# Cisco Policemen Make \$14 Million Drug Bust

A burned-out headlight and two alert city policemen have resulted in what is believed to be the largest drug bust ever in Eastland County. It could represent some \$14 1/4 million worth of street-priced amphetamine, Cisco Police Chief Billy Raines reports.

Taken was some 40 to 50 pounds of "product" and the equipment capable of producing it, Chief Raines said.

It began Thursday night in Cisco on South Highway 6

(Conrad Hilton Ave.) when Cisco Patrolmen Larry Weikel and Don Wylie stopped a pickup because it had one headlight out. Upon examination they saw that there was a great deal of laboratory-type equipment in the back of the pickup. Soon an automobile drove up, and it too was seen to have lab equipment in it.

A 34-year-old Wichita Falls man and a couple from Vernon, he 36 and she 28, were taken into custody and

placed in Eastland County Jail. Charges of first degree felony were expected to be filed later in the day.

Samples of the material was immediately taken to Austin for chemical analysis.

Also taken into custody was some \$400 to \$500 in cash, glassware and laboratory equipment estimated value of some \$5,000.00.

One official guessed that there was enough equipment to set up as many as three

labs.

The patrolmen immediately brought in Chief Raines and assisting with the investigation was Commander Frank Cleveland and Skeet Wilbank of the Area Drug Task Force.

Also assisting were Criminal District Attorney Emory Walton and Deputy Sheriff Gene Russell. Walton expressed appreciation to the officers for their alert work.

## City Of Cisco To Keep Voluntary Water Conservation At This Time

The citizens of Cisco are to continue with their voluntary water conservation, it was decided at the last city council meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall.

City manager Mike Moore said even though there is no new water in the lake, voluntary water conservation will be the only action there is to be taken to cut back on the usage of water.

Moore told council members that the schools and everyone else is complying with the cutback. He said he hopes that next year the city won't wait so long to do something about the water shortage.

Moore said the West Central Texas Municipal Water District will begin a detailed study for alternate water sources. Council members approved a motion to be a part of this study.

Moore said if there is normal rainfall for Cisco for the next three years, then Cisco will do fine. But, he added, if there is another year like 1983, then Cisco will be hurting bad.

Moore told council members the Texas Water Development Board will have the study completed around October, 1989. He said there is not a short term water source answer available, but there is a permanent water solution for the city. He said it will be impossible to find water in a hurry.

Moore also said if anyone wants Cisco to grow, then the city will have to get water. He said the city will have to wait and see what the other cities in this area want to do and see what the cost of the water will be. Moore said there is no free water any

where.

In other matters, the council approved the motion made to pay their share of the cost of the West Central Texas Drug Task Force.

Moore told council members the share of all of Eastland County is \$5,325. He said Cisco's share is \$1,000. Moore said the Task Drug Force is the most effective force ever.

Council members approved the bid of \$306.00, by Jim Webb, to buy the house/structure at the City Landfill. The building will have to be moved.

The City of Cisco will also

accept bids for two vehicles owned by the city. One is a used sanitation truck and the other is the pick-up truck, driven by employee Frank Young.

Moore also gave council members a status report on the WTU Rate Case Appeal. Moore said Cisco was one of 13 cities in this suit.

A Travis County District Court Judge affirmed the Public Utilit Commission's order authorizing a rate increase for West Texas Utilities.

Moore said the law office that the 13 cities used for this case will need to decide

whether Cisco desires to pursue further appeals.

WTU has said they need the price rate to buy more gas, but it was brought out that WTU has a brand new coal-fired plant that the citizens have to pay for too.

Moore said he will let the council members know what the other cities will plan.

Attending the meeting were council members, John Muller, Bural Chambers, Olin Odum, III, Arlie Whitley and Allen Masters. Also attending were Mayor Joe Wheatley, City Manager Mike Moore and City Secretary Ginger Johnson.

## Ambulance Drive Is 638 Short

"Some day, somebody is going to die because an ambulance wasn't available, and then the public will know how important have them available is."

That's the recent comment of one citizen meeting with a group Thursday morning to evaluate the four-month drive to secure 1700 memberships for the emergency ambulance service Eastland and Cisco.

With the remainder of September to go, the drive is about two-thirds successful. The total at 1,062 members Thursday, having picked up 92 in last Saturday's blitz of the two towns. Cisco has received 429 members and Eastland, 633. That's 638 short of the 1,700 goal, which Tommy Patterson says is necessary for them to continue to operate here.

The memberships at \$36 each are not insurance policies, just support the availability.

Another spokesman said, "The public is going to pay for ambulance service in one way or another. If they don't pay for memberships in this manner, then tax increases will be necessary, and these will be subsidies for a service."

Memberships in the existing, highly efficient company is preferably to the tax-supported, establishment of a volunteer program to be administered by the county, cities, hospitals, and/or combinations of these, it was agreed by those present.

A lot of application forms are out, and hopefully these will come in sufficient numbers to top the goal before the Oct. 1 deadline.

If not? Then membership fees will be prorated and returned to those who have joined, it was pointed out.

It was also pointed out that a number have indicated that they want the services,

but they just can not afford it, so it is being suggested that ministers throughout this area make it a special point to mention the importance of ambulance availability, and congregations even perhaps help provide memberships for those who cannot afford the cost.

Individuals, firms and organizations might also consider the possibility of funding additional memberships for those who are truly in need of help.

M.H. Perry presided at the Thursday meeting and in attendance were Carol Patterson, Marsha Carr, Truitt Benn, John Berry, H.V. O'Brien, Randy Roper, J.T. Wright, Mike Moore, Charles Escue, Joe Wheatley, Dan Staggs and Mary Ann McCloud.

Mr. Perry will appoint a committee to continue to work with the Pattersons to work out and achieve the goal, and sustain the service.

## Small Crowd Attends "Schools Without Drugs" Program Held Last Tuesday

A small crowd attended the "Schools Without Drugs" program held last Tuesday at the First United Methodist Church. The program was held to help find ways to rid the Cisco schools of illegal drugs.

A booklet was given out at the meeting entitled "What

Works: Schools Without Drugs." The booklet is from the U.S. Department of Education.

The booklet had a quote from John Van DeKemp, the California Attorney General. He said, "It is a sad and sobering reality that trying drugs is no longer the excep-

tion among high school students. It is the norm."

The booklet said the foremost responsibility of any society is to nurture and protect its children. In America, today, the most serious threat to the health and well-being of the children here is drug use.

Drug use by the young is a growing crisis.

Detective with the Cisco Police Department, Adrian Huddleston, who was at the meeting, said he feels as though a program of this nature, will be the best deterrent to drug use. He said the ones that this program will have the most impact on will be the students from the 4th grade and down.

He said he believes that education is going to be an important way to reduce the drug problem in Cisco.

Another fact brought out at the meeting, was that another problem is the American and local court systems that will not give a criminal drug user stiffer penalties. Juries will not give stiff enough prison sentences and when they do, if someone is sent to a state prison, they are only required to serve 19 days for each year of prison time. This is due to the overcrowding of the prison system.

But, the major reason a city and school has a drug problem is the apathy of the citizens of a town. A question brought out at the meeting was, "Is there only a half dozen people in Cisco who want to help clean this town of drugs?" That's only how many people attended the meeting.

It was brought out that if Cisco does not fight, to rid the town of the drug dealers, then Cisco will become the home of the drug dealers who were run out of other towns. It can be done, but it will take hard work. One section of the booklet entitled, "Teaching About Drug Prevention," recommended that teachers, parents and involved citizens should implement a comprehensive drug prevention curriculum from kindergarten through grade 12, teaching that drug use is wrong and harmful and supporting and strengthening resistance to drugs.

Anyone can receive the free booklet and are urged to do so. They may call the toll-free number, 1-800-624-0100, or send their name and address to: Schools Without Drugs, Pueblo, CO. 81009. It was recommended that every parent, teacher and concerned citizen become knowledgeable about drugs and signs of drug use. And, when symptoms are observed, respond promptly.

Mexican Corn Bread is delicious with red beans/salad for a super quick supper! Try this recipe!

**MEXICAN CORN BREAD**  
1/2 lb. ground beef  
1 cup yellow cornmeal  
2 eggs beaten  
1 cup milk  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 16 oz. can cream-style corn

1/4 cup bacon drippings  
1/2 lb. grated Cheddar cheese  
1 lg. onion, chipped  
4 jalapeno peppers, chopped

Brown ground beef in skillet, stirring until crumbly

Combine next 7 ingredients in bowl, mixing well.

Pour half the batter into hot greased skillet.

Sprinkle cheese, ground beef, onion peppers over batter.

Top with remaining batter

# Gordon Spot

By DeMarquis Gordon, County Agent—

In conjunction with national Farm Safety Week, Gov. William P. Clements, Jr. has proclaimed the week of September 18-24, as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Week.

This year's theme, "Ensure Your Future with Farm Safety," stresses the hazards involved with agricultural production and the effort into preventing injury and illness on the farm, especially during times of economic stress.

Each year this event is observed to initiate and promote safety on Texas Farms and ranches. About 100 Texas fatalities result from farm and ranch related accidents each year, and an estimated 10,000 disabling injuries and 100,000 injuries requiring medical attention occur annually.

According to National Safety Council figures, most fatalities are caused by (in descending order) tractors, firearms, drowning, burns, falls, electrical shock and machinery. During the past 10 years, rural fatalities have been reduced by 50 percent due to increased awareness and improved safety design. Some 1,600 farm deaths were estimated for 1987.

Most agricultural accidents and work illnesses can be prevented at little or no expense. For instance, safety features on farm equipment and machinery should be maintained and repaired when needed. These precautions and the use of safe work procedures can reduce the needless suffering of rural accident victims and prevent the financial burden

of agricultural accidents on productivity and family income.

Farm safety must be practiced every day—it's not a seasonal thing or something to be taken lightly. So, safety reminders such as the following should be taken seriously.

—Plan to prevent accidents and occupational illnesses, and incorporate preventive measures into every activity. Safety is good business.

—Be fit and ready for a safe day. Dress properly for the job and weather. Avoid hazardous work when you aren't feeling well or taking strong medications. Take work breaks to stay alert. If you drink, save it for after work.

—Always read operators' manuals and product labels, and carefully follow their suggestions on proper and safe use and maintenance. Make sure family and employed workers do so, too.

—Use personal protective equipment, such as hard hats, respirators, safety shoes and safety goggles, when the job or working conditions call for them.

—Train help well for every job. Assign young workers only those chores or jobs they can accomplish safely.

—Keep children and non-workers out of the work area. Don't let kids ride on farm equipment.

—If your tractor has roll-over protective structures (ROPS), wear your safety belt; if it doesn't, consider installing ROPS if

available for your model.

—Watch what you are doing and where you are going. Inattention is a leading cause of accidents.

—Keep shields on equipment when operating. Shut off the power before unclogging any machine or attending to operating problems.

—When applying pesticides or herbicides, follow label directions to the letter, and wear appropriate protective gear. Post treated areas. To avoid posing a hazard to the environment or others, safely dispose of empty and leftovers; seek expert advice if necessary.

—When on public roads with either a motor vehicle or farm machine, drive with care and obey all traffic laws. Buckle your safety belt.

—Inspect all equipment and facilities periodically. Correct hazards and make needed repairs, without delay.

—Exercise care at home and during recreation. Protect children and elderly family members and friends from accidents.

The title then becomes the most important item to be considered when purchase of real property is contemplated. 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### STATE SERVES CHILDREN'S SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

Texas has the second largest handicapped student population in the nation, serving approximately 370,000 students in special education programs. Every handicapped child is entitled to what the federal law calls a "free, appropriate public education."

According to Eugene Lenz in the special education programs division at the Texas Education Agency, a child is eligible for special education classes if he or she has a physical, mental or emotional handicap that requires special services in place of or in addition to instruction in the regular classroom.

Before a child is placed in a special education class, the child must be referred for diagnosis by a parent, teacher or other person. State law requires a school district to diagnose a child within 60 days of the referral.

The child is diagnosed with a battery of tests which may include an IQ and achievement tests.

When the testing is completed, a committee made up of the parents, a school principal or other administrator, a teacher, a representative of the assessment team and a representative of special education meets to decide if the child needs special education and design an appropriate educational program to meet the student's individual needs. This committee is called the admissions, review and dismissal (ARD) Committee.

In Texas, there are more than 350 special education programs which consist of single district programs and cooperatives. Cooperatives (co-ops) are formed by smaller rural districts so they are able to offer a comprehensive service system to their eligible students.

Each eligible child has his or her own individual program designed by the ARD committee and is called an Individual Educational Plan (IEP).

The IEP identifies that child's specific needs, states the amount of time a child will spend in special education classes, sets goals and objectives and establishes criteria and timeline for accomplishing those goals.

"The IEP is that child's educational road map," says Joan Shirley, an education specialist in the division of special education programs at the Texas Education Agency. "By law, the child's IEP must be reviewed twice annually to see if progress is being made."

Shirley says special education classes are more intensive than regular education classes, often involving reduced teacher/student ratios for individualized instruction, and must be taught by a certified special education instructor.

Instructional arrangements vary, but Lenz says 70 percent of the children in special education in Texas attend classes in what are called "resource rooms." The student spends less than half a day in the room and receives individualized instruction from a special education teacher.

Children with all kinds of handicaps may qualify of special education in Texas. These handicaps include deafness, blindness, mental retardation, speech handicaps, learning disabilities, orthopedic handicaps, autism, and emotional handicaps. Students handicaps range in severity from mild to profound.

Officials with the TEA say there is a critical need for certified special education teachers throughout the state. It is estimated that Texas universities produce approximately 400 fewer teachers than are needed to serve special education students.

A recent major change in the education of the handicapped is in the way residents of the State schools for the Mentally Retarded are educated. In 1985, a federal court ruled that separating residents of the state schools from their nonhandicapped peers in the public schools deprives these children of an equal education. Since then, more than 500 residents of the state schools, many of them multi-handicapped and wheelchair-bound, have been transported to and from their local public schools.

Ken Crow, director of interagency coordination for the handicapped at the Texas Education Agency, says this "deinstitutionalization," as it is called, is the largest of its kind in the nation.

"Research has proven that if you segregate these children you tend to make them more handicapped," he said. "By educating them with their non-handicapped peers, we are helping them to cope with the transition into the adult world."

## Mike Moore Talks About Water Situation In Cisco

"Water will be hard to find, and it's going to be expensive when it is found," said Mike Moore, city manager, at the regular meeting of the Cisco Rotary Club held last Thursday at the White Elephant Restaurant.

Moore said the city of Cisco is making headway about the steps forward to find the water, but it's going to be long while yet.

Cisco will be taking part of a detailed water study along with 17 other Texas counties. Moore said the total cost of the study is \$250,000. He said Cisco's cost will be \$30,000. The state of Texas will pay half of the cost.

Cisco is looking at three sources of water, Moore said. He said the water study is being held to find a long term water source for this

area. He said, "I assure you, whatever route we take, it's going to be expensive." He said the study will be finished in one year.

He said it will take a long time to turn the valve on for the new water, maybe up to five years, but this is for the present citizens, their children and their grandchildren.

He said if Cisco has normal rainfall from now on, there will not be a need for an alternate water source, but if there is another year like 1983, then Cisco will be really be hurting.

Standee McCracken was in charge of the meeting. James Cotton gave the invocation at the meeting. Otto Urban presided over the meeting and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Attendance was at 90 percent this week and 85 percent last week. Jerry Morgan will be in charge of next week's meeting and the club assembly will be held on September 29. Marvin Cole was a guest.
