That was the joking agreement of a number of area residents who gathered this week to help re-initiate the RC&D Program, and meet its new coordinator.

Meeting Wednesday morning, County SCS Director Ron Bailey introduced Ernest Maravec who has come on board to head up the RC&D Program, which has been without a coordinator and much steam since 1980. 

Mistrial Declared In Organized Garcia Murder Crime Case

The Organized Crime Trial in 91st District Court ended in a mistrial Tuesday. At 6 p.m. the jury was still deadlocked, and visiting Judge Herman Fitts granted a mistrial motion made by defense Attorneys Leslie

Charles LeFlore.

Vance and Steve Davis. It is not known at this time whether a new trial will be held for defendants Joe Perry St. and Barbara Williams. Perry and Williams were the seventh people to be tried in the 1981 Abduction, rape and murder of Debra Jo Garcia, a Cisco convenience store clerk. Attorney Bill Hart was special prosecutor in the case.

Reportedly the juror's difference of opinion in this trial hinged on the testimony of Charles LeFlore, who was previously sentenced in the case. LeFlore stated that he was an eyewitness to all phases of the crime, and implicated Williams, Perry and others

Some of the jurors believed him, and others apparently did not.

During the trial Prosecutor Bill Hart Brought up other state's witnesses besides for their defendants. There was conflicting testimony during the trial and some who apparently changed testimony. Joe Perry Sr. took the stand in his defense and Barbara Williams did not.

There was no physical evidence of the almost seven-year-old crime submitted to the jury. "All the physical evidence in the case had been misplaced or lost and no fingerprints were ever taken in the investiga-

the jury at 3.45 p.m. Monday(Labor Day). After five hours of deliberation Monday jury members asked to hear transcripts of some of the previous testimony of The transcripts were read

to them Tuesday, and the jury resumed deliberation. At 3:40 p.m. Judge Fitts was advised that the jury could not reach a unanimous decision. He instructed the jurors to "try again", but by 6 p.m. no decision had been reached. Therefore the mistrial was declared.

This trial was one of several involved with the disappearance and murder of Debra Jo Garcia. in 1982 Charles LeFlore and his brother, Thomas, confessed to the crime and were given long prison sentences. Later **Brenda** Andrews was given a probated sentence for alleged involvement in the crime. In 1985 Charles LeFlore made a statement involving a number of other people. Grand juries later indicted Brenda Andrews, Richard Hinton, Pat Starr, Barbara Williams and Joe Perry Sr. on charges of Organized

Crime In 1987 Pat Starr, Richard Hinton and Brenda Andrews were tried in 91st District Court. Starr and Hinton were acquitted, and Andrews found guilty. She was assessed 33 years in the state penitentiary, and her case is presently on appeal.

Brenda Andrews, Richard Hinton, Barbara Williams and Joe Perry Sr. are all related to each other by blood or marriage. Perry and Willia.ns were once





Russia was built inadequately and was just an accident waiting to happen. But the plants in America are different, he added.

McGuire said the pipeline is 790 miles long of 48" pipeline. He said the weather did not stop the construction of the line. He said over 1,000 contractors worked on the line. All the line was imported from Japan and most of the oil goes to Japan.

It was brought out that the U.S. steel companies did not want to build the pipe since it would take away too much of their production time.

STATE FOCUSES ON DROPOUT PREVENTION As another school year begins, Texas education officials are working hard to ensure that it won't end early for many of the state's estimated 3.4 million schoolchildren. In 1986, a study commissioned by the state examined the school dropout problem and found that an estimated 33

percent of Texas students leave school before receiving a diploma. The study also estimated that 45 percent of the state's fastest growing and largest minority student population-Hispanics-drop out of school

Armed with these distrubing statistics, Texas school and political leaders set out to find ways to keep students in school and lower dropout rates.

In June 1987, the State Board of Education adopted a new rule requiring every school district to adopt policies designed to retain potential dropouts in a school setting. These policies must designate the programs and services in the district that are available for students at risk of dropping out of school.

Students in grade one through six who have failed to meet promotion requirements are considered to be at risk of dropping out of school. A student also in considered at risk if he or she is in grades 7-12, under age 21 and has not been promoted one or more times based on academic criteria; is two or more years below grade level in reading or mathematics; has failed at least two courses in one or more semesters and is not expected to graduate within four years of the time he or she entered the ninth grade; or has failed one or more of the reading, writing or mathematics sections of the most recent Texas Educational Assemssment of Minimum Skills test, beginning

"On an average, hospitals providing workers' compensation services will see a 30 percent reduction in payment under the IAB's fee guidelines. Statewide, this cut in payments to 537 community hospitals will be in excess of \$125 million,

"Texas hospitals employ approximately 200,000 workers. As major employers, hospital share the state's concern with the dramatic increase in workers' compensation premiums. However, Inadequate payment for hospital services is not the solution," Townsend said.
