He said they were able to staff of Chuck Lawrence. Charles Leflore Testifies In Crime **Trial In 91st District Court**

Testimony continued in the Garcia Crime Trial in the 91st District Courtroom Tuesday. visiting Judge Herman Fitts said he hoped to complete the trial this week.

A jury of eight men and four owmen was sworn in late Monday after five days of questioning. They were secelted from a group of 48 prospective jurors who were told to return to the courtroom Monday.

On Monday Joe Perry and Barbara Williams heard Special Prosecutor Bill Hart read the indictments against them. Williams is charged with organized crime, murder and conspiracy, and Perry is charged with the same counts plus robbery and rape.

Court appointed attorneys Leslie Vance and Steve Davis are representing the defendants. Perry and Williams are the seventh people to be tried on the 1981 abductionmurder of Debra Jo Garcia of

First Charles LeFlore and , then his brother Thomas were given prison sentences for taking part in the crime. Last

summer Brenda Andrews was given a 33 yr. prison sentnece, and two men - Richard Hinton and Pat Starr - were acquitted.

After the jury was seated Monday witnesses Dwight Hamilton and Roy Dennis took the stand. Hamilton said that on Nov. 29, 1981 he and his wife delivered the Abilene Reporter News about 5:30 a.m. to the Quickway Grocery, where Debra Garcia worked. Mrs. Garcia waited on them for some purchases.

Roy Dennis, the owner of Quickway Grocery at that time, told of a telephone call a little before six a.m.

reporting Debra Garcia missing. He helped search for her at the store. Her body was found about three days later west of Cisco, with a bullet hole in her

head.
Court resumed Tuesday with more witnesses called by the Prosecution.

Fire Chief Guthrie of Cisco told of finding Debra Garcia's body near a road west of Cisco. He described it as 'Very neat, glasses on - hair was neat - no sign of anything." He checked for a pulse, found none, and called authorities.

Then Charles Allen LeFlore took the stand. He said he pled guilty in 1981-82 to the death of Debra Garcia, and is serving a long term in prison. He agreed that on March 15, 1985 he told the Special Prosecutor "Others were involved."

He told his story of the abduction and murder to the Courtroom, continuing in a halting voice at times and apparently pausing to weep. He said he was present at the abduction, and named those who allegedly helped him, one of the defendants and others.

He said Garcia was carried to a house near Cisco, where the defendants and others held her and engaged in various acts. According to LeFlore Garcia was then carried to Rising Star, where she was kept for a time. She was then brought back to the house near Cisco and shot.

The LeFlore testimony was continuing at presstime, but other witnesses were expected to take the stand later in the day.





We learn that many others are planning to join but just haven't gotten around to it, and we would encorage one and all to act now to become members because our membership support is what makes it possible for us to offer this service.

that many might be waiting to see "if we make our goal" before they join because they don't want to join if the service is not going to be here in the future. This is understandable, but unfortunately it won't help us to reach our goal or provide the ambulance service.

In telephone conversations and in person, we have also learned

After careful analysis of our expanding operating expenses, it has been determined that the minimum of 1,700 members must be met for us to offer the current service and/or advance the service to a higher skilled level of care for our patients.

We are taking a positive attitude because we want to continue to live in this county and provide this service. We believe we can reach the minimum and we would encourage citizens to share our positive attitude by signing up and joining fellow citizens in helping to provide this important service.

In the unlikely event that the minimum is not reached, members will be refunded a pro-data amount of the membership fee, so there's nothing to lose by joining, and everything to lose if the ambulance service is lost in our-area.

You may visit our office at 201 S. Ostrom, Eastland, Texas. We look forward to Serving Eastland County for a long time.

The City Council reminds all residents and city water users that Voluntary Water Conservation is still very much in effect. City Manager Mike Moore states that since June 15 Lake Cisco's water level has dropped five feet. A lot of this loss is from evaporation, but water consumption is also up 35 percent. If it continues at this rate, with no relief from the weather, the City Council will consider mandatory curtailment at their Sept. 13th meeting. This action would result in very restricted outside irrigation and strict enforcement on the part of the city. The current voluntary program means that irrigation is restricted to two days a week - Tuesday and Saturday - 1 a.m. to noon.

Twenty-three bicyclists and six crew members with the Pacific Atlantic Crossing Tour stopped for a brief rest in Cisco last Monday. They had started from Snyder, Texas early Monday morning, and planned to spend the night in the Classic Inn Motel in Eastland that night. Group members are riding their bicycles from San Diego, California to Jacksonville, Florida. They started Aug. 14, and expected to be in Florida this Tuesday, Aug. 30. The average speed on the bike is 40-50 miles per hour, and the riders range in age from 19-61. A crew member said Texas people have been the friendliest of all they have met.

Charlie's Pets, Fish and Supplies is a new business in Cisco. The pet store was opened for Business last week by owners Charlie Tatum and Star Reese. The location is 711 Conrad Hilton Ave., and the business will be open from 9 a.m. - 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday. Charlie and Starr invite all to stop by and see their beautiful birds, as well as animals and fish. They have several aquariums filled

with tropical and salt water fish - a most interesting display.

Sears is not going to shut their doors completely, according to Don Shepard, Cisco Chamber of Commerce Manager. They are changing locations and will be relocated in Cisco. The local outlet will become an agent store, where all the services that are available now, except receiving payments, will be in effect. One of the local merchants will become the agent. There will not be in floor merchandise in the store, however.

EASTLAND

Plans are underway for Old Rip Day, which will be Saturday, Oct. 1. According to custom, Old Rip Day will start with a large parade. Among the expected entries this year are the HSU Band with the Six White Horses, Junior College Bands and Drill Teams, the Marine Color Guard, and more than ten High School Bands. Following the Parade, a fair is expected to again fill the streets to the south and west of the Courthouse. A number of exhibits are expected to be inside the Courthouse, as insurance rates for the use of other buildings has become excessive. Two big events will be held outside of the fair area - a Statewide Fiddler's Contest in the Majestic Theatre, and a band contest at Maverick Stadium.

The County is being informed that the West Central Texas Interlocal Drug Task force needs more funding to continue. In the last eight months The Force has solved 133 drug cases involving 92 defendants. Some \$800,000 in cash has been siezed, as well as five vehicles, 12 weapons and 100 pieces of jewelry. Several of the successful drug-busts have been in Eastland County. Emergency funding for the Task Force is set up on a population basis, and

The resignation of Policeman David Jackson was accepted by the City Council on Saturday, Aug. 27 in a special meeting. The announcement was made to a large crowd of citizens. Jackson was employed by the city last April.

The Ranger Independent School District has made application to the Governor's Office, Criminal Justice Division, for funding under the 1989 Criminal Justice Plan. Senator Bob Glasgow has announced support of this application, stating that the funding, if approved, would be to fund an Alt Classroom for At Risk students in the amount of \$6,492." The Senator said that we are all concerned about the crime in our cities and communities, and this funding would certainly be of assistance to Ranger ISD.







Vegetable farming like crap shoot

Sem-Tex winning with perishables

By REYES ABILA

Like a crapshooter in Las Vegas, vegetable farmers are gam-blers of the soil who flip their money across the land hoping that in the end a healthy crop will make

At least that is how vegetable farmers Dwight Crawford and Ted Higginbottom describe themselves and six other farmers who comprise Sem-Tex Produce Co., a multi-million-dollar vegetable produce company operating 18 miles west of Seminole

Sem-Tex itself netted about \$2 million last year from sales to retail grocery stores, restaurants and food distributors, according to Crawford, the corporation's vice president. The retail organizations who

sold the vegetables to the public profited about \$9 million from the produce purchased from Sem-Tex. said the farmers, who take pride in knowing that they are one of the few West Texas groups who grow vegetables commercially. Originally, the corporation was

formed as a cooperative between eight farmers in 1985, Crawford

Today the corporation's farmers manage six farms located within a 30-mile radius of the company's processing plant. This season they are growing watermelons and cantaloupes for distribution across the United States and Cana-

Farming is inherently risky, but growing produce is riskier since vegetable growers do not have the insurance of povernment subsidies some other farmers enjoy, said Higginbottom, company

"The vegetable crops have no price supports," he said. "With perishable foods, the government is saying 'We're willing to take what you supply us.' 'And And Higginbottom does not see any offerings of government subsidiza tion unless there is a severe shortage of produce which he sees a

"The risks are pretty high with produce," Crawford said. "This is a high dollar crop to produce."

of crops is more than \$300, labor to harvest the produce adds more than \$100,000 to production costs. he said. The company is almost stagnant while the crops are in the field and employs only a full-time

secretary year-round.
"We employ about 250 people at harvest time," Crawford said.
"Harvest begins about mid-August and lasts until Nov. 1."
But while the area farmers

worry about adverse weather and disasters damaging their crops, farmers in the Midwest are experiencing drought conditions which could drive the price of the local crop up, Higginbottom said.

The Silver Haired Legislature is an elected, representative, nonpartisan body of citizens 60-plus years of age, elected by persons 60-plus years of age. PARENTS ARE CHILDREN'S MOST IMPORTANT TEACHERS

Research has proven that children's chances for success in school are much better when their parents get involved in their education.

So important is parental involvement to education, that the State Board of Education made improved parental and community involvement a major goal of its Long-Range Plan for Texas Public School Education.

"There is some evidence that shows that it doens't matter what level of involvement a parent takes as lond as he or she supports what the school is doing," Lopez says.

Much of the assistance parents can give their children at home is developmental, says Lopez, and includes such tasks as teaching a child to count by using pots and pans or helping a child learn to read by selecting books at the library and reading them aloud together.

Lopez says that even parents who may be undereducated themselves can still find many things they can do to help their children.

"These parents make a difference when they encourage their children to finish their homework, make sure they have a good breakfast and that they get to school on time and attend regularly," Lopez says.

In addition, the staff of the Texas Education Agency has prepared a list of some simple, everyday things parents can do to help their children succeed in school. These in-

* Speak to your child about the importance of a good education. Children should learn to respect school.

* Get to know your child's teacher and the school principal. It's important to meet your child's teachers at the beginning of the school year and let them know you care. * Help your child's teacher by reinforcing the importance of following school rules to your child. Talk about discipline, especially self-discipline.

* See that homework is done every day. Check to see that homework is done correctly and provide a quiet place for your child to study. Be sure your child remembers to take homework to school each morning.

* Provide your child with breakfast each day and make sure your child is at school on time

* Parents can also help their children become better readers. Become an example for your child by reading newpapers, magazines or books from time to time.

* Take your children to the library. Schedule trips regularly to get books for your child to read.

* Talk to your child often. Make your child a partner in all your conversations and encourage and praise your

* Ask teachers to help choose books that are on your child's reading level. Read to your child and encourage your child to read aloud.

* Encourage your child to write. Writing is important to reading. Have pens, pencils, crayons and paper available. * Play learning games with your child. Ask your child's teacher to recommend sight word cards, puzzles and other learning materials that make learning fun.

* If you feel your child has trouble learning at school, contact your child's teacher and school officials.

Investigate whether your child needs special education classes. Through conferences it can be determined whether your child should participate in special classes. Finally, parents should always remember that they are

their children's most important and influential teachers.





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
