City Manager Mike Moore Attends Meeting

Commissioners Approve Line On Road

Eastland County Commissioners found a lot of county business waiting when they met Monday. All Commissioners were present, with County Judge Scott Bailey presiding.

This was the last meeting of the fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30. The 1989 budget will go into effect on Oct. 1.

Ray Pruitt, County Auditor, asked for permission to adjust some line items in various Departments, so that the available money would cover items that were over the budget. Indications were that a number of those existed. The Commissioners approved this request.

Mike Moore, City Cisco Manager, requested permission to cross County Road 103 in Pct. 4 with a water line. He explained that this road was north of the city near the Fee property. He said the City would need to cut the road, but would repave it immediately. The Commissioners approved his request.

Jesse Jones, representing Paladin Geophysical for Pitcock, Inc. requested permission to run a Vibroseis Line along certain roads south to north in the County. They would be looking for structures likely to hold oil or gas. This request was approved.

On other road matters, Billy Bacon, Commissioner of Pct. 4, said the Court ought to "do something" about Companies which run plastic pipelines illegally under bridges on county roads. He suggested that they be fined \$500 if these lines are not removed. He said these plastic lines are very dangerous - they could blow up a while bridge.

Hilton Community Center To Have "Christmas Market"

The Hilton Community Center in Cisco will be sponsoring a "Christmas Market at the Hilton" on November 19-20, 1988. This event is intended to give persons an opportunity to have a local market, at a reasonable participation fee. Each booth will be \$15. The exhibitor will be expected to provide his own table (no longer than eight feet) and display equipment. There will be a

Bacon listed about six such lines, four in Pct. 4 and two in Pct. 1. At least three oil companies were responsible, he said. He told of one six-inch plastic line under a bridge near Scranton.

The Commissioners requested that District Attorney Emory Walton take the necessary steps to bring the oil companies into compliance with state laws.

The Commissioners gave further consideration for the removal of buildings located on the property immediately north of the County Jail. The bid was awarded to Eaton House movers of Olden, who will do the work for \$5,545 - and keep all salvage. Bacon made a motion to accept the bid, with a second by Norman Christian, Comm. of Pct. 2. Richard Robinson, Comm. of Pct. 1, also voted for the motion. L.T. Owen, Comm. of Pct. 3, abstained.

Billy Bacon reported that 26 prisoners were currently in the County Jail. Five were sentenced and due to be sent to the Texas Department of Corrections Monday.

Judge Scott Bailey told the Court that a modified ruling had been made recently by the Texas Jail Standards Commission, exempting overpopulation in a jail in cases where inmates had been sentenced and were awaiting space in TDC.

Jean White, Secretary for Judge Bailey and the Court, brought in what appeared to be quite a few bills for Indigent Health Care. She mentioned the largest bill, one for \$1,018 from Humana Hospital for the care of one of the jail prisoners. She explained that Indi-

gent Health Care does not pay 100 percent of these bills.

On another matter, Mrs. John Rodgers asked the Court if it could be of any help on the collection of a bill for secretarial services.

She explained that she had worked for a local attorney, Steve Davis, who had been court-appointed to defend Barbara Williams in the recent Organized Crime Trial.

On July 30 she learned that her employer had been indicted by a Federal Jury in Fort Worth for allegedly falsifying documents for immigration. She left her job at that time, but stated that she was not paid for the last week she worked for the Attorney. She listed the amount owed as \$244.

She has filed in case in the JP Court, Precinct 1, and this will be heard by Judge Bush on Friday of this week. Davis has filed an answer saying that he does not owe Mrs. Rodgers anything.

Mrs. Rodgers indicated she was hoping for a garnishment on what the County owed Davis.

The Commissioners referred her to District Attorney Emory Walton. After consultation it was reported that the Commissioners "could not do a thing" about this problem, and Mrs. Rodgers would need to wait for the outcome of Fridays' hearing.

On an unrelated situation, J.D. Griffin told the Commissioners that a bad problem existed on his land south of the Leon River south of Eastland. He said that in 1972-73 he paid to get a spring on his land dammed up and the water way fixed.

Bob R. Simpson has applied to the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to inject fluid into a formation which is productive of oil or gas.



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Childhood Cancer Awareness Month

The American Cancer Society has announced that Governor Bill Clements has declared September "Childhood Cancer Awareness Month" in the state of Texas.

Childhood cancer is the number one medical cause of death in children under the age of 14. Every year in the United States, 8,000 new cases of cancer are discovered in children. "The most important thing for people to understand is that the majority of childhood cancers are curable. People should not ignore signs of poor health in children, out of fear of detection of cancer," said Larry Frankel, M.D., of Temple, Chairman of the American Cancer Society Childhood Cancer Committee.

The cure rate for children with cancer has increased from near zero 30 years ago to over 50 percent today. Some childhood cancers can even be cured in 90 percent of the cases.

Texas is one of the leading centers in the United States for research into the treatment of childhood cancer.

The American Cancer Society reminds us that the

eight warning signs of childhood cancer are:

1. Continued, unexplained weight loss.
2. Headaches with vomiting in the morning.
3. Increased swelling or persistent pain in bones or joints.
4. Lump or mass in abdomen, neck or elsewhere.
5. Development of a whitish appearance in the pupil of the eye.
6. Recurrent fevers not due to infections.
7. Excessive bruising or bleeding.
8. Noticeable paleness or prolonged tiredness.

"The signs of cancer in adults are not the same warning signs for children," said Dr. Frankel. "Parents should be aware of cancer warning signs, but not any one of the signs necessarily means that a child has cancer."

"The public needs to be aware that there is help available for children who have cancer and their families through the American Cancer Society," said Frankel. "Children are the future, don't ignore any signs of potential health problems."



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

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Questions Answered To "What Is P.C.S.?"

In response to questions that have been raised concerning the Pregnancy Counseling Service of Abilene, Mrs. Celia Shackelford of Cisco consented to answer the following questions. Celia has been a volunteer counselor for P.C.S. for the past one and one-half years and was recently appointed to the seven-member Board of Directors.

Question: Celia, what is the purpose of P.C.S.?

Answer: The primary purpose is to save the lives of unborn babies. We attempt to educate those coming to us that life begins at conception and that there are alternatives to abortion.

Question: How to you approach the situation?

Answer: I try to be extremely sensitive to a woman who comes in desiring to end what she considers a troublesome pregnancy. A woman often does not know she is carrying a tiny human being in her womb. We have many pictures and films showing the growth and development of the pre-born child, as well as those depicting the various methods of abortion, all of which are hurtful, hideous and cruel, often ending in danger to the mother.

Question: What are some of the hurts and dangers?

Answer: The dangers are both psychological and physical. In a 15-year study conducted since the Roe vs. Wade ruling, reliable data have established that there is a higher rate of suicide among women who have had abortions than those who have not. Women undergoing abortions later testify to suffering guilt, depression, anxiety, and a tremendous sense of loss, often producing a nervous breakdown. Physically, sterility, frequent miscarriages, stillbirths, and more tubal pregnancies than average, and some times needed surgical procedures to correct botched abortions occur.

Question: Celia, what would you say then are the benefits of P.C.S.?

Answer: As I said before, the purpose is to save the lives of unborn babies. We hold out alternatives to abortion, putting those who desire to know in touch with adoption agencies. We direct these women - and among them young teenagers - to medical and also financial resources to help them through their pregnancies. We inform them that there

are maternity clothes, donations for formulas and baby food, diapers, and baby clothes available.

Question: How is P.C.S. funded and who composed the Board of Directors?

Answer: P.C.S. is funded strictly by donations and is composed of a dedicated, interdenominational group made up of individuals from a housewife to a university professor, all united to save the life of an unborn child and bring the mother to a decision she and her child can live with the rest of their lives.

Question: Statistically, what records do you have to justify this weekly expen-

sure of time and effort?

Answer: In 1987, we had 1,936 consultations, some of those repeats, with most coming from the 20-25 years age group. Sixty percent of those coming who originally stated they were undecided or were for abortion decided against abortion after receiving counsel.

Question: Celia, what motivated you to give one day a week in your busy schedule for P.C.S.?

Answer: I have been an LVN since 1969, and, as a member of the helping profession, I am interested in people of all ages. I have a deep love for children. I know all things that are legal

TEXAS AND THE LEGISLATURE

Texas Task Force on Waste Management Policy

We in the Texas Legislature continue to receive information from our constituents regarding problems they are encountering with solid waste in their communities. The need for additional capacity, and the impact of this situation on our environment, led to the creation of an interim study group.

Of concern, also, are the potential dangers with the transportation of waste, such as can occur with the derailment of a train carrying hazardous materials.

Additionally, the extensions under the Hazardous and Solid Waste Amendments to the Federal Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976 expire August 31, 1989. If there are not further extensions nor changes in the Federal law, burning of waste at landfills will no longer be allowed after that date.

During the 70th Session of the Texas Legislature, the Texas Task Force on Waste

management Policy was established. The purpose of this interim committee is to examine State policies that affect the siting of hazardous and other solid waste treatment, storage and disposal facilities and the transportation of those waste materials.

The membership consists of members: four Senators and three citizen members appointed by the Lt. Governor; four Representatives and three citizen members appointed by the Speaker of the House; three citizen members appointed by the Governor; and three ex-officio member, Board Chairman of the Texas Air Control Board, Chairman of the Texas Water Commission and Chairman of the Texas Department of Health.

Several subcommittees were formed, and they held public hearings across the State. These members have prepared preliminary recommendations, which will be submitted for approval at the Committee's final meeting, set in Austin for October 7, 1988. The final recommen-

packaging by the Texas Department of Health to identify problems which are detrimental to the environment;

- pursuit of the development of markets for recycled materials by the Texas Department of Commerce;
- and specific definitions regarding used tires and guidelines for facilities which receive them.

Areas reviewed by the Subcommittee on Hazardous and Industrial Waste include:

- possible formation of a separate waste reduction/minimization group within the Hazardous and Solid Waste Management Division of the Texas Water Commission;
- Establishment of an advisory committee to work with the Texas Water Commission in establishing effective implementation for public policy;
- incentives for local governments which install capital equipment to reduce hazardous waste generation or recycle waste materials;
- inclusion of specific rules regarding the location of incinerators;
- amending the Texas Solid Waste Disposal Act and the Texas Injection Well Act to insure thorough and timely review of permit applications for facilities which meet applicable statutory and regulatory provisions;
- enforcement of regulations through frequent hazardous waste facility inspections;
- and various aspects of the State Superfund activities and sites.

We Texans are proud of our State, and campaigns such as "Don't Mess With Texas" are achieving noticeable results in the reduction of litter. Public awareness of waste management, and the cooperation of our citizens is such management, is essential for the protection of public health and our environment. Working together, we can achieve this goal.

Victims' Children File Suit

A New Mexico couple's children have filed a wrongful death suit in 91st District Court. The couple was killed east of Ranger on Interstate 20 during May.

Charles and Shirley Hensley's children, Eric David Hensley of Fort Worth and Cynthia Olevera are seeking \$30 million from Robert Truitt of Artesia, N.M.

The Hensley couple's pickup truck was struck from the rear by Truitt's car while both vehicles were east-bound on Ranger Hill on May 27.

Robert A. Cattanach, attorney for the Hensley brother and sister, said Truitt was guilty of several violations. Among these are excessive speed, driving carelessly and recklessly, and failing to apply brakes.

Truitt is also accused of failing to keep a proper distance from the other vehicle, failure to yield the right of way, failure to keep his car under reasonable control and failure to obey the Texas Alcoholic Consumption law.

In a response to the suit, W.L. Burke Jr. of Abilene, Truitt's attorney, denied each allegation and accused the Hensleys of being negligent.

Truitt has been indicted on two counts of involuntary manslaughter by a 91st District Grand Jury.

To be able to accomplish this, the following had to happen and timing is most important:

1. It started in 1941 when someone decided that all Medical Schools be placed on a War Time Basis (All Medical Schools be 3 years, all Internships be 9 months.)

2. Use the V.A. for Residency Training and use the old Medical School Faculty which had returned from the War.

3. Englarge the Medical Schools to take more students, and use a full time faculty. Slowly replace the professional Practicing Doctor with a full time Academic one.

4. Use Government money to build new Academic Hospitals, and then drop the V.A.
5. You now have full time Academic Professors, (on salary) who have never Practiced medicine, teach young Doctors how to Practice Medicine.

6. Infiltrate all State and Federal Agencies with Academic Advisory Boards.

7. From Chancellor's Councils, Presidents Clubs, for all Universities and Medical Schools. Cost 10 - 15 Thousand Dollars to be a member. (Status and Political Power)

8. Infiltrate State and National Medical Associations, and place Academic Mem-

bers in the positions to control Policy.

9. Have Hospitals (501-C-3, Tax Exempt) build office buildings for Academics to do "Private Practice".

10. Neutralize State and National Medical Associations. Establish The American Board of Medical Specialties. With this you have 12% the Academic Physicians telling the 88% what to do. With the cooperation of the American Hospital Association, you are now ready for your Master Plan.

11. The Academic Ultimate Plan is to have Non-profit University Hospitals, General Hospitals and Satellite (Regional) Hospitals - but to do this you must destroy the small Private Hospitals, and all of the Rural Hospitals. Private Hospitals pay taxes.

12. To have absolute control you must use Academic Advisory Boards in the Federal Government to help destroy the Private Practice of Medicine and the Rural Hospitals. The vehicle for this is HHS - HCFA. Have HCFA reduce the fees paid for procedures in Rural Hospitals and not Academic Hospitals. This will bankrupt most Rural Hospitals. Have HCFA, on the advice of Academic Advisory Boards of HCFA, refuse to pay for procedures not approved by the American Board of Medical Specialties.

13. Advisory Boards in Congress now are studying "Relative Value" pay for physicians - they want an

Academic Board to determine the fee a physician would be paid and not the free market.

The stage is now set: Academia now has control over Congress, Executive Branch, and the Practicing Physicians of America. They will have become so entrenched that regardless of the Party in Power, they are The Academic Bureaucracy, a dangerous thing for Democracy. All Federal and State Advisory Board should be 50% "Hands-On" Practicing Professionals - including the Chairman.

TEAMS EXAMS TEST BASIC SKILLS

For the fourth consecutive year, students in all odd-numbered grades in Texas public schools will be given statewide examinations to determine their progress in mastering the basic skills of reading, writing and mathematics.

The Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) testing program was mandated by education reforms passed by the Texas Legislature in 1984. TEAMS tests cover the basic skills of students in grades 1,3,5,7,9 and 11, with the eleventh grade test serving as an exit-level exam which students must pass in order to receive a diploma.

The TEAMS testing schedule for the 1988-89 school year calls for exit-level exam (which consists of two parts, English language arts and mathematics) to be administered October 25 and 26 and again on May 2 and 3. Students have four opportunities to pass the exam, beginning in their junior year.

The exam for grades 3,5,7 and 9 will be administered between February 6 and 17, while the first grade exams will be given between April 3 and 14. School districts can choose any days between those dates to give the examinations.

Although high school students must pass the exit-level test in order to be eligible to receive a diploma, passing scores on the tests in other grades are not required for promotion, says Keith Cruse, director of student assessment for the Texas Education Agency.

"There is some misconception about passing requirements for the tests at grades 1,3,5,7, and 9," Cruse says. "There are no penalties for not answering a certain number of questions correctly. The purpose of the tests is to gather information about how well students are mastering the basic skills."

Parents can learn how their child performed on TEAMS from the TEAMS Confidential Student Report, a standard report sent to all school district. The report shows how many objectives a student mastered on each section of the test (mathematics, reading and writing), the total number of questions answered correctly on each section, and the scaled score for each section. Another section shows whether the student demonstrated mastery of the minimum competencies for that particular grade level on each section of the exam.

"By State Board of Education rule, the school district must send home to the parents information on mastery of specific objectives, how many questions the student answered correctly and the score on the writing test," Cruse said.

Cruse adds that the best way for parents to help their children prepare for the TEAMS test is to ensure they get adequate rest and understand the purpose of the test.

"Be sure that they get a good night's sleep and understand that the purpose of the test is to help with the student's instructional program," Cruse said.

Some traits of Down's syndrome can be spotted in ultrasound imaging, alerting doctor and mother-to-be to the need for further testing, a radiologist at Harvard Medical School has found.

Ideally, flu shots should be given by November each year, the Public Health Service recommends. Even later shots will be effective, however, and should not be neglected if earlier deadlines are missed.

Researchers at the University of Alabama have trained rats to respond to a certain odor with increased production of interferon. In time, they hope to enable people to do the same thing.

Preliminary research at the Louisiana State Eye Center in New Orleans suggests that zinc may halt the progress of macular degeneration. Because the mineral can have dangerous side effects, many doctors are using caution in recommending zinc to their patients.

If parents are allergic to foods, infants should not be fed allergenic foods, nor should breast-feeding mothers take them, according to a review in the Journal of the American Medical Association.

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
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
