

Property To Be Seized For Taxes their outgo is more than

City of Cisco council members discussed the policy regarding tax warrants and seizures for delinquent property taxes at their last meeting held last Tuesday at City Hall.

Mike Moore, city manager, told the mayor and council members that personal tax accounts owing the larger amounts of delinquent taxes, or accounts that are delinquent for multiple years will receive priority in the seizure proceedings.

Moore gave each council member a policy list for initiating and pursuing the issuing tax warrants. He said any personal property tax account that is delinquent for a minimum of two years are subject to seizure of personal property. He added that if any personal property tax account, current or delinquent, is in danger of the owner moving, impending bankruptcy, or foreclosure, then they are subject to seizure within the provisions of the Texas Property Tax Code and the City of Cisco policy

Moore said the owners of the delinquent accounts who will have their property seized, will also have to pay an added 15 per cent of their delinquent taxes total for lawyer fees. Moore said he is very serious about this action. He said the City of Cisco will get 100 percent of the past due taxes.

The tax warrant policy states that if the property is seized and the owner still refuses to pay taxes and costs owed, then appropriate notices will be provided and the seized property sold to

recover delinquent taxes. Moore said property owners will not be surprised about having their property

seized. He said they have been notified about their past due taxes several times and they have ignored the notices.

Moore said the city will mail out this year's tax statements to citizens by October 15. He said this way citizens can take an opportunity to pay early and not have to pay for a late charge.

In other matters city manager Moore told the council members that the street seal coating is still going strong. He said the city has seal coated 75-76 blocks this season. Moore said this is the biggest number of streets the city has ever done in this amount of time in years. And, he added, the city has had to work with a smaller amount of employees.

Moore told the council during the city manager's report that he has called Bob Bullock, tax comptroller, at Austin and talked to him about the garage sale problem in Cisco. He said Bullock told him that most towns will only let a commercial home have 2 garage sales a year. But, Moore said, in Cisco sometimes these garage sales last for 3 or 4 days and they have them several times a year.

Bullock said if someone wants to have several garage sales, then they need to get a tax permit like a business has to.

Moore told the council that Patterson Ambulance will be staying in this area for at least one year. He said they are a private business and if

their ingo then they won't be able to stay. Moore said \$36.00 a year is

a good deal and he hopes more people will become a member of the ambulance service. Moore said this is the best way to go to help keep an ambulance in this area without having taxes.

Moore said ambulance dues are a part of life in Eastland County, just like taxes and everyone should pay their part. He said if the citizens want to have a private ambulance service then the city council will listen to what they say. But, Moore said, he believes this is the best way.

Patterson Ambulance will accept memberships until June 30, Moore said.

Council members also agreed to approve the financial audit for Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch for Fiscal Year 1987-88. Moore said the city of Eastland, the city of Cisco, the county of Eastland and Patterson Ambulance each paid \$50.00 to pay for the audit forms. Moore said Cisco used the money out of the surplus account. The council also approved the budget for the Eastland County Cooperative Dispatch Budget.

They also approved the contract with Texas Municipal League Worker's Compensation Joint Insurance Fund for the fiscal year of 1988-89. Moore said this insurance is required by

Moore said the City of Cisco paid every bill that was due for the past fiscal year. He said the city also had to pay back \$30,000 they borrowed last year from the fund. Moore said the city is doing good to be able to pay the money back and not to have to borrow from next

year's fund. Mayor Joe Wheatley told city manager Moore that this shows that he has good abilities when shown the figures given to him at the

meeting. Attending the meeting were council members, Vernetta Pierce, Olin Odom, Arlie Whitley and Allen Masters and Mayor Joe Wheatley, city Secretary, Ginger Johnson and city manager, Mike Moore.



The Center was on a limited budget, however, and donations were always welcome. The Multipurpose Center has a clothing room, a transportation program, a Family Planning Clinic, and a Commodities distribution, and assists with utilities for the needy.

I received a letter from Schusters of Texas, Inc. this week. They are a dried flower manufacturer and use large quantities of annual broom wees, especially the kind that tops out like umbrellas

They asked, if we had concentrations of 10 acres or more in the county, to let them know about it. Mr. Schuster says he generally can send contract crews onto a given ranch and guarantee him \$60 per ton for the weeds and they will pick and box the product on the ranch. This is done after a frost. If you have that amount of broom weeds, you can contact Mr. Schuster at 800-592-1445.



Pharmacy Topics

Researchers at Johns Hopkins in Maryland have ome up with a thermometer that patients swallow. It measures "core" temperature, emitting signals that are picked up by a receiver.

State Senator Bob Glasgow today announced his concerns as to actions by the Board Members of the Texas Department of Human Services in not approving the proposal of the Commissioner for an increase in Inpatient Hospital Reimbursement to rural

hospitals. The Legislative Budget Board on which Senator Glasgow serves had instructed the Texas Department of Human Services to give very close consideration to increasing the lowest hospital payment division from \$1,200 to \$1,500 so that rural hospitals would receive the same reimbursement rate as urban hospitals.

There is a rural health care crisis in Texas, Glasgow said, "and rural hospitals in my Senatorial District as well as other rural areas are closing one right after the other. It does not matter whether a person receives medical treatment in a rural area or in a large metropolitan area, it is just as important and just as urgent. It does not matter whether a person has an operation in a small town or in a large city, it is just as serious and just as necessary. I believe the reimbursement rates should also be the same," Glasgow continued. "At least the State would be being fair in treating hospitals the same:

USDA Announces Aid For Drought-Stricken Farmers

The U.S.D.A. has announced provisions of a program to aid farmers who suffered crop losses from this summer's widespread drought.

Emergency crop loss assistance is a major part of the multi-billion dollar package of federal aid made available by the Disaster Assistance Act of 1988.

The program provides for payments for losses in excess of 35 percent of production of specialized crops.

Highlights of the program

-- Disaster payments will be available to eligible producers on losses which are greater than 35 percent of normal production. Producers with annual gross revenues \$2 million or less will be eligible for such payments.

-- Wheat, feed grains, cotton, rice and soybeans minimum yields have been established and, if production is equal to or less than this yield, any crop production will be considered zero.

-- Eligible producers with

crop losses greater than 65 percent must agree to purchase multiperil crop insurance under the federal Crop Insurance Act for the 1989 crop for which disaster payments are made. This requirement may be waived by the county Agricultural Stablilization Committee under certain conditions.

-- The total amount of payments and benefits a person may receive for combined crop and livestock emergency losses in 1988 may not exceed \$100,000. Emergency livestock program benefits may not exceed \$50,000 in any calendar year.

-- Disaster applications for crop losses must be filed not later than March 31, 1988 at the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office, together with crop acreage reports and acceptable crop production

-- Payments will be calculated by determining the amount of loss below 65 percent of normal production and multiplying the eligible

Social Security Cards

Social Security numbers for work purposes can only be issued to U.S. citizens, permanent resident immigrants, and temporary aliens who have been granted permission to work by the Immigration and Naturalization Services, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said recently.

Even so, Hammons said, legal aliens who do not have permission to work, may need a Social Security number for purposes other than work, such as banking, school, or driver's license.

In such cases, a Social Security number will be issued, but the card will be marked to show that it is not valid for employment. A prospective employer would know at once that the holder of such a card is not legally permitted to work.

Social Security numbers cannot be issued to illegal aliens for any purpose.

A person applying for a Social Security number must present evidence of age, identity, citizenship or alien status. In addition, a person 18 or older must apply in per-



volves both common sense and the development of safe habits. All shooters should practice these 10 rules of shooting safety:

1. Treat every gun with the respect due a loaded gun. 2. Be sure of your target

before you pull the trigger. 3. Always be sure the barrel and action are clear of obstructions.

4. Never point your gun at anything you do not intend to

5. Never leave your gun unattended unless you unload it first.

6. Never consume alcoholic beverages either before or during shooting.

7. Never climb a tree or cross a fence carrying a loaded

8. Never shoot at a hard, flat surface or the surface of water. Always make sure you have a safe backstop.

9. Carry only empty guns -- taken down or with the action open -- into your camp car or home.

10. Store guns and ammunition separately, under lock and key.

Remember, carelessness is the largest single contributing factor in firearms accidents. Safety rules and proper instruction, in themselves, do not prevent accidents. It's up to every individual shooter to make the rules work, said Mrs. Wilbanks.

Today's 4-H program is for all youth -- rural and urban -- from all racial, economic and social backgrounds.

4-Hreaches girls and boys in a variety of ways as members of organized 4-H clubs, as participants in special interest groups, as enrollees in short-term projects. 4-H reaches youth through television, workshops and other educational methods, and programs are planned to meet specific needs of youth in communities where they live. Girls and boys "learn by

doing" in 4-H.

4-Hinvolves youth people everywhere -- in big cities and little towns, in the country and in the suburbs. Activities are typically conducted in the homes of members of their leaders, in schools or in other community buildings.





Notes On Northview...

The City of Eastland is the home for two Intermediate Care Facilities for the mentally retarded (ICF-MR). Northview Development Center is classified as an ICF-MR 5 and serves clients in the moderate to severe range of mental retardation. Rock House Springs is an ICF-MR I and provides services for clients who are mildly and high-moderately retarded. The third type of facility serving the mentally retarded is an ICF-MR 6 - whose clients test in the profound range.

The legal definition of mental retardation is any individual who possesses significant deficits in adaptive behavior and an IQ below 70. Each of these factors must have occurred during the developmental years between birth and 18. Therefore, an IQ or adaptive behavior level occurring beyond the 18th year would not qualify that individual for ICF-MR services by definition.

The level of retardation assigned an individual is determined from their IQ and adaptive behavior level. IQ is

calculated from administration of standardized tests such as the Peabody Vocabulary Test, the Stanford-Binet, and the Wechsler Intelligence Scale for Children. There are also specialized tests for those individuals who are sensory impaired. Once an IQ score is computed, it is ranked using the following scale:

Profound 0-19 Severe 20-35 Moderate 36-55 Mild 56-69

To gain the most accurate IQ, several tests are usually administered and then a full scale IQ figured from the various test results. This is necessary since some test result in higher scores than others based upon the degree of test difficulty.

Adaptive behavior is the degree to which an individual meets age appropriate criteria in personal and social skills. Personal skills involve those activities of daily living that a preson is able to carry out independently. Infantile, immature, and adult are the laymen's terms for adaptive behavior. Adaptive behavior levels are also derived from

standardized tests.

Once an IQ and adaptive behavior level are established, a rank is assigned based upon the aforementioned scale.

Adaptive behavior level and IQ are not fixed statistics. They can increase or decrease depending upon environmental stimuli and/or physiological influences. Therefore, a mentally retarded person may qualify for a lesser or more restrictive environment in the course of a lifetime.





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
