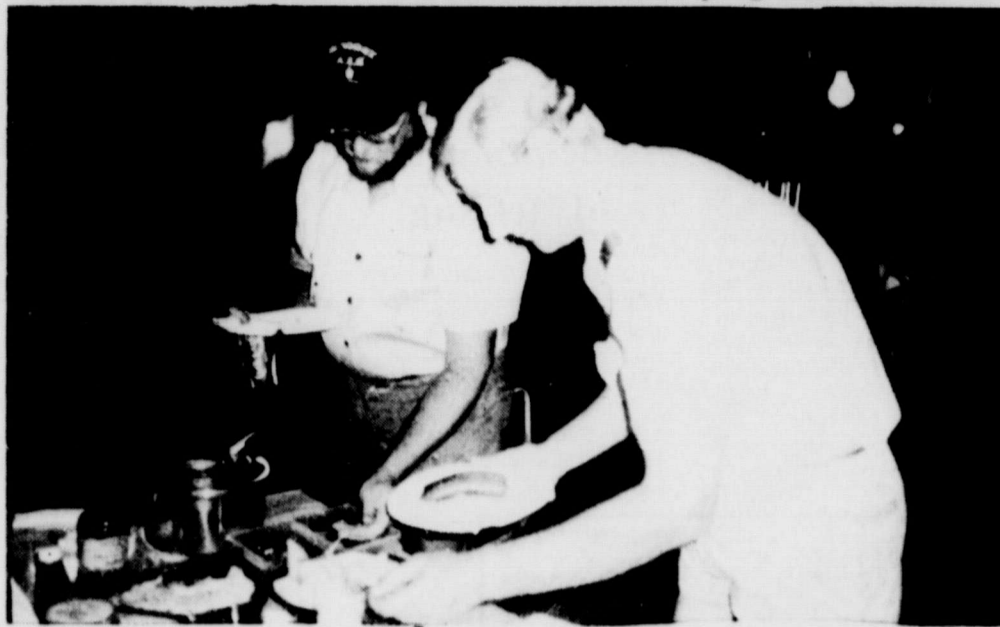
