Fire Department **Purchase Second Rural Fire Truck**

The Cisco Volunteer Fire Department has purchased a second new rural fire truck, according to Fire Chief Richard Connell. They bought a reconditioned 11/2 ton Jeep truck.

Connell said the truck is completely rebuilt. The Cisco Fire Department purchased the truck from the Huntsville Fire Department. The cost of the truck was

Connell said the Cisco Fire Department will need the second rural fire truck since this area is preparing to go into an extra dry winter.

Connell said the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department answered 140 rural fire calls this year, due to the extreme dry conditions. He said they have also answered 105 city fire calls.

The fire chief said the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department is a busy department. He said they have had it pretty hard in the past, but when the two new rural fire trucks are in operation they will be able to handle all the

Connell said this area will experience a real rough 'fire winter' and he is expecting numerous rural fires. He said even if this area should receive several inches of rain, it's too late to help the grass to green up for the winter months. He said with the use of unsafe wood stoves and fire places, those not properly installed or not cleaned before use, there will be more rural and in-

Connell said the fire epartment will need to get the two rural trucks equipped to fight fires before winter. He said the fire department has the steel to build the tanks for the trucks, but the trucks need to

be equipped with radios. He said the radios are a necessity for the firemen in case one is trapped behind a fire line and they need to radio for help. They also need the radio to call in for more help, if a fire is bigger than what was first called in.

the trucks. The trucks cost \$4,000 each. Connell said everyone has worked so hard and donated so much to help the fire department, and all the money that everyone donated is greatly appreciated.

He said the fire department had about \$6,000 in the special fund, and they spent \$2,000 over the total to buy the two needy rural fire trucks. Connell said the fire department is completely out of funds now.

Connell said again everyone has been so good to help the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department, but he is asking for donations for the Cisco Volunteer Fire Department to finish the work on the two trucks. He said the Fire Department is still shy about \$6,000 to \$7,000 to get the two trucks in operation.

On September 6, Cisco VFD put out a rural grass fire on I-20, at Fleet Cementers.

On September 9, Cisco Firemen put out a grass fire 5 miles south on Hwy. 183.

The department was called out to extinguish a fire in a pickup south of town.

On September 10, Cisco firemen had to put out a grass fire on Lake Bernie Road and were called out to a controlled burn south of town. In each instance a rural fire truck was needed to help with these fires.

Mr. Cole was born in Wichita Falls, and was raised in Tipton, Oklahoma. He has a masters degree in health from Southwest State University. He has been in health care for 19 years. He served 8 years in the Air Force in the medical field.

The Commission has appointed Michael E. Fields as General Counsel to the Commission effective October 1, 1988. He replaces J. D. Head, who has resigned to enter private practice. "J. D. Head has been a very resourceful and effective General Counsel," said Buck Wynne, Chairman of the Texas Water Commission. "I have absolute confidence in Mike Field's legal experience and ability to meet the challenge of this additional responsibility.'

Field has served as Chief Hearings Examiner for the Texas Water Commission since September of 1987 and will continue in that position in addition to his duties as General Counsel. He received a Bachelor of Arts from Stephen F. Austin State University in 1967, as well as a Master of Arts in 1969 and a Master of Education in 1976. Mr. Field obtained a Juris Doctor Degree with honors from the University of Houston in 1983.

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
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

First of all, we would like to express our sincere appreciation to those who have signed up as members of the Patterson Ambulance Emergency Service. Right now, we have approximately 900 members to start our next year, for which we are most grateful.

We learn that many others are planning to join but just haven't gotten around to it, and we would encorage one and all to act now to become members because our membership support is what makes it possible for us to offer this service.

In telephone conversations and in person, we have also learned that many might be waiting to see "if we make our goal" before they join because they don't want to join if the service is not going to be here in the future. This is understandable, but unfortunately it won't help us to reach our goal or provide the ambulance service.

After careful analysis of our expanding operating expenses, it has been determined that the minimum of 1,700 members must be met for us to offer the current service and/or advance the service to a higher skilled level of care for our patients.

We are taking a positive attitude because we want to continue to live in this county and provide this service. We believe we can reach the minimum and we would encourage citizens to share our positive attitude by signing up and joining fellow citizens in helping to provide this important service.

Tourney Draws 224 Contestants

The members of the Eastland County Bass Club would like to say "thanks" to all the sponsors, contestants, and tournament helpers who made the 13th annual open invitational at Lake Leon a success.

Two hundred and twentyfour contestants were on hand this year. Of these 33 were entered in the Jr. Division leaving 191 entrants in the Sr. open division. This gentlemen and ladies were awarded over \$3,000 in cash and prizes which were paid down to around 50th place.

Anglers were allowed to bring in 3 fish or less measuring a minimum of 14 inches. At the close of the day the results were as

1. Jack York three fish 9.29 pounds \$1,000.00; 2. Richard Lancaster 3 fish 9.26 pounds \$600.00; 3. Tommy Rose 2 fish 9.19 pounds \$450.00; 4. Chuck Burgess 3 fish 8.42 pounds \$200.00; 5. Marlin Moore 3 fish 8.09 pounds

These five gentlemen lead a field of 90 of the 191 anglers who weighed in fish. Of the 90 anglers who weighed in 50 of these were awarded a cash or merchandise prize.

One hundred and sixty-six fish were brought to the scales which weighed a total of 387.37 pounds. This gave an average weight per fish of 2.33 pounds. A little light average, but this I'm sure will improve in a few weeks with cooler temperatures

and an increased appetite. Three anglers were crowned as true hawg hunters, with these catches in order of finish. First place big bass Tommy Rose 6.48 pounds,

second Darrell Goetz 4.79 pounds and third place big bass went to Joe Dale Smith with a 4.54 pound Leon Lunker. Buzz baits, worms and crankbaits tricked these


three lunkers. Of the 166 fish which were weighed in only 16 of these were unable to swim free after being chemically trated. This is an excellent percentage, of course if it was 100% it would be nice, but most of these deaths were due to improper handling prior to being turned over to tournament officials. The anglers weighing in dead fish were penalized .10 hundredths which was subtracted from the total weight of their catch.

I was especially proud to see 33 Jr. Division entrants at this years event. These youngsters are our future and hopefully by planting seeds of conservation, sportmanship, friendly competition at an early age, our outdoor's will be well cared for

Of the 33 Jr. entrants present the top five were: 1st Jadon Gilly 2 fish 3.93 pounds; 2nd Donald Holland 1 fish 2.62 pounds; 3rd Suzanne Bates 1 fish 2.42 pounds; 4th Jeremy Wheeler 1 fish 2.22 pounds; 5th Jeff

Dollar 1 fish 2.02 pounds. A total of 7 of the 33 Jr. entrants were able to land a 14 inch or larger fish this year. But each Jr. was awarded prizes even if they did not catch a fish. These items were donated by Berkley Trilene, Fishing Outdoors and Eastland County Bass

"The prison is made by enclosing about 15 acres with a strong thick board wall 14 ft. high with a platform attached to the wall that the guards walked around the prison day and night, with 13 long two story houses with bunks enough in each building to accomodate 200 men to a building.

"I room in the middle room in the upper story where I have, from the window of my room, a view of the city of Sandusky which is three miles distant. I have full view of Lake Erie.

'The western portion being thick heavy timber, with sugar trees and sugar maple, ash, walnut, and buckeye trees.

There are about 11 hundred prisoners here, mostly officers, This being the 31st. and last day of July 1862."

The guard ordered him to go back and at the same time leveled his gun. Gibson turned back as he was ordered, as he entered the door the guard fired one large ball and two buck shot took affect. He lived only 15 minutes after being shot. Major Poe and others washed and dressed him, then sat up with him throughout the

All officers of his regiment was permitted to go out of prison to the graveyard for his funeral.







Agency Disclosure Form To **Prevent Confusion**

Starting September 1 when prospective homebuyers begin their search for a new home or apartment, they will receive an agency disclosure form to help them understand that real estate agents usually represent the property owner, not the prospective buyer or tenant.

"This form will help consumers better understand this complicated part of our business," says George Tucker, San Antonio, 1988 president of the Texas Association of Realtors. "Brokers and agents are required to treat all parties in tive buyers and tenants need to understand that selling agents, along with listing agents, work for the proper-

ty owners in most cases." Briefly, the law of agency states that an agent owes a duty of loyalty and faithfulness to the person who established the relationship and who usually pays for the services.

Think about going to a clothing store for a new suit. The salesperson is glad to help and advise the consumer, but there is no doubt that the salesperson is working for the store because the store pays the salary,

Tucker says. In real estate the situation

is similar with the property owner usually paying the commissions. sales However, through the years the distinction has grown clouded because of the time most agents spend with prospective buyers and the many services that are provided-showing property, explaining property values, reviewing financial positions, etc.

More than 20 other states are following similar rules of agency disclosure. The form is to be presented at the time of face-to-face negotiations

in the Poll were split on whether their markets offer a good to excellent supply of homes affordable to firsttime buyers(47 percent) or a fair to poor supply(51 percent). More than half the brokers (55 percent said first-time buyers have more difficulty today than five years ago finding a home they can afford.

However, there were strong regional differences on this issue, with brokers in the South more optimistic than elsewhere that firsttime homes is good or excellent, compared to 50 percent in the Central states, 41 percent in the West and only 37 percent in the East.

"First-time buyers have a challenge cut out for them, but the Poll suggests that housing is available for buyers who are realistic about what they can afford,' Gresham said

on a specific property or before a written offer is prepared, whichever event occurs first.

"We are encouraging members of the Texas Association of Realtors to discuss the form even sonner as a way to develop closer relationships with their customers," Tucker says.

Use of the form is not required for residential leases of one year or less without the intent to purchase. The rule was approved by the Texas Real Estate Commission, the state regulatory authority for real estate licensees.

Gresham said mortgage insurance experts have indicated the average downpayment for first-time buyers is around 11 percent. Repeat homebuyers, who bring equity to the closing table, made downpayments averaging 30 percent or more, he said.

The real estate executive emphasized that many firsttime homebuyers make downpayments as low as five percent, by qualifying for privately or federally insured loans, or VA loans, which are federally guaranteed. Such programs may require a cap on home price, and he pointed out that lower downpayments generally are offset by higher monthly payments-a consideration for any

homebuyer. "If the median first-time home price is \$70,000, and the average downpayment is 11 percent, a young couple planning to buy their first home needs a nest egg of about \$7,700," Gresham said. "Saving this much monty is a challenge, but the dream of home ownership is

Prevention of oak wilt

By Bonnie Skaar George

If your trees are healthy and you want to keep them that way, institute the following practices:

- 1. Prune during cold weather. In Texas, that generally means you can prune October through January, but not from spring until fall. Seal pruning wounds with a good wound coat paint available from a nursery or hardware
- 2. Before use, disinfect any tools used on your trees.
- 3. Do not transport firewood onto your property from an unknown source or from a known oak wilt center. If you don't know, assume the firewood has oak wilt. Many people do not know they are selling firewood infected with oak wilt. Cover all stored firewood with
- clear plastic and pile soil along the edge of the plastic to make a seal. Keep an eye on the plastic and repair any small cuts you
- 5. When manicuring your yard. use great caution not to bruise the bark of your oaks. If you do, seal the wound with wound coat 6. Contact a profe sional if you notice a dying oak and suspect oak wilt. Pay special attention to Spanish or Red Oaks. The Texas
- Forest Service or your County Agent can refer you to compe-7. Oak wilt is a community prob lem. Stay alert to trees in your

Symptoms of Oak Wilt

Oak trees die for many reasons. How can you tell if your oak trees are dying from oak wilt? Here are some symptoms. If you're still not sure, contact your county extension agent or the Texas Forest Service for help.

1. Fresh leaves wilt. Leaves develop veinal necrosis which is THE symptom of oak wilt With veinal necrosis either the veins of the leaf turn red and the rest of the leaf remains green, or the veins are green and the remain

der of the leaf is red The leaves develop leaf burn, a dry-ing from the outside. This symp-tom is also characteristic of other

Red Oak/Spanish Oak trees

Symptoms are similar to those of the Live Oak trees. However, symp-toms are harder to find in these trees because of their deciduous nature. These trees are primary carriers of oak wilt, however, so if you suspect the problem, have a professional check



BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION **NOVEMBER 8, 1988**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general reve-

nue in the preceding biennium. The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from

the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will ap-

pear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT


House Joint Resolution 5 prooses a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture cap-ital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will ap pear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

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All of us are consumers, and as such are given certain protections under the Texas Deceptive Trade Practices - Consumer Protection Act. This was enacted during the 63rd Session of the Texas Legislature in 1973, to provide consumers with protection from false, misleading or deceptive trade practices. This applies whether we purchase goods or services as individuals or as businesses.

This Act makes it possible for a consumer to sue for damages, court costs and attorney's fees as a result of deceptive trade practices, as defined in the statute. Reasoning for such law was based on the recognition that the consumer should have access to a direct legal process when it was felt that he or she had been victimized by unfair business practices prohibited by law.

The Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's office, as well as District and County Attorneys, enforce this law; however, manufacturers, merchants and consumers can all benefit from an understanding of their rights under this Act. Amendments have been made to the original law in virtually every Legislative Session since its enactment, in an attempt to further define the original legislative intent.

Cases which have been tried under this statute include misrepresentation of merchandise or services and various violations of certain deceptive trade practices. One successful suit under the scope of this Act involved a certain group which had sold memberships on a door to door basis, but had misrepresented the memberships as a type of insurance. The defendants were also found in violation of the mandatory "three day cooling off period" provided by another Texas statute. Thus, this Act also adds additional enforcement measures to other existing

During the 70th Session of the Texas Legislature in 1987, the Joint Committee on Deceptive Trade Practices were formed. This Committee consists of three State Senators and three members of the public appointed by the Lt. Governor, and three State Representatives and three members of the public appointed by the Speaker of



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
