Verdict Awaited In Lengthy Crime Trial

Jurors in the organized crime trial were back in the 91st District Courtroom Tuesday morning to hear a portion of Charles LeFlore's testimony read back to them.

Attorneys were given copies of the requested transcripts to study, while the jurors were sent back to the Jury Room. Spectators were shifted to the County Courtroom on the west side of the third floor, so that civil cases could be heard in 91st District Court.

On Monday (Labor Day) lengthy closing arguments in the case were given by Special Prosecutor Bill Hart and Court-appointed defense attorneys Leslie Vance and Steve Davis, representing Joe Perry Sr. and Barbara Williams.

Perry and Williams are accused of participating in the 1981 abduction, rape and murder of Debra Jo Garcia, Cisco Convenience Store clerk. They are the seventh people to be tried on this offense.

The jury went into deliberations about 3:45 p.m. Monday, and after five hours, members asked to hear part of the LeFlore testimony again. They were permitted to go home while the material was being transcribed.

The portion of the testimony which particularly interested the jurors was who LeFlore said was present during the Nov. 1981 abduction of Mrs. Garcia. They also wanted to re-hear who was present at two different houses she was apparently carried to before her death.

One location was the "pink house" west of Cisco, and another a house in Rising Star.

Charles LeFlore and his brother, Thomas LeFlore, are serving long prison sentences for the Garcia murder. Charles LeFlore testified here last week that they were only part of a group involved in the

crime. He stated the defendants in the present trial were part of that group, and named others whom he said were also involved.

On Monday the trial began about 12:30 p.m., with visiting Judge Herman Fitts reading the charge to the jury. The sound system in the Courtroom did not work well, and it was difficult for the roomful of spectators to hear the text.

The final arguments of the attorneys came more clearly. Prosecutor Bill Hart said the account of the three days Debra Garcia was held was "the nearest thing to Hell I have seen". He told of the brutality of the crime, and stated there was a conspiracy to commit it. He summed up the testimony of LeFlore and other witnesses for the state.

Defense Attorney Leslie Vance declared that Joe Perry Sr. was in Slaton during the time the crime was committed. He called Hart's case: "A jigsaw puzzle that has gone through three garage sales".

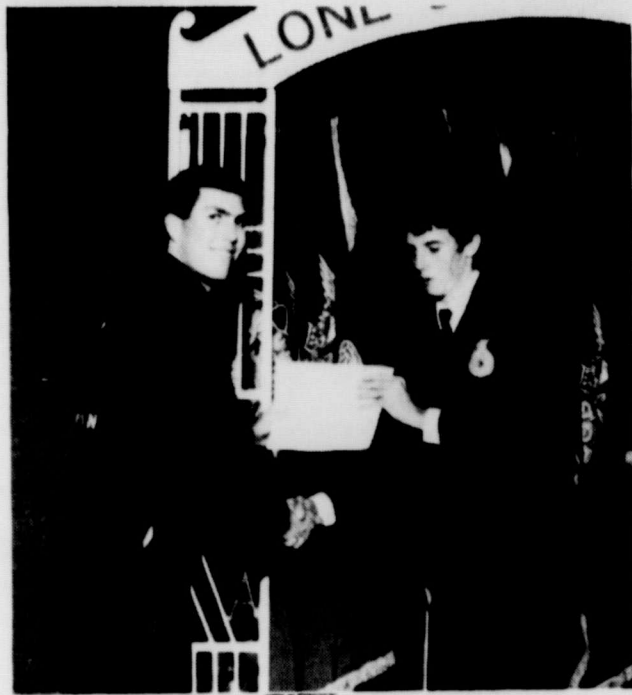
He said that Johnnie Morren, then Eastland County Sheriff, "checked out Joe Perry's story and decided he wasn't involved".

Attorney Steve Davis, representing Barbara Williams, also disputed the testimony of Charles LeFlore. He said that Johnnie Morren investigated Barbara Williams after the crime and told her she was free to go.

Davis also told the jury that they shouldn't convict someone because they didn't like their lifestyle.

Just before noon the jury was still waiting to hear the court reporter read from testimony which they had requested to be represented to them.

After this recording, the jury presumably will retire back to the jury room for deliberation.

Eastland County Bass Club To Hold Tourney

Over 15 years ago a group of anglers comprised of citizens from Cisco and Eastland met to discuss forming an organization for bass fishermen in Eastland County.

A short two years after the creation of the Eastland County Bass Club, members decided to host a fishing event and invite other anglers from the area for some friendly competition. In its early years funding was somewhat of a problem, member pledged donations to cover any expenses not covered by the entry fees to make sure this event would continue to grow.

Those seeds planted by early members have grown into one of the premier fishing events in Central and West Texas. In its 13th year the Eastland County Bass Clubs Open Invitational has grown in numbers from 50 entries to an expected 200 to 250 this year.

Bass tournaments are not only fun, but these events pump hundreds even thousands of dollars into the local economy. An average tournament in our area looks like this on expenses: boat gass \$12.00, vehicle gass \$20.00, fishing equipment \$15.00, motel \$30.00, eats \$15.00, misc. \$25.00.

This is an average of \$120.00 per visiting contestant. Of an expected 200 contestants around 125 of these will be visiting the area. Which its pretty easy to see that a good amount of money will be brought in by this event. And this money will of course be circulated in our area at least three times. S next time you hear someone condemn a fishing tournament, tell them some of the pluses.

Membership Drive In Progress For Patterson Ambulance

"This is a delicate and desperate time for the ambulance service in Eastland County," according to M.H. Perry, Patterson Ambulance Membership Drive Chairman, at a meeting held last Friday in Cisco.

Perry added, "If we lose our ambulance service, lives could be lost. It may be my life, or maybe yours, but if an individual here loses their life, then the smoke will go up! And this could happen if we don't have an ambulance service!"

Perry said he has had to use the ambulance service three times and he is grateful it was available.

Some 17 individuals from Eastland and Cisco attended the meeting to discuss the membership drive. KVMX radio in Eastland will have a live show on Saturday, September 10, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon, to help with the membership drive.

Buddy Marshall, with the radio station, said they will interview local citizens who have had to use Patterson Ambulance and what the service means to them now.

Telephone lines will be set up at Cisco City Hall, Eastland City Hall and the radio station to accept calls from anyone who would like to become a member with Patterson's Ambulance. The cost for a year's membership is \$36.00. There will be volunteers in both towns who will go to any interested persons home to pick up their

application and check.

The \$36.00 fee covers all the times a patient has to use the ambulance to be taken to a hospital. Or, if a patient has to be transferred to an Abilene hospital, the trip is covered. This is very beneficial if someone does not have insurance to absorb the cost of the ambulance ride.

Carol Patterson, who was at the meeting, said even if someone has insurance that will pay for the ambulance ride, it is beneficial for them to become a member. She said when someone is a member, then their membership takes care of the ambulance ride. But, she said, if a person does not have a membership with Patterson's, even if they have insurance, the patient is responsible with filing with the insurance company, to get their money back. She said the patient is responsible to paying the ambulance and it is up to the patient to get the money from the insurance company. She said Patterson's does not file insurance claims.

It was brought out that Patterson Ambulance needs to stay in Eastland County. The ambulance service is needed, even by people who do not live here. One example was given as when there is a wreck on the highway. He said these people need an ambulance, and it would be bad, if a call one comes in and there isn't one.

Relatives Live In Cisco Search Intensifies For Missing Girl

Authorities throughout the state were still searching Tuesday morning for Cortney Lynn Clayton of Stamford who has been missing since about 8:45 p.m. Friday.

She is the seven-year-old daughter of Stan and Candice Clayton of Stamford and granddaughter of Ruth Conger of Cisco. She is the niece of Jackie Conger, Johnny Conger and Teresa Martin, all of Cisco.

The little girl's parents and brothers formerly lived in Eastland. Mrs. Clayton was employed as a nurse at Ranger General Hospital, and Mr. Clayton worked at Russell-Newman in Cisco.

Cortney was reported missing after she failed to return home Friday evening after going to a grocery store a block from her home.

Authorities are approaching the disappearance as an abduction.

Crimestoppers and the Clayton family are offering rewards for information leading to the girl's return.

Anyone with any information is asked to call Jones County Sheriff Mike Middleton at 823-3201; Stamford Police Department at 773-3647; or Jones County Crimestoppers at 823-4111. The Abilene office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation is also assisting in the search.

Cortney Clayton is about four feet tall with shoulder-length blond hair, brown eyes and freckles. When she entered the M-System store along State Highway 6 in Stamford Friday night she was wearing a white T-shirt with print on the front, maroon terry cloth shorts and blue tennis shoes with white laces. She has pierced ears and a scar on her right index finger.

Postal Service Readjust Window Hours Here

The Dallas Division of U.S. Postal Service is pleased to announce that most post offices previously closed on Wednesday mornings to meet the requirements of the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of December, 1987, will reopen effective the week of September 10, 1988. This includes the Cisco post office, which will be open from 8 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.

Postmaster General Anthony M. Frank stated that the Postal Service was able to restore window service

because of the success of accumulating savings from cutbacks in other areas, such as administrative personnel cost, travel, training, supplies, reevaluation and adjustments in transportation and several other operational areas. The exact amount of savings will not be known until the end of the year; however, the PMG's best estimate is close to the \$160 million required.

At this time the Postal Service will not restore Sunday collections.

Fullen until 10:00 p.m. Saturday. Contestants may also register Sunday, September 11, 1988 starting at 5:00 a.m. until 6:30 a.m. However these entrants will not receive the free fishing line. All contestants must be registered prior to fishing Sunday.

This will be a 3 fish maximum tournament, and all fish must measure at least 14 inches using the new state measuring system of squeezing the tail.

No contestant may enter the weigh-in line with more than three black bass. Weigh-in will begin at 3:00 p.m. and will close at 4:00 p.m.

The following is a list of rules and regulations for this event.

Entry fee \$25.00, \$5.00 Big Bass pot is optional.

Entry fee must be paid at headquarters before fishing unless pre-registered. Pre-registered contestants must check-in at headquarters prior to fishing.

During the tournament contestants may fish out of a boat or tube. No wade or bank fishing.

No pre-fishing. Lake Leon is off limits to fishing from

12:01 a.m. 9-7-88 until 6:30 a.m. 9-11-88. Motoring is allowed and contestants may be at their chosen location ready to begin fishing at 6:30 a.m. on the 11th.

All fish must be caught on artificial bait only. (no trolling or live bait). Fishing will be done at Lake Leon ONLY. 3 fish maximum - 14" minimum length, large mouth black bass ONLY.

All contestants must wear an approved life vest when the big motor is running.

All state and federal laws must be obeyed.

Fishing hours are 6:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., weigh-in time is 3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Each contestant must bring their own fish to the weigh-in.

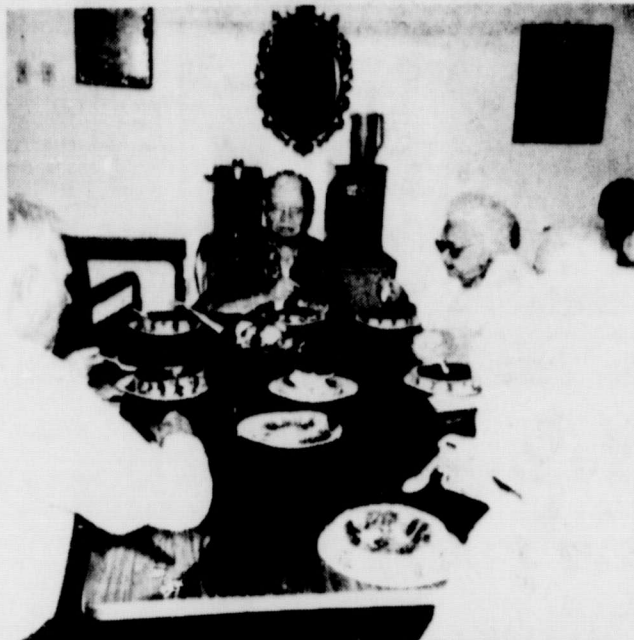

Remember To Buckle Up During Back-To-School Activities

Parents who "buckle up" themselves and their children could save much more than a price discount during back-to-school activities this fall.

Back-to-school means new tennis shoes and notebooks and more cars on the road. Driving through mounting bottlenecks and snarled traffic with the number of vehicles exceeding holiday loads requires every precaution. "Buckling up before driving to the next shopping center or sale can be a major defense against being injured or killed," said Carla Baker, statewide coordinator for the Safe Riders Program at the Texas Department of Health.

The proper use of child safety seats is especially important during this potentially dangerous driving time. "Most accidents happen close to home in town, during peak traffic," said Baker.

Although use of child safety restraints has increased slightly since last year, the 1988 figures are still below 1986, according to the latest Texas Transportation Institute survey. After reaching a peak of nearly 60 percent in 1986, the rate of compliance with the state's 1984 child safety seat law declined to 49.9 percent in 1987 and has

risen to 51.9 percent for 1988.

"Many parents see that their children have new clothes and books but then neglect them when they ride in a car or truck," said Baker.

"School-age children should be buckled up securely even if the destination is a shoe store only three blocks away. And little brothers and sisters - state law requires all children under age 2 to ride in a safety seat. Because young children are more apt to be seriously injured in an accident, it's best for them to ride in a safety seat until age 4," Baker said.

A growing list of statistics continues to prove the wisdom of older children and adults using safety belts. Almost four out of five occupants who escaped serious injury in accidents on Texas roads in 1987 were wearing seat belts, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety. There were three times more fatalities in accidents where occupants did not wear safety belts.

As the 1988-89 academic year begins, we are truly fortunate to have the charter class of the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science beginning at the University of North Texas in Denton.

The administration and faculty of the University of North Texas are to be commended for having the vision to seek the establishment of such an Academy. This University has been a dedicated leader in efforts to pro-

vide academic opportunities to the youth of our State. University faculty will teach the Academy's curriculum, and provide counseling on courses available within the undergraduate programs.

It is especially rewarding, as Senate sponsor of the bill which was enacted by the 70th Texas Legislature in 1987 establishing the Academy, to have the following 11 students from my Senatorial District in this initial class of

This Academy will encourage those students with an interest and aptitude in math and science to pursue their goals.

to ten percent of 18 year olds in 10 countries. Sadly, our State's students rank 45th in SAT scores.

A recent study revealed a decrease in the number of bachelor's degrees in mathematics and science education; representing less than one new mathematics or science teacher for every ten school districts in the United States.

This Academy has been established as a two-year residential early admissions program for accelerated study for qualified high school juniors and seniors. Selection is based on scholastic record, SAT scores, aptitude and potential in science and mathematics, and intellectual curiosity. Interested students may be nominated during their sophomore year of high school by teachers, parents, members of the community or by the students themselves.

Those students graduating from the Academy will have two years of college work completed, while also completing their last two years of high school. Upon completion of their degrees, these students will be well prepared to make significant contributions in careers such as computer science, accounting, finance, engineering and

other areas in high technology.

We live in a diverse State, dependant upon a wide spectrum of careers. We can be proud of educational achievements, such as the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science; and we need to continue to find ways to provide for the best education possible for all our students.

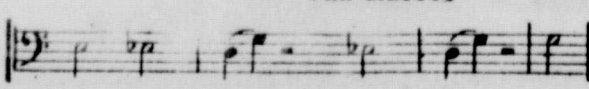

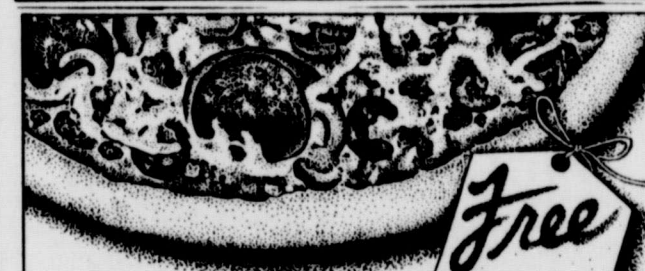

Recent gillnet surveys by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fishery crews turned up evidence of a strong population of spotted bass at lake Cypress Springs in Franklin County.

Biologist Mark Webb of Marshall said net surveys ordinarily yield more catfish than bass, but the nets collected 40 spotted bass averaging one pound in weight and more than 12 inches in length. The largest

was an 18 inch that weighed over three pounds.

Webb said the relatively clear water and rocky shorelines at Cypress Springs apparently provide good habitat for the fish, which are not as well-known to most anglers as largemouth bass. "Spotted bass should provide plenty of light tackle excitement," said Webb, adding that they can be caught on small jigs, crankbaits, spinners and live crawfish.

Lake Cypress Springs is located near Mount Pleasant, and is adjacent to Lakes Monticello and Bob Sandlin.

Officials remind anglers that beginning Sept. 1, spotted and smallmouth bass will be subject to the statewide 14-inch minimum length limit already in effect for largemouth bass. For details on all freshwater fishing regulations, obtain the department's 1988-89 Fishing Regulations Guide, now available from department offices and fishing license outlets across the state.

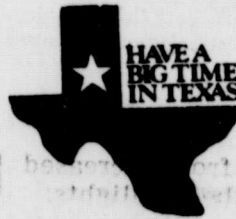
Registration Continues At Cisco Junior College

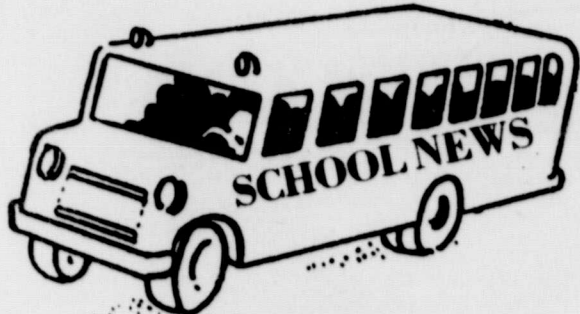

PARENTS CAN HELP SMOOTH TRANSITION TO NEW SCHOOL

Moving to a new town and school is always traumatic. After a move, parents and students often go through a grieving process similar to that when a loved one is lost.

"Students who move are losing not only friends but a whole way of life," according to John Lucas, director of guidance and counseling at the Texas Education Agency.

But parents can help make the transition easier on their children by discussing the move to a new hometown with them. Let your child know that you are concerned about his or her feelings.

And even though one or both of the parents did not want to move either, parents should put on the best possible face about the move when dealing with their children.

"Discuss the reasons for the move," Lucas said. "Look for similarities between the old town and the new town and discuss the differences."

Take your children on a tour of the new town to help them get to know the community. Include your child's new school on the tour. Visit points of community interest. Make contact with the athletic, religious, cultural or scouting groups who may offer youth programs in the town.

And although the new town may not have the same things to offer as the old town, there will be similar things. Assure your children that there will be other children at their school who are the same age and who will become new friends.

Many times, school principals work through the summer. If the principal is in, ask him or her to show the school to both you and your child. Ask about new student orientations programs that might be available.

Many schools have new student clubs. These clubs help new students make the transition into a new school with special activities.

"Your child needs to know that there will be someone at the school to meet their needs just like there was at the old school," Lucas said. "It's just going to be a different somebody."

When it is time to enroll your children in school, make sure to bring an immunization record, birth certificate, report cards or other school records from the old district.

Course credits from an accredited private school will generally be accepted at face value by school district in Texas for students in upper elementary grades, junior high and high school.

Students transferring from an unaccredited private school may be required to take tests for placement. They may also be required to earn credit by examination.

Students who have attended a private kindergarten program and are five years of age but will not be six until after September 1 will probably be required to enroll in kindergarten when they transfer to the public school system.

Students who have attended first grade at a private school and are six years old will probably be enrolled in the second grade when they transfer to the public school system.

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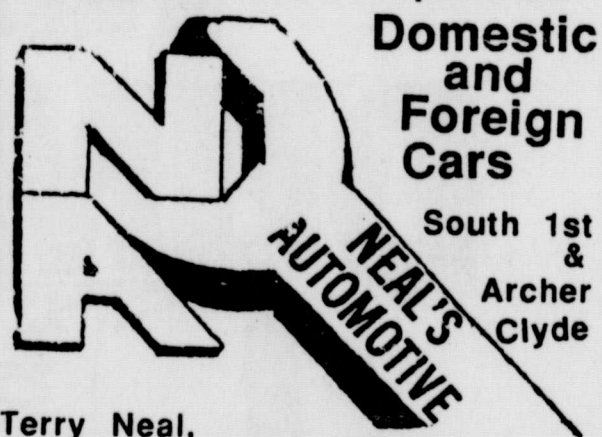

Certain helpful viruses can prevent diabetes in mice prone to the disease, a California scientist found. In tests, the viruses attacked the white blood cells that normally destroy insulin-producing cells.

Extra-sensitive teeth can be relieved with a treatment of a potassium compound, say researchers at the University of Michigan. Dipotassium oxalate seems to combine with the calcium in the tooth to form crystals that protect the teeth.

"It's good to win our first game of the season," according to head Coach Rick Frazier.

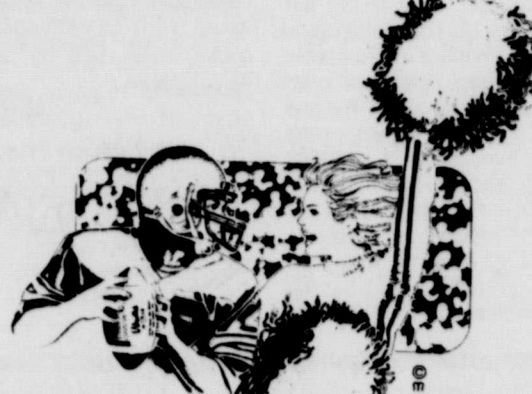

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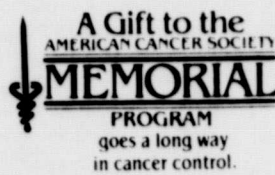
SERVING CISCO AND EASTLAND

CJC Bible Chair To Offer Free Night Course

The Biblical Studies Center at Cisco Junior College will offer a ten-week, non-credit evening Bible course on "Biblical Lessons as Seen Through the Years of History" beginning on Tuesday evening, September 13, and continuing weekly through November 15, according to an announcement by the Center.
The class will meet from 7 to 9 p.m. each Tuesday, and will be open to anyone wishing to participate, at no charge. The sessions will be informal, and there will be no tests, special re-

quirements, or assignments, according to Bible Chair spokesman Dr. Ken Hammes, who also stated that the lessons would be helpful to scholars and non-scholars alike.
Instructor for the course will be Dr. John C. Stevens, Chancellor of Abilene Christian University. Dr. Stevens, who is also ACU's immediate past president, is a Professor of History as well as a minister, lecturer, and former military chaplain. He has spoken extensively throughout the country, and is well known as a professor who can relate lessons that can be learned from significant events of man's history to Biblical truths.
Stevens joined the faculty of ACU in 1948, and since then has served the University of Dean of Mean, Dean of Students, Assistant President, and President. While chief executive at ACU, he was elected president of the Texas Association of Texas Colleges and Universities. During 40 years of service for the school, he has also been extensively active in community activities, was a member of the Abilene City Council, and was named Citizen of the Year for Abilene in 1981.
Dr. Stevens received the BA degree from ACU in 1938, the Masters of Arts from the University of Arkansas in 1948, and the Ph.D from Arkansas in 1954. He currently still teaches courses for ACU in The History of Western Civilization and The History of England.
Dr. Stevens is married to

the former Ruth Rambo, and they have two children and four grandchildren.
The course will feature a different topic each week. They will include: Providence Interposed in Our Behalf—God's Work in Human Affairs; The Answer He Was Born to Make—The Problem of Looking Back; Three More Days—The Importance of Time; Walls; Too Old to Serve?; Let Not the Sun Go Down on Your Wrath; The Kind of World Jesus Came to Save; Possessions and Perspective; All That I Am in Life I Owe to My Angel Mother, and Giving Without Regrets.
Each week's class will be a separate lesson, and if a class member has to miss one or more classes it will not interfere at all with the overall continuity of the course, Dr. Stevens has pointed out.
The CJC Bible Chair is under the direction of the elders of the Cisco Church of Christ, and is supported by other Churches of Christ in the Big Country area. It is located immediately adjacent to the CJC campus, just west of the president's residence. Dr. Hammes, who is head of the Language Arts Department of CJC, is chairman of the Bible Chair Committee for the Cisco church.
