Clyde Crum Speaks To Cisco CofC Breakfast

Clyde Crum, guest speaker for the Cisco Chamber of Commerce quarterly breakfast held last Wednesday morning at the Ranch House, said everyone needs to live their life more consciously now. He said successful people live consciously, not in their unconscious.

He said everyone has a handicap because they don't have confidence. He said commercials now say that everything is immediate and everyone should be pretty, slim and good looking.

He said in reality no one has to worry about anything.

He said there is someone who has more control over everything than humans do. He said he is talking about God and everyone needs to get on their knees sometimes and give Him all the control.

Crum said if someone wants to succeed they need to learn to really care for people. He said if someone has not seen one of their friends in quite awhile then they need to call them. He said the most valuable things in life are learned from people who really care about them.

He gave three principals that are different between a

successful person and an unsuccessful person. He said the principals are skills possessed, usage of time and persistent action.

He said the successful person did not only learn everything from experience. He urged everyone to use technology not just experience.

There was a good crowd at the breakfast and everyone enjoyed the talk from Mr. Crum. It was said that Mr. Crum might be available for a day long seminar for this area if there is enough interest for this type of program.

Fall Enrollment Is Record At All Cisco Junior Colleges

Cisco Junior College's enrollment for the current fall semester has reached record levels. The school is serving an all-time record enrollment of 1,971. This is an increase of some 13 percent over the total head count of the fall of 1987. "The last high enrollment was 1,861 in the fall of 1985," reported Olin Odom, director of admissions and records at CJC.

The enrollment on the Cisco campus reached 742 which is the largest enrollment since 1976. This is a 13.45 percent increase over the fall of 1987. Dr. John Muller, dean of students, reports that "dormitory students are about the same as last fall. Therefore, the increase is attributed to more area students getting their education locally."

The enrollment at the Clyde campus reached an all time high of 583. This is an increase of 86 students or 17.30 percent over the fall of 1987. The Clyde campus offers general academic courses.

The enrollment at the Abilene campus is 639. This is an increase of 2.84 percent over the fall of 1987. In Abilene, CJC offers vocational-technical courses, including some offerings at Dyess Air Force Base. Carroll Scott, CJC vice president and dean of the Abilene campus, says, "I am very pleased with the continued interest in our offerings in Abilene. CJC is proud of its serving the educational needs of the area."

The CJC enrollment total includes students enrolled in Coleman this semester. Clois

Purvis, dean of instruction at CJC, is very encouraged by the response to the classes in Coleman. Purvis says, "We have every indication that this new area will grow."

"I have every confidence that this record enrollment is our students' acknowledgement of the offerings at Cisco Junior College," concludes CJC President Dr. Roger C. Schustereit. "It is a tribute to our faculty, administration, and staff and to the leadership of the Board of Regents."

"55/Alive/Mature Driving Course To Be Given By AARP

A "55 Alive/Mature Driving" course will be conducted by the AARP Tuesday, Oct. 4, and Thursday, Oct. 6, in the Senior Citizen Center, according to an announcement.

Bob Bevers will be instructor, and cost will be \$7. Sessions will be from 8 a.m. until 12 noon both days.

55 Alive/Mature Driving consists of eight hours of classroom instructions that refine existing skills and develop safe, defensive driving techniques. Produced by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) and conducted throughout the country in two half-day sessions 55 Alive teaches

preventive measures to use when driving that save lives. The course is conducted by a nationwide network of trained volunteer instructors, numbering in the thousands, who are concerned about safety on the road. AARP provides the program and its materials, and the instructions. It is an opportunity to help peers handle adverse driving conditions and traffic hazards, in addition to learning about the effects of aging and medications on driving.

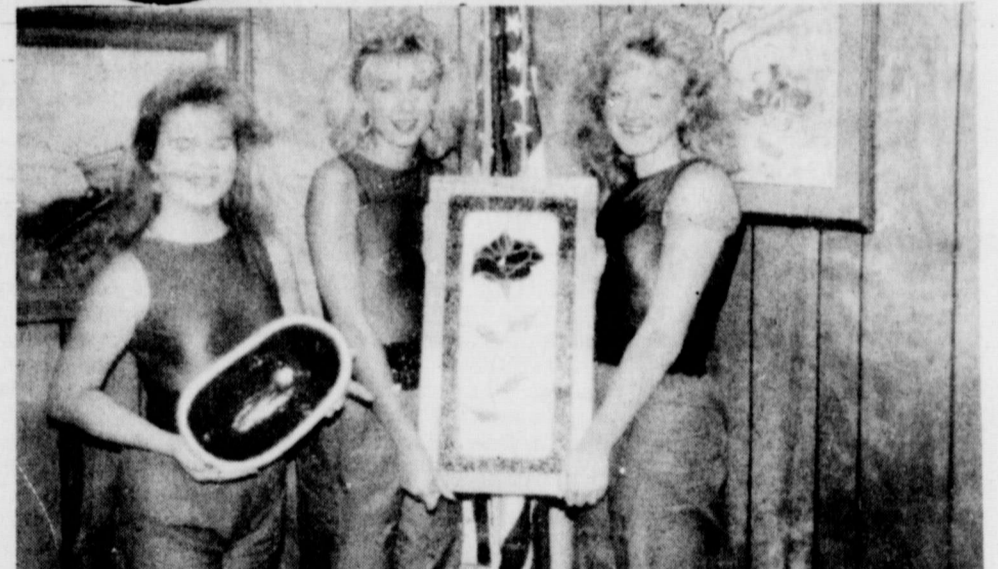

Pharmacy Topics

Some traits of Down's syndrome can be spotted in ultrasound imaging, alerting doctor and mother-to-be to the need for further testing, a radiologist at Harvard Medical School has found.

Ideally, flu shots should be given by November each year, the Public Health Service recommends. Even later shots will be effective, however, and should not be neglected if earlier deadlines are missed.

Researchers at the University of Alabama have trained rats to respond to a certain odor with increased production of interferon. In time, they hope to enable people to do the same thing.

Preliminary research at the Louisiana State Eye Center in New Orleans suggests that zinc may halt the progress of macular degeneration. Because the mineral can have dangerous side effects, many doctors are using caution in recommending zinc to their patients.

If parents are allergic to foods, infants should not be fed allergenic foods, nor should breast-feeding mothers take them, according to a review in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

Peanut Tour To Be Sept. 27

All peanut growers in Eastland County are urged to attend a peanut demonstration tour Tuesday, September 27th, says DeMarquis Gordon, Eastland County Extension Agent. Two important peanut disease control demonstrations will be seen. The tour will begin at 9:00 a.m. at Lynn Hagan's farm

We all know that auction barns, packers, feedyards, and dealer/order buyers are collecting the checkoff dollar. But, did you also know that every individual who buys at private treaty is responsible for collecting the \$1 per head assessment? That's right, and these are the steps to take to collect the dollar.

The purchaser (buyer) collects the dollar from the producer (seller) and remits it to the Texas Beef Industry Council. The correct procedure for this is for the buyer to deduct \$1 per head on the bill of sale, therefore "collecting" the dollars. It is the seller's responsibility to see that the buyer checks off the dollar. Then the buyer

sends These "collected" dollars to the Texas Beef Industry Council. All dollars collected within one month can be sent in on one remittance form, however they must be sent in by the 15th of the following month. Monthly remittance forms can be obtained from your County Extension office or simply call the Texas Beef Industry Council, (512) 345-3531.

Fall armyworms have already been found in some parts of Texas and if left uncontrolled, they can wipe out entire lawns and cause heavy damage to pastures.

While fall armyworms have been light this year, the pests often increase following a local or general rain. They prefer to feed on well-

fertilized lawns and other lush grasses.

Frequent and careful inspections are necessary to locate infestations before extensive damage occurs. Control measures are most effective against young larvae (worms).

Fall armyworm adults are ash gray moths with mottled forewings which have irregular white or light gray spots near the tip. They lay batches of white eggs on foliage which hatch in about five days. Young larvae are light green with black heads. They become darker green as they grow older and can devour forages and lawn grasses.

Larvae are about 1 1/2 inches long at maturity and light gray to almost black in color with several light stripes along the body. The front of the worm's head is marked with an inverted

white "Y".

Worms are full grown in two to three weeks and then burrow an inch or two into the soil to pupate. Moths emerge 10 days to two weeks later and the cycle repeats. There may be as many as six generations a year, and it's common to find various sizes of larvae infesting pastures at any one time.

Pesticides labeled for control of fall armyworms in lawns are carbaryl (Sevin 80 percent wettable powder and Sevin XLR), malathion, diazinon (Spectracide), Dylox and various products containing Bacillus thuringiensis.

Use sufficient water for complete coverage. Also, read the insecticide label for rates and follow all directions, instructions and restrictions.

LOW-E WINDOWS - ARE THEY WORTH IT?

Low-E windows are double paned windows that absorb and transmit heat more slowly than conventional windows. Low-E stand for "low emissivity", meaning light can be transmitted while heat is reflected away.

Low-E windows typically have a low-emissivity film between two window panes of a thermopane window on the pane next to the inside of the house. They cut about a third of the heat loss during the winter in old parts of the country. But what about air conditioning costs?

The typical low-E windows will not cut air conditioning costs in warm climates. However, one company does make a low-E window with the coating between the panes, but on the pane next

to the outside of the house. This type of low-E window will save four times as much energy during air-conditioning in homes.

One side benefit of low-E windows is that they reduce ultraviolet radiation from the sun which is damaging to some materials and dyes. However, before you consider buying low-E windows find out how much more they will cost than regular window and consider whether the expense will be worth it for your climate.

RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

From visiting with women in the county, pears and apples are in great abundance. For something different and sounds delicious, try this recipe for a very moist Chocolate-Apple Cake. This is a cake that will freeze very well.

CHOCOLATE-APPLE CAKE

- 2 1/2 cups unsifted flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 2/3 cup unsweetened cocoa
- 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup cooking oil
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups shredded tart apples, drained (see note)

CHOCOLATE GLAZE

Melt 2 tablespoons butter in small saucepan over low heat; add 2 tablespoons unsweetened cocoa and 2 tablespoons water, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Do not boil. Remove from heat. Gradually beat in 1 cup confectioners' sugar and 1/2 teaspoon vanilla until smooth and of glazing consistency. Add additional water, 1/2 teaspoon at a time, if needed.

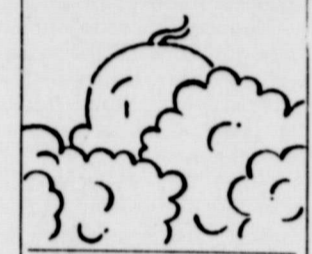

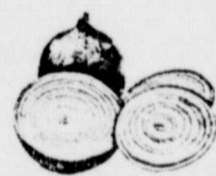
